THE FIE TODAY

The FIE today

Today, the FIE has 148 member federations and its head office is in Lausanne (SUI), the Olympic Capital. At the FIE Elective Congress held in Moscow (RUS) in December 2012, Mr. Alisher Usmanov (RUS) was re-elected as President to lead the federation until 2016. He has been the FIE President since 2008. Mr. Usmanov appointed Mr. Frédéric Pietruszka (FRA) as Secretary General and Mr. Jacek Bierkowski (POL) as Secretary Treasurer.

The major objectives of the FIE 2012- 2016 are

- to actively promote the development of fencing throughout the world
- to establish fencing as a global sport and media product.

The means to reach this aim is to continue giving financial and organisational assistance to confederations and national federations. The FIE conducts and finances administration courses, coaches training courses, athletes training camps and distributes equipment. In addition, the FIE continues to enhance the visual appeal of the sport and to make fencing more accessible to a broader audience.

FIE Governance

The FIE is governed by the FIE Executive Committee which is composed of 21 members. 16 members including the President are elected by the FIE Electoral Congress which takes place every four years. The FIE statutes provide that they all have to be of different nationalities and that three of them be women. The President of each of the five continental Confederations recognised by the FIE is also full member of the Executive Committee.



THE THREE WEAPONS

Foil

The foil has a total length of 110cm and its blade is 90cm long. The total weight of the weapon must be less than 500g.

The foil is a thrusting weapon only. Fencers can only score a hit by striking the point of their weapon on the defined target area of their opponent which is limited to the torso only. Non-valid hits also stop the bout, but are not counted.

Foil is governed by the rules of right of way. The fencer who starts an attack has the right of way. In order to avoid being hit, the opposing foil fencer usually attempts to parry the attack and, if this is successful, riposte. To avoid being parried, the attacker may use several tactics, such as disengages or coupés, which are different ways to avoid the opponents' blade.



Epee

The epee has a total length of 110cm and its blade is 90cm long. The total weight of the weapon must be less than 770g. As foil, the epee is a thrusting weapon only and the epee attack is with the point of the weapon only.

At epee, the target area is the entire body, head to toe, including any clothing and equipment. Unlike in sabre and foil, in epee there are no right of way rules regarding attacks. Any hit which arrives is counted. Touches are awarded solely on the basis of which fencer makes a touch first, according to an electrical recording apparatus. Also, double-touches are allowed in epee, although the touches must occur within 40 milliseconds (1/25 of a second) of each other.



Sabre

The sabre has a total length of 105cm and its blade is 88cm long. The total weight of the weapon must be less than 500g.


The sabre's basic difference from the two other weapons is that a hit can be made with the cutting edge and not only with the point. The target area consists of everything above the waist, including the head and both arms.

As foil, sabre is governed by the rules of right of way. The fencer who starts an attack has the right of way.

In order to avoid being hit, the opposing sabre fencer usually attempts to parry the attack and, if this is successful, riposte. To avoid being parried, the attacker may use several tactics, such as disengages or coupés, which are different ways to avoid the opponents' blade.







THE **ORIGINS OF THE FIE** AND THE FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The history of the FIE is strongly intertwined with the history of the modern Olympic Games: it was the need for a standardised set of competition rules for the Olympic Games that finally led to the foundation of the FIE 1913 in Paris, France. Before, it had been the French Société d'Encouragement de l'Escrime or the national federation of the host country that specified the rules to be used at the Olympic Games. In 1912, France and Italy withdrew fully or partially from the Olympic tournament because it had been impossible to reach an agreement over the rules.

In order to prevent similar incidents in the future, nine federations gathered in Paris in November 1913 to establish an international body that would be in charge of developing standardised rules and organising international competitions.

World War I delayed the organising of fencing competitions but with the success of the fencing events at the 1920 Olympics using the new rules, the FIE organised the first championship in 1921. The competition was called "Championnats d'Europe" and was held in Paris with only a men's individual epee competition on the programme. In the following years the championships were gradually expanded and several events were added.

The championship tournament continued to be called "Championnats d'Europe" even though non-European fencers were allowed to compete in it. Following a request of the Italian Fencing Federation, the first competition to be officially called a "world championships" was held in 1937 at the Palais des Sports in Paris, featuring men's epee, men's sabre, men's foil and women's foil

The last world championship before World War II was held in 1938 in Piestany, Czechoslovakia. In 1947, the world championships were resumed in Lisbon, Portugal. Since then, world championships have been held in every non-Olympic year. Disciplines that are not the programme of a specific edition of the Olympic Games, however, have a world championship instead.

