The FIE was founded in Paris in 1913. It has 145 member federations and its head office is in Lausanne (SUI), the Olympic Capital.

The FIE President and members of the Executive Committee are nominated by the FIE Congress, the annual meeting of the national federations. The Executive Committee has 16 members, all of different nationalities, and is composed on one side by the President, elected by the Congress and, on the other, by 15 members, including 3 women, also elected by the Congress. The President of the 5 Confederations recognised by the FIE, is a full member of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee then elected Mrs. Ana Pascu, Mr. Giorgio Scarso and Mr. Wang Wei Vice-Presidents.

Since 1896, the history of fencing and the Olympic Games have been intertwined. The first Olympic Games of the modern era took place in Athens. Nobility, Honour, Respect and Tradition are the key words governing fencing and these were reflected in the Olympic ideal. Thirteen fencers representing four countries participated in the foil and sabre events; epee was not yet an Olympic event. The discipline was entirely male.

1900: The Olympic Games were held in Paris within the context of the International World Fair. 156 fencers representing seven countries participated. Epee became an Olympic discipline.

: The Olympic Games were held in St Louis, USA, at the time of the World Fair, but the only fencers from outside the USA to take part were two Cubans and one German.

1906: The Intermediary Games in Athens were intended to be the first of another series of Olympics to be held permanently in Athens halfway through the normal Olympic cycle, but the cost was prohibitive and only one was held. Although 12 countries took part - more than at any previous Games - in 1949 the IOC ruled that they were not official.



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OLYMPIC FENCING

: London Olympic Games. Foil was removed from the Olympic programme that year because the organisers considered foil fencing to be a graceful and athletic exercise rather than a sport.

: The organisers of the Stockholm Games wanted to modify the rules relating to the foil target area. The dissatisfaction this caused highlighted the need to unify the rules in fencing.

: Paris Olympic Games. Women's Individual Foil was included in the Olympic programme.



: Berlin Olympic Games. The epee electrical apparatus, which had been around since 1931, made its Olympic appearance. Metallic pistes replaced the old cork pistes.

: Melbourne Olympic Games. The electric foil, which had been used at the world championships for the first time in 1955, became an Olympic weapon.

: Rome Olympic Games. A women's foil team event was introduced.

: Seoul Olympic Games. The electric sabre was included; there had been electric sabres since 1986.

: Atlanta Olympic Games. First women's epee events, individual and team. Women epee fencers had already competed during the 1989 World Championships.

: Athens Olympic Games and first Women's Individual Sabre events.

Fencing became completly mixed, with all three weapons available to men and women, but the team events at women's foil and sabre were dropped to comply with the IOC's restriction of ten fencing events.

: Beijing Olympic Games. 212 fencers participated, twelve more than in Athens. There were five men's events (three individual and two team) and five women's events (three individual and two team). Thus, full gender parity was reached in Beijing.





THE THREE WEAPONS

Epee

The epee has a total length of 110cm and its blade is 90cm long. The total weight of the weapon must be no more than 770g. As foil, the epee is a strike weapon only and the epee hit is with the tip of the weapon only. At epee, the target area is the entire body, head to toe, including any clothing and equipment.

Unlike in sabre and foil, in epee there are no right of way rules regarding attacks. Any hit which arrives is counted. Touches are awarded solely on the basis of which fencer makes a touch first, according to the electronic scoring machines. Also, double-touches are counted in epee, although the touches must occur within 40 milliseconds (1/25 of a second) of each other.

Sabre

The sabre has a total length of 105cm and its blade is 88cm long. The total weight of the weapon must be less than 500g.

The sabre's basic difference from the two other weapons is that a hit can be made with the cutting edge and not only with the point. The target area consists of everything above the waist, including the head and both arms.

As foil, sabre is governed by the rules of right of way. The fencer who starts an attack has the right of way. In order to avoid being hit, the opposing foil fencer will usually attempt to parry the attack and, if this is successful, riposte. To avoid being parried, the attacker may use several tactics, such as disengages or feints, which are different ways to avoid the opponents blade.





