1. Addresses

Alisher Usmanov: My friends, the time came to take your places, please. Nathalie, please make a special announcement. Is everything ready to begin?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes, we are ready. We start with the addresses.

Alisher Usmanov:

Good morning to everybody. Welcome to Lausanne.

We begin our Congress today at the end of the Olympic cycle, and we need to recognize we have a big event today because our President Thomas Bach is here with us. I think everybody remembers how difficult it was to arrange the Olympic Games and our fencing competitions in Tokyo. I would like to point out President Bach's role in creating the example of the unity of all nations during the last five years in the world. On behalf of us all I would like to express our gratitude and appreciation for his efforts to the sport generally and into fencing particularly. For the first time in our history, we have achieved the dream of many generations of fencers to have a full set of 12 events of our World Championships in the Olympic programme. For this, I think we all must sing Alleluia for Thomas Bach.

Thomas, your belief in the Olympic flame and its role in uniting humanity gives such a beautiful and generous example of how people can be together. Because of this, with great pleasure, I give the floor to our President, Thomas Bach.

Applause.

Address by the President of the International Olympic Committee.

Thomas Bach:

Bonjour! Good morning!

It is truly a pleasure to be among you, be with our fencing family, and be able to address you at the very beginning of this Congress.

It's about one year that you should have met already in 2020, but you had to postpone your Congress because of the pandemic. This is another demonstration, another signal of what has changed with this pandemic and how it has influenced not only our health but made a significant impact on all our social life. Nobody, nobody should even dream that the world and our life will be back to the times before. This pandemic will have far-reaching consequences for our future, even once the health crisis is over, which is still very far as we have to experience these days.

In these difficult moments for all of us, it's even better to be together, to be with your families. Whether it's your private family, or the sports family, or here, to be with our family of fencing, and work for the sport we all love so much. This is what the world needs now. The world needs this looking into the future, in sport in particular. The world needs these symbols, signals, and messages of hope, so that we all are engaged to work for a better and brighter future not only for us, not only for fencing, not only for sport but society at large. And as your President, Alisher Usmanov, was already very kind to mention it, I would like to thank you very much for this. We all know that the Tokyo Olympic Games played an important role for the entire world in this respect, because

these Olympic Games were sending this message of hope, this message of peace, unity, and solidarity to the entire world. There were unprecedented gains, and they needed unprecedented efforts to make them happen and to make them happen in a safe way.

There were very, very difficult moments about one year and a half ago. Almost every day, there were challenges, there were doubts. There were new questions, and we had to find new answers. We could find them, and we did find them, because we were all united in our Olympic community. Nobody, not a single National Olympic Committee nor a single International Federation, was opting out of this unity and this joint effort. Only this made the Games possible in the end. This is why I would like to thank your President Alisher Usmanov, and I would like to thank all of you for having been a part of this effort and this team, which made the Tokyo Olympic Games happen and made them such a big success. So, all my thanks are to you, and all my congratulations are also to you. You can be extremely proud, extremely proud to be part of this team. You can be extremely proud of the success of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, and you can be extremely proud of the success of fencing during these Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. Thank you to all of you.

Applause.

We can really say: we did it, and we did it for the athletes. Because that is what was the most important: to give the athletes their opportunity to shine on the Olympic stage. What was also the secret of the success of these Olympic Games is the athletes' attitude, and it was the true Olympic spirit the athletes brought to these Games and brought from Tokyo to the world.

Then we had to accept the decision of the Japanese authorities, shortly before the games, no spectators at all. This was one of the moments where I was really worried, and I was not alone in these worries. We were afraid, really afraid that these would be Olympic Games without a soul. That these would be very cold Games of technology, that these would be Games without any spirit, that they would not send any message beyond sport. And the Olympic Games are always also beyond sport. The competitions are at the core, of course, but the mission of the Games is going beyond sport. What happened was just the contrary. I've never experienced this Olympic spirit as much as in Tokyo. When you were walking through the Olympic Village and speaking with the athletes, and you saw the athletes, you always saw smiling faces, you saw happy people, and you saw grateful people who knew what effort it took by all of us to make these Olympic Games happen. They were showing this gratefulness and this appreciation, and they were communicating about it.

Then when it comes to the venues, it was really a unique experience. I'm sure those of you who could not be there could feel it on your TV screen or mobile devices. What happened then in the competitions and in the stadia was that the athletes, rather than enjoying being celebrated individually by the public, celebrated each other, enjoying this true Olympic spirit of peaceful competition, of a competition among friends, respecting and acknowledging each other in a way that had never happened before, when most of the attention went to the spectators or went to other events. All this in the stadia gave you real goosebumps, and from what we know from the reaction of the worldwide audience, the same was true for the spectators on TV or the digital platforms. When you saw these athletes communicating with their friends and family at home, you could feel these emotions, and you could feel the relief of these athletes to have these Games, to have their performance, and to enjoy this true Olympic spirit of friendship, excellence, respect, and solidarity.

Fencing played its important part there. There were unforgettable moments during the fencing competitions in Tokyo. Thanks to outstanding cooperation over the years of preparation between you, the FIE, and the IOC. This is the reason our IOC Sports Director Kit McConnell is here with me this morning to demonstrate this extremely close and good cooperation in all the preparations, and then also with regard to the final fencing competitions.

I still remember the women's foil team competition, which I could attend, which displayed a great sport. I think everybody in our family also remembers Sofia Pozdniakova, following in the Olympic footsteps of her father.

What a story we could experience there! What a human touch this gives to fencing and to these Olympic competitions in Tokyo!

You could achieve this and build on this because you have created a very strong foundation for fencing in the last couple of years. You made tremendous progress there in the communication of your competitions of the World Cup, where the people can follow on TV, and the Olympic Channel. You achieved this because you had a vast and very successful development programme with the education of coaches, and with the equipment donations you've made to so many member Federations and the new member Federations. You achieved in Tokyo in particular gender equality, which also helps develop the sport to have boys and girls, men, and women on an equal basis, enjoying our great sport. You had Olympic scholarships for athletes and coaches, which again helps develop our beloved sport of fencing in the long term. There are so many more things, and I can only encourage you to go further now, keep developing in this way, and address the new challenges we are all facing, and the IOC is making you an offer.

We have recently adopted the Olympic Agenda 2020 +5, our follow-up strategic road map on Olympic Agenda 2020. This Olympic Agenda 2020 +5 has one core point and one core topic. This is the contribution of sport to sustainable development to live up to the international community's expectations in us with regards to being an important enabler in achieving the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. And if you want to keep the relevance of sport, which we have increased during the pandemic... We have suffered a lot, but the social relevance of sport, the relevance of sport in society during this pandemic has increased... If you want to keep this relevance and strengthen and further increase this relevance, then we must address this challenge of the UN SDGs and take it as an opportunity for us to develop further. I can only invite you and encourage you to take this offer of the IOC and join hands once again, to partner up. They are making it clear what sport can do for health, for education, for gender equality, for peace, for environmental protection, and what sport can do in the fight against climate change.

I invite you to join the Sports for Climate Action initiative, which the IOC has initiated together with the UN. Many international sports organisations and national sports organisations have already been joining. You are most welcome in this Sports for Climate Action initiative to help address the most urgent challenge we have in this world. We need to have an effort by everybody because nobody can do it alone: to fight against climate change. We need a concerted effort in solidarity by everybody. So welcome, hopefully, to this initiative.

I would also like to invite you to develop further when it comes to a clean sport, particularly the fight against doping. In the last couple of years, you have already been undertaking very important steps by delegating the out-of-competition testing and result management to the International Testing Agency (ITA). In Tokyo, again, you have seen how successful this delegation of the anti-doping system was and is in different aspects. First of all, you can benefit from this delegation from a wide experience of ITA with all the sports, which makes the tests much more intelligent and benefits from the latest state-of-the-art science with regard to anti-doping. It also makes the Federations credible because you do not even have the perception of a conflict of interest when it comes to the fight against doping. You, in turn, can have confidence in ITA and CAS (The Court of Arbitration for Sport) that they're doing their best, that they're doing an excellent job to keep your sport clean and to keep any suspicion away from your sport and your Federation. I would like to encourage you to study the possibility of taking the next step and delegating the full anti-doping system to ITA on the testing and doping management, and then to CAS when it comes to sanctions. Then, I think you can also be a part of a success story in the fight against doping. Again, remember Tokyo, did you hear any discussion about any doping cases or any kind of management? I think nobody heard anything. This was greatly thanks to the fact that the IOC fully delegated this issue and that both ITA and the CAS have been doing a fantastic job already in the pre-Games testing period, but then also during the Olympic Games.

I would also like to thank you for the excellent cooperation with the Olympic Channel, which is another signal of how close we are and how we can create win-win situations because it's an excellent promotion for our sport.

It's at the same time also a great opportunity for the Olympic Channel to be closer to fencing and to be closer to the athletes.

When I summarize all these together, I think you have many reasons to look ahead with great confidence into an even brighter future of fencing, building on this truly very strong foundation all of you have been building together in the last couple of years under the leadership of your President. All of you together is also the message for the future. We have seen during this pandemic, and we have learned may be in the hard way that in fact, we can only go faster, that we can only aim higher, we can only become stronger if we are working together and in solidarity. Therefore, our new Olympic motto is so appropriate for these times and for the future of the sport, but also society at large: "Faster, higher, stronger together".

I invite you to join this journey together with the IOC and keep strengthening sport, keep strengthening the Olympic values, and keep strengthening the Olympic Games, so that we can in the future and even more in the future send this message of peace, unity, solidarity, and respect without any kind of discrimination to the entire world. Thank you very much, and I wish you a great and successful Congress, and I'm looking forward to seeing the latest in Paris 2024 with another splendid Olympic fencing tournament. All the very best and thank you very much for your kind reception.

Applause.

And to say thank you to you, I would like to hand over to your President a token of appreciation from the IOC to FIE with great thanks for your great contribution to the success of the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020. This is the official torch for FIE with all our gratitude, appreciation, and congratulations.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Thank you. From our side, we also cannot not recognize the contribution, which President Bach made. As I said earlier, you fulfilled the dream of many generations of fencers. We have a special award of Challenge Chevalier Feyerick on behalf of our Federation to President Bach. Thank you very much.

Thomas Bach: Thank you. All the best. Have a great Congress and see you soon again!

Nathalie Rodriguez: I would like to invite the President of the Swiss Federation, Mr. Lars Frauchiger to address the Congress, please.

Address by the President of the Swiss Fencing Federation

Lars Frauchiger (SUI): Thank you.

Dear President of FIE Mr. Usmanov,

Dear Mr. Bach, President of IOC,

Dear Members of the Executive Committee, the Councils, the Commissions,

Dear Delegates, Dear Fencing family,

My name is Lars Frauchiger; as Madame Rodriguez just said, I am the President of the Swiss Fencing Federation, and I would like to welcome all of you here for this Congress. I am happy that we are all able to be reunited

here in Lausanne, Switzerland.

Alisher Usmanov: We are also delighted to see you here and thank you for your warm hospitality.

Lars Frauchiger (SUI): You are very welcome.

As Mr. Bach already said, we are still living in uncertain times, wondering how the pandemic will continue to affect us in the future. Numbers are rising, and more people are being hospitalized. Some countries are implementing new and robust regulations; others are going into partial lockdowns. The virus and the uncertainties still impact sport and certainly also fencing. This is why I strongly believe it is important to hold this Congress.

Here in Lausanne, we can come together, reconnect, and support each other in promoting the sport we feel so passionately about. Today we talk about fencing to strengthen our sport in every possible way, despite any uncertainties. This Congress also gives me the opportunity to say thank you. Thanks to all who organised competitions, big or small, whatever kind of competition, wherever. The initiative demonstrated has been fantastic. The advantage you made for our sport is praiseworthy. And to all of you who will host future competitions, I say: I know now it is harder than ever and more complicated than before, but we must try by all our means to keep our sport alive. We must ensure we continue to provide training, competitions, and championships. Stay strong, keep your heads up, looking to the future. Thanks to your dedication, our sport will blossom again.

Having organised last week's World Cup competition in Bern, we, and I'm sure all the other hosts of competitions of the previous weeks and months will agree with me, we are aware of the challenges and the hard work needed to host such a Congress as this one here. The FIE staff have organised this Congress, allowing us to reunite our fencing family again. Dear staff, you made this possible, thank you and congratulations!

Let's take this chance we have been offered! Let's work together and give our sport, and our friends and family, everything it needs to grow and stay alive. Let's make it our intent, and let's have this Congress, not only to survive but to come strong out together. We are here because of fencing, we are here for fencing, and we all love fencing. Dear friends and fencing family, have a successful Congress. Thank you for your attention.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Mr. President, we also appreciate your support in organising our Congress and everything the Swiss Federation did to develop our sport. Especially in Lausanne, we make together a very big fencing club. We want to present you with this gold medal from our Federation in the memory of this Congress.

Applause.

Dear friends, we continue our work, and firstly, I want to finish my address to you.

Again, welcome everybody and I wish you great success and results of our work. After having analyzed our Road to Tokyo we can admit that we have achieved the great results. But simultaneously, we need to think about the future. In the future, we, of course, will have new achievements and success, but at the same time, we must understand that the problem persists, the virus is still existent in the world, and it will continue its influence on our competitions.

It mainly creates serious difficulty when traveling between countries and continents and holding large worldwide events in our competitions. That is why, everybody must understand that must use all our resources to solve potential problems. We will continue our way forward to develop our sport and make our sport competitive with every member of this Olympic programme, where we now, for the first time in 32 years, have moved up in the ranking of the Olympic sports.

I don't say this because I want to demonstrate my role. My role is very small. Every success and development of our sport is in your hands, inside of the Federations that today create the history of our sport. But simultaneously, I want to emphasize that if we together do not find the new sources for our budget, apart from the money which the IOC can give us, it will be absolutely impossible to provide everything necessary to develop our sport. These are very big questions, and these questions are primary.

I heard about some proposals concerning our achievements, particularly regarding modification of our qualifications of the Olympic Games. We got the opinion of the Sports Director of IOC regarding this issue. The IOC is the owner of the Olympic Games. Our Federations are only participants. Everybody must understand it.

I would like that every federation understands that only together we can achieve something. Let's not divide our unity especially during this challenging period caused by pandemic and its consequences that fencing as well as other sports have faced.

I think our Executive Committee has achieved a lot in these five years although we have been working mainly online. We were able to provide full support to every Federation that needed our help for organising qualification competitions, arranging anti-Covid efforts. All federations were getting our direct support. And that is why I want to express my gratitude and thanks to all the Executive Committee members, our Directorate members, and of course, to our Lady of Fencing, Madame Rodriguez.

After the new elections, when we have a new Executive Committee, we shall see how we plan our work until the Olympic Games in Paris. The most important is to keep the joint effort to solve this problem, not make himself or his Federation look like the brightest member of our family. We are all equal, and we recognize everybody. But if we send a signal of disrespectful behavior, this cannot remain unanswered. Everybody must be responsible for their words.

Today I want to say words of gratitude to everyone for our joint work during these 12 years. It is a very long period during which we managed to promote this sport to a higher level online, in the digital world, and to achieve greater brightness of fencing in science and content. That is why one more time I presented my candidature to the presidency, if somebody wants to do more, please go ahead.

Because I am the only one nominated today, I am saying to everybody that I received about 50 or 60 letters from different Federations encouraging me to keep my nomination and stay in this job and this position. I want to thank you very much for demonstrating your support to me. Still, at the same time, I want to guarantee, guarantee this word of a President: I work for the interests of any Federation that is a part of our family, excluding those who creates an illusion of the activity. We don't need those Federations. In the future, we must have an extensive campaign to check the actual activity of several Federations who know acting, but in any case, received some small but at least help from FIE. Thank you very much again, and I wish you good work in this Congress, an atmosphere of unity, of hoping and believing in the future of our sport. Thank you very much. I give the floor to Nathalie to open the actual programme, which we need to be quick in finishing today.

(Laughter)

Applause.

And excuse me for my special protocol as I cannot hug everybody who comes to me because I have a meeting with President Bach later. He also had a special protocol, a five-day quarantine.

Yesterday we had our Executive Committee meeting in the Olympic House. President Bach participated personally and expressed many good words in the address of those who put their efforts to develop our sport. I believe everybody who is sitting in this hall, of course, loves fencing and wants it to develop. Thank you very much again. Nathalie, please start.

Applause.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Good morning, everybody.

You had to come a bit earlier this morning because we made the roll call before nine o'clock.

Today there are one hundred and eighteen Federations present. You can see their names on the screen. And twenty-eight Federations gave a proxy. The screen displays the names of these Federations and the names of the Federations which accepted the proxies. There is a total of one hundred and forty-six Federations present or represented.

The process for the voting is following: the First Delegate of each Federation has a tablet on his or her desk and also received a password, generated randomly, which must be used to open the tablet. The whole process is managed by an external company and not by the FIE. We did not have access to the tablets, nor did we have access to the passwords. The tablets are not connected to the internet; they are cabled to prevent network interference. You have on your desk also an explanation on how to vote. You will see that it's very easy. If you have any questions, we are ready to answer them. All the votes will be done electronically from the beginning until the end.

We will not provide microphones to the delegates for sanitary reasons because we don't want the microphones to be touched. We have installed three microphones in each hallway here. The delegates who wish to intervene must raise their hand and then move to the nearest microphone in the hallway.

We have to nominate a Commission for the awarding of the Challenge Chevalier Feyerick. We propose the following persons for the Commission as per the Statutes: Mrs. Ana Pascu, Mr. Yann Bernard, Mr. Haibin Wang, Mr. Mbagnick Ndiaye, and Mr. Lars Frauchiger. The Commission should meet during lunchtime to discuss the proposal of the Executive Committee for the awarding of the 2021 Challenge Chevalier Feyerick.

Also, you know that we will have to vote on the candidatures for the Senior World Championships 2023. There are three candidates, and we would need these candidates to come to the tribune to select an envelope. Each envelope contains a number, and this number, once selected, will be the order in which the Federations will present their candidatures. I would like to invite Italy, United Arab Emirates, and Uzbekistan to come here to select an envelope.

So, Uzbekistan will present first, Italy will be second, and the United Arab Emirates will be the third.

I would like to remind you the rules on votes.

The decisions of Congress are reached by a simple majority vote cast.

The modifications to the Rules are valid with a simple majority of the votes cast.

The modifications of the Statutes are valid with a majority of two-thirds of the votes cast.

The total number of votes cast must be equal to the majority of all the Federations present or represented at the Congress.

2. Ratification of the new federations

Nathalie Rodriguez: Let's move to the first item – actually, the third item on the agenda, which is the *Ratification of the new federations*. The Executive Committee has approved the affiliation of the Federation of Pakistan in 2021, and we ask Congress to ratify the affiliation of the Federation of Pakistan.

We are going to move to the vote.

The vote is open now.

Has everyone voted? Is there anyone who did not vote?

The problem was solved, we close the vote.

Pakistan is now a new member of the FIE.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Pakistan is a big country. We welcome you, and we look forward, and we hope for the reactions of quickest support from your government to develop fencing in Pakistan. Historically, this country, of course, must have a good fencing tradition. Thank you.

3. 2020 Executive Committee Annual Report

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item on the agenda is the *Annual Report of the Executive Committee* for the year 2020.

The report includes the results of the vote proposed to Federations on November 24, and the results of these votes were sent by information letter 11-20 to National Federations. The floor is to the Secretary General for the item on the Annual Report.

Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH, GRE): Good morning, everybody. During the year, we lost many friends from our fencing family. Please stand up in the memory of all these friends who passed away.

(A minute of silence.)

Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH, GRE): Thank you very much. Thank you.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We are going to open the vote on the 2020 Annual Report of the Executive Committee.

Nathalie Rodriguez: The vote is open.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We are going to close the vote.

The vote is closed.

The report was approved.

4. 2020 Financial report, auditors' report, approval of the accounts, discharge to the Executive Committee and to the auditors.

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item on the agenda is the *2020 Financial report, auditors' report, approval of the accounts, discharge to the Executive Committee and to the auditors*. The floor is to the Secretary-Treasurer of the FIE, Mrs. Ferial Salhi.

Ferial Salhi (ALG): Good morning, everybody.

Our budget was of 10,334,400 CHF in 2020, and we spent 8,590,945 CHF. Of course, we didn't spend the whole budget, because as you know, a large part of the competitions was cancelled. There were cancellations of Grand Prix and World Cups and Championships and the postponement of the Olympic Games. It is normal that we did not completely spend the budget, and the expenses of the Olympic Games were transferred to the following year. The International Federation has set up an assistance plan for Federations, Confederations, and webinars. Referees, Commissions, and Councils also benefited from this exceptional plan, and the amount of this exceptional budget was 1,102,000 CHF.

It was a particular year, and if we count the usual aid and the exceptional aid from the International Federation, we can say that the International Federation provided 32% of its budget for assistance.

We ended the year with a capital of 23,685,594 CHF.

Regarding revenue, we were expecting to receive 21,444,200 CHF, but with the postponement of the Olympic Games, the income from the Olympic Games obviously did not come in, and we had the usual donation from the President of the International Federation. We thank him for that 5 million. These revenues represent 93% of the contributions we had in 2020.

We ended the season with the year 2020 with a capital of 23,685,594 CHF. Do you have any questions?

Alisher Usmanov: This is not normal for other Federations in other sports. *(Laughter.)*

Ferial Salhi: Do you have any questions to ask, please?

Alisher Usmanov: How much is our total resource today before going to new elections?

Ferial Salhi: 29 million, nearly 30 million.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: It is my heritage for the new President.

(Laughter.)

Don't worry; we will not return to a very poor Federation.

Nathalie Rodriguez: If you have no questions on the Financial Report 2020, we are going to open the vote on that item.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The report was approved.

5. Budget for 2022

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item on the agenda is the *Budget for 2022*, and the floor is to the Treasurer.

Ferial Salhi (ALG): The budget planned for the year 2022 is the same as the other years, in the end. Except that there is an additional assistance budget of 1,541,000 CHF for the organisers. That's the only difference between the budgets we had in previous years and the year 2022.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We are going to move to the vote on Budget 2022, and we are going to open the vote on that item.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The budget is approved.

6. Nomination of the auditors

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item on the agenda is the *Nomination of the auditors for 2022*, and the proposal is to reconduct Ernst and Young as auditors of the FIE for 2022.

We are going to open the vote on that item, and the vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

Ernst and Young are reconducted for another year. We are going to move to the next item.

7. Proposals submitted to the Congress, reports of Commissions, Councils and Ethics Committee

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item is the *Proposals for the Congress*, and we will start with the proposals regarding the modification of the Statutes.

Proposals for the amendment of the Statutes, with the opinion of the Commissions, Ethics Committee, Councils, and the Executive Committee

Proposal #1 is a proposal from the Legal Commission. It's a long proposal because it includes Congress, the Executive Committee, the Commissions, and the Councils. During the pandemic, many IFs and the International Olympic Committee have modified their bylaws stating that votes, decisions, and meetings can be held electronically or virtually in case of an emergency or an extraordinary situation, such as a pandemic. IFs and the IOC have included that possibility in their bylaws, and the Legal Commission proposes to include it also in the Statutes of the FIE.

The Executive Committee was in favor of the proposal from the Legal Commission.

We are going to open the vote on *Proposal #1* from the Legal Commission.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #2 is still a proposal from the Legal Commission. This proposal aimed to provide the possibility for the coaches working in a country of a different nationality to have a license requested on the FIE website by the Federation for which they are working. We know that more and more coaches work in another country, and this proposal offers a possibility for a Federation to request a license for a foreign coach.

The information can be provided by the coach and the Federation for which the coach is working. And, of course, the coach doesn't need to request a new license if he works for another country. It's one license per season. The Executive Committee agreed with the proposal and was in favor.

We are going to open the vote on that proposal with a slight modification from the Executive Committee.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes, please.

[Question in the audience]

Alisher Usmanov: Please speak to the microphone.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Can you please move to the microphone, please? Yes, I understand. I understand this is *Proposal #3*. I am sorry, I skipped one proposal.