HOF THE HALL OF FAME

The Hall of Fame is one of the FIE's major centennial projects. The idea for the Hall of Fame is to honour the legends of fencing and commemorate their exceptional achievements and contribution to the evolution of fencing throughout the last 100 years. During that time, fencing has seen the advent of many magical moments and extraordinary athletes, coaches, officials and individuals that have shaped the image of our sport and have significantly assisted in the development and diffusion of fencing. The Centennial of the FIE is the opportunity to look back over the past century of fencing and pay tribute to the men and women

that have helped make our sport what it is today. The FIE is proud to present a selection of 112 persons based on the proposals of the FIE member federations and the votes of the FIE Executive Committee. The candidates range from outstanding athletes over officials and administrators to coaches and fencing masters. All continental zones are represented.

The FIE Hall of Fame is accessible in different ways. Throughout 2013, a wall with the pictures of the elected candidates is exhibited during all the centennial competitions organized by the founding members of the FIE and at the

Junior and Cadet World Championships in Porec (CRO) and the Senior World Championships in Budapest (HUN) and the Veteran World Championships in Varna (BUL). There is also a booklet that has been produced to present the Hall of Fame elected candidates with a short biography reflecting the greatness achieved in the sport of fencing. In addition, the FIE Hall of Fame is displaying on the FIE website, www.fie.org, in order to share with the whole world the legends of fencing and is presented in the FIE digital magazine Escrime XXI.

THE TRAVELLING EXHIBITION


The aim of this centennial project is to create an interesting and interactive exhibition about the FIE and fencing. The main subjects of the exhibition are the foundation of the FIE and the development of fencing over the years, approaching fencing from different angles.

The exhibition has a compact design and will be available to the public at the Senior World Championships in Budapest and the FIE Centennial Gala Dinner in Paris. A smaller version will be exhibited at the centennial competitions organized by the nine founding members in 2013.

The Travelling Exhibition can be divided in three basic groups:

- Weapons, masks and protective tools from the last 150 years.
- Publications and printed matter. A complete set of original text books of fencing covering all regions from 1568 (Achille Marozzo, Arte dell Activate to the principle of the 20th control





INTERVIEW WITH **ALISHER USMANOV**FIE PRESIDENT

ESCRIME XXI: Mr. President, would you regard 2012 as a successful year for the FIE and fencing?

Yes, 2012 was very successful. Everybody who attended the Olympic fencing events in London or watched them on television would confirm that the competitions were held at a high level.

Our sport came across very well. The level of fencing has risen significantly. It was a real spectacle. We had more spectators at the venues than at any previous Olympic Games, and the number of TV viewers increased to almost 2 billion. On behalf of the FIE, I would like to thank the London 2012 organising team and all the volunteers for their great work.

I would like also to thank the organisers

of the 2012 World Team Championships in Kiev and the Junior and Cadet World Championships in Moscow who delivered high level championships and contributed to making 2012 a fruitful year for the FIE.

ESCRIME XXI: What else can you say about London 2012 from an FIE perspective? I would like to highlight that the London Olympic Games proved that our efforts to develop fencing as a global sport have advanced significantly. The Games will be remembered for the first fencing gold medal for a South American athlete and the first fencing medal ever for a competitor from an African country.

Fencing is becoming a truly universal sport. We have now 148 member federations and there is still room for more. We want to raise the level of fencing around the world. The future of the FIE lies in the development of national federations.

ESCRIME XXI: In order to achieve this goal, the FIE gives substantial financial and material assistance to confederations and national federations. In addition, the FIE supports or organises athletes' training camps, coaches' training and administration courses.

In the last four years, the FIE's budget has almost doubled to CHF 24.5 million. A considerable portion of this money has been spent on these and similar activities. The goal is to create equal opportunities for all sportspeople and



help them to realise their full potential. If we really seek to establish fencing as a global sport in high demand then we have to reach out to people and create a strong base of practitioners all around the world.

ESCRIME XXI: At the 2012 Congress in Moscow you were re-elected for a second four year term. What are the goals for your second presidency?

My position is to consistently pursue the implementation of the development projects that were started four years ago. In addition to that, the focus will be on improving the organisation and running of competitions at all levels, in particular the title competitions. We will continue to put considerable efforts into increasing the visibility of the sport. Fencing has to be actively promoted as a global sport and media product.

there been in achieving twelve medal events at the Olympic Games in Rio 2016?

I promise that the FIE will undertake all efforts to reach the target of twelve medal events at the Olympic Games in Rio 2016. We actively collaborate with representatives of the International Olympic Committee, national Olympic committees and the international sports community.

ESCRIME XXI: In 2013, the FIE celebrates its 100th anniversary. In your opinion, is the FIE ready for the next 100 years?

100 years of Olympic history combined with strong core values is already a solid foundation. However, we cannot rest on our laurels. We have to move forward and there is no time to lose. We have to act professionally and apply business principles to all our actions. Thankfully, there are a lot of talented and qualified people who are passionate about fencing. We will work together and unite our efforts for the successful future of fencing.