THE FENCING COMPETITION

The Fencing competition at the London 2012 Olympic Games will be held from Saturday 28 July to Sunday 5 August 2012 at ExCeL in London. The competition will consist of 10 medal events, summarised below:

A total of 212 athletes may take part in the Olympic Fencing competition. This figure includes 102 men and 102 women, with the remaining eight (8) places reserved for the host country with a non-predetermined gender breakdown.

In accordance with Rule 47 of the IOC Olympic Charter, the FIE will be responsible for the technical control and direction of Fencing at the London 2012 Olympic Games.

Duration and scoring: individual events

At foil and epee, all bouts in the individual events will consist of three (3) periods of three (3) minutes, with one (1) minute between periods, or until one fencer has scored 15 hits. If the third (3rd) period is completed before either fencer has scored 15 hits, the fencer with the most hits will be declared the winner. If the scores are tied after the third period, there will be a further one (1) minute of Fencing time. One fencer will be randomly given priority. The winner will be the first fencer to score a valid hit; if no hits are scored, the winner will be the fencer with priority. At sabre, if one fencer scores 8 hits, there is a one (1) minute break.

Duration and scoring: team events

In the team events, each match will consist of nine (9) bouts, to a maximum of 45 hits. Each bout will last three (3) minutes, or until one team's score has reached the next multiple of five (5) hits: a score of five (5) hits after the first bout, a score of 10 hits after the second (2nd) bout, a score of 15 hits after the third (3rd) bout, and so on. If the ninth (9th) bout is completed before either team has scored 45 hits, the team with the most hits will be declared the winner.

If the scores are tied after the ninth (9th) bout, there will be a further one (1) minute of Fencing time. One fencer will be randomly given priority. The winner will be the first fencer to score a valid hit; if no hits are scored, the winner will be the fencer with priority.



COMPETITION FORMAT

Individual events

All events will be fenced in a direct elimination format throughout

Individual competitions at weapons with a team event at London 2012 will comprise approximately 36 fencers per weapon and will be run as an incomplete direct elimination tableau of 64. Individual competitions at weapons with only an individual event at London 2012 will comprise up to 32 fencers per weapon and will be run as a complete or incomplete direct elimination tableau of 32.

The initial order of fencers will be established according to the updated and adjusted FIE Official Ranking. If there are fencers qualified who do not appear in the FIE Official Ranking, and/or if there are fencers ranked equally in the FIE Official Ranking, the FIE will carry out a preliminary drawing of lots as follows:

- a drawing of lots for any fencers ranked equally
- a drawing of lots for any fencers who do not appear in the FIE Official Ranking

Once all fencers have an initial ranking, there will be a drawing of lots in pairs for all fencers in the tableau.

Team events

Teams will be seeded according to the Adjusted FIE Official Team Ranking at each weapon. Where teams are ranked equally, a drawing of lots will be carried out.

Teams will be placed in a complete direct elimination tableau of eight (8) or an incomplete direct elimination tableau of 16, depending on the number of teams participating in the event. The teams will retain their initial ranking without a drawing of lots. If there is a host country team, it will be placed in the direct elimination tableau according to its place in the current Adjusted FIE Official Team Ranking at the weapon concerned

All team events will be run by direct elimination throughout.

Places five (5) to eight (8) will be fenced.



MEDALS AND DIPLOMAS

Medals and diplomas will be awarded in each event of the Fencing competition in accordance with the IOC Olympic Charter (Rule 57: Victory, Medals and Diplomas Ceremonies) and the IOC Technical Manual on Protocol (Articles 5.4.3, 5.4.4 and 5.4.5).

First place

A silver gilt medal, a diploma and an Olympic medallist's pin.

Second place

A silver medal, a diploma and an Olympic medallist's pin.

Third place

A bronze medal, a diploma and an Olympic medallist's pin.

Fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth places

A diploma.