Let's return to the previous proposal. The proposal was only to add one word and add that the CEO or his delegate is a liaison with the Ethics Committee.

We opened the vote on that proposal to add the CEO as a liaison officer to the Ethics Committee.

We are going to close the vote.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

We move to *Proposal #3*, which allows the possibility for a National Federation for which the coaches are working to request a license for him/her. The Executive Committee was in favor of the proposal and added that the coach or the National Federation can inform the FIE of the change.

We are going to open the vote on *Proposal #3* from the Legal Commission.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

We have finished with the modification of the Statutes.

We now move to the modifications of the Rules.

Proposals for the amendment of the Rules, with the opinion of the Commissions, Councils, and the Executive Committee

The *First Proposal* is a proposal from the Veterans Council. It was approved by the Rules Commission and the Executive Committee.

We move to the vote on that proposal from the Veterans Council.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

The *Second Proposal* is from the Rules Commission, which has revised its proposals. The Athletes' Commission was in favor of the proposal, as modified by the Rules Commission. The Executive Committee is in favor of the modified proposal by the Rules Commission. Just one precision in the proposal's numbers, o.99.7. i and o.99.7.ii should be a) and b), and not i and ii. In the list of decisions, the ii and i will be replaced by a) and b).

We are going to open the vote on the proposal as modified by the Rules Commission.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #3 is a proposal from the Veterans Council. The Rules Commission agreed to the proposal but added a few words at the end of the sentence that reference the articles. The Executive Committee was in favor of the

proposal as modified by the Rules Commission.

We are going to open the vote on *Proposal #3* from the Veterans.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #4 is a proposal from the Rules Commission. The aim was to improve the visibility of the article and provide in a simple table the requirements for each kind of competition. The Executive Committee agreed to the proposal and made some minor revisions. Please note that for the Junior and Cadet World Championships, figure "8" should not be in red but in blue. Because it's not deleted, it is added.

We are going to open the vote on that proposal.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #5 was deleted by the Veterans Council.

Proposal #6 is from the Russian Fencing Federation to revise how the points are counted to award the Grand Prix of Nations for Juniors and Seniors. The Rules Commission has revised the proposal in order to introduce the Grand Prix of Nations for Cadets and the Grand Prix of Nations for Veterans and made some modifications to the proposal from the Russian Fencing Federation. The Executive Committee was in favor of the proposal, as revised by the Rules Commission.

We are going to open the vote on the proposal as revised by the Rules Commission.

The vote is open.

We are voting on the proposal.

[Question in the audience] Is it Proposal 6? Which one is it?

Nathalie Rodriguez: This is Proposal 6. The screen is not correct, I think. Yes, Proposal 5, if you look at your document, was deleted by the Veterans Council. It's written in your document: proposal deleted as it was transferred to o.75.1. Therefore, Proposal 6 should be displayed on the screen.

We are opening the vote on Proposal 6. The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote.

The proposal passed.

We move to *Proposal #7*, a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor and added the words "*see diagram*". The application should be the season 2022-2023. The SEMI Commission slightly revised

the proposal, and the Executive Committee has also revised the proposal to determine that the distance should be between one meter and 1.5 meters. The application date should be the season 2022-2023.

We are going to open the vote on that proposal.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #8 is from the Rules Commission. The SEMI Commission was in favor. The Rules Commission was in favor, but with a slight modification. And the Executive Committee was in favor of the proposal, as revised by the Rules Commission.

We are opening the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

The vote is going to be closed. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #9 is also from the Rules Commission. The Executive Committee was in favor of the proposal. The Rules Commission added that it is also in favor of reconciling the Rules and Administrative Rules with the definition of the season given in t.159 and t.169.

We are going to open the vote on this proposal, the vote is open.

The vote is closing. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #10 is a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor, the Executive Committee was in favor, and the date of application is season 2022-2023. We are opening the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

We are closing the vote.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #11 has been postponed by the SEMI Commission, so we are going to move to *Proposal #12*.

Proposal #12 is also a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor, and the Executive Committee was in favor.

We move to the vote.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

We move to *Proposal #13* from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission has made some modifications. The Semi Commission and Rules Commission propose the same exact change, and the Promotion Commission is in favor of the modified proposal by the Rules Commission. The Executive Committee is in favor of the revised proposal from the Rules Commission. So, we vote on the proposal as revised by the Rules Commission.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #14. This is a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor. The Executive Committee was in favor, and the proposal should be implemented in season 2022-2023.

We move to the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #15 is a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor. The Executive Committee was in favor, and the rule should be implemented in season 2022-2023.

We are opening the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #16 is a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor, and the Executive Committee was in favor.

We open the vote on this proposal. The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote.

The vote is closed. The proposal passed.

Proposal #17 from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was not in favor because it wishes the apparatus to be verified. Therefore, the Executive Committee proposed delegating to the organiser the duty to verify if the apparatus works properly. We move to the vote on the proposal as revised by the Executive Committee.

The vote is open.

Remark in the audience

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes.

We are closing the vote.

The proposal passed.

Was the issue with your tablet solved? Is it solved? Okay, so it is solved.

We move to *Proposal #18*. We have the same situation here as in the last proposal. The Executive Committee added that the organisers of the competitions would verify the pistes.

We are going to open the vote on that proposal. The vote is open.

We are going to close the vote.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #19 from the SEMI Commission. The Rules and SEMI Commissions made the same modifications, and the Executive Committee is in favor of the proposal, as revised by the Rules Commission.

We move to the vote on this proposal.

We are closing the vote on this proposal.

The vote is closed.

Proposal passed.

Proposal #20 from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor. The Executive Committee was in favor.

We move to the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

We are closing the vote. The vote is closed.

Proposal passed.

Proposal #21 from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor, and the Executive Committee was in favor.

We move to the vote on this proposal.

We are closing the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #22 is a proposal from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor. The Executive Committee was in favor.

We move to the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

We are closing the vote.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #23 again from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor. The Executive Committee was in favor. And we move to the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.

We are closing the vote. The vote is closed.

Proposal passed.

Proposal #24 from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor but made some modifications. The Executive Committee agrees with the proposal as revised by the Rules Commission, but with the words "starting from the table of 64". This proposal should be implemented in 2022-2023.

We vote on the proposal as revised by the Rules Commission and the Executive Committee.

We are closing the vote on that proposal.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #25 from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission was in favor but wished to replace five years by three years. The Executive Committee is in favor and wishes to replace five years by four years as a compromise.

We are going to open the vote on this proposal, as revised by the Executive Committee, and the date of application is the season 2022-2023.

We open the vote.

We are going to close the vote. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed, and we move to the last proposal, *Proposal #26*.

Proposal #26 is from the SEMI Commission. The Rules Commission has made some revisions. The Promotion Commission was in favor of both the proposal and the presentation by the Rules Commission. The Executive Committee is also in favor of the proposal and agrees to the revisions of the Rules Commission.

We move to the vote on this proposal as revised by the Rules Commission.

The vote is open.

We are closing the vote.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

We are now having a coffee break. The next item will be the vote to award the World Championships.

(Coffee Break)

8. Vote to award the organisation of the World Championships:

- **2023 Seniors: candidature of ITA, UAE, UZB**
- **2023 Veterans: candidature of USA**
- **2024 Veterans: candidature of UAE**

Nathalie Rodriguez: We are going to continue the work of the Congress. Please take your seats.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We are moving to the next item, which is the *Vote to award the World Championships*. We are going to start with the Senior World Championships 2023 and the presentations.

Dr Huda Al Matrooshi (UAE): Is the microphone working?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes.

Dr Huda Al Matrooshi (UAE): The United Arab Emirates would like to withdraw from the nomination of the Senior World Championships, and we wish other candidates all the best.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: I would like to say a few words about the three delegations who propose and wish to organise our championships because these three countries very closely relate to my life. I am a citizen of Russia, but I was born and grew up in Uzbekistan. I have lived half of my life in Italy, and it is also my second home. The United Arab Emirates is also a very close brother country to me.

I want everybody to appreciate the Emirates' decision to withdraw and agree that they must have the privilege to have a place to nominate themselves for the next World Championships. We encourage the United Arab Emirates Federation to get more and more involved in our items, our competitions, and maybe organise Congress one day. I wish an Arab country finds good fencers, and as we say in our old language, Shamshir masters. Thank you.

Applause.

But we know that it is an absolutely legal activity for lobbying a candidate. I myself advised Mr. Mamedov to withdraw his nomination from Executive Committee because I don't think we need too much presence in our Executive Committee from Russia. We are more than enough. I need to say the words of welcome to every new Confederation President because Pozdnyakov got reelected as President of European Confederation; our friend from the United Arab Emirates is the President of Asian Fencing Confederation. We congratulate these two large Confederations. In Africa, we have our guarder and defender of fencing, our friend Mbagnick, President of the African Fencing Confederation. Only in the Americas, we have a person who I think has a big difficulty from his illness. It is the only reason I cannot not invite him here. I can have my friendly support and love if it is a woman. I love Aze, for example, or I love Hristeva; there is a big romance between Bulgaria and Russia, so I vote for them, I am ready to work with anybody.

Imagine, I have been friends with Mr. Scarso for 12 years, and he was Vice President for two terms. He is absolutely antagonistic to me. But I have my approach: we both love fencing to the same degree, and I respect his significant contribution, although you remember the extensive discussion we had before. Thank you very much and vote for our two candidates, Uzbekistan and Italy. Yes?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes.

Presentation of Uzbekistan

Rustam Shaabdurakhmonov (UZB): Asalam alykum!

Hello Dear President, Dear Guests,

It is a great honor for us to present our country today. Our people are building a new state, a new Uzbekistan, where sports and a healthy lifestyle take an essential place, specific action programmes are being developed to create conditions for sports.

On behalf of the Ministry of Tourism and Sport, the National Olympic Committee of the Republic of Uzbekistan, the Fencing Federation of the Republic of Uzbekistan, we assure you that we will create all the necessary conditions for the successful holding of these competitions. A cultural programme will also be presented, including visiting and getting acquainted with the historical cities of the world heritage. We will provide everyone with unforgettable Uzbek hospitality and attention. Allow me to give the floor for the presentation to the Secretary General of the Federation Gulnora Saidova. Thank you for your attention.

Applause.

Gulnora Saidova (UZB): Dear Mr. President, Dear Colleagues,

Thank you very much for your attention. I am a little nervous because Uzbekistan is one of the countries known due to the Great Silk Road, and we have many friends among you, and many people participate in some of our competitions.

I would like to share with you a little bit of information about Uzbekistan.

Uzbekistan is situated in the ancient legendary Silk Road, and it's a country that is home of three most important Silk Road cities. Maybe you heard about Samarkand, which is the same age as Rome, Bukhara, and Khiva. There are many other beautiful cities in Uzbekistan. Uzbekistan has a large territory, and we have more than 35 million people population, more than 100 nationalities. Also, it is not a secret that Uzbekistan is one of the safest countries in the world.

The history of Uzbekistan goes back to times of honorary antiquity where the first state territory appeared, and very century ledged, surrounded of myth allegiance country that invites the travelers from around the world year after year to share its secrets and show them the great monuments and antiquity.

Uzbekistan is also very modern, and Tashkent is one of the biggest cities in Uzbekistan, with more than 35 million people population. We have excellent transportation, and many people can arrive from around the world. Uzbek Airlines fly to more than 50 countries, and we have, as you see, many different air companies that fly to Uzbekistan. We have one of the big airports in Tashkent, very comfortable for traveling. More than 1000 people arrive per hour in Uzbekistan, and everything works very efficiently there. I know many of you were in Uzbekistan in 2015, and you remember how it works.

We would like to inform you that the government really supports this event; we are guaranteed free visas for all

countries participating in it and going to Tashkent. With the government's support as the Minister of Tourism, the NOC of Uzbekistan, we organise a lot of competitions. We start from a satellite, try how it works, and then begin to organise the World Cups. I'm proud to inform you that we have successfully organised many events for the last year. And now we ask FIE to support us in organising the Junior World Cups. It is very important for us that the athletes can participate, can fence, even in this difficult period. In Uzbekistan, there are excellent facilities for organising such a big event as World Championships. We plan to organise it in one of the unique and biggest in the Central Asia sports arena, named Humo.

Uzbekistan is also a tourist country. Many hotels are open, and every year, there is a boom in the construction of new buildings. Currently, in Uzbekistan, we have more than 300 hotels, ranging from very expensive to very cheap hotels. We have good transportation logistics, and we also have a wonderful metro, and there can be specially organised trips for tourists to show them the metro.

I think that this event is not only about sport, it's not only about fencing, not only about participation but learning about each other.

There are also other reasons why we would like you to come to Uzbekistan, to Tashkent for World Championships.

For the last ten years, the Senior World Championships were organised in Asia only one time, in 2018 in Wuxi. We are representatives of Asia, and it's vital for us to develop further. Such a big event is an excellent push for fencing development in Asia. We have great respect for European countries, your charming cities, and your strong athletes, but please give us a chance to organise such an event in Asia. It is really important for us. In 2015, when we organised the Junior and Cadet World Championships, it was quite a boom for fencing promotion to start training in Uzbekistan and Central Asia.

Secondly, Uzbekistan loves sport. We organised many different events. For example, we organised 25 international competitions in the year. We have the World Championships for different kinds of sport, such as judo and boxing. Next year, we will organise Junior Asian Championships. We will be glad if you come and see it as well.

In Uzbekistan, you will meet fascinating people. On the table you have a small present, please look at those faces, they smile, they are very kind. Such are people in Tashkent, in Uzbekistan. When you come, you will see and confirm it.

We have fantastic food. We know that many countries have great food, but we would like you to try it in Uzbekistan. I am sure that when many of you visit, you will remember about it, and want to return. You can also discover the unique history of our country.

As I mentioned earlier, this competition will be supported by the government. Our Organising Committee already includes the Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Tourism and Sport, President of NOC, Deputy Minister of International Affairs, Deputy Minister of Health, many sponsors, and others. I can continue and speak much longer, but in conclusion, I would like you to see a small video, and we hope you feel how strongly we wait for you in 2023.

Presentation of Italy

Marco Fichera (ITA): Mr. President Usmanov, Mr. Katsiadakis, Madame Rodriguez,

Distinguished Members of the General Assembly and to all the Fencing Family,

Thank you and good morning,

In my capacity as the President of the Organising Committee, I am very honored to present the candidature of Italy for the Senior World Championships 2023, and I would like to explain why Milano, why to choose Italy.

Today, I am happy because it's an honor to speak with you here, with my friends, and with my fencing family. As you know, I am an Olympic athlete, and I fenced in Tokyo 2020 on a different podium in a different role. Now I'm here in a different role, and this is a common thread linking me with a fencing family.

I am a witness of an athlete, a young boy that ten years ago, decided to come to Milan, chose Milan, and invested in fencing in my beautiful Olympic dream. Now I choose Milan one more time for this, for this dream, and choose to talk to you about the best World Fencing Championships of history.

Let me talk about why we think Milan can be the place for the future Fencing World Championships. We thought about Milan Fencing Championships around two concepts – sustainability and village. Sustainability because our World Fencing Championships will be Green World Fencing Championships. Sustainability is not only a word, but in my opinion, it must be a mandatory choice, and we must follow this trend. And village because we see it as the second concept, as World Fencing Championships Village 2023. The village is a new way of thinking about fencing. We will create a fencing hub; everything will be tailored for delegations. We will make everything close to you, your delegation, and your athletes.

Let me tell you the other reasons you should choose Milan and choose Italy. You should choose Italy for our transportation. You will find the accessible airports far less than 50 minutes from the city centre, hotel, and the accommodation. You will find five thousand buses, trams, and five tube lines. You will find two central stations in Milan, far less than five to fifteen minutes walking distance from the competition venue.

But it's not only this. Italy and Milan are beautiful: its culture, its food, it's art, especially Italian passion. Then, as you know, Milan is full of beauty, and you can come to Milan and enjoy this Italian beauty. You can choose between Leonardo da Vinci's "Last Supper" original and Fashion District, Gothic Cathedral, and Food District. Everything you may want to see is a five-to-ten-minute walk away from the competition venue. You can come to Milan and visit lake Como or lake Iseo; you can visit Verona, Florence, Cinque Terre. Many other destinations are reachable by a one-hour trip to Milan.

Milan as a big city has large facilities. This year, thanks to the 2026 Winter Olympic Games, that we will organise, as my dear colleague here on this podium will explain to you later, we renovated many facilities, and we will fence, your fencers will fence in the renovated centre called Allianz Cloud. It is in the centre of Milan, within walking distance of the accommodation and the hotel. As I said before, this will be a fencing village because we will tailor everything for your delegation. It will include many hospitality areas, food zones, food districts, and merchandising because the Fencing Championships is not only a competition but also a team, an event, and we want to organise an event.

Regarding accommodation, in Milan, you will find more than 300 hotels and flats, and you will find different kinds of hotels and flats. But the thing is that we have already made a deal with the hotels and reserved them

so later we can choose for you the best price in the best place, because they know that organising travel for the World Championships is not too easy. And we want to make it easier for the delegations. This is the reason we did it. We made a special deal with the hotels, and then the hotels will give a special deal to the delegations.

Last but not least is our organisational experience. We organise many events not only in fencing, but Milan will also be the centre of sport in the next five years. So, we set up an organisation and transportation plan that will present Milano as a fencing hub. But this is not all. We start on March 22, not July 23, because "Milan, a candidate city" is like a "Road to..." concept. With this "Road to..." concept, we will engage Italian people and people worldwide to come to Milan, develop fencing, and discover fencing because we have to expand what we are developing right now to the rest of the country. For this, we will organise several camps this year to host those who have the pleasure to come to Italy for training, train with us, train in Italy, train in Milan, and enjoy our programme and lifestyle. To me, the best programme is not only the best organisation of the World Championships but a road that accompanies this organisation, and this road starts on March 22. Fencing in Milan on July 23 will be an integral part of the city. Because Milan is inclusive, because fencing is inclusive, and then as we all know, fencing is for all of us, for all of you, for all your fencers, and all of our wonderful fun. This is our dream. Let's live it together. Come to Milan because we all love fencing. Viva Milan! Viva fencing!

Applause.

Now, we have the pleasure of showing you a video, but before that, I want to thank my Federation for the support and especially say thanks, sorry for this additional second of your time, to Diana Bianchedi, who is here with me with two gold medals. She's now the Game Director of Milan-Cortina 2006 Olympic Winter Games, and it's an honour for me to divide the podium with her. She will speak after me and better than me, I think.

Diana Bianchedi (ITA): Good morning, Mr. President, my friend Secretary General,

Dear CEO, and good morning to all of you.

I know I have just a few minutes to speak with you, but I wanted to spend some of my time to thank you all for these feelings. Coming back here, I found my family. I grew up with some of you, to be honest, many years ago, and we spent a lot of time competing all over the world, but we had a really, really wonderful time. Do you remember, Madame Pascu? I also wanted to thank you for bringing me here to Lausanne as exactly in this hall I received from President Bach the honour to host the Milan-Cortina 2026 Olympic Winter Games.

I am here because I was born in Milan, and I started my fencing career in Mangiarotti Fencing Hall with old and big Edoardo beside my piste. I wanted to tell you that in Italy fencers are well-considered, not only for our big tradition but also for our credibility. I am speaking about my friend, a really great fencer Valentina Vezzali, who is now the Under Secretary in our government in the Department of Sports. But not only do we have a big tradition, but we are also used to organising competitions. In the recent past, we hosted the Senior Annual World Championships two times, two times the Junior ones, and once we hosted the World Cup competition.

As an athlete, an old one, to be honest, I want to tell you that we wanted to put the athletes in the centre of our project, not only as a fencing goal but from the perspective of feelings and atmosphere. We are the land of sunlight. We are the land of delight. Maybe for our story, maybe for our soul, or our geography, or just for our hearty warming food.

Facing a challenge is what we always strive for: for our vision of the world, the greatest ideas, and tiny perfection. We are always ready to get the job done. You can call it ingenuity. You can call it creativity. There are explanations of all sorts, but you can call it if you want just plainly and simply a passion for sports. Whether it's teaching, learning, or passing a torch, we are ready for the challenge. We are ready for the endeavour; the bigger, the better. Great achievement is something we savour. So, we know there is one thing that for sure is clearer than our sun; we together and united are super ready to get this amazing dream done. Thank you.

Applause.

Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH, GRE): Thank you.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you.

Alisher Usmanov: Thank you, Italy.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We are now going to move to the vote with two candidates only, and we open the vote. Please select the organiser you wish to elect.

The vote is open.

We close the vote.

Can you still display it? Yes, thank you.

Applause.

Italy will organise the Senior World Championships 2023.

Alisher Usmanov: We congratulate the Italian Federation for winning this duel, and simultaneously I want to commend Uzbekistan. This country reanimated fencing school with direct assistance from me and some old masters of fencing, and already in Asia achieved the Senior level and demonstrated a big success. These 57 votes are already a sign of big confidence towards Uzbekistan, and next time you can share the candidature with the Emirates as two Asian Federations. Very good. Good luck to everybody.

Nathalie, for which month can we plan the Championships in Italy? Because it will be the last Championships before Paris.

Nathalie Rodriguez: They can organise it during the second part of July or at the beginning of August.

Alisher Usmanov: Why do we need to do this in such a hot time?

(Laughter)

Alisher Usmanov: I know Italy very well. Why cannot we do this at the beginning of September?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Because Congress changed the period to organise Senior World Championships numerous times. It was in October, then in November, then in September, then it was in July, then in August, and now it is planned from 15 of July until 15 of August. This is the last resolution of Congress. If we want to change this, we will have to make a proposal for the next Congress.

Alisher Usmanov: Why do we need to decide the date of the championships in Congress? We need to consider

every specific condition of a country. For example, it is good to go to South Africa or Australia in July. I understand as it is winter there, but in Italy, in Milan... Are we all here in this hall, sure that we are ok with that temperature? I'm afraid, as I care about sportsmen, and we don't need to forget about the pandemic. Maybe we can adjust this by an extraordinary solution of Executive Committee in September or at least after 25th of August. We need to discuss this with Italy. This is my opinion. I don't want to change anything in our Congress solutions and resolutions, but in the future, we need to be thinking about this, at least for future Executive Committee. Thank you.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Then we have the candidature of the USA for the Veterans 2023.

Presentation of the USA

Rita Comes (USA): Good afternoon, Mr. President, the Executive Committee, and all of the FIE family,

I want to thank all of you for approving the 2021 Veterans World Championships that were to be held in Florida this past October. Unfortunately, it had to be canceled because of the pandemic, with the association of the FIE Veterans Council, FIE, and the US organisers. So, we are here today to ask for the 2023 FIE Veterans World Championships in Daytona Beach, Florida.

Daytona Beach is a city on the coast of Florida. It's about 70 miles from Orlando. We have a couple of airports, and when you look outside, it's lovely sun, and the beaches in Florida are just incredible, especially where this venue is; it's just at the beach. We have full sponsorship for this particular event. Of course, a lot of the work had already been done and prepared for the 2021 occasion, and the sponsors we have are US Fencing, US fencing sponsors, and the Daytona Beach Convention and Visitors Bureau. As I mentioned, it's very close to Orlando International Airport and Daytona Beach. So come on, bring the family, go to Disneyland or Disney World, and then come on to do the Veterans World Championships.

During October in Daytona Beach, the weather is about 30 degrees centigrade, 86 degrees Fahrenheit. The distance between the hotel and the Convention Centre is right across the street, and on the other side of the hotel is Daytona Beach. The dates that we're proposing are October 11th through the 17th of 2023. Ocean Convention Centre is a well-known place in Daytona Beach for many different events. As you can see, the strips are not put down on the floor yet, but in preparation for the 2021 event, we have already arranged all the logistics for this particular event. The primary hotel, as I mentioned, is just across the street, but Daytona Beach has about 15000 hotel rooms, everything from \$50 a night to a palatial suite someplace.

U.S. fencing will help all athletes and Federations with visa requirements. And as President of the IOC, Thomas Bach mentioned earlier of us looking to the future for sustainability, the Ocean Centre is not just about sustainability for recycling, but about the mental wellness of its employees and the people that come and do events there.