QUALIFICATION SYSTEM



During the Olympics in London, the number of fencers

will be: 212
Men 102
Women 102
Host country 8
TOTAL 212

In addition to its possible qualification through the current rules, the host NOC had the right to enter 8 fencers, to be distributed between team and individual events as it sees fit.

6 individual events and 4 team events

The individual events bring together about 36 fencers in each weapon that has a team and about 30 fencers in the weapons that do not have team events.

The teams will be composed of 3 fencers, i.e. for 8 teams, 24 fencers in each weapon, plus the team from the host country if applicable.

Qualification details

The teams were qualified through the FIE official team ranking. Athletes from countries that qualified through team also participate to individual events.

The athletes could qualify through:

 the FIE official individual ranking as of March 31st 2012 (the five best results in the World Cup, the Grand Prix or Satellite competitions, plus the World Championships and the Zone Championships are taken into account for the classification of an athlete)

2. the zone-qualifying events

9.04.2012	Olympic qualification in Africa (Casablanca, Morocco)
2021.04.2012	Olympic qualification in Asia (Wakayama, Japan)
2022.04.2012	Olympic qualification in America (Santiago, Chili)
2122.04.2012	Olympic qualification in Europe (Bratislava, Slovakia)

The zone-qualifying events were only open (1 fencer per country and per weapon) to those countries which did not have any fencers who have qualified (through team or through the individual AOR by zone).

1. Qualification for Men's Sabre/Foil and Women's Epee/Foil

a) Team qualification

The teams were qualified as follows:

- The first four teams in the FIE official team ranking, irrespective of which zone they are from.
- The highest ranked team from each zone among the teams ranking in 5th to 16th position in the FIE official team ranking. If a zone is not represented in these ranking positions, the next team in the official team ranking qualifies, irrespective of its zone.

b) Individual qualification

- For each weapon, the 24 fencers who qualified through team qualification.
- The 7 highest ranked fencers in the FIE individual AOR* by zone (2 for Europe, 2 for Asia-Oceania, 2 for America and 1 for Africa) with only one fencer from any one country.
- The 5 highest ranked fencers in the zone-q ualifying events (2 for Europe, 1 for Asia-Oceania, 1 for America and 1 for Africa).

In no case could a country qualify more than 3 fencers per weapon.

Qualification through the individual AOR by zone iwas reserved for countries that do not have any fencers qualified through team.


2. Individual qualification for Mens's Epee and Women's Sabre

- 1. the first 12 from the individual FIE Official Ranking;
- the first 8 from the individual AOR by zone, with only 1 fencer from any one country (2 for Europe, 2 for Asia-Oceania, 2 for America and 2 for Africa);
- the 10 fencers from the zone-qualifying events (4 for Europe, 3 for Asia-Oceania, 2 for America and 1 for Africa).

In no case could a country qualify more than 2 fencers per weapon through the 1st and 2nd criteria.

AOR * The Adjusted Official Ranking is the FIE Official Ranking modified as follows:

- For the weapons with a team event, the names of all the fencers, by country and by weapon, who have qualified through team, are removed. For the other countries only the 2 highest ranked fencers by country, by zone and by weapon are kept.
- For the weapons with no team event, only the 2 highest ranked fencers by country and by weapon are kept while all the other names are removed.






Fencers may ask for a review of a decision by video-refereeing.

Appeals:

 In individual events each fencer has two possible appeals in direct elimination bouts and one in a pool bout. Should the referee agree with fencer who appealed for video-refereeing, the fencer retains his right of appeal.

REFEREEING

- In team events, the fencers have the right to a single appeal for video-refereeing per relay and are entitled to retain this right should the referee agree with this appeal.
- In case of an appeal for video-refereeing, the referee will walk over to the refereeing consultant.
 They will watch the video together and after consultation with the consultant delegate, the referee will give his final decision. No other review of the same action can be requested.
- If the fencer's scores are equal at the end of the match, for the decisive hit, the referee must use the video refereeing.
- The refereeing consultant may at any time request that the referee review his decision.