Daytona Beach is a beautiful area, and U.S. fencing has a history of some really quality events. There will be over 25 strips for a six-day competition and practice for all the teams. The US fencing will be honoured to have the 2023 FIE Veterans World Championships and, of course, the Gala dinner. Mr. Anthony?

Donald Anthony (USA): I just want to say we look forward to seeing you in the US for the 2023 Veterans World Championships, and I think we'll have a very, very good time.

Thank you.

Rita Comes (USA): Thank you very much.

9. Call for candidatures to organise the World Championships:

- 2023 Juniors and Cadets
- 2024 Juniors and Cadets

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item is the *Call for candidatures for the organisation of Junior and Cadet World Championships 2023 and 2024*. I would like to ask if there are Federations that are willing to be candidates to announce their candidature for these events.

My goodness, no one? I will still leave you some time to think about it during lunch, but I hope that we will have at least one announcement after the lunch.

Yes. Can you please come to the microphone?

Rajeev Mehta (IND): India wants to host these championships in Delhi.

Nathalie Rodriguez: You announce your candidature?

Rajeev Mehta (IND): Yes.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes. We will vote next year.

Rajeev Mehta (IND): Thank you.

Nathalie Rodriguez: So, for 2023. Sir, 2023 or 2024?

Rajeev Mehta (IND): I think it's better 2023.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you very much. And for 2024? Yes.

HH. Engr. Sheikh Salem Sultan S. Al Qasimi (UAE): We would like to announce that we would like to host the 2024 Junior and Cadet World Championships in the UAE.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you very much for the announcement.

Mandlenkosi Masuku (BOT): Botswana has an interest in 2023.

Nathalie Rodriguez: For the Juniors and Cadets?

Mandlenkosi Masuku (BOT): Yes.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you.

Anybody else? Yes. Can you please go to the microphone?

Ioannis Lignos (GRE): I'm talking on behalf of Greece for 2023, the World Championships for Juniors and Cadets.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Excellent. Now we have three candidates for 2023, India, Botswana, and Greece. Yes.

Mariana Vila Carvajal (COL): Hello, Colombia is interested in 2024.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you so much.

Mariel Sifuentes (PER): Hello, this is Peru, and we select 2024.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you. We now have three candidates for each year. Do we have another one?

Abdullah Alsunaid (KSA): Saudi Arabia will be interested in hosting 2024.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you.

Marcelo Lorca (CHI): Excuse me. Yes. Right here. Chile for 2024.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Chile?

Marcelo Lorca (CHI): Yes.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you.

Marcelo Lorca (CHI): You're welcome.

Nathalie Rodriguez: So, next year will be interesting. Very good. Nobody else?

(Laughter) Applause.

Thank you so much, before we move to the lunch, we have decided to take the photo of the Congress inside the venue because there are some works outside and in addition, it's very cold. So, we ask you to come here and stand all around the Tribune. The photographer will take the photo from the balcony, and we will stand here in the Congress Hall. 10. Elections of the President, Executive Committee, Commissions and Ethics Committee

Alisher Usmanov: Dear Delegates, please take your seats.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Ladies and Gentlemen, we are going to resume the Congress; please take your seats.

We have reached the item on the agenda that everybody was expecting, obviously, which is the *Elections*. We start with the President, followed by the Executive Committee, and then the Commissions and Ethics Committee.

Regarding the President, the Statutes mention in article 3.6.2 that when the number of candidates for an election does not exceed the number of positions to be filled in, the candidate is considered elected by acclamation without the need for an electoral process. I therefore propose you elect Alisher Usmanov as President of the FIE by acclamation.

Applause. Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Thank you, thank you. Can I speak from here?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Of course.

Alisher Usmanov: You know, I don't expect such long high-level applause in my honor; this is first. I asked Nathalie why we still vote when we have one candidate for World Championships? Maybe we need to do this for President as well? Now I understand, of course, that some people are against me because you cannot be so handsome for every woman. *(Laughter) Applause.* But some people, I can feel from these voices here are here with me, and we're one team, one family. So, I take this responsibility only because of you. Really, I don't want to have any caprice or play with words, but I can tell you honestly. I think about my role more as a trustee of our sport to help it develop, improve, and bring it to a place it deserves in the Olympic programme. Each of us sees the level of competition we face to participate in this Olympic programme, to be in the group.

In addition to the budget, which we approved today, we have the prizes and the money we pay as a premium for the World and Olympic Champions. It is additional. We don't calculate the money that we spend to help our Veterans. Actually, we increased that amount and created a Fund to help Veterans, and this Fund works. The first base sum that I put down is €10million.

Moreover, we have a fund for the development of fencing. Next year I will change its President because our Russian President, Mr. Mikhailov, retired. I want to thank him from Executive Committee, from myself personally, and Congress because we don't have a single Federation that hasn't had help from this local fund. We need to thank Mr. Mikhailov as the President of this fund.

Applause.

We need to continue the work of this fund that is between three to five million euro a year additional money which we can spend on our sport, in addition to our Federation expenses. Because of this, I understand my responsibility to follow the recommendation of the IOC President to keep my nomination. I consulted with Nathalie, Mr. Katsiadakis, and many others who approached me.

Secondly, I want to propose to everybody to be more realistic when we want to contribute to our Federations because contribution must be logical, useful, and helpful. Therefore, I want to tell everybody, if you have any

questions, please write to me, receive my answer, and openly speak with me after that. I am ready. And again please, as Sting sings, from the bottom of my heart I say to you thank you, merci, grazie, gracias, shukran jazilan, спасибо большое. Thank you very much for your confidence in me and your support. Thank you.

Applause.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you. We are now moving to the election of the Executive Committee.

I wanted to inform you that I have received the withdrawal of one candidate, Mr. Zeyad Saleem, from Iraq. Yes, please.

11. Paris 2024 Olympic Games

Alisher Usmanov: Nathalie, please continue. How many items have we left?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Two. The next item on the agenda is the *Paris 2024 Olympic Games*. We must think about the future of fencing at the Olympic Games and its presence at the Games in the future. Until Paris 2024, we have only two years and a half left because the Olympic Games will be held in July 2024. You must know that we have consulted the IOC twice on the qualification system. Yesterday, Mr. Thomas Bach was at the FIE Executive Committee meeting, and he explained the achievements of fencing. He clearly said that the current qualification system used by the FIE is good. We have two written documents from the IOC, including one we received today from the Sports Director whom you have seen this morning with Mr. Thomas Bach, Kit McConnell, who wrote:

“Dear Nathalie, we understand that it is not easy balancing qualifications for the team and individual events within the set Olympic quotas. We believe the FIE did find this balance in the qualification system for the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020, which was approved by the IOC Executive Board following technical review by the IOC Sports Department in consultation with National Olympic Committee representatives. It is important to move quickly to finalize the qualification system for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, which the IOC Executive Board will approve in early February 2022 in order to provide certainty to NOC National Federations and athletes.

In response to the question which has been raised, we would support maintaining the balance of qualification between individual and team places from the Tokyo 2020 qualification system for the Paris 2024 qualification system.”

Therefore, the Executive Committee of the FIE is in favor of maintaining for Paris 2024 the same qualification system as the one used in Tokyo with one small modification, which is linked to the host country places and universality places.

This is the proposal of the Executive Committee.

[Question in the audience]

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes.

Alisher Usmanov: Sure.

Otto Drakenberg (SWE): I would like to address the Congress. Am I allowed to do that?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes, of course.

Alisher Usmanov: Who is it?

Otto Drakenberg (SWE): It's the usual guy. We met first in Dubai, President Usmanov.

Alisher Usmanov: Yes, I see. It's not necessary, but you can speak like that, please.

Otto Drakenberg (SWE): For me, this is a very important question. I would like to see the faces of all my fellow fencing friends.

Alisher Usmanov: Please, please.

Otto Drakenberg (SWE): Thank you very much.

Alisher Usmanov: I don't question the importance. Do you think it's very important for you but not for us? Please.

Otto Drakenberg (SWE): We share many things or at least some things, Mr. President, both the love for fencing and the feeling of not being afraid, so that's very good.

Dear President, Usmanov, dear friends of fencing, I came here today to speak about, for me, a very important topic, of course. I started talking about this in Dubai four years ago, and I would, of course, have hoped that we would have been at a different place today, not geographically, but with developing the qualification criteria.

Before coming here today, a friend of mine asked me to explain the situation within international fencing in one word. Good, I answered. My friend then asked me to explain the situation in two words, and I replied, not good. What did I mean by this? Well, under the leadership of President Usmanov, several outstanding achievements have been made, and I would like to mention a few myself. FIE is now in a very strong financial position; two additional medals for the Olympic Games have been obtained. Obviously, we have known that for some time, and it's great. The presentation of the international competitions it's a step change to the benefit of all spectators, even Swedish spectators, of course. And for this and more, I would really like to say thank you, Mr. President.

However, we must never stand still. The continuing development of our sport is crucial for the future of fencing and for safeguarding that fencing will be an attractive alternative for young athletes worldwide. Creating a qualification system for fencing for the Olympic Games is not easy. It's not easy, and several issues have to be considered. For example, the best fencers must have a realistic chance to be present at the Games. The Olympic competition must be accessible for fencers from all Federations and the quota provided by the IOC, of course, respected. We believe in Sweden that the current system no longer balances these different issues for the best of future fencing. We must change to have a qualification system that puts the individual competition first.

I come from a family where we are brought up with sports, the importance of hard work, and the mindset to never give up. My great grandfather's brother was a member of the Pierre de Coubertin's working party that established the modern Olympic Games. My grandfather Hans Drakenberg an Olympian himself, became the European épée champion in 1935. The competition was held here in Lausanne at the Beau Rivage. Inspired by my ancestors, I also dreamed of becoming an Olympian in my fencing career, and ultimately, I did.

Dear friends, I now call upon you to consider this matter carefully. What is in the best interest of the future of fencing? To do nothing and watch Olympic fencing be reduced to a matter for the lucky few born in the right country, or change the qualification criteria and watch the Olympic dream grow and prosper among young fencers all over the world?

What can we do today to give the young fencers from countries such as Nigeria, Peru, Vietnam, and Slovenia, including my home country Sweden, the opportunity to have an Olympic dream? Since there is no proposal for change of the criteria that the FIE has sent out before this Congress, it would not be respecting good governance for me to come here today and demand the decision for change; that would not be good governance.

My proposal, therefore, is that this Congress, by voting today, declares and decides the following four things.

- That we shall keep the current qualification criteria for Paris for the reasons I just mentioned.
- To establish a working group within the members equally divided between the zones of the globe, to develop a new qualification system.
- That on a regular basis, the working group consults with all the member Federations.

- And fourthly and finally, that Congress establishes the new system for the Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

Thank you very much. Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, fencing friends.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Very impressive words, very impressive history. I don't want to take your time to tell you the history of my family, but I assure you that my history is not less good. But because I see your face from this place also and Nathalie Rodriguez explained earlier to Congress, I want this very energetic person from Sweden to recognize the following: he says we close the open discussion about qualifications. It is not true. We gave the answer to the letter we had received about the impossibility of simultaneously deciding on two medals and asking for a new qualification system.

In my opinion, the existing qualification system has minuses and pluses, and it is not stagnant.

Was it the Swedish Federation which for 32 years had been submitting the proposals that changed the programme of fencing, or was it the FIE? Never Swedish Federation gave us any proposal to obtain two additional medals, but we did achieve it. And today, of course, we find improvement in changing our qualifications to achieve goals, which we have in our Federations: universality, gender presence, and more importantly, giving the possibility to best sportsmen to participate in the Olympic Games.

The number of participants we have is 212. Is this right? Swedish Federation, please give your opinion. I brought this up to the Executive Committee discussion. First, I refused to discuss this as I felt we don't need to discuss this issue at the Executive Committee one or two months prior to our elections. But after Nathalie told me that we need to give our opinion at least. Therefore, this question was discussed at the Executive Committee meeting.

Did anyone thank us for considering their proposal? Nobody. The Executive Committee members who took part in our latest meeting are here, and they heard my opinion. I told them that I think these people are right about some athletes, but we could kill the possibility of Confederations to be represented by their athletes at the Olympic Games. And Olympic Games in Tokyo proved that I am right, when the Hong Kong foil fencer wins Gold Medal in Olympic Games, while in Asian Championships, he loses every time to Japan, the Korean fencers, or China, which is at its highest at foil.

And what about the Estonian épée team which won a Gold Medal in the Olympic Games? It is not an achievement gained through increasing the number of countries that participate and win in the Olympic Games? It is my answer for the future because the concept proposed now, I see, unfortunately, in undemocratic and suspicious ways.

I want to tell these people if you wish to help... I, for example, don't know this person, but I know Mr. Palmström, and I don't forget his participation in the Executive Committee. I respect him very much, and of course, I respect his opinion. But I don't agree with the method of being pushy and just saying something is not good. What exactly is not good? Is this democracy? And when I have support from my colleagues from the whole world, and everybody tells me that I have achieved something, and after you tell me it's not good, it feels like duplicity: good, not good, happy, or unhappy. Of course, there can always be someone unhappy. We want to have more participants in the Olympic Games. But we have to keep in mind that we cannot decide on the Olympic Games programme without the IOC.

We immediately reached out to the IOC regarding this issue. Nathalie has many times spoken with the Sports Director. I don't understand what you are trying to achieve.

First of all, we need to think about people who go to these Olympic Games to participate. For the first time, we have twelve medals, but we don't have this qualification system fully employed yet because everybody knows in

which conditions, we organised the qualifications for these competitions; please do not forget about that. Did the Swedish Federation offer its help to arrange the competitions? No, Hungary did it. Because of this, I regret that the representative of this Federation is not part of the Executive Committee. We need the representatives of such federations as Hungary everywhere, and I fully support this Federation because it helped the FIE two times. But I don't feel anything from the others. At least I never heard anybody proposing anything. Russia proposed, Italy proposed, Hungary proposed, and Egypt did. But Sweden didn't propose anything to us. OK, you can criticize but respect what we were doing and what we want to do.

The IOC has made it very clear not to rush, wait, and come back to discuss this issue after Paris. The Organising Committee for Paris gave us the best place – the Grand Palais. What did we achieve? Isn't this an achievement?

Once ten years ago, we had the World Championships there. Did the Swedish Federation contact me, paid for this, and made this happen? Nobody helped me ten years ago. Everybody should remember these first championships where Eurosport started to broadcast fencing, but everybody forgets this.

Thank you very much, you recognized €30 million. In other International Federations, the money reserve is less than in fencing. When did this exist before? Other International Federations received \$38-45 million for Olympic Games for four years. But today, our reserve is similar to theirs. Isn't it an achievement? What was the contribution of the Swedish Federation? Maybe in Sweden, you cannot find sponsors? But I find sponsors for IOC to support our participation in the Olympic programme in a full set. And of course, fencer Thomas Bach wants this also. But I am not trying to demonstrate my contribution. It is a highly energetic type of lecture, which I now hear. I am already 70 years old. I can teach somebody myself. I propose absolutely equal respect towards what we did, what we want to do, and what we can do together. On this principle, please, Mr. Usmanov is your supporter every time.

The Hungarian Federation only once asked for small support from IOC. Every time they organise competitions on the highest level. This country is also not very big in Europe, but it helped the FIE. The Italian Federation, when Mr. Scarso began working with me, he asked for my support every time. Ask him if I refused once. He openly speaks; when I tell him it is impossible, he understands. What is this pressure about what Congress must do tomorrow or today?

Today we have elected new members of the Executive Committee. I have another critic in Oceania. But have I once refused when she approached me for help? No, it is I do this because I love fencing, and I very much want to create a school in Australia, Oceania, and New Zealand. And now I found ways because Helen cannot achieve without my help what we need and what she needs. I think we need to send a good coach to Australia and open one fencing school there.

We needed to develop fencing in Dubai. Who heard about Dubai in fencing competitions before? Fifteen years ago, I approached all my friends, the Minister of Sport, and other heads of this country to support us. Today, a minimum of 3-4 competitions take place there.

This daily work is the way of defending the interests of everybody who loves fencing, not this demonstrated nervous collision. We need to have unity in our family. Of course, we cannot achieve everything simultaneously.

I very much respect your opinion, but I don't want to hear "this is the only way, we are staying still in one place", imposing where we need to be today and what we need to do. We are not staying still in our place, and we now go like sprinters after 40 years of sleeping. If you don't feel this, excuse me, change us, change the Executive Committee, and make this deal. Presidents of every Federation, don't you see how difficult it is to keep our sport in the programme when you go to Olympic Games? We have expanded it now. Everybody asks Bach why he expanded the fencing programme etc., etc. Think about this.

If we change the qualifications now to prioritize individuals, will we be able to maintain what we have achieved at the full volume? I see this proposal very deeply. But what can we do? After this headache, the IOC will say, let's decrease the number of people. Then everything is finished. Right now, we have a good result. Please, be more patient as I am. For many years our working group was doing everything to obtain the additional medals. At the Olympic Games Rio 2016 we had only 10 events, and only in 2017 the IOC gave us these additional medals after agreeing on our qualifications.

This is my last explanation of these questions. Right? Mr. Katsiadakis, I remember you worked with the IOC also.

Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH, GRE): I discussed it, but I was not in the working group.

Alisher Usmanov: Nothing is created from nothing. I tell everybody every time, don't explain what we do, it's better to show the results, then people understand. I have finished, and I gave a complete answer. Now, we have an official announcement from Madame Rodriguez.

Nathalie Rodriguez: First, you must know that for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, all sports except three had their quota of athletes reduced. Fencing was one of the three sports with no quota reduction for Paris 2024. I think you may imagine how hard it was to achieve. It did not simply fall from the sky, and it was a huge work to accomplish this.

The current qualification system should be improved. The Executive Committee proposed to create a working group in order to work on possible changes, analyses, and the consequences of these changes. We need to find the best possible system for the future of fencing at the Olympic Games. And it's not by deciding this, without thinking about the consequences, without analysing the situation, that we will achieve the best possible qualification system for fencing. The Executive Committee had proposed to create a working group with those Federations which want to work on improvements. We need all kinds of Federations, big, medium and small. Don't forget there are many principles of the IOC that we must follow. This is an obligation, don't think we can go to the IOC and say, we want this, give us this. We have to work for it. And this is what we have done over the past 12 years. This is how President Usmanov achieved the 12 events. We must work more to achieve something more.

The IOC is in favour of the current qualification system as it is, not because it should remain like this forever, but this is what we should have for Paris as Paris is in two and a half years.

Alisher Usmanov: And pandemic will last for another year, for sure. Please read the answer from the IOC.

Nathalie Rodriguez: I reread the answer from the IOC again because we raised the question, and the answer was in response to the question which has been raised. "We would support maintaining the balance of qualification between individual and team places from the Tokyo 2020 qualification system for the Paris 2024 qualification system." This is the official position of the IOC. Yes.

Joonas Lyytinen (FIN): Thank you, Mr. President, Dear friends,

I'm Joonas Lyytinen from the Finish Fencing and Pentathlon Federation. I would like to say a few words. Firstly, I'm glad to hear we will have a working group to resolve this matter.

I think we are all in agreement that it would be impossible and almost irresponsible to change the qualifications for the Paris Olympics. Those are done, and we will proceed. And there is much good in the current qualification system also. Great achievements have been made in the last years, and nobody denies the fact that fencing has taken a huge leap forward. But the whole essence of sports is striving to become better and improve.

In this spirit, I think we can gladly second the resolution suggested by our dear neighbours, the Swedish Fencing

Federation. We should have, and we can have a better qualification system for Los Angeles Games, and I hope that we will have a working group that will start working on this. First, we must form some common vision inside our own fencing family to understand better what we would like the future qualification system to look like, and then consult and work together with the IOC to achieve as much of that vision as we do can.

Of course, it's going to be a compromise between various realities and constraints that we cannot achieve everything that we won, but we can take steps towards a better system. I really hope this will happen, and we will start the process of having a common vision that serves our fencing better for the Los Angeles Games. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President.

Donald Anthony (USA): Mr. President, I would like to say a couple of words. I think the biggest thing is we know that we can improve. I think the question that we have right now is timing. But I believe that the proposal that's put forth as it currently stands puts us directly at odds with what the IOC's directives are. We are required to have eight teams. I don't know how we resolve that. I think that idea of having a working group is a good thing. And I also want to say that I think it's way too late in our Olympic cycle to make changes at this point. But I do think we need to get the working group in place, and I don't think that we can do this by Paris, because at that point, we have the investments already made by many Federations. Thank you.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes.

Alisher Usmanov: We don't have any compromises. We have the common decision received by Congress on our qualification system and the full programme. We don't know, maybe in Paris again due to the medical situation we cannot have completely normal competitions. Do you understand? To examine the system of qualifications, you need to have the full programme of Olympic Games competitions. It is not a compromise. You cannot compromise with the IOC if it is the owner of these Games, of these competitions. What kind of compromise do you want to find? We can propose something, and the IOC may accept or reject it. What I propose today was the subject of argument yesterday at the Executive Committee meeting. Did everyone hear what Mr. Bach said about our system of qualifications? He is the one that said that, not me. What did he say? Who can remember?

Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH, GRE): I can tell you.

Alisher Usmanov: Please, Mr. Katsiadakis tell us. Mr. Scarso did you also hear those words?

Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH, GRE): Yesterday, the President of the IOC explained about the competitions of fencing in Tokyo and said only good words about the success of our competitions there. He clearly said that for the next competition in Paris, we must continue with the same system. It was so clear in explanation.

Alisher Usmanov: OK.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Sheikh Salem Al Qasimi.

Alisher Usmanov: Please answer this question, please.

HH. Engr. Sheikh Salem Sultan S. Al Qasimi (UAE): Thank you, Mr. President.

Thank you, Mr. President. I want to share my point of view on this subject. I am Salem Al Qasimi, President of Fencing Confederation of Asia and the UAE Fencing Federation. The United Arab Emirates Fencing Federation is a new Federation of 15 years old. We are working very hard to have successful teams in the future in fencing. We are shocked to learn that before the Congress, the image of the International Federation and fencing was damaged by the Swedish Federation by going to the international press to lay false accusations. This is not a sign of good governance, and this is unacceptable and unethical. I hope you understand the position and bad

publicity which will affect our beloved sport and our prestigious FIE. Thank you.

Per Palmström (SWE): Thank you. My name is Per Palmström, and I'm from the Swedish Fencing Federation. I would like to clarify. Because to me, it sounds like we are in agreement, Mr. President. The Swedish Fencing Federation is not proposing to vote today on the proposal that we have sent out to all of you. The proposal made by our President Otto Drakenberg is that we shall keep the current system for the Paris Olympic Games. So, to that point, it sounds like that is something I hope that we could unanimously agree upon. However, I also strongly believe that we need to decide upon the working group today, just as Mr. Drakenberg proposed, and that should be a fairly big working group. We are not defining the number of people in it, and we believe that it is up to the wise Executive Committee to decide upon, but as Nathalie said, it has to include members from all zones. It has to be a working group that genuinely reflects the fencing family.

We also think that we all need to be involved in this. As the third point that Mr. Drakenberg made, we believe that the working group should regularly consult. It should send out proposals and get comments on that so that we know that we have a lot of time until Los Angeles to start putting together all the brilliant minds we have in this room to find the solution going forward. I just wanted to say this.

And the fourth point then is that this new proposal should be created by all of us together because together we are fencing, as we can read on the board behind the Executive Committee. Together, I believe we are much better at solving this situation than when Sweden is trying to solve it by itself. But we do not believe that the status quo is an option. It's the option we have to go forward for Paris. Still, for Los Angeles, I do think we all agree and unanimously can decide that we need a working group; it should be a broad working group, a working group that consults with all the members regularly. The aim is that when we meet, I don't know at which Congress, but well before L.A., we should decide then, hopefully unanimously, on a new system. But we need to do it together because together we are fencing. Thank you very much.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Mr. Palmström, I would like to clarify something for you.

Alisher Usmanov: Nathalie, excuse me, I asked you to announce the IOC position and close this topic. Now, please let me respond.

First, it is good that you don't forget to say that we need to figure out the details at the Executive Committee meeting. Today you elected the Executive Committee. Yes? Yes. The Executive Committee has its responsibility, work regulation, and rights. Because of this, it's good that you understand that you cannot vote for that proposal today. We, those who received this confidence from Congress, decide when we create these groups, who should be a part of this group, and how many Federations it should include.

If you want to change anything today, please make a proposal. When we create this group, join this group, work with them, but do not direct the activities of the Executive Committee and President. It will never happen until I am the President, and this is what you must understand.

Swedish Federation is a very old fencing Federation. We remember beautiful épée and foil masters. But today, you must really participate in the FIE activity to teach us.

But what I want to propose, please hear what I want to say to everybody. Nobody should work under pressure, ever.

Please stop demonstrating that your proposal is the smartest. Work on this proposal, defend this proposal in the IOC, help us understand how this proposal works, and after that, make a conclusion to create a new system for the new generations. I can only warn, be careful, do not lose a discipline because I don't want to kill the fencers' dream, which we finally achieved. I will stand by it until I have my strength and my responsibilities. We

must be honest.

Nathalie, please announce the answers we had received from the second man of the IOC, the Sports Director, when we approached him two times. It is not my decision; I don't dictate to him what to do.

Nathalie Rodriguez: The proposal of Sweden was sent to the IOC Sports Director, who you have seen this morning. Here is what he wrote.

"The proposal you have received to reduce the number of teams from eight to four in each of the six Olympic fencing competitions has several significant issues. As you note, the Olympic Charter bylaw to Rule 44.13 specifies that the number of teams in team sport should not exceed 12 teams for each gender and should not be fewer than eight teams unless the IOC Executive Board decides otherwise.

This bylaw applies equally as a clear reference for teams' events in individual sports disciplines and not only team sports. And this is why they are currently eight teams in each of the Olympic fencing team events. The minimum number of eight allows for appropriate universality, global representation, and a credible competition to give suitable value to winning an Olympic medal by having only four teams competing in an event. If it were only a semi-final and final format, a team would be guaranteed a silver medal if they only win the first match.

Equally, regardless of the format, a scenario where three out of four competing teams would be winning an Olympic medal would not seem to have credibility from a sports perspective.

The FIE continues to invest strongly in global development programmes in order to develop fencing around the world and increase competitiveness in elite competition. The reduction from eight to four teams would obviously cause a direct and significant reduction of universality and continental representation in the Olympic team competitions, and probably also directly have an impact on the development as fewer National Olympic Committees would invest in the team competitions, knowing that the qualification opportunities would be significantly reduced in teams.

One of the main Olympic qualification principles is that athletes and teams shall have more than one opportunity to qualify. This protects the qualification system from issues related to injury or travel, providing the ability to attend an event to ensure appropriate fairness in opportunities. This principle will continue to exist in the qualification system principles of the Paris Olympic Games.

The proposal of having just a single qualification tournament for the teams without including continental or zone events seems to oppose to the central qualification system of having at least two opportunities to qualify.

Many thanks again for the openness in passing on the proposal. However, as we had hopefully clearly outlined above, the proposal would appear to directly conflict with several key guidelines and principles applied equally across all the Olympic sports and events and therefore would not be supported by the IOC."

I think it was a clear indication from the IOC. This is why the Executive Committee proposed some weeks ago, some months ago, to keep the same qualification system in Paris 2024 and to create a working group for the future Olympic Games. This is not a proposal from the Swedish Federation. This is a proposal from the Executive Committee months ago. Yes, Mr. Mbagnick.

Mbagnick Ndiaye (SEN): Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen Members of Congress,

I believe that the problem is solved. The IOC is the structure that has the eyes. The Olympic Games belong to the IOC. Federations seize the IOC to bring about changes in the qualifying system. The IOC deemed it appropriate to inform us at our Congress and yesterday at the Executive Committee that it did not agree to the changes in the qualification system. So, if we are true democrats and want to respect the principles of equality

in the qualification system, we must follow the path indicated by the IOC, who owns these Games.

Now regarding the future. Several countries think that the qualification system needs to be changed. But the Sports Director of the IOC told us that by changing this system, we are unbalancing it. It is not an effective change that improves the conditions for universal participation. What do you want to bring the qualification from 8 teams to 4? But this is to the disadvantage of small countries. If we do this, would Egypt qualify? I am asking you the question, the Europeans, if we do this, would certain emerging fencing countries have the possibility of participating in the Games? I think we must be reasonable. The qualification system is approved by the one who owns the Games. The Games do not belong to the International Fencing Federation. The IOC is the one who says that we can't change because it's unbalancing. And you want to impose a change on us? You, the countries, the great fencing countries, as they say. No, no, and no.

It's true, Madam CEO, Mr. President, we must create this working group to think about changes, but integrate the small countries which are emerging countries, without which there is no universality of fencing. We have agreed to changes since 2008. Since 2008, I have been at the Executive Committee. Since 2008, each time we change the rules, change the Statutes, change the equipment system, but it costs us dearly. Do you realize it every time when we change a piste, every time we change a mask, every time we change a weapon? Do you recognize it? It is part of the progress of fencing. But it is expensive, extremely expensive. That's why I say this, Mr. President...

Alisher Usmanov: Yes, please.

Mbagnick Ndiaye (SEN): Mr. President, I am not a dictator. My country is one of the most democratic countries in Africa, but we have to move on. We can't spend all our time saying change, change, change. Create this working group, but not before Paris, after Paris.

Alisher Usmanov: You are right.

Mbagnick Ndiaye (SEN): Because the IOC said we couldn't change for Paris. If we can't do it, why are we wasting our time here? Why? It was already discussed at the Executive Committee.

Alisher Usmanov: I support your position.

Mbagnick Ndiaye (SEN): We have to move forward. That's what I wanted to say. In any case, be very careful. Emerging countries in fencing, emerging countries in fencing: Latin America, Africa, Oceania, Asia pay great attention to those wishes for a general upheaval in our discipline.

That's what I wanted to say on my behalf as a member of the Executive Committee. But if it must be said in the name of Africa that I represent, I will say it in the name of Africa. It must be taken into consideration. Thanks very much.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: If anyone else wants to speak to ensure we have a democracy, we can give you the floor. But do you know why Nathalie is disappointed? Because she has put such a big effort into this. OK, I spoke with the President, Vice President, and Sports Director. But after that, day by day, we worked. Nobody, nobody, recognized what was changing day by day. Look, today, we made 90 changes in rules.

We don't do anything against the interests of fencing. It is very important for me today to have the support of my position from Africa, Egypt, Tunisia. Iran participates in the semi-finals of the Olympic Games.

Oh, Mademoiselle, please.

Claudia Bokel (GER): It is not my turn; there is someone else before me.

Alisher Usmanov: It's okay, please, please.

Claudia Bokel (GER): Mr. President, I followed this discussion with great interest and heard the words of Madame Rodriguez that a working group is to be established to look at the Los Angeles qualification. Since we are a great fencing family, may I suggest that we invite the IOC member sitting at your table who was re-elected to the Executive Board and my compatriot Britta Heidemann who is an IOC member. May I suggest including these two IOC members in the working group that will be established for Los Angeles? Thank you.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Thank you.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Of course, how can we work without IOC if it is related to the IOC solution? I want to assure everybody. I don't care any less than the Swedish Federation about the new qualification system, and I do what I am able within my responsibility and my right to achieve this. Do you understand? I already answered this by Statutes, regulations, and rules, and not because today one Federation, after ten years of sleeping, made one proposal, but because it is a very big item, a very big issue for us.

How many participants in World Championships do we have? Please tell me.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We have in the Senior World Championships around 100 countries, sometimes more, and we have about 1500 athletes.

Alisher Usmanov: What if tomorrow, the IOC gets irritated by our proposition and decreases the number to 50 participants? Currently, there are ten thousand five hundred participants for 27 sports. Ten thousand means five hundred for football, basketball, volleyball, handball, swimming, gymnastics, and other sports, and we have 212. Within this, we need to think and find a new possibility to improve our sport but not in the manner it is outlined in the proposal.

Tomorrow we, the Executive Committee members, after dividing our posts in Commissions, will begin our usual work, but in a speedy regime. And I want to mention one more objective we want to achieve. We want to create an FIE-owned company to start making our own fencing equipment. We have already started this work with one of the members of our Executive Committee, Mr. Bierkowski. He hasn't been reelected this time but keeps his role as an organiser of a working group for the Olympic Games in Paris. I proposed him to be my adviser for SEMI Commissions and equipment.

We employ every capacity to achieve our goals.

Soon we will appoint in the Executive Committee those responsible for qualifications so they can analyze the possibilities to change the system of qualifications. This is my answer to Congress, and I want to stop here and close the discussion about this. We know Federations' opinion. Who wants to speak more about these questions? No one. OK, please don't tell me tomorrow that I don't give you a chance to speak up.

Nathalie Rodriguez: There is a clear proposal on the table.

Alisher Usmanov: Did you read the second letter as well?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes. Both. So, we have a clear proposal and guideline from the IOC to keep the same qualification system. The Executive Committee of the FIE agreed with this and proposed creating a working group for the future

Olympic Games. These are the proposals with which we are dealing now.

Alisher Usmanov: OK. OK, please.

Tadeusz Tomaszewski (POL): Tadeusz Tomaszewski, Polish Fencing Federation. Just one minute, I want to support Mr. Usmanov's proposal to stop the discussion because we have already heard a lot about the details of this Swedish proposition. In my opinion, it is too early to discuss this proposition in detail. The Executive Committee proposes to create a working group, and the Swedish Federation wants the same as I understood. So, there is a general agreement for that, and there is no need to discuss it longer. My proposition is to stop the discussion and leave it to the Executive Committee. Today we elected a new Executive Committee and elected a new President, so we trust them. So, that should leave them the decision to create the working group.

Alisher Usmanov: Thank you very much. But you know, if somebody wants to add anything I don't want to close this topic. I remember the neighbor of the Swedish Federation, who is my friend also.

Tadeusz Tomaszewski (POL): Thank you very much, Mr. President.

Alisher Usmanov: You are my friend, so you must know. Some time ago we used to train together. He became a tremendous champion, but I preferred another career. Please.

Joonas Lyytinen (FIN): Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I think that the wise compromise that we could all agree on could be, in this case, that if the Executive Committee proposal would just be amended.

Alisher Usmanov: Let me immediately tell you; we do not compromise. Do you understand? We announced and explained to Congress our concept, and there is absolutely no room for any compromise position on the Swedish proposal. If you find any compromise, please come to me, and we will study it.

Joonas Lyytinen (FIN): Sir, please, can I finish? If the proposal would be amended with just the part of the Swedish proposition, where there were a few lines about the representation of the working group, and then we are all in agreement.

Alisher Usmanov: We answered this question also. I explained that tomorrow the Executive Committee begins its work, and we will decide how we work in this Working group and when we create this group. We will send information to inquire who is interested in joining this group and becoming a member, OK? It is our responsibility; it is our right. And more importantly, I personally invite you to join this group for sure.

Applause.

Which Federation, which country do you represent? Ah, Finland. OK.

Alexander Mikhailov (RUS): My Dear colleagues, my dear friends.

Alisher Usmanov: Excuse me, Alexander. But Finland, why do you forget? You are a neighbor not only to Sweden but to Russia also.

(Laughter, exclamations in the audience)

Alisher Usmanov: Ay ay.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes. Please.

Alisher Usmanov: Please.

Alexander Mikhailov (RUS): My Dear colleagues, my dear friends, my big, big family,

I defended my country; I participated in international competitions for twenty-three years. There have been many changes in the formula for twenty-three years when we fenced. We were dissatisfied as always. But fencing gave us such famous people. Now we have a system that is working, it is wonderful, there are no problems. Look, they win perfectly; the system is balanced in all respects.

If we talk about what needs to be changed, we should remember that we need to follow the principle do no harm when changing. It may turn out that we will be considered unnecessary in the Olympic movement in the end. And this system is now working, and it works for us. I mean, look at what our International Federation is dealing with now, and our President personally. Look, what kind of offers were received today to organise the Junior and Cadet World Championships, and which countries gave their consent. After all, five or seven years ago, we didn't even think about it. Still, thanks to the fact that our sport is becoming more popular, I'm sure those countries will have fencing competitions there very soon. They will bring out the best that we once gave birth to, just as what is being born in here right now, what we are protecting. I am not against Sweden; this is our family; it has its own opinion. But we also have our own opinion, which gives us the right, gives us the strength to move on. So, let's go further.

Applause.

Nathalie Rodriguez: I think we have a clear proposal, and we reached an agreement. For Paris, we have the same qualification system as in Tokyo. The Executive Committee will create a working group that will include the representatives of all zones, big Federations, small Federations, and medium Federations. Can we agree on this and move to the next item, please?

Applause.

Otto Drakenberg (SWE): Hold on, hold on. If you ask a question, you must be prepared for an answer. I want to say thank you very much. I totally support the proposal presented. I did that, I think, 20 minutes ago when I said that Sweden believes that we shall keep the system for Paris, and we shall appoint a working group for Los Angeles. So, I'm very, very happy about that.

I would also like to say thank you so very much to all the members of the FIE. It's important that we meet and discuss, especially now when the Covid is over. I believe this is one of the most important issues we have on the table, and we will only move forward if we work together and properly discuss the topics. This discussion to me is very, very good, and I'm really looking forward to the upcoming discussions we will have when we get the different proposals from the working group, and they ask us to come back with feedback and so on. Thank you very much for that.

The final thing I would like to say is that it might be a small thing for some people, but for me, it's very, very important that we remember what we say in our Statutes. We say that it is Congress that establishes our qualification rules. Not the Executive Committee, but the Congress. So, it's our decision, and I think we should keep that power, which is currently within the Statutes. I'm happy for the Executive Committee to put together the working group, but it's Congress that finally decides.

Today, we have decided that we keep as-is for Paris, and what the decision would be for L.A., well, we will wait and see, and we will take that decision on one of the future Congresses in good time before L.A. Thank you so very much.

Nathalie Rodriguez: We move to the next item because our athletes are waiting for us. We have finished for now with that item on the Olympic Games, and we reached a decision.

12. Awarding of the 2021 Chevalier Feyerick Challenge

Nathalie Rodriguez: The next item is the *award of the Challenge Chevalier Feyerick*. The Executive Committee made a proposal, and this morning, the Honour Commission agreed to the Executive Committee's proposal. The proposal is to award the Challenge Chevalier Feyerick to Mr. Áron Szilágyi.

Applause.

The text that we would like to read to the Congress will be included in the Statutes and is following: "For brilliantly winning the Gold Medal at Individual Men's Sabre in 2012, 2016, and 2020 Olympic Games and becoming the first fencer in history to win three consecutive individual Olympic gold medals. Having always demonstrated the purest sporting spirit and thus promoting the values of fencing, he has become an inspiring model to the young generations."

Applause.

The President will present the Trophy to Áron Szilágyi.

Applause. Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: A few other prominent fencers are part of this list, including the Hungarian Bence Szabo, who I respect very much. He has won twice; Isabelle Lamour won twice. But now we have, as we said, the Champion of the Champions. Congratulations, and we wish you at least one more medal. OK?

(Laughter) Applause.

Congratulations! Congratulations!

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Áron, this is not everything. Here is the diploma, and here is our gold medal of the FIE.

Áron Szilágyi (HUN): Dear Mr. President, Dear Congress,

It was a surprise. I was just about to receive the award for winning the world rankings. This very prestigious award is a surprise for me, and I am very, very thankful for it. Thank you, Mr. President, congratulations on your re-election.

I started fencing at the age of nine, and this sport has been my whole life for the last 22 years, and I think it will be in the future as well. I'm very happy to be here in the fencing family, which is my family, and I congratulate all the members who got elected to the Executive Committee and in the Commissions. I wish you good work, good health, and good energy for that. I hope I will return for the next Congresses as well. But firstly, I will mainly try to compete in the next World Cups or Championships and the Paris Olympics. Thank you very much.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: If we had no Covid measures, I would hug you. Thank you very much.

13. 2021 Fair-Play Trophy

Nathalie Rodriguez: We move to the *Fair-Play Trophy 2021*, proposed by the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee decided to award the Fair-Play Trophy this year to the Egyptian Fencing Federation for having so brilliantly organised, secure and safe Junior and Cadet World Championships 2021 for the benefit of fencers, teams, and delegations.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Everybody knows the enormous challenges we faced when organising competitions. In such a turbulent, difficult time, we will never forget the support of the Egyptian government. Thank you very much. Please convey our appreciation to everybody in your government, to every minister.

With the efforts of the Egyptian Federation, we organized the most significant event for Juniors and Cadets. We thank your federation for this enormous contribution and help to the FIE. You assured a significant presence of fencers in the World Championships programme. Thank you very much, and all the best wishes.

Applause.

Abdelmoneim Elhousseiny (EGY): Hello, everybody. Thank you very much, Mr. Alisher Usmanov. It is a pleasure today, as it is the first day that we can speak in our beloved language, in Arabic, and you can hear the translation.

Peace be upon you all.

I have a very simple comment on democracy. Democracy means that a country like Egypt is present today and is being praised and recognized for organising World Fencing Championships at a high level. Democracy means that Egypt, in 2022, will organise the World Fencing Championships for Seniors. Democracy does not mean being against the FIE's success; the FIE's achievements and success during the Presidency period of Mr. Alisher Usmanov for the FIE. Democracy means that Egypt has got 2 of its foil fencers to reach the Finals in the Tokyo 2020 tournament. Democracy for us means freedom. Democracy is not just talking or making speeches. Democracy means to take action and to perform well. Today Egypt is well acknowledged and highly appreciated due to the democracy that was established by Mr. Alisher Usmanov. Thank you.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: If you want a translation, I can translate only in one big phrase because I forgot a lot. (Laughter) He defends the democracy shown by the Executive Committee and the President, and he says that democracy is not only about talking but also about action and control of what you do and for who you do this. Thank you again. (Laughter)

Applause.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Also, as an exception this year, the Executive Committee decided to award an exceptional trophy, the Merit trophy, to three Federations, which helped the FIE finalize the Olympic qualification for the Olympic Games. These Federations are Hungary, Russia, and Qatar, who have organised wonderful competitions so that the fencers can go to the Games.

Please, can you come here?

Alisher Usmanov: Please, my friends. Welcome, everybody, again. I am confident in the Hungarian Federation in Budapest. We thank Qatar Federation, thank you to you, Mr. Mikhailov. These Federations created a miracle.

After Paris, it will be 2024, and our term will be over. We would not have the Tokyo Games if this competition didn't exist.

I must recognize every Federation who really contributed to fencing for everybody. Thank you very much to these three Federations. Please accept my appreciation, respect, and forever I am at your disposal. Thank you very much.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: If anyone wants to speak, please.

Khalid AL HAMADI (QAT): Mr. President and the Executive Committee,

Ladies and Gentlemen, thank you very much.

It's been a pleasure for us as a three-nation to participate in making these Olympic Games in Tokyo 2020 happen. We are all here to support the FIE. As Mr. President has said, we are one hand. And in the future, we are also very interested in supporting the FIE. Thank you very much.

Henriette Brigitte Tamas (HUN): On behalf of Hungary, I also say thank you, our Federation in the future also will organise competitions. We are friends. Yes. Thank you so much.

15. Final remarks and closing of the Congress

Nathalie Rodriguez: We have finished with the awards.

Alisher Usmanov: Nathalie tells me she has finished with her items of the Congress agenda. But obviously, we have one much more essential issue to address; today, it's a real challenge for our movement. We need to figure out how to help the African Federations overcome the new virus strain.

On behalf of our Fund for Development, I can try to research which vaccine defends better against this new strain, and we will look for a possibility to get them arranged for Confederations. Give me the number of coaches and athletes, and we will buy this vaccine and send it to you. Please provide me with your addresses. I will try to speak with Moderna, Pfizer, or Sputnik and send them to you because it is very dangerous without this vaccine.

We should not forget that the virus does exist, and we need to plan how to live with it in the next two and a half years before the Olympic Games. Reducing the number of competitions and keeping only those necessary for qualifications is more important, in my view, for Paris.

Please approach the new Executive Committee starting tomorrow, so together with Nathalie, we can start thinking about what we can do. Maybe we keep 100% of our competitions. Still, the difficulty is in the arrangements for these competitions because we cannot not invite the African athletes, but twelve countries in Africa are closed for a lockdown. Ten countries in Europe are currently in lockdown and they will remain closed minimum until the end of January. France wants to extend it until April, from what I hear. It is not simple. I think all Federations must help each other to calculate their capacity.

Tomorrow, I am meeting our colleague from Luxembourg, Mr. Tesch. I will approach him; if he is not against it, we will think about his status after today's elections. If he is ready... Do you confirm what you told me before? I think he doesn't hear me. Do you hear me? I speak about you.

Pascal Tesch (LUX): Yes, I do hear you.

Alisher Usmanov: If you hear, please look here. As our Swedish friend said, we need to see the eyes of each other. My one eye doesn't see very well, but I do see you in any case. Think about the control of arranging the competitions, it is important to check every country's capacity. For example, I know that currently, in Uzbekistan, the sanitary situation is very good. There is maximum hundred cases per day for the 35 million population. Okay, it's the ex-Soviet Union Republic; nobody trusts the numbers. Okay, let it be 300 cases, but not more. In Germany, there are 75,000 cases per day. But it is not the fourth wave; it is only the end of the third one. These are the issues we need to solve. How much have we planned for our COVID expenses for 2020-2021 to help?

Nathalie Rodriguez: To help the Federations for the coming season, we have planned a budget of 1.5 million.

Alisher Usmanov: 1.5 million. It does not include my personal help to many Federations. We have a good financial situation, but we need to find other financial sources.

I repeat my hypothesis. Why do youth, every child, kid, teenager, play a game where anime people kill each other? And why our live fight between two beautiful women or two handsome men does not attract as much attention? These are the questions of strategic development.

This is where the possibility is to find some source for the commercialization of our sport. Why does tennis attract so much attention from these sponsors? Why not fencing? There are no real figures, but Dota, and

other games are very popular.

We must make our fighting interesting, bright, and understandable? We need to think about this. This is the strategic way to find a future for fencing because Usmanov will not last forever. If I create a noble endowment fund, it is still not enough in any case. How much money does the bank pay for endowment today, one percent, right?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Here, yes. One percent, maximum.

Alisher Usmanov: To get ten million, you must put in one billion. I can't. *(Laughter)* Please be more realistic and support us. Thank you very much to everybody. I declare our Congress closed, and I congratulate every new member of the Executive Committee. I hope it continues to be one united team. I wish every new member to find his own place. If somebody wants to speak with me through Nathalie and Mr. Krylov, we can speak about this. What time does the Executive Committee begin its work tomorrow?

Nathalie Rodriguez: The Executive Committee meeting is at 10 o'clock.

Alisher Usmanov: 10 o'clock is very early; I cannot. I need to come from Morges. Can we do this at least at 11 o'clock?

Nathalie Rodriguez: 11 o'clock is possible, but it's the latest.

Alisher Usmanov: OK. 11. OK. 10:30.

Nathalie Rodriguez: 10:30 is good.

[Discussion in the audience]

Alisher Usmanov: OK, you start until I get here. I announce today my first request as a new President. Please prepare everything to reconfirm Madame Rodriguez as the Chief Executive. Everyone should thank her for such a difficult 12 years of working with me.

(Laughter)

I think everybody must respect and appreciate such an immense contribution of Nathalie Rodriguez to fencing, especially in this turbulent time. Thank you, Nathalie.

Applause.

We need to discuss with Mr. Katsiadakis which position suits him better to achieve what we need to employ his experience and beautiful knowledge, e.g., in refereeing. He is Ana Pascu's successor. He helped arrange the Olympic Games and ensure a very high level of refereeing. The first Executive Committee meeting is in February. Yes?

Nathalie Rodriguez: Yes.

Alisher Usmanov: We need to meet in January to discuss the calendar because I am certain we will have many cancellations from people who want to organise our competitions. We need to find a solution for this. Think about this; we are waiting for your proposals.

And tomorrow, we need to elect three Vice-Presidents.

I want you to know what I am planning. Why am I planning this? Because my age is coming to a time when we need to find successors. In the Russian Federation, we found someone who successfully manages the Olympic Committee of Russia, like Krisztian Kulcsar, who used to be the Sports Director of the FIE, and today is the President of the National Olympic Committee. Today Frau Bokel is acting Head of the National Olympic Committee of Germany. It is a very good result when fencers take on more leadership roles.

Applause.

(Laughter)

I am very happy with Qatar and the Emirates Federations' willingness to help us and be ready to increase our cooperation. We also are ready to make any efforts to support the development of our sport in all these Gulf countries. Does nobody have questions for me?

Nathalie Rodriguez: No, we are all tired.

Applause.

Alisher Usmanov: Thank you very much; I can see everyone is tired. Madam Rodriguez invites you to the boat.

Nathalie Rodriguez: Two boats are waiting for us, and we'll leave shortly. Before you go, I would like you to thank the translators who have done a very good job.

Applause.

Nathalie Rodriguez: I would like you also to thank the personnel of the FIE who worked hard to organise this Congress and without whom it would not have been possible.

CONGRESS 2021

AMENDMENTS TO THE STATUTES

The texts below are applicable from January 1, 2022, unless otherwise indicated.

3.1 MEETINGS

(d) In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, the Congress may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

(e) In a matter of urgency a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the FIE by the President or the Executive Committee. The required majorities set forth in the Statutes shall apply to these resolutions and decisions.

3.6.2

The voting for the President, the Executive Committee and the Commissions is conducted by secret ballot, which shall include, but not be limited to, votes submitted by appropriate electronic communication as determined by the FIE CEO.

5.4.2

The Executive Committee can only deliberate if more than one half of its members are present. In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, the Executive Committee may hold its regular meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means. It may also call special online meetings to discuss and make decisions relating to urgent matters.

5.5.3

The Executive Committee outlines the work of the Commissions and the Congresses. For this purpose, it can use all means of communication to gather relevant information.

It decides the date and the place of the meetings of Congresses, commissions and councils. In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, such meetings may be designated to be held via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

6.4.2

A Commission's meeting is valid only when the majority of members are present. In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, a Commission may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

When the meeting is held via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means, the identity of the participants must be verified.

Each member who wants to participate by telephone or video conference, pursuant to the above, shall submit the request to the President, at least ~~40~~ 20 days before the meeting. However, no such ~~40~~ 20 -day notice is required if a member of the commission cannot attend the meeting in person on account of a force majeure event including, but not limited to, illness or injury preventing a person from coming to the meeting or travel interruption due to delays preventing the person from arriving in time for the meeting.

For certain matters the President, following each meeting deliberation, may ask for a confirmation to be addressed by e-mail within 10 days from the date the meeting is held.

Participation by telephone or video is not permitted when a secret ballot is required. However, balloting through the use of appropriate electronic means that assure secrecy is permitted.

In addition to the above:

- (i) in a matter of urgency, a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the Commission by its President;
- (ii) special online meetings may be called to discuss and make decisions related to urgent matters; and
- (iii) regular meetings, at which there are no significant issues to be decided, may be held online with the approval of a majority of the members of the Commission.

6.9.4

The functions of the Ethics Committee are defined in Chapter XII of these Statutes, section 5.

In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, the Ethics Committee may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means. In a matter of urgency, a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the Committee by its President.

6.A.4.2

A Council's meeting has a quorum if the majority of members are present. Otherwise, the proposals taken at the meeting of the Council will be submitted by correspondence from the FIE Office to absent members within 5 days as of the meeting held, who shall express their opinion within 8 days following the receipt of the proposals. In the case that a member does not express his/her opinion within this 8-day deadline, it shall be deemed that the affected member of the Council has agreed with the proposal.

In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, a Council may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

In addition to the above:

- (i) in a matter of urgency, a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the Council by its President;
 - (ii) special online meetings may be called to discuss and make decisions related to urgent matters; and
 - (iii) regular meetings, at which there are no significant issues to be decided, may be held online with the approval of a majority of the members of the Council.
-

9.1.9 (new article)

- a) A National Federation can obtain a license for a coach who is a citizen of the country of such National Federation and whose license will specify the nationality of the coach.
 - b) A National Federation can obtain a license for a coach who is not a citizen of the country of that National Federation, but which National Federation is intending to send the coach to an official competition of the FIE as a member of the delegation of such National Federation. The license for such coach will specify:
 - i. the nationality of the coach's passport; and
 - ii. the nationality of the country of National Federation the coach is representing at the competition.
 - c) If a coach changes the country s/he is to represent at a future competition, the coach or the National Federation s/he will be representing shall inform the FIE of the change and the FIE will note such change on the coach's license. The coach will not need to secure a new license.
 - d) A coach needs only one license, even though s/he may represent more than one country at official competitions of the FIE.
 - e) A coach needs a license as a coach, even though such person has another license as a fencer, referee, official at the World Championships or Olympic Games or member of the Executive Committee, a Commission, a Council or Ethics Committee.

Chapter XII, art. 5.1

The Ethics Committee is formed in order that the FIE Family shall ensure the observance of the principles and rules of the Olympic Charter and of this Code. The CEO, or her/his representative shall be the liaison with the Ethics Committee and shall provide the administrative support for the Committee.

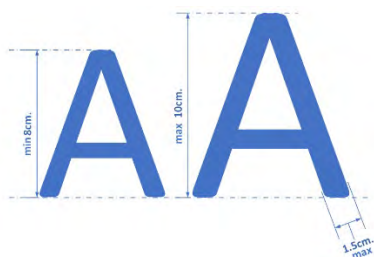

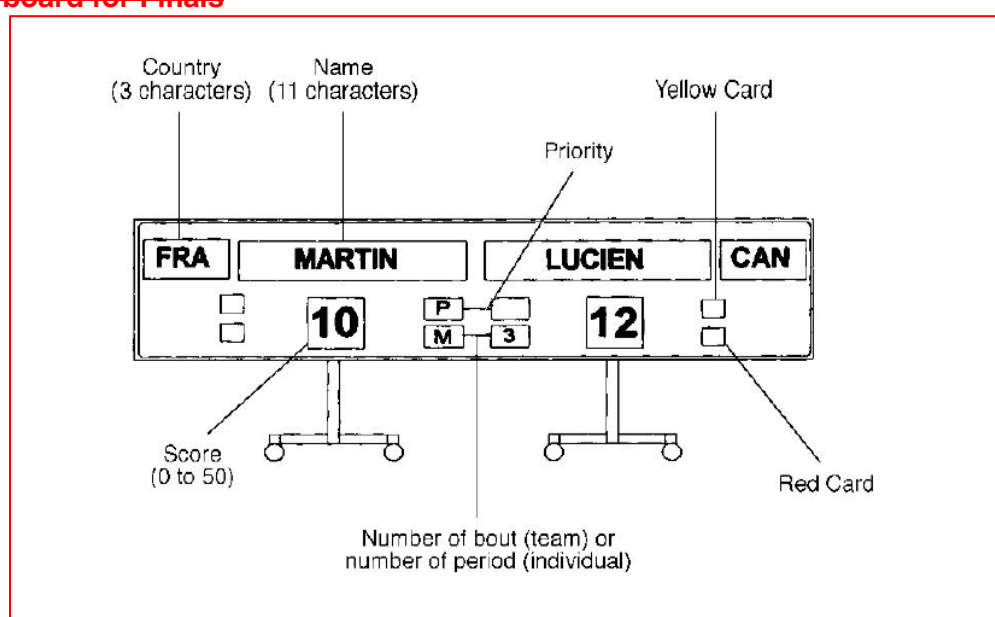

Modification management:

1) The homologation is valid for the duration specified in the technical handbooks as long as no modification is made to the equipment or its manufacturing process.

For blades the first homologation process has to be confirmed with a periodical check done every 2 years (see page 68 item 7)

2) Any change must be immediately reported to the FIE SEMI Commission President. These changes cover all aspects of the homologated items (appearance, composition, internal content, software and all other material changes).

3) The modified equipment must pass the whole homologation process again.

In particular, if a manufacturer intends to change the material or the manufacturing of his FIE certified equipment, the manufacturer must submit it for a new homologation process and wait for the result.

From 01.03.2021, the obligatory chipping of new fencing equipment (jacket, trousers, plastron mask) has been introduced. The appearance and geometrical dimensions of the chip are shown in Fig.1

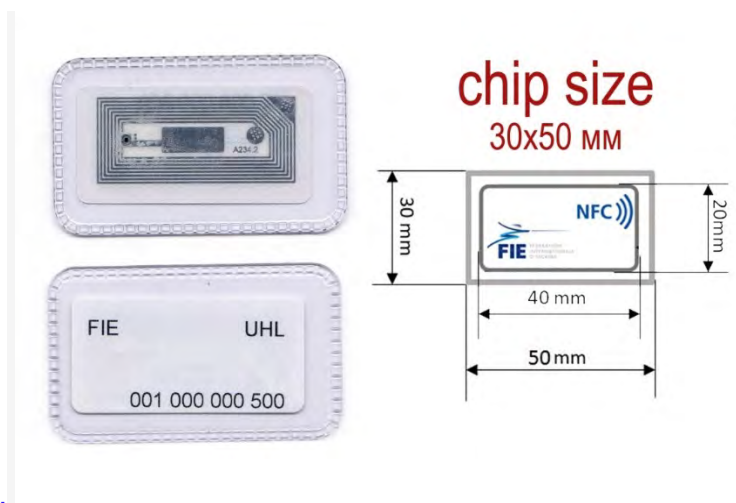

The chip contains information about the type of product and the name of the manufacturer. Reading of the information can be done both by equipment manufacturers and by consumers using smartphones with NFC modules.

A special label is sewn on top of the chip. The label design and dimensions are shown in Fig.2.

In the LOGO zone, the name of the equipment manufacturer is indicated.

The S 800 label is sewn onto the jacket, trousers and plastron. The M1600 label is sewn onto the mask. Places of installation of chips and labels on equipment are shown in Fig.3

Chip and FIE label of quality location

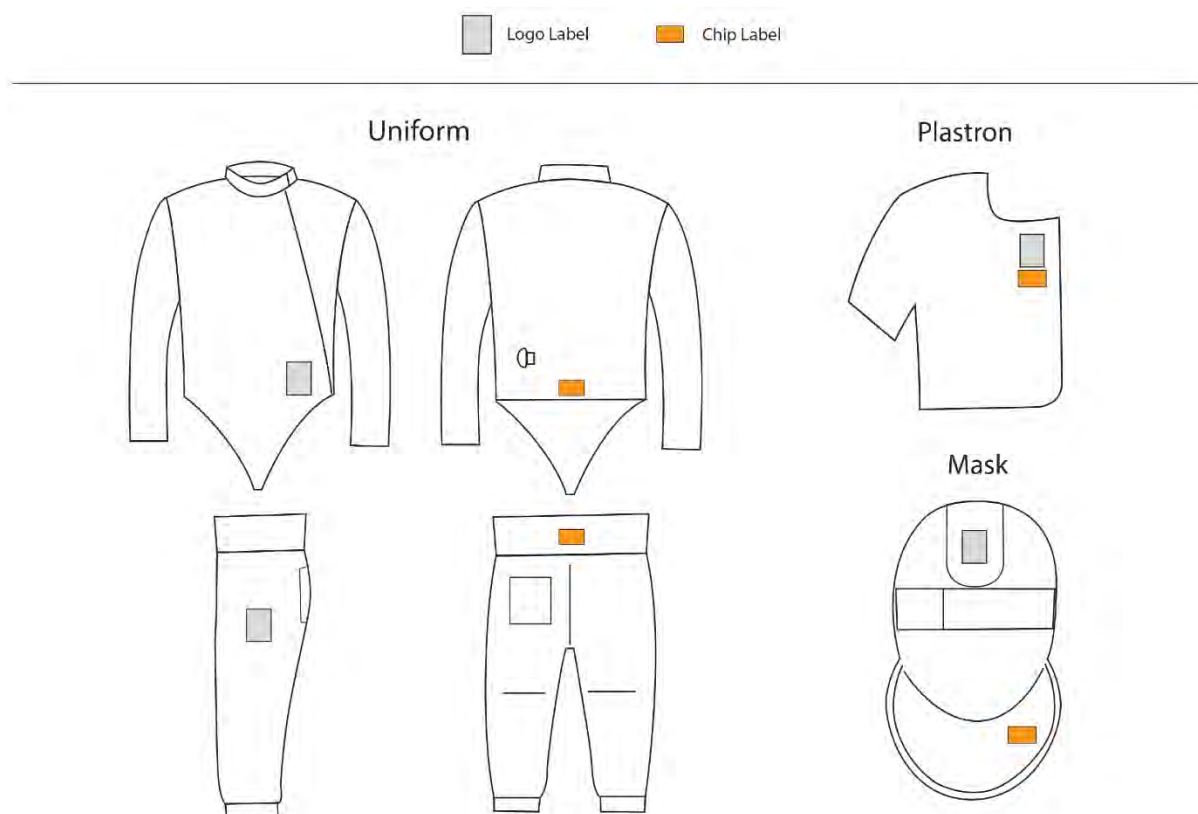


Both variants of the FIE seal of quality are acceptable up to and including the 2025/2026 season.

For the 2026/2027 season, masks, jackets, breeches and plastrons must have the new quality seal with a chip securely located underneath.

OBITUARY

The International Fencing Federation has been affected by the departure of several friends:

Colonel Albert Kaya (CGO), 1953-2020

The FIE is saddened to be informed of the passing of Colonel Albert Kaya, president of the Congolese Fencing Federation, on January 19 at the Centre Hospitalier Universitaire de Brazzaville.

Marcello Baiocco (MH, ITA) 1924-2020

Marcello Baiocco was born on March 21st, 1924 in Rome. He graduated as electrotechnical engineer at the University of Rome.

He practiced fencing from 1935 to 1945, then, after a long break, he returned to the sport in 1965 at the Rome Fencing Club, whose President was Sidney Romeo.

Marcello Baiocco had been President of the SEMI Commission and Member of Honour of the Italian Fencing Federation.

He had also been a member of the Technical Commission of the Italian National Olympic Committee, which awarded him the silver and gold Stars of Sports Merit.

Marcello Baiocco was a member of the FIE SEMI Commission from 1983 to 2000, and then its President from 2000 to 2004.

He launched the first technical fencing laboratory, the "Laboratorio Scherma Marcello Baiocco", which is still today the FIE's centre of certification for the inspection, research and technical tests involving apparatuses and fencing equipment, ensuring their safety and homologation.

Marcello Baiocco was elected Member of Honour of the FIE by the 2009 Congress, and the FIE Executive Committee elected him Member of the FIE Hall of Fame in 2014. Gifted and talented expert, he contributed to protect the safety of fencing and fencers with selflessness and tireless dedication.

Gennady Miakotnykh (BRA) 1940-2020

Gennady Miakotnykh, Brazilian fencing team coach, passed away on Wednesday, March 25, 2020. A renowned Russian fencing master, Coach Miakotnykh lived in Brazil for 20 years and was also the coach of the Esporte Club Pinheiros in São Paulo. He trained numerous high-performance Brazilian fencers, including Ana Beatriz Bulcao, women's foil medallist at the Lima 2019 Pan American Games and competitor at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games.

Antonio Melo (VEN) 1948-2020

Antonio Melo (VEN) passed away on April 17, 2020 from complications related to Covid-19.

Born on January 21, 1948, Antonio Melo was a member of the FIE Veterans' Council.

He was vice president of the Venezuelan Fencing Federation from 1981 to 1983 and had also been a national referee in foil and epee. He represented veterans' interests on the national federation board, initiating, developing, and organizing veteran competitions throughout the country.

In addition to competing on the Venezuelan national team in sabre B veteran competitions, Antonio Melo served as a member of the national delegation to the Pan American Youth and Veteran Championships in Costa Rica 2013 and Aruba 2014, the 2015 South American Youth and Veteran Championships in Caracas, Venezuela as well as the 2015 Veteran Fencing World Championships in Limoges, France.

Antonio Melo has dedicated his life to fencing and to veteran fencing, performing various functions and roles. He continuously gave the best of himself and devoted his talent, energy, kindness, and experience to the cause of our sport.

Corey Rogers (BAR) 1977-2020

Mr. Corey Rogers, vice president of the Barbados Fencing Federation passed away. Mr. Rogers (b. Nov. 28, 1977) was an active fencer who participated in the 2018 Central American and Caribbean Games in Barranquilla, Colombia as well as the 2017 Pan American Training Course for epee coaches.

Jean Link (LUX), 1938-2020

Mr. Jean Link passed away at the age of 81. Mr. Link was born on Sept. 3, 1938 and began fencing at age 10. He participated in the Junior World Championships at age 14 and University Games at 15. In 1958 in Bucharest, he became the men's foil junior world champion and again in Paris in 1959. In the same year, Mr. Link became individual and team military world champion.

"With Jean Link, fencing loses a great personality", said Pascal Tesch, president of the Luxembourg Fencing Federation.

In 1959, Mr. Link was voted "Best Sportsman of the year" by the Luxembourg Association of Sports Journalists. The next year he went on to compete in the 1960 Rome Olympic Games.

Soon after, he left world fencing to be part of a family business while continuing to follow his competitive spirit and pursue a variety of sports. In 1967, he was a founding member of Luxembourg's Tennis Spora, which is still today one of the country's largest tennis clubs.

Mr. Link returned to fencing and competed in the 1999 Siofok (Hungary) Veteran Fencing World Championships, where he took gold in men's 60-plus epee and bronze in men's 60-plus foil. At the 2002 Tampa (Florida, USA) Veteran Fencing World Championships he won silver in men's 60-plus foil.

Jean Link's lifelong, immense love for fencing was legendary and he was very often present at national and international events even when not competing.

Aleksandar Anastasov (MKD) 1945-2020

The FIE is saddened to be informed of the passing of Aleksandar Anastasov (MKD) at the age of 74. Fencing since age 16, he competed in the Silni Trophy competition on February 23, 2020 in Belgrade this year, taking a bronze medal despite battling a serious illness.

He competed in all three weapons in numerous national, zonal, and international competitions and notably was 70+ world champion in men's sabre at the 2017 Veteran Fencing World Championships in Maribor, Slovenia. He competed in the 1975 Budapest and 2009 Antalya Senior Fencing World Championships.

Ljubomir Shopovski, Secretary-General of the North Macedonia Fencing Federation, stated Mr. Anastasov was "one of our most prominent fencers and [one whom] we can certainly claim to be our best veteran".

At the Veteran World Championships, he fenced three weapons over many seasons. In Maribor, Mr. Anastasov took a bronze in epee and was 12th in foil; he also earned bronzes at the 2016 Stralsund (sabre) and 2015 Limoges (foil) Veteran World Championships. He fenced epee satellite competitions over the last two decades, finishing in the top 64 (45th) at the 2018 Belgrade Satellite tournament, 20th at the same event in 2009, and 13th at the 2009 Istanbul Satellite Competition.

Mr. Anastasov earned medals at the Yugoslavia and Balkan championships, at multiple European Masters and European Veteran Championships, winning the Italian Cup for veterans, Champion of Bavaria, and he reigns as the current European Veteran Fencer of the Year in sabre.

Yiannis Hadjirapis (CYP) 1946-2020

Born in Limassol, Cyprus on August 11, 1946, Mr. Hadjirapis attended Sussex University in the UK and became a hotelier. In 1986, he followed Mr. Ouranios Ionnidis as president of the Cyprus Fencing Federation and remained in the position until now. He also served as a member of the Mediterranean Fencing Confederation.

In a statement about Mr. Hadjirapis, the CFF said he "...was a kind man, one of the pioneers in fencing, a fighter and a pure fan of the sport".

During his tenure as CFF president, Cyprus began hosting an FIE satellite world cup competition, the Aphrodite Cup. From 2005 to today, clubs in Cyprus increased from one to five, with Cypriot athletes increasingly participating in world competition. "The work and selfless contribution of Yiannis Hadjirapis for the development and dissemination of fencing will remain indelible in everyone's memory", said the CFF.

During an "extraordinary" session of the Cyprus Fencing Federation, the members decided to name an annual competition, the "Yiannis Hadjirapis Cup", to honour their old President, to close national training centres on the day of his funeral (October 5) and to observe a minute of silence for him at the Pancyprian Championship with the event dedicated to his memory.

Taymi Chappe Valladares (ESP) 1968-2020

The FIE is saddened to be informed of the passing of Taymi Chappe Valladares, born on September 11, 1968 in Havana, Cuba. She began her fencing career in that city. In 1990 she became world champion in women's epee at the Lyon Fencing World Championships representing Cuba. She then began fencing for Spain, and in 1994 received a gold medal at the Athens World Championships in women's team epee and was first in the World Cup ranking in 1996. She qualified for the Atlanta 1996 Olympic Games and was ranked 17th in individual women's epee. Ms. Valladares also took the individual women's epee bronze medal in 1997 at the World Championships in Cape Town, South Africa.

The Spanish Fencing Federation stated on Ms. Valladares “endowed with a unique personality, she transmitted her strength to the national team, making it the best women’s team in the history of our sport and one of the best in the world. Her memory will remain in all of us who knew her and admired her passion for fencing”.

Gabriel W. J. Oloka (UGA) 1938-2020

The FIE is saddened to be informed of the passing of Gabriel W. J. Oloka (UGA), who most recently served as the president of the Uganda Fencing Federation until November 22, 2020. Mr. Oloka, who founded the Federation, in 2013 was awarded the International Olympic Committee’s “150 Years, Pierre de Coubertin, Sport as a School of Life” Trophy. He served as the Secretary-General of the Uganda Olympic Committee for many years.

Born on November 11, 1938, Mr. Oloka pursued many professional and personal interests in his life, including working with the Uganda Police and ultimately retiring from active service with the Uganda Posts & Telecommunication Corp. He played football for the Police Football Club and was also a national referee for the Federation of Uganda Football Associations. Throughout his life, he was instrumental in forming and supporting numerous Uganda sports organizations.

Wojciech Zablocki (POL) 1930-2020

The FIE is saddened to be informed of the passing of Polish fencing champion Wojciech Zablocki on December 5 at the age of 89. Born on December 6, 1930 in Warsaw, Mr. Zablocki was a member of the FIE Hall of Fame who won a bronze and two silver medals in team sabre at the Olympic Games (Melbourne 1956, Rome 1960, and Tokyo 1964) as well as ten medals in both individual and team events at the Fencing World Championships between 1953 and 1963. As a member of the Polish men’s sabre team, he was a team world champion in 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963, and in 1953 was individual junior world champion.

An official release from the Polish Fencing Federation stated, “He was an outstanding man—not only a great sabre fencer but also a world-famous architect, academic lecturer, expert in non-firearm weapons, author of numerous books, draftsman and painter. He was also a devoted husband, father and grandfather ... he will remain in our memory as a righteous man of great heart, and at the same time, despite his impressive sports and professional achievements, modest, warm, humorous and kind to everyone”.

Throughout his career, Mr. Zablocki received numerous Polish and international accolades and awards in both fencing and other professional pursuits. Among them, he was awarded the International Olympic Committee Sports and Architecture Trophy (1992) and Pierre de Coubertin medal (2009). In 2011, he was given the Polish Ecce Homo Order for “...a great sports career, enormous charisma in acting for the benefit of athletes and sports, and the magical beauty enchanted in his architecture”.

We express our sincerest condolences to the bereaved families and federations of the deceased.

1.3 Antidoping

1.3.1 CONTROLS

Antidoping measures were continued throughout the period and no case of doping occurred in any competitions organized by the FIE.

116 tests during competitions (January-March) and 274 out-of-competition controls and 14 blood tests were performed by ITA.

1.3.2 FIE ANTI-DOPING RULES

Following the adoption of the 2021 WADA Code and amendments to various international standards, the FIE adopted new anti-doping rules, which came into force on 1 January 2021.

1.4 Social media, magazines

1.4.1 FIE MEDIA REPORT 2020

During 2020, the FIE developed its digital communication platforms and significantly engaged its on-line audience both on social media, on TV channels and on FIE streaming platforms.

Several digital promotional campaigns covered major fencing events: Grand Prix, World Cups, the Olympic Day, the World Fencing Day, and development programs prepared with the athletes, addressing a variety of content reflecting the functions of each online platform.

1.4.2 SOCIAL MEDIA

A dynamic social media strategy was implemented during 2020, on all the FIE digital platforms. With the growth of followers on each digital platform, although the limited events around the world due to the pandemic, the FIE continued to manage four social media platforms every day, i.e., Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and YouTube.

The on-line content of the Fencing channel on YouTube obtained 1,9 million views. Despite the global situation and the significant impact on video content and video streaming, the number of YouTube subscribers increased by 5,7% - 4,3K reaching 63,339 subscriptions. During 2020, with the fencing Grand Prix and the World Cups organized around the world, the World Fencing Day plus weekly videos, graphic content and reposts the FIE achieved a 3,3 % average increase in followers on Facebook with a total of 939 posts, 11,8% on Twitter after 374 posts and 14,5% on Instagram with total number of posts 178.

The commitment and interaction between athletes and the public on social media have been significant. A series of digital features, such as winner interviews, IOC Athlete career+, event news, Behind the Mask videos, educational programs, World Fencing Day, and athletic-centric unique stories have been part of the continuous content plan on the FIE channels. Athletes and fencing event's organizers have used the FIE platforms as a showcase during World Cups and Grands Prix and have shared their personal viewpoints with the public online.

1.4.3 DIGITAL MAGAZINE - ESCRIME XXI

Across 2020, Escrime XXI enjoyed a total of 143,501 page views across its three languages and its three editions – two digital 114, 116, and one print-conversion 115 (Annual Report). Despite the difficult circumstances in this year and with few fencing events taking place, the readership of Escrime XXI grew by 3.6% on average per edition and in each language, which is a very positive sign.

This significant increase can be explained by the diversity of its content, with fencing stories from all over the world, and the effective cross-disciplinary communication on social media and the national federation platforms. According to our measurement indicators, the magazine aroused most interest in the USA, the United Kingdom, France, Italy, Spain, and Russia. The magazine reaches a wide population all over the world, increasing the awareness of fencing by broadcasting a positive image of our sport.

1.4.4 FIE SWORDPLAY

The FIE Swordplay game was launched in July 2016. This is a worldwide first for mobile telephone games, incorporating the real rules and techniques of fencing with fabulous 3D graphics, phenomenal animation, and ultra-realistic laws of physics, officially supported by the FIE. The countries where it is most popular with most downloads are France, Italy, Russia, China, Brazil, and the United States. The number of downloads from iOS in 2020 are 130'736 and from Android are 782'432, 913'168 in total.

1.4.5 TELEVISION - GRAND PRIX EVENTS IN 2020

The Grand Prix Events in 2020 took places in Canada (Jan.10-12) - the signal takers were Match TV and Olympic Channel, in Qatar (Jan 24-26) the takers were Olympic Channel, Match TV, Alkass TV(Qatar), in Turin (Feb.7-9) the takers were Match TV and Olympic Channels and in Budapest (Mar.6-8) the takers were Match TV, Olympic Channel, MTVA (Hungary).

For all GP Events the News and Highlights were sent to Eurovision for distribution.

The International Fencing Federation celebrated the World Fencing Day on September 12th. The 2020 theme “Fencing, a Passion, a Family” brought together fencers, referees, coaches, officials, federations, clubs, communities, and fans across the globe virtually. All the engagement across the social media created worldwide excitement with over 1.4 million unique interactions and with inspiring fencing day content.

The fencing world demonstrated that fencing is both a family and a deeply felt passion, which continues to unite in common love for and commitment to the sport. Fencers are built to persevere and fight with honour and friendship, even in challenging times, and World Fencing Day 2020 made the fencing community even closer and stronger.

World Fencing Day takes place annually in September, on Saturday of the second weekend.

1.8 Webinars for National Federations

1.8.1 WEBINARS FOR NF ADMINISTRATORS

The FIE organised informational webinars for administrators of national fencing federations. The first programme, comprising three modules, was designed as a service to better acquaint staff of the member federations with FIE resources and procedures in various essential, functional areas through a combination of theoretical and practical how-to guidelines and tips.

It was broadly welcomed by attendees from national federations and confederations, who enthusiastically requested more webinars. Participation in this first webinar programme, which is part of a series to be followed by more events with additional modules, included 158 individuals from the five continental regions.

The modules covered the following topics:

Module 1: FIE Functions and Resources

Effectively navigating the FIE web site (www.FIE.org) to find important information
Licences, changes of nationality
Process for participation in FIE competitions
Information due by national federations

Module 2: FIE Global Aid, Inclusion and Development Programs

Subsidies for federations participating in zonal and World Championships training camps and the FIE Annual Congress
FIE help in equipment and the FIE COVID Global Support Plans
Participation in the FIE Annual Congress, including processes to vote and present candidatures

Module 3: FIE Policies & good practices

Cyber security and communicating with the FIE
Safeguarding policies and the FIE Code of Conduct
Sustainability policies and how they may be implemented regionally

2 ASSISTANCE OF THE FIE IN SPORT DEVELOPMENT

2.1 Global support from the FIE following COVID-19

2.1.1 GLOBAL SUPPORT PLAN 2020

A global support plan of CHF 1 million was implemented as follows:

Support to all federations and Confederations

- Exceptional allocation of CHF 4,000 to all federations and Confederations
- Cancellation of the payment of the annual fee for 2020 and for those federations which have already paid, carry-over to 2021

Support to competition organizers

- Cancellation of payment of all organising fees for the 2020-2021 season and for the period January to March 2020

Support for referees, Commissions and Councils members

- Exceptional allocation (EUR 1.000) to referees appointed by the FIE for the 2019-2020 season, as well as all the members of FIE Commissions and Councils

In addition, the financial grant for the participation of one fencer per Federation which was planned for the 2020 Junior and Cadet World Championships was allocated for the 2021 Junior Zonal Championships.



2.1.2 GLOBAL SUPPORT PLAN 2021

In order to continue to help confederations, national federations, organisers and athletes overcome the difficult situation related to COVID-19, the Executive Committee and the President have unanimously decided to put in place the 2021 global support plan, which was included in the 2021 budget, and was approved by the National Federations in 2020.

2.2 Oceania Fencing Master Academy (OFMA)

OFMA Coaching Commission

The Coaching Commission met online regularly to discuss coaching matters across Oceania. Several projects have been undertaken to improve the delivery of coach education:

- Redesign of the Australian Sports Commission's Assessor Training Course to apply specifically to Fencing and to be able to be delivered partially online.
- Mapping of the OFMA Coaching Courses against that of the FIE Coaching Academy in South Africa.
- Development of online Coaching Webinars to be delivered in 2021.

OFMA Coach Education

The Regional Development Officer visited Fiji in February where he continued to train three Level 1 Foil Coaches. He also carried out activities in Papua New Guinea in February and March where he also continued the ongoing training and accreditation of six coaches.

After the onset of COVID-19 travel restrictions, the Regional Development Officer delivered six online webinars to Fiji Fencing coaches. Sessions were approximately one hour in duration covering the use of electric equipment and apparatus, as well as revision and instruction of fundamental fencing actions. In December, the OFC applied for and received funding from the FIE to develop and run OFC Coaching Webinars in 2021.

OFMA Coach Assessments and Coach Accreditations

Due to COVID-19 travel restrictions, face to face Coach Education and Assessments were not possible.

2.5 Equipment aid

The criteria used to perform the analysis and allocate the equipment were as follows:

- Specific requirements: participation in FIE competitions or competitions other than the FIE ones.
- Federations in need of equipment for organizing important competitions (Olympic Games, World Championships, Grand Prix, World Cup, Continental Championships, Regional Games, Universiades).
- Special cases.

The budget for 2020 was 600'000 CHF.

The FIE awarded equipment to 102 federations: 25 in Europe, 28 in Asia and Oceania, 25 in the Americas, 24 in Africa. The federations received equipment worth CHF 5000 or CHF 7000.

The operations for the equipment distribution started in June 2020.

This program allows the FIE to work actively for the national federations.

2.6 Information on the activity of the International Charity Fund “For the Future of Fencing” in the year 2020

The International Charity Fund “For the Future of Fencing” was continuing its charitable activity in the framework of the programs aimed at development of fencing at the global sports stage during the year 2020.

In 2020 the international charitable programs performed by the Fund were aimed at supporting:

- the continental fencing confederations (Pan American Fencing Confederation, Oceania Fencing Confederation, European Fencing Confederation).
- the national fencing federations/associations of all the continents which have low budget but carry out active work aimed at national fencing development (Moldova, Cyprus, Georgia, Tajikistan, Togo, Nigeria, Nicaragua, Honduras, and others).

In the framework of charitable support of the fencing confederations and the national fencing federations and associations the Fund performed 20 charitable programs. In the year 2020 the total amount of the donations of the Fund aimed at development of fencing as the mass sports at international level constituted almost 300 thousand USD.

The global spreading of the pandemic of COVID-19 and cancellation of the international fencing competitions of the year 2020 did not allow the Fund to carry out its traditional charitable programs of fencing development as the sports of the highest results, aimed at incentive of the fencers who achieved the superior results during the major international fencing competitions.

In that context starting from the second half of the year of 2020 basing on the request for donations from the national fencing federations/associations the Fund was carrying out the charitable programs aimed at development of the national fencing in the circumstances of the pandemic of COVID-19 and support of the fencing federations in reduction of negative effect of the coronavirus infection spreading.

2.7 Assistance with athletes’ participation program

Since 2009, the FIE has implemented a special aid programmer for NF athletes participating in senior regional championships and the World Championship (junior and senior).

For each national federation taking part, all the confederations received a subsidy intended to cover expenses (plane ticket and hotel) for an athlete entering for:

- the World Championships- junior and cadet 2020 – postponed to 2021

2.8 Assistance for Confederations

All confederations received an annual subsidy and a subsidy for their administrative expenses.

The confederations employing a sport director received an additional subsidy to pay this director’s salary.

2.9 Assistance for competition organizers

Each national federation having organised an FIE competition (senior World Cup, Grand Prix) and applying, received a subsidy of CHF 3 000 to cover the cost of video refereeing.

GP organizers received a subsidy of CHF 20 000 from the FIE to cover organization and promotion.

The FIE subsidized the cost of the wireless system for the Grand Prix events.

2.10 Veterans Fencing Support Endowment

Within the year of 2020 the Fencing Veterans Support Endowment established by the IChF “For the Future of Fencing” was continuing its activity aimed at support of fencing veterans worldwide.

In the framework of the principal activity of the Fund, it supported veterans in the following fields of concern: specialized material aid in coverage of expenses connected with the medical screening and diagnostics; specialized material aid in coverage of expenses connected with treatment of chronic diseases, immediate and planned surgeries; specialized material aid in purchase of medicines in the framework of the provided treatment and post-hospital rehabilitation; social support to fencing veterans who have complicated life situations and etc.

In compliance with the above-mentioned lines of activities the Fencing Veterans Aid Fund granted support to the fencing veterans of Russia, Kyrgyzstan, North Macedonia, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Ukraine, Bulgaria, Tajikistan, Venezuela.

The total amount of material aid granted by the Fund under the above-described activity lines within the year of 2020 exceeds 260 000 USD.

At the end of 2020, the Fund developed a new Program aimed at aid to fencing veterans in paying the costs of purchase of voluntary health insurance policies. The Program will be implemented by concluding agreements with National Fencing Federations to finance the costs of the National Federations of purchase of voluntary health insurance policies for the individuals - fencing veterans.

EUROPEAN FENCING CONFEDERATION

CADET AND JUNIOR EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS 2020:

The 14th European Cadet and 28th European Junior Championships 2020, were organized in Porec (CRO) in date of 22.02 – 02.03.2020.

Participants:

Cadet: 602 fencers and 126 teams from 40 countries.

Junior: 457 fencers and 94 teams from 38 countries.

CIRCUIT CADET CUPS 2019/2020 SEASON:

Season 2019 – 2020 was influenced by important impact of the concept of the FIE Calendar, but at general level the participation in tournaments was not touched. In any case we can state that number of participants in EFC CC increased again from 9280 in 2018-2019 reaching 10029 in 2019-2020! The number of countries reached 64 (40 Europe, 13 Asia, 7 America and 4 Africa) and special record of participation was one more time registered in Bratislava where the inscriptions in men's epee reached 347 fencers, in women's epee 329 and in men's foil 252 giving in total 928 fencers in individual competitions! Traditionally big tournament was running in Budapest and in Moedling as the message of the federations that logistic seems be easier when they are travelling to Central Europe.

Total of fencers on pistes in 2019 – 2020 season: 10029 fencers.

Grand total of participants in 2018 – 2019: 9280 fencers.

EFC C CATEGORY REFEREES

This category allows federations in the future to send those selected ones to the FIE examinations for the B-category. In the 2019/2020 season we registered on all CC cups 771 referees (180 in sabre, 333 in epee, 258 in foil) who have been evaluated.

At the end of the 2019/2020 season 69 referees have been awarded EFC C license: 18 in sabre, 26 in foil and 25 in epee.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF PRESIDENT STANISLAV POZDNYAKOV (PRESIDENTIAL FUND)

With the financial support of the EFC President in our all annual activities, the EFC was able to support the more needy countries to pay for fencers and teams entry fee at the Cadet and Junior European Championships in 2020. 18 countries received the assistance.

LAUNCHING A NEW PROJECT - SABRE REFEREES

Motivation

Increasing the quality of the sabre refereeing. Unfortunately, in recent years we have been seeing a lack of good sabre referees, especially young referees.

Although from the top referees that FIE announces every year, 80% are from the European Confederation, we are generally lacking the required number of referees to respond to changes in the international calendar and the rising avalanche of international competitions in Europe.

At each of these competitions one or two supervisors/mentors (Vasil Milenchev, Vladislav Shamis and Nikolay Mateev), are designated, who will select referees with potential for development.

The EFC will recommend National Federation to support these referees in their international career for a period of one year. During this year, the selected referees will work closely with the supervisors.

GOAL ACHIEVED

The feedback from the Organizers (NF), coaches and fencers was very positive.

- Increasing the level of refereeing.
- Increasing the level of organization of the Junior World Cups (like Senior WC).
- Nine sabre referees who are not currently members of the FIE Masters list were selected and will be recommended to referee FIE Junior and Satellite World Cups.

Referees EFC Master List

We continue to update the EFC Master List which is useful for us in the process of appointing referees for the European Championships. Based on our experience from last year and the fencing global tendency to increase the number of women referees, EFC Executive Committee decided that EFC Master List should be amended accordingly.

New criteria in the process of selecting referees to the EFC Master List:

- Proposal send by the National Federation, ranked for each weapon;
- Maximum 9 referees in all weapons but no more than 3 referees per each weapon and no more than 2 with one license.
- FIE category ("A" or "B");
- Gender equality (Maximum 6 referees with one gender).
- In exceptional situations, EFC Refereeing Commission can propose changes in the applications, after consulting with a federation and obtaining its consent.

WEBINARS FOR FOIL AND SABRE REFEREES "GET READY FOR THE NEW SEASON".

General assumption

- Our goal is to continue the good work from the previous EFC Project "European Foil and Sabre Referees" and showing our support to them in this difficult time during the coronavirus pandemic.
- Increasing the quality of refereeing in foil and sabre in Europe
- The online video webinars were an important part for preparation of our foil and sabre referees for the new season.
- To prepare 10 selected new referees in foil and sabre to participate in the European Championships.
- To prepare referees who obtain EFC C license to the FIE refereeing examination.

Promotion and Marketing Webinars

EFC organized webinars "How to improve social media strategies" on April 30 and May 20.

On each webinar participated 30 attendees.

Webinars were moderated by Ana Valero-Collantes – President of the Promotion and Marketing Commission of the EFC.

ASIAN FENCING CONFEDERATION

The year 2020 was an exceptionally difficult year all over the world that changed the way people have lived because of the Covid-19 pandemic. Various degrees of community lockdown, travel restrictions, and health protocols were put in place. Sports was not spared at all as most international and local competitions were either postponed, downscaled, or cancelled outright.

In Asia, the FCA cancelled all its competitions in 2020 including the Asian Juniors and Cadet Championships in Jakarta, the Asian Championships and Olympic Qualifiers in Korea, the Veterans Championships in Hong Kong, and the Asian Under-23 Championships in Chinese Taipei.

The FCA General Assembly approved the rescheduling of the FCA Elections for September 2021 but also in Taipei City immediately preceding the 2021 Asian U-23 Championships.

Amidst the worldwide pandemic however, most international, and national sports organizations implemented some activities and events many of which were virtual on-line. As part of its worldwide developmental program, the FIE organized an Administrative webinar for all continents, which tackled various matters essential for the knowledge of all federations in accessing the FIE website for all necessary transactions.



REFEREEING WEBINARS

For its part, the FCA conducted several webinars aimed at enhancing the skills of its referees in all levels. Managed by the FCA Refereeing Commission Chair Dr Eyad Maghayreh (JOR) with the participation of FIE expert guests, Chang Gon Kim (KOR), Katsumi Yamaguchi (JPN), FIE Refereeing Commission members and Medhat El Bakry (EGY) and Vilem Madr (CZE), FIE Referees, the webinar included both theoretical and practical lessons in refereeing in Foil, Sabre, and Epee.

The first of two Refereeing Webinars of the Fencing Confederation of Asia was held from October 23 to 25, 2020. This webinar was dedicated for Asian federations belonging to group 1 comprising referees from West Asia, South Asia, and Central Asia. Eight countries were represented namely: Jordan, Kazakhstan, India, Iran, Lebanon, Nepal, Saudi Arabia, and Syria.

The second FCA Refereeing Webinar was held on October 30 to November 1, 2020. This 3-day seminar done online was participated in by referees from East Asia, Southeast Asia, and the Oceania federations, who all compose Group 2 of this development program. This time, 12 countries were represented namely: Australia, New Zealand, China, Macau, Mongolia, Chinese Taipei, Indonesia, Japan, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam.

There were 31 participants in the Epee session, 25 for Sabre and 32 for Foil. Dr Eyad Maghayreh conducted the theoretical part which included a lecture on General Principles and Penalties addressed to all the participants. He likewise handled the refereeing techniques for epee. Medhat El Bakry handled Sabre while Vilem Madr led the session for foil.

The FCA has scheduled its second series of webinars, this time addressing the enhancement of all C licensed referees and those with "frozen" B licenses, in Asia and Oceania. Similarly, participants will be divided into two groups. The webinar for the first group of referees from West Asia, South Asia, and Central Asia took place on December 4 to 6, 2020. The webinar for the second group of referees from East Asia, Southeast Asia, and Oceania was held on December 11 to 13, 2020.

In both webinar schedules, the experts were Chang Gon Kim and Katsumi Yamaguchi and Dr Eyad Maghayreh. 26 participants joined the session for foil, 18 participated in the epee session, and 24 referees were in the sabre session. Dr Eyad Maghayreh conducted the theoretical part which included a lecture on General Principles and Penalties addressed to all the participants. He likewise handled the refereeing techniques for epee. Medhat El Bakry handled sabre while Vilem Madr led the session for foil.

NATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Some national federations in countries where the pandemic was somewhat under control were fortunate to have organized actual fencing competitions during the year. Among these countries were:

- * Bangladesh which organized the 6th Bangabandhu President Cup Fencing Championships in December 22-24 participated in by 10 clubs and 180 fencers.
- * China had its 1st national youth Online fencing competition with 200 participants, and three high level national competition with more than 1600 athletes in attendance and one public event with around 2600 participants covered on television and live streaming which generated more than 5 million views.
- * Japan had their All-Japan Championships in September live streamed on internet using LED presentation and “visualized fencing technology” showing movement of weapons.
- * Vietnam organized their National Fencing Championships in November, and a competition for junior and cadet in December. Training of their national team was uninterrupted all the year round.
- * Chinese Taipei was lucky for having avoided any lockdown and disruption in their sports activities. Their scheduled fencing competitions for the year were mostly held with a wide participation of their fencers.
- * Thailand organized their Thailand Fencing Championships on weekends August to October 2020.
- * Iran organized actual competitions at the national levels and in some clubs, following health protocols allowed by government.



Other federations in countries where various health protocols were put in effect, limited their activities to those allowed by their government. Among these were:

- * Kyrgyzstan organized training camp for 15 junior fencers, cadet in November, and in December had their national championships, and an International tournament in memory of A. Dizendorf (cadet & junior).
- * Jordan had Online training for national fencers, online session on Covid prevention among fencers.
- * Myanmar organized beginner course for kids (5 to 9), while having online training of national team.
- * Philippines was limited to Online training for national team during the year but conducted a Bubble training for all Olympic aspirants in Ormoc.
- * Saudi Arabia in the early part of the year had 4 local competitions in all age categories and at the 3 weapons while participating in the Bahrain junior World Cup. Eventually, virtual courses in medical and scientific subjects were held, while initiated negotiations with FIE for coaching program.
- * UAE had various virtual courses online covering several subjects such as nutrition brainstorming session, world championships distance fencing session, a session about developing healthy behaviour for athletes, virtual training for national team, virtual training camp for school Olympics.

Many other federations in Asia continued with their fencing activities in circumstances allowed by their government authorities in due consideration of the current health situations. Among those countries were Singapore, Korea, Qatar, Uzbekistan.

PAN AMERICAN FENCING CONFEDERATION

PAN AMERICAN CADET AND JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP 2020

Held in San Salvador, El Salvador, from 22 to 29 February 2020, at the Palacio de los Deportes Carlos "Famoso" Hernández, with over 300 cadet and junior athletes in attendance. The event once again brought together the talented stars of Pan American fencing, with many distinguished athletes defending their titles and giving us an opportunity to meet the new stars of our sport. The event was run by a very professional management staff that included elite FIE referees responsible for the competition, as well as professionals from the FIE's SEMI and refereeing commissions, who were satisfied with how the event was organised. The technical management of the competition was headed up by José Benavides, Sport Director at the Pan American Fencing Confederation (CPE).

In 2020, the Pan American Fencing Confederation ran various activities to remain proactive in the face of the situation caused by the Covid-19 pandemic that forced all sports events to be suspended. These activities included:

VIRTUAL BASIC REFEREEING SEMINAR

This was delivered in both English and Spanish, and was well received not just in the Americas, but also in Europe, Asia, and Africa. In total, 98 people attended the seminar run in Spanish (20 national federations) and 181 the seminar held in English (33 national federations, of which 28 were from the Americas, 4 from Europe and 1 from Africa).

The Spanish seminar was held from 20 to 23 August 2020 by FIE referee Juan Carlos Ríos Rivera (MEX) and the English one from 10 to 13 September 2020 by Irina Knysch (RSA), a member of the FIE refereeing commission, with presentations from top-class international referees including Vasil Milenchev (BUL), Alexey Kuznetsov (CAN) and Juan Carlos Rios Rivera (MEX). The English seminar took place in conjunction with the celebrations marking World Fencing Day, which generated much more interest in participation.

SPECIALIST EPEE REFEREEING SEMINARS

Following the successful virtual basic refereeing seminars, the activities continued with specialisations by weapon. In this case, specialist epee sessions were organised, bringing together three or four national federations per session to give broader coverage to all those involved in developing fencing in each country: national referees, coaches, instructors, athletes, and other collaborators. These seminars were supervised by FIE referee Juan Carlos Ríos Rivera (MEX). The epee seminars held in 2020 were as follows:

- 21 and 22 November 2020: Guatemala, Nicaragua, and Costa Rica
- 27 and 28 November 2020: Panama, El Salvador, and Honduras
- 7 and 8 December 2020: Uruguay, Paraguay, and Ecuador
- 12 and 13 December 2020: Venezuela, Puerto Rico.

VIRTUAL JUNIOR INTERCONTINENTAL CUPS

As athletes have been suffering from the consequences of the suspension of face-to-face activities, the CPE decided to organise these virtual competitions via Instagram, promoting coexistence, harmony, cooperation, and motivation among the junior athletes. The virtual junior cups were a great success and well received throughout the world fencing community, inspiring the young fencers, their families, and friends to learn more about our sport and keep the competitive spirit alive in a new way, yet with the same energy and optimism. By doing this, the CPE helped ensure that our sport gains widespread visibility on social networks.

- Virtual Junior Sabre Intercontinental Cup. From 20 to 27 June 2020. More than 100 participants in each event (men's and women's).
- Virtual Junior Epee Intercontinental Cup. From 18 to 25 July 2020. 157 participants in each event (men's and women's).
- Virtual Junior Foil Intercontinental Cup. From 12 to 19 September 2020. This event began on World Fencing Day. 330 participants from all continents.

The social success of this project was bringing together more than 450 fencers from four continents and reaching more than 6 million people around the world via Instagram interaction.

THE GREAT CHAMPIONS AMONG US

On 20 December, we held the first virtual interactive conference with London 2012 Olympic medallist Rubén Limardo (VEN), who discussed the key moments in his athletic career and personal life and answered questions from a few athletes, who had the opportunity to listen to him and learn a bit more about his career and goals for the future.

In parallel with these activities, the CPE has been in constant communication with the national federations to monitor the situation in the most affected regions and assess the impact with the aim of channelling the necessary support and providing suitable tools to relaunch activities once the crisis has passed.

From 30 November to 2 December 2020, the executive secretary of the CPE, Melissa Alvarenga, travelled to Cali, Colombia, to see the sports venues that will host the First Pan American Junior Games in 2021. This visit was an opportunity to physically see the facilities and hold meetings with the people in charge of each functional aspect of the organisation, to guarantee an international-level competition to reaffirm the commitment to resume our competitive activities.

OCEANIA FENCING CONFEDERATION

DEVELOPING NEW FEDERATIONS IN THE PACIFIC

The Oceania Fencing Confederation (OFC) continued the development of Fencing in Oceania with a follow up visit to Fiji in February by OFC President, Helen Smith and Regional Development Officer, Leon Thomas. The program at Suva International School (ISS) was expanded and the training of three Level 1 Foil Coaches continued. Several fencing demonstrations were conducted and a meeting with officials and members of the Fiji Association of Sports & National Olympic Committee (FASANOC) was held.

A public meeting was held at FASANOC offices culminating in the formation of the Fiji Fencing Federation (later renamed Fencing Fiji). Fencing Fiji will now work with OFC and the ISS to expand classes and increase the exposure of Fencing there. Ultimately Fencing Fiji wishes to achieve membership of FASANOC to become eligible to gain membership of the FIE.

The OFC currently has six full members (American Samoa, Australia, Guam, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, and Samoa) and two Associate Members (Tahiti and New Caledonia).

DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

The Regional Development Officer carried out activities in Papua New Guinea in February and March. Highlights included the ongoing training of the coaches and the distribution of much needed FIE Equipment Aid and equipment from the FIE 'Donate Your Fencing Gear' program. Over 400 children in schools in Port Moresby participated in introductory fencing classes during this visit.

ONLINE ACTIVITIES AFTER THE ARRIVAL OF COVID-19

From April to December, the OFC had to change its mode of delivery to online activities, as travel and face to face activities became impossible.

- The OFC Elective Congress and four OFC Board meetings were held on Zoom.
- OFC Administration was carried out on Skype, with the OFC President & Regional Development Officer meeting twenty-five times.
- The OFC Coaching Commission met online eight times.
- The OFC met twice online with the newly established Fiji Fencing Federation.
- The OFC President, Regional Development Officer and five of the six Member Federations participated in two FIE Administration Webinars in December.
- Four OFC representatives participated in the Organisation of Sports Federations of Oceania HOPE Leaders Webinars (focusing on positive psychology & wellbeing in sport).
- Six online coaching webinars were delivered to Fiji Fencing. Sessions were approximately one hour in duration covering the use of electric equipment and apparatus as well as revision and instruction of fundamental fencing actions.
- In December, the OFC applied for and received funding from the FIE to develop and run OFC Refereeing Webinars and OFC Coaching Webinars in 2021.

OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Unfortunately, during 2020 all OFC Championships were cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The holding of events is contingent upon the easing of travel restrictions in Oceania. If possible, the championships missed in 2020 will be held in 2021.

PARTICIPATION IN FIE EVENTS

Fencers from Oceania participated in a few international events in early 2020, but then international travel became impossible.

SUPPORT FROM FIE

The OFC acknowledges the important financial and administrative support it receives annually from the President, Secretary General, and staff of the FIE. The OFC has greatly appreciated the additional support received during the COVID-19 crisis. Without this support, many of the OFC development activities would not be possible.

AFRICAN FENCING CONFEDERATION

TOURNAMENTS

The 2020 African Junior Cadet Championships were held in Cape Coast (GHA) from 26 to 28 February 2020, with Egypt winning 10 of the 12 gold medals.

PROGRAMS

Following a decision of the FIE Executive Committee taken in 2018, two coaches' academies were set up on the African continent. These programs both last almost a year and cover training in all three weapons. Algiers (Algeria) hosted one of the two academies from 26 January 2020 to 6 January 2021, involving the participation of 13 student coaches representing eight nations. The other was held in Johannesburg, South Africa, from 1 February to 30 November, with the participation of ten students representing five countries.

On 25 November 2020, the 2020 FIE Vote took place via the Lumi Global platform. 135 Federations connected to the platform and voted.

NOTES TO THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AT 31 DECEMBER 2020

1. Accounting principles applied and not prescribed by law:

- 1.1. The 'Fédération Internationale d'Escrime' (hereinafter the "FIE") is an international non-governmental, non-profit organisation, having the legal form of an association under Swiss law and having its registered office in Lausanne, Switzerland.

It is recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) as the world governing body for fencing. The FIE lays down the rules governing the organisation of international competitions and supervises their application.

- 1.2. The financial statements are presented in Swiss francs (CHF) in accordance with the accounting standards governed by the Swiss Code of Obligations, the regulations and statutes of the FIE and the following

1.3. *Items denominated in foreign currencies*

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted into Swiss francs (CHF) at the exchange rate in effect at the time when they are effected. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are converted at the exchange rate in effect on the year-end date.

The rates applicable to the balance sheet below correspond to the year-end rates at 31 December 2020.

1.4. *Federation receivables and other short-term receivables*

Receivables from Federations and other short-term receivables are entered in the accounts at their nominal value. Individual value corrections are made, with the residual balance being the subject of a flat-rate value correction of 5% and 10%.

1.5. *Stocks*

Stocks are valued at their acquisition cost or production cost. The acquisition cost and production cost of stocks are determined in accordance with the weighted cost method.

1.6. *Tangible fixed assets*

A team that has lost a match due to a black card is not allowed to continue the competition and the mutual responsibility for all team members and team officials to respect the rules should be made quite clear.

o.99.7.i) If both a fencer and the reserve, if any, are forced to retire, ~~or if a fencer is excluded~~, their team has lost the match and must retire from the competition. Cf. t.124.3.b, t.170.

o.99.7.ii) If a fencer is excluded during a team match, his/her team has lost the match and the team is excluded from the competition without any final ranking. Cf. t.160.

t.160 However, a team excluded from a tournament because of a black card imposed on one of its members during a team match, is not penalized by suspension. Only the individual fencer who was penalised will be suspended in accordance with t.159 and cannot be selected as a member of any team during the period of suspension. Cf. o.99.8. ~~is not excluded as a team from the following competitions, but it may not select the penalised fencer.~~

- 2) Team composition (o.103.2.b)
It is intended to provide the best reasonable means by which teams can compete while recognising that some countries do not have the spread of age groups that enable them to fill all team places at all weapons. A fencer fencing their 'second' weapon in a team event is not necessarily seen as giving that team an unreasonable advantage.
- 3) Team Championships (o.103.9)
The Veterans Council proposes not to fight the matches for the places after 5th, because the team final classification is not relevant after the podium positions. There is no Veterans Teams ranking and the pools composition is calculated based on the final classification of the team members in the relevant individual competition.

Motivation: The Grand Prix of Nations is the highest award in the world of fencing, which is given to a national federation for winning a world championship. After the analysis of the recent years world championships results, we came to the conclusion that the system with the points awarded for the places up to the 64th (FIE Organization Rules, Chapter 2, article o.110) is not quite fair and often counteracts with the common system of the medal count at determining of the world championships winner.

We believe that the determination of the Grand Prix of Nations winner should be based firstly on the highest results of the athletes in the individual and team competitions, i.e. the medals they have won. This approach helps to avoid a situation when a national team winning the most number of competitions in the tournament does not receive the well-deserved award. We therefore propose to determine the Grand Prix of Nations winner by the medals count, and only when the teams have equal number of medals to use the existing scale of points from the FIE Organization Rules article mentioned above.

Proposal:

o.110

The FIE gold medal, the Grand Prix of Nations, is awarded each year to the federation which has obtained the best results at the Junior and Senior World Championships, according to the **number of medals scale of points below. Strict count is kept of the total number of points won** in all the individual and all the team events.

The winner will be the Federation with the most gold medals.

If both Federations have won the same number of gold medals then the award goes to one of them - the winner of the most silver medals, and if there is still a tie, to one of them -the winner of the most bronze medals; and if there is still a tie, a strict count is kept of the total number of points according to the scale of points below:

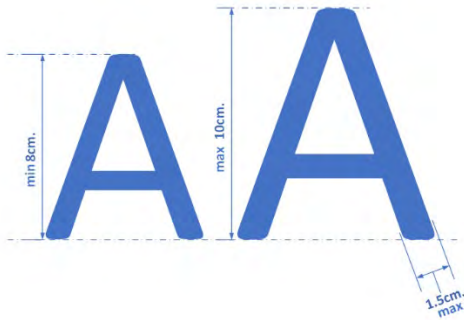

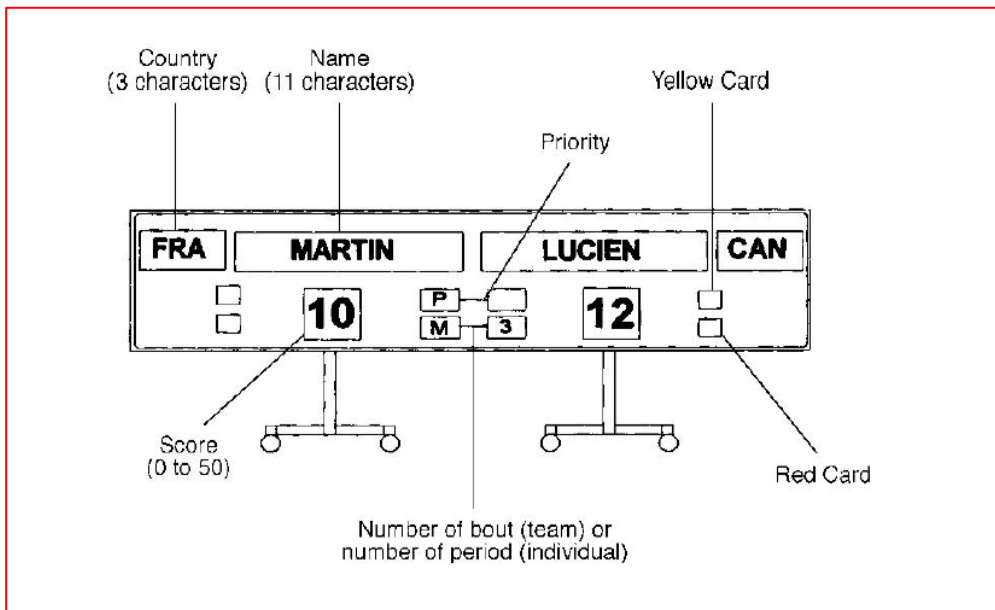

Actually, we don't have in our book rule the obligation of the periodical check of the blades. It is only written on the header of the blades list. We think that this periodical test is extremely important for the safety of the fencer and to keep high the attention of the manufacturer.

Modification management:

1) The homologation is valid for the duration specified in the technical handbooks as long as no modification is made to the equipment or its manufacturing process.

For blades the first homologation process has to be confirmed with a periodical check done every 2 years (see page 64 item 7)

2) Any change must be immediately reported to the FIE SEMI Commission President. These changes cover all aspects of the homologated items (appearance, composition, internal content, software and all other material changes).

3) The modified equipment must pass the whole homologation process again.

In particular, if a manufacturer intends to change the material or the manufacturing of his FIE certified equipment, the manufacturer must submit it for a new homologation process and wait for the result.

The blades, after the first homologation remain valid, under the condition that the manufacturers send the blades for a periodical test at least once every two years. These periodical tests have to be carried out at least once every two years in simplified mode: 3 blades will be tested for the following:

Fatigue resistance (by bending) quality of the steel
Chemical test
Traction test
Tensile test
Test of fracture resistance (K1°C)

If the periodical tests are not be done for 5 years, the blade will be scratched from the FIE official blades list. The manufacturer can ask for a new complete homologation process.

SEMI Commission: In favour.

Rules Commission: In favour, but replace '5 years' with '3 years'.

Proposal from: SEMI Commission

Motivation: In February 2020, the FIE Executive Committee made a decision on the obligatory chipping of fencing equipment. This became the basis of the work carried out. A new, universal label for all manufacturers was developed and the places for its and chips installation were determined. This proposal adds this to the material rules.

Proposal:

4. LABEL OF QUALITY

1. As far as the quality label is concerned, the Committee has established that it must be indelible, must be circular in shape with a diameter of 25 mm for the mask and 50 mm for the uniform, and must include the following data:
 - the emblem of the manufacturer;
 - the date (year and month) of manufacture;
 - the FIE emblem.

On blades, the label must be 7 mm wide

2. Chip and label installation requirements.

From 01.03.2021, the obligatory chipping of new fencing equipment (jacket, trousers, plastron mask) is introduced. The appearance and geometrical dimensions of the chip are shown in Fig.1.

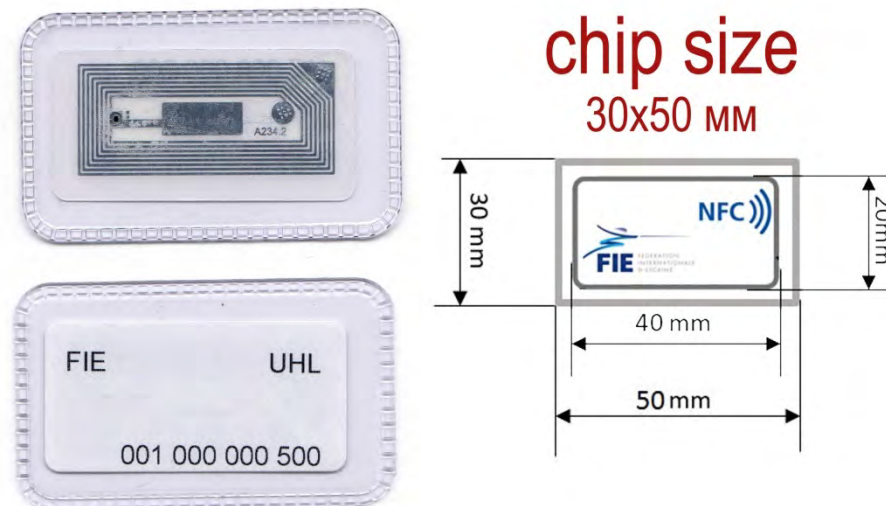

The chip contains information about the type of product and the name of the manufacturer. Reading of the information can be done both by equipment manufacturers and by consumers using smartphones with NFC modules.

A special label is sewn on top of the chip. The label design and dimensions are shown in Fig.2.

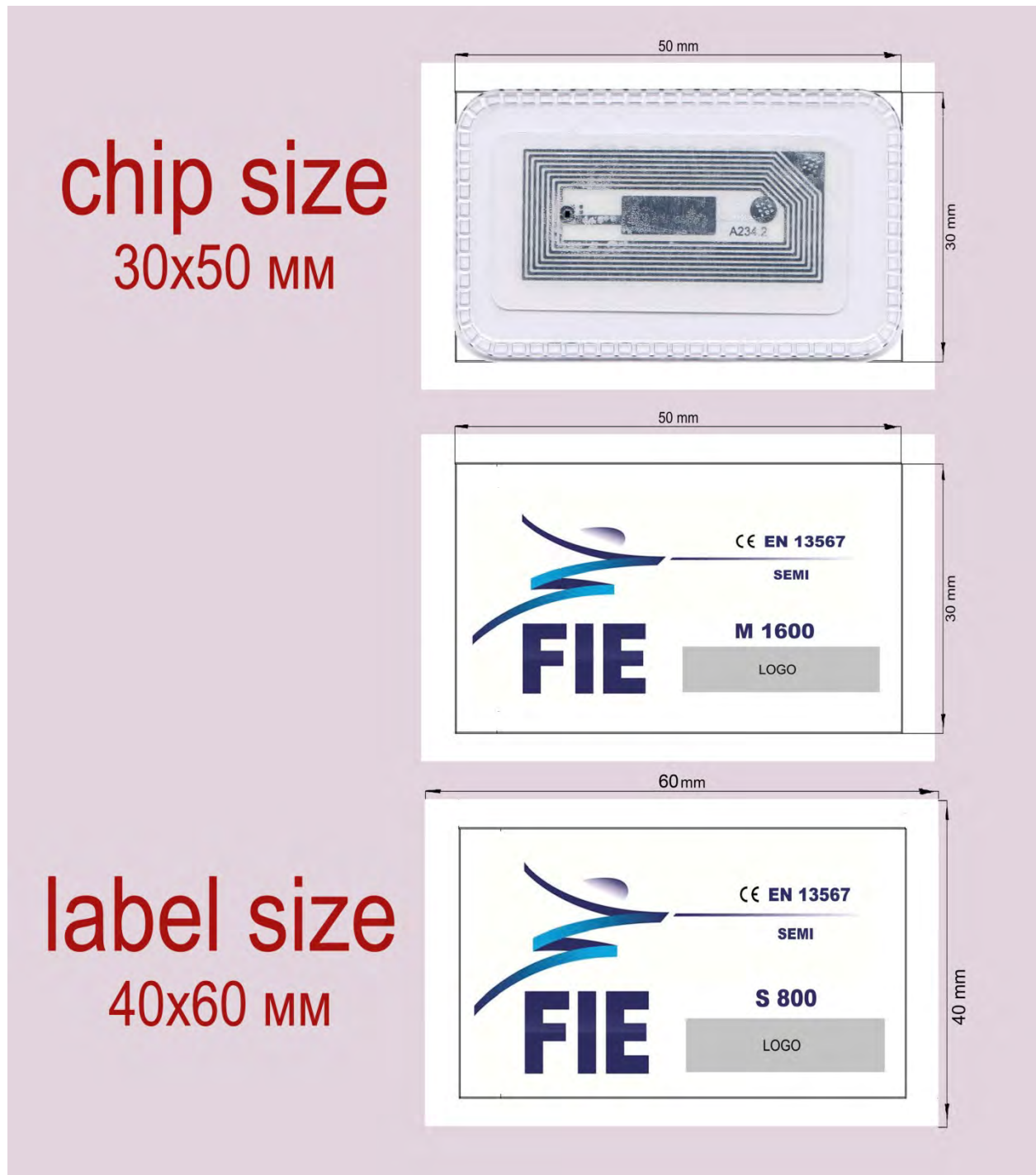

In the LOGO zone, the name of the equipment manufacturer is indicated.

The S 800 label is sewn onto the jacket, trousers and plastron. The M1600 label is sewn onto the mask. Places of installation of chips and labels on equipment are shown in Fig.3

Chip and FIE label of quality location

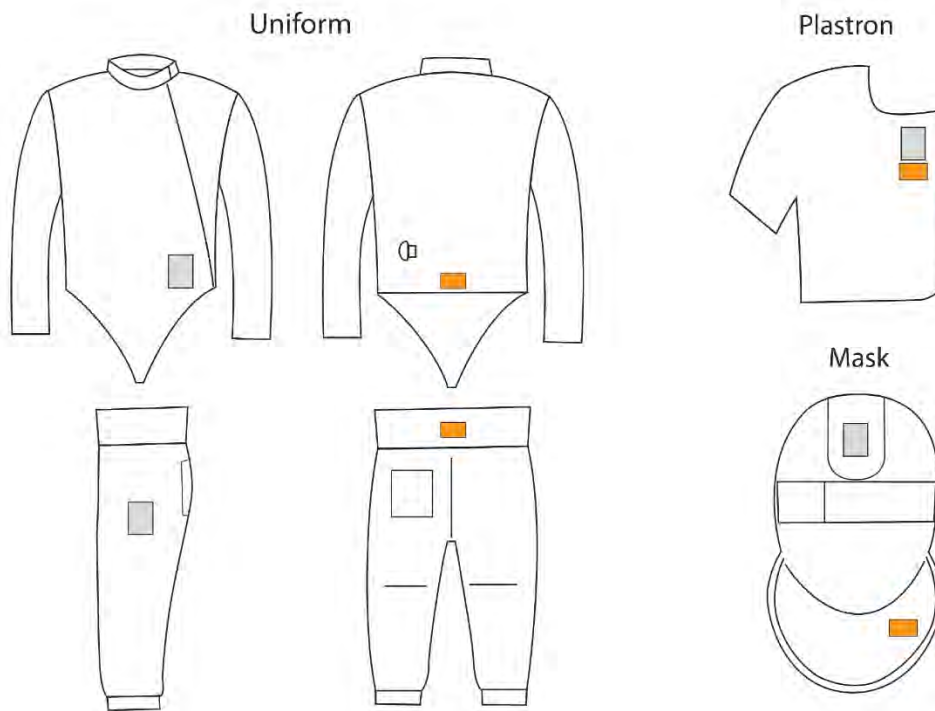

Both variants of the FIE seal of quality are acceptable up to and including the 2025/6 season.

For the 2026/7 season, masks, jackets, breeches and plastrons must have the new quality seal with a chip securely located underneath.

The SEMI Commission will oversee the approval of the chip placement during the equipment homologation process.

The text below are applicable on January 1st, 2022.

Article: 3.1; 3.6.2; 5.4.2; 5.5.3; 6.4.2; 6.9.4; 6A.4.2;

Proposal from: Legal Commission

P. 1

Motivation: Rationale: It was determined during the recent pandemic emergency that the FIE Statutes should be more definitive regarding the holding of meetings and voting in situations when the particular Committee, Commission, Council or Congress is unable to meet in person by reason of force majeure (including, but not limited to health risk, governmental regulations regarding ability to hold in-person meetings, travel bans, armed conflict or natural catastrophe) or because of significant budgetary issues. It is also important to permit the Congress, the Executive Committee and Commissions to discuss and make decisions regarding urgent matters that cannot effectively be made by written consultations.

It is necessary to achieve a balance between the need for in-person interaction, the need to make rapid, informed decisions, which online consultations would facilitate and the budgetary realities of the FIE. The FIE is cognizant of the benefits that exist in having in-person meeting such as sensitivity to body language, facial expression, etc. at the physical meeting as well as the creative process of side meetings between members of different commissions, councils and committees, informal chats and other interactions outside of the formal meetings of such groups. At the same time, it is necessary to be aware of the significant income loss to the FIE due to the lost year of competitions and the likely reduction in funds coming from the IOC due to the altered state of the Tokyo Olympics.

In preparing the new texts we used the changes in the IOC Bylaws as a model.

Proposal:

3.1 MEETINGS

- a) Congresses are held during the latter part of November or the first part of December each year.
- i) The Elective Congress is held during the Olympic year.

The following Congresses will handle the specific matters stated below:

- ii) The Congress to handle proposals to change the Rules and Olympic Games issues shall occur in the 1st year after the Olympic year.
- iii) The Congress to handle proposals to change the Statutes and remaining matters concerning the Olympic Games shall occur in the 2nd year after the Olympic year.
- iv) The Congress to handle all other matters shall occur in the 3rd year after the Olympic year.

As an exceptional derogation to ii) or iii), urgent proposals that need immediate attention can be handled during any of the Congresses mentioned above, if the Executive Committee so decides, after having received a motivated advice on the matter by the Legal Commission (for Statute modification proposals) or the Rules Commission (for Rule modification proposals).

b) An extraordinary Congress may be convened if the Executive Committee so proposes, or at the request of at least 50 % of member Federations. The expenses incurred by the organisation of this Congress are paid by the FIE.

c) The place and the date of a congress is established by the Executive Committee in a city offering convenient air and rail links as well as lodging opportunities.

3.1 (d) In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, the Congress may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

3.1 (e) In a matter of urgency a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the FIE by the President or the Executive Committee. The required majorities set forth in the Statutes shall apply to these resolutions and decisions.

3.6.2 The voting for the President, the Executive Committee and the Commissions is conducted by secret ballot, [which shall include, but not be limited to, votes submitted by appropriate electronic communication.](#)

The Executive Committee may decide that the vote be conducted by electronic ballot, in which case it will inform the member federations.

If the vote is not conducted by electronic ballot, it must take place in a separate polling booth, to which the delegates of the federations go one after another to complete their voting slips, which should be a different colour for each Commission, and place them in one or more closed ballot-boxes.

If the number of candidates for an election does not exceed the number of persons to be elected, the candidate(s) is(are) deemed elected by acclamation without a formal election process.

Legal Commission: Re: Section 3.6.2

The Commission would like to add to the end of the first sentence of Section 3.6.2 the following:

“, as determined by the FIE CEO.”

5.4.2 The Executive Committee can only deliberate if more than one half of its members are present. In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, the Executive Committee may hold its regular meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means. It may also call special online meetings to discuss and make decision relating to upon urgent matters.

5.5.3

The Executive Committee outlines the work of the Commissions and the Congresses. For this purpose, it can use all means of communication to gather relevant information.

It decides the date and the place of the meetings of Congresses, commissions and councils. In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, such meetings may be designated to be held via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

It may convene an Extraordinary Congress.

It establishes the agenda of the Congress.

6.4.2

A Commission's meeting is valid only when the majority of members are present. In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, a Commission may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

When the meeting is held via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means, the identity of the participants must be verified.

Each member of the commission is entitled to participate in any in-person meeting, by telephone or video conference, provided that both of the following conditions are fulfilled:

- (i) the President of the commission is able to ascertain the identity of each person attending the meeting;
- and
- (ii) all the participants are able to take part in real time in the discussion and simultaneously vote on the items of the meeting agenda.

Otherwise, the proposals taken will be submitted by correspondence to absent members who must express their opinion within 8 days; if they fail to do this, their silence will be interpreted as an agreement with the submitted proposal.

The Meeting is considered to be held in the location where the President is attending the meeting.

Each member who wants to participate by telephone or video conference, pursuant to the above, shall submit the request to the President, at least ~~40~~ 20 days before the meeting. However, no such ~~40~~ 20 - day notice is required if a member of the commission cannot attend the meeting in person on account of a force majeure event including, but not limited to, illness or injury preventing a person from coming to the meeting or travel interruption due to delays preventing the person from arriving in time for the meeting.

For certain matters the President, following each meeting deliberation, may ask for a confirmation to be addressed by e-mail within 10 days from the date the meeting is held.

Participation by telephone or video is not permitted when a secret ballot is required. However, balloting through the use of appropriate electronic means that assure secrecy are permitted.

In addition to the above:

(i) in a matter of urgency, a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the Commission by its President;

(ii) special online meetings may be called to discuss and make decisions related to urgent matters; and

(iii) regular meetings, at which there are no significant issues to be decided, may be held online with the approval of a majority of the members of the Commission.

6.9.4

The functions of the Ethics Committee are defined in Chapter XII of these Statutes, section 5.

In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, the Ethics Committee may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means. In a matter of urgency, a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the Committee by its President.

6.A.4.2

A Council's meeting has a quorum if the majority of members are present. Otherwise, the proposals taken at the meeting of the Council will be submitted by correspondence from the FIE Office to absent members within 5 days as of the meeting held, who shall express their opinion within 8 days following the receipt of the proposals. In the case that a member does not express his/her opinion within this 8-day deadline, it shall be deemed that the affected member of the Council has agreed with the proposal.

In case of a force majeure event or significant budgetary issues of the FIE, a Council may hold meetings and take decisions via teleconference, videoconference or any other appropriate electronic means.

In addition to the above:

(i) in a matter of urgency, a resolution or decision may be submitted to a vote by correspondence, including by fax and/or electronic mail or by any other appropriate electronic means, of the members of the Council by its President;

(ii) special online meetings may be called to discuss and make decisions related to urgent matters; and

(iii) regular meetings, at which there are no significant issues to be decided, may be held online with the approval of a majority of the members of the Council.

Legal Commission: Unanimously in favour of the proposal.

Executive Committee: In favour.

Article: Chapter XII, art. 5.1

Proposal from: Legal Commission

Motivation: ASOIF provided the FIE with the following comment in response to the good governance questionnaire that was submitted to them:

“The comment about staff responsibility not being identified refers to liaison with the Ethics Committee. It is understood that the Code of Ethics does indeed apply to staff, as to the rest of the FIE. IFs generally have a member of staff identified who co-ordinates with the Ethics Committee when there is a case. This may be an individual with other responsibility for governance, legal affairs etc. It is clearly an important role because cases that arise are likely to be sensitive.”

Could the Legal commission, please, prepare a proposal in this sense? Currently is the CEO dealing with it, but alternatives can be presented, if you deem so.”

The following change notes that the CEO or his/her delegee will be the staff liaison with the Ethics Committee.

Proposal:

Chapter XII

5.- ETHICS COMMITTEE:

1. The Ethics Committee is formed in order that the FIE Family shall ensure the observance of the principles and rules of the Olympic Charter and of this Code. **The CEO, or her/his delegee shall be the liaison with the Ethics Committee and shall provide the administrative support for the Committee.**

Legal Commission: Unanimously in favour of the proposal.

No comments or corrections.

Ethics Committee: Unanimously in favour.

Executive Committee: In favour.

Article: 9.1.9 (new article)

Proposal from: Legal Commission

Motivation: Rationale: To clarify the means of securing a coaches license for both those coaches who carry of passport from the country for whom they are coaching and those who carry a passport from another country.

Proposal:

- a) A National Federation can obtain a license for a coach who is a citizen of the country of such National Federation and whose license will specify the nationality of the coach.
- b) A National Federation can obtain a license for a coach who is not a citizen of the country of that National Federation, but which National Federation is intending to send the coach to an official competition of the FIE as a member of the delegation of such National Federation. The license for such coach will specify:
 - i. the nationality of the coach's passport; and
 - ii. the nationality of the country of National Federation the coach is representing at the competition.
- c) If a coach changes the country s/he is to represent at a future competition, the coach shall inform the FIE of the change and the FIE will note such change on the coach's license. The coach will not need to secure a new license.
- d) A coach needs only one license, even though s/he may represent more than one country at official competitions of the FIE.
- e) A coach needs a license as a coach, even though such person has another license as a fencer, referee, official at the World Championships or Olympic Games or member of the Executive Committee, a Commission, a Council or Ethics Committee.

Legal Commission: Unanimously in favour of the proposal.

No comments or corrections on the English version.

With regard to the French translation, it was suggested that Section 9.1.9 should read:

Une fédération nationale peut obtenir une licence pour un entraîneur qui n'est pas citoyen du pays de cette fédération nationale, mais **que** cette fédération nationale envisage d'envoyer (...) à une compétition officielle de la FIE en tant que membre de sa délégation.

Coaches Council: In favour.

These are some of the comments and questions raised by the Council members during the discussion:

- Can anybody register as a coach, or is proof of qualification required?
- Will the coach lose his/her license if the coach is unable to pay for the following year?
- It is more important to register people who have qualifications and education.
- "Supporters" must not be registered as licensed FIE coaches.
- It would be better to create a name – " Support staff "
- It is not clearly stated why and how a coach should inform the FIE when relocating to a different country.

The Coaching Council's opinion is that it would be better to register all coaches in the world.

Executive Committee: The coaches' qualifications are not determined by the FIE, but by the national federations. The proposal only deals with the process of ordering a licence as coach on the FIE website for national federations.

In favour of the proposal, with the following modification:

- c) If a coach changes the country s/he is to represent at a future competition, the coach **or the National Federation s/he will be representing** shall inform the FIE of the change and the FIE will note such change on the coach's license. The coach will not need to secure a new license.

After a fairly broad discussion, the Ethics Committee came to the conclusion that, although there had been little activity (only one real report had been drawn up), there were several reasons for this:

Fencing is a sport that, at the present time, undoubtedly complies with the ethics rules fairly well and that has not encountered problems as considerable as those encountered by other federations.

However, this explanation was based merely on impressions and our experience.

The Ethics Committee, which is new, is undoubtedly still not well known among the national federations and in the fencing world. Steps could be taken to raise awareness of the existence of this committee, its prerogatives and the activities it may perform.

Nevertheless, as members of the Ethics Committee, we must be prudent in any promotional efforts as we must maintain the reserve required for the activity that this function entails.

It was also noted that, in certain federations, the Ethics Committee has suddenly become very important and well known due to significant decisions made on the basis of the example set by the FIFA Ethics Committee, which suspended a former president or members of the Executive Committee for long periods, which has put the activity of the Ethics Committee in the spotlight.

The Ethics Committee also has the power to refer matters to itself where it is aware of facts that could fall under the Code of Ethics, which requires an attitude similar to that of a prosecutor. The decision as to whether the Ethics Committee wants to be seen as active on its own initiative is a political one, and that decision has not, at the present time, been taken over the course of the last few years.

If necessary, this issue should also be discussed with the FIE to ensure consistency with the FIE's policy in this area.

To conclude this item, the members of the Ethics Committee were of the opinion that the following steps could be taken:

Talk to the FIE and its Executive Committee to reach an agreement on a way to better promote the issue of ethics in the world of fencing.

The Ethics Committee believes that it is more the duty of the FIE and its Executive Committee to take steps on this matter with the support of the members of the Ethics Committee.

A short, fairly simple document in three languages (French, English and Spanish) could be drawn up and distributed to the national federations, explaining that this body is relatively new and that, in today's world of sport, it is important that everyone concern themselves with ethics issues.

This short document could also state the way in which matters may be brought before the Ethics Committee and explain its powers.

Candidatures Congrès FIE 2021 – Lausanne / Applications to FIE 2021 Congress - Lausanne

During the first phase of the existence of the Ethics Committee, its members were appointed by the FIE Executive Committee.

In the meantime, plans have been tabled for the Ethics Committee (which is now a Commission) to be elected by the Congress, which led to an amendment to the FIE statutes.

After hearing from everyone present, it was noted that the five members of the current Ethics Committee are candidates for election.

The reason behind each candidate's decision to run for election was the fact that this Ethics Committee is a new body and that, without doubt, more significant efforts were needed to better establish it within the global fencing environment and raise awareness of it.

Based on the above, the members considered that it would be a good idea for the Congress to allow them to be elected so that they can continue the ongoing work over the next legislative period.

However, the members noted that the election method chosen by the Congress would force them

to show restraint during the phase preceding the Elective Congress, as it would be contradictory for the candidate members seeking election to the Ethics Committee to conduct an active promotional campaign regarding the activities they could be required to perform in this function in the future.

This was the reason behind the current Ethics Committee's consideration that the ongoing work and need for this activity to be continued with the members who began it must be emphasised to the national federations that would be voting.

Of course, each candidate would have to draw up a detailed CV explaining their profile, their professional career and their activities in fencing.

Discussions des règles de procédure du Comité d'Éthique et d'éventuelles règles à établir / Discussions concerning EC rules of procedure and potential rules/process to establish

The COVID situation prevented us from being active in this area, but this issue had already been identified in the past, specifically that, when matters are referred to the Ethics Committee, the committee does not have well-defined rules of procedure or a procedural code specifying the way in which it operates and giving the parties involved a clear view of what they need to do to establish the facts or proceed with their defence in a context that may be detrimental to them.

Some federations have an extremely broad procedural code with a pretrial and trial chamber under the Ethics Committee.

Other large federations have simpler rules.

From the perspective of the FIE, it would be important to have a procedural code, but to draft it with terms appropriate to our sport and its scale.

After discussion, the members of the Ethics Committee came to the conclusion that they should proceed as follows:

Each member would analyse the rules of procedure of other federations with a view to determining points that would need to feature in an FIE Code.

An interim Ethics Committee meeting would be held before the FIE Congress scheduled for 27 November 2021.

Olivier Carrard would contact Nathalie Rodriguez prior to that date to exchange views in the event that she were to become an official contact person and liaison between the Ethics Committee and the FIE if the proposed amendment of Chapter XII, Article 5.1 of the Statutes (item 4 on the agenda) were to be accepted.

Therefore, in order to not waste any time, it would be useful for the FIE and the Ethics Committee to exchange views on this subject.

If the members of the current Committee were to be re-elected to continue this work, the aim, after the Congress, would be to draw up these rules of procedure, for which there are three approaches:

The Ethics Committee draws up these rules: the members do not think that it is the duty of this Committee to draw up its own rules, but that they should be established by external parties, with input from the members of the Ethics Committee drawn from their experience.

The Legal Commission could be the body responsible for drawing up these rules.

The Ethics Committee, however, believes that the best solution would be for the FIE to engage an external lawyer with experience in this area (who would need to be paid) to draw up a Procedural Code based on work carried out by the President of the Ethics Committee and the President of the Legal Commission, working closely together.

This work could be carried out between December 2021 and spring 2022 so as to have a complete text to submit to the FIE Executive Committee before summer 2022 and then put forward at the Congress to be held towards the end of November 2022.

Propositions de modification des statuts (chapitre XII art 5.1) / Proposed amendment to EC statutes (chapter XII, art 5.1)

After discussion, the members of the Ethics Committee were of the opinion that the amendment to Chapter XII, Article 5.1 of the Statutes, which was proposed and is annexed to this report in three languages (French, English and Spanish) was unanimously accepted.

Olivier Carrard notified Samuel Cheri, President of the FIE Legal Commission.

It was therefore noted that, if accepted by the Congress, this amendment would be positive as it would establish an official channel for discussions between the Ethics Committee and the Executive Committee of the FIE via its CEO.

14:30 – 15:00 / Réunion commune avec la Commission juridique / Joint meeting with the Legal Commission of the FIE

In view of the above, it was noted that a meeting with the Legal Commission was not necessary as things stand, and notification of the cancellation of that meeting was sent to the Commission.

Comparaison avec le Comité d’Ethique d’autres fédérations / Comparison with Ethics Committees of other federations

A general discussion was held between the members of the Ethics Committee on this matter and each member provided their analyses of the situation in other federations.

With the aim of preparing for the discussion and the work involved in drawing up the rules of procedure, Olivier Carrard suggested organising a workshop/seminar with people he knew well who are heavily involved in ethics issues.

These would be people that he has worked alongside professionally and who are active in this area, either within large international federations or as judges with the Court of Arbitration of Sport in Lausanne.

He believed he could ask these people to provide him with their experience within their federation and the reasons why rules were put in place to a greater or lesser degree based on the problems that arose in the sport in question and the scale of those federations.

This workshop could be held by videoconference or in person and would need to take place around late January/early February 2022 so as to be useful for drafting any potential rules of procedure.

Divers / Miscellaneous

So as to continue this work, the members of the Ethics Committee decided to hold the next meeting on **Friday, 27 August 2021 at 13:00, via Zoom**, for one or two hours.

Olivier Carrard would organise the Zoom link one week before the meeting and would, in the interim, have contacted the FIE to discuss how to proceed with the work of the Ethics Committee.

Friday 25 June 2021

The Zoom meeting of the Legal Commission was called to order at 1305 CET. All Members of the Commission were present, except Hameed Mahdi Abdulhadi and Kanako Inokuchi. Kanako Inokuchi joined as soon as she was able after a personal emergency. Also present were Novak Perovic, the representative of the Executive Committee and Elena Murdaca, the FIE Administrative Director.

Proposal number 1 from the Legal Commission

Review of the FIE Anti-Doping Procedural Rules

The Commission reviewed the draft prepared by FIE Swiss Legal Counsel, the President of the FIE Legal Commission and the CEO of the FIE and suggested modifications, which are included in the draft attached to this report.

Joint Meeting with the Women and Fencing Commission

The Women and Fencing Council explained the rationale for the development of a new FIE Council to deal with issues regarding Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and presented a proposed charter for that new Council.

The members of the Legal Commission were in favour of the concept and this proposal would be forwarded to the new Legal Commission, to be elected at the 2021 Congress, for further action.

A discussion ensued regarding whether this new Council's agenda should be added to that of the Women and Fencing Council or whether a new Council would be required. There will need to be discussions between the Legal Commission and the Women and Fencing Council after the elections at the 2021 Congress to develop a path forward.

Joint Meeting with the President of the Coaches' Council

The Coaches' Council has no objection to the licensure of the coaches or the methodology of procuring licenses. Their issues related to whether persons other than coaches (e.g., teammates) would be allowed to coach in the DE if the coach were busy with other fencers. We noted that the licensure proposal had no effect on existing rules regarding who was entitled to be on the field of play at official competitions of the FIE.

The meeting was adjourned at 1700 CET

13:00 Update of the agenda of our last Meeting with a list of open points (FIORE)

The meeting was opened by Erika Aze's greeting to all participants who, then yielded the floor to Dr. Fiore. The President of the Medical Commission presented a summary of all the steps taken during the pandemic with special emphasis on FORMIR and support given to the FIE administration during a period, which was particularly challenging from the medical and health care and Covid 19 prevention perspectives.

Regarding pending issues after the last meeting in Bucharest, Fiore highlighted:

1. The status of transgenders in fencing.
2. A digital data collection system for fencing injuries.

The first point contemplated the drafting of a comprehensive scientific paper for ComEx, which would highlight all known issues related to "gender dysphoria." This, to develop a policy for how to handle competitions concerning such athletes. This started with the participation of Dr. Fiore to a 2019 symposium

in Lausanne organized by the IAAF, which was attended by the IOC Medical Commission and almost all international federations. At this symposium, the difficulty to define unique objective criteria of genders became evident. Current criteria are based on genetic, hormonal, and psychosocial evaluations which are open for discussions and objections. In other words, the direction the IOC is to consider "gender" of an individual as a personal and subjective perception that ought to be respected on the basis of everyone's right to freely express their own tendencies.

Concerning the second point, the stop of all activities caused by the pandemic brought to the fore the urgent need to give the FIE a system for the data collection of injuries in fencing. However, the progressive resumption of international competitions and the necessity to identify more sophisticated and effective prevention measures (especially after the USA incident in July 2020), has made this issue top priority for the

incoming new Olympic cycle.

13:15 Report on 2021 Cadets-Junior World Championships in Cairo (MOURAD)

Due to the absence of Dr. Maha Mourad during this phase of the meeting, Dr. Catherine Defoligny reported

on the Cairo Cadet Junior World Championships. She expressed her satisfaction with the positive outcome from the sanitary point of view of this event, which resulted in only 12 positive cases, ten of which registered upon arrival at Cairo's airport, not at the venue. She congratulated her colleagues and the Egyptian Fencing Federation physician in charge for his great collaboration and efficiency.

13:30 Review of Covid precautions. Overview of all competitions held, regarding success of organization during COVID. Changes for international events to come in 2021.

Dr. Fiore presented a summary of the three international FIE events in Budapest, Kazan and Doha. Only the

first event in Budapest involved some serious problems mostly due to the disregard of some basic behavioral rules (related to the Covid 19 protocols) on the part of athletes and coaches.

The last two events were far more successful (from a Covid 19 mitigation perspective) because of a stricter control by the FIE executives present at the venue.

Any future changes to the FIE Covid 19 guidelines, will have to reflect the evolution of the pandemic, which

has proven difficult to predict or anticipate because of:

- ↓ the continuous emergence of new and more contagious variants.
- ↓ the difficulty of enacting mass vaccinations in different countries.

↓ the scarce scientific knowledge, which still characterizes this pandemic from a clinical and epidemiological perspective.

14:00 What's new regarding Tokyo (HUZEL)

Dr. Lisa Huzel presented the organizational plan prepared by the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games, in cooperation with the IOC, with special emphasis on the measures adopted to prevent the spread of Covid19.

15:00 Anti-Doping Education Plan Revised. AD Rules key changes. Testing program. Problems with forms and data. Result management for AA cases. (HALSTED)

Dr. Clare Halsted gave a summary of the items cited in the agenda. They were all unanimously approved by the commission.

16:00 MEETING WITH VETERANS COUNCIL

Prior to the meeting, which had been requested by the Veteran Council, the Medical Commission discussed

critical aspects related to the current FIE protocols for the upcoming world championships to take place in Florida.

The concept of having a "bubble" (which is already difficult to have in place in a senior competitions) becomes inapplicable for a veteran competition considering that these athletes experience often these types of competitions in conjunction with a short vacation.

To force all participants (already tested before their flight) to undergo a PCR test before the competition doesn't present any guarantee for the subsequent days because there is no practical way to control the movements and behavior of these athletes.

On the other hand, the cost of a PCR test in USA (for those not covered by an American insurance plan) is considerably high thereby making it impossible to organize a competition in United States with the current protocols.

Therefore, after the meeting with the Veteran Council, the Medical Commission agreed to propose as a solution to request one or more antigen tests upon their arrival in Florida (i.e., before entering the venue) and possibly during the competition (for athletes fencing in more than one event). Naturally, this must be cleared first with the current federal and state rules enforced in the United States and in Florida, respectively.

26/06

The agenda of the meeting was modified following the request of Nathalie Rodriguez, Pascal Tesch and Novak Perovic to meet with the Medical Commission at 14:00.

13:00 Medical Handbook revised version. Medical Delegate Handbook (HALSTED)

Dr. Clare Halsted introduced two documents prepared by the Medical Commission with the most significant changes compared with the previous versions.

14:00 Meeting with Nathalie Rodriguez, Pascal Tesch and Novak Perovic.

Nathalie Rodriguez raised the issue of the unsustainable costs for the FIE if the current protocol for competitions is maintained during the next season. She asked the opinion of the Medical Commission on the possibility to modify some protocols without compromising safety, in particular with respect to the most expensive item, the molecular PCR, which, under current rules, all participants must take, before the start of the competition.

After the discussions on the 25th regarding modifying the protocol for veteran world championships, the Medical Commission agreed to review FORMIR by adding one or more rapid antigenic tests and replacing the PCR test upon arrival at the venue, given the very much increased reliability of the rapid tests available on the market.

15:00 MEETING WITH THE SEMI COMMISSION

The meeting with the SEMI commission revolved around two main themes:

1. Update of the safety measures in fencing and use of maraging blades in saber. Giandomenico Varallo confirmed the obligation to imprint the FIE seal on all maraging blade used. From the

Tashkent incident, Jacek Bierkowski suggested to increase the resistance in Newtons of the uniforms and the need to develop an educational program for athletes and coaches stressing the obligation to always wear, including during training, all the necessary safety equipment.

2. The July 2020, incident in the USA and the prevention of neck injury. Some possible solutions on how to protect that neck area were presented. These need to be further examined and studied especially considering the discomfort level of these solutions, which displeases many athletes. A proposed working team to be formed with SEMI, MedCom and members of the Athletes Commission.

16:30 FIE Environmental policy and action plan.

Dr. Clare Halsted raised the environmental issue in general terms stressing that it is incumbent on the FIE to

rapidly contribute with solutions to the various problems before we run out of time.

Dr. Fiore agreed on the importance of the environmental problem and the need to involve the FIE. He stressed that we must first identify a number of specific problems related to fencing to then raise the issue with ComEx with concrete actions.

17:00 Closing of the meeting

Antonio Fiore thanked all participants for their cooperation and help in the past years, especially this last difficult year for everyone.

Wilfried Wolfgarten, Catherine Defoligny and Jenő Kamuti announced their intention not to present their candidature to the Medical Commission elections for the next Olympic cycle after many decades of active participation.

Fiore regretfully accepted their decision but since the announcement was made during a video-meeting he proposes that the FIE invite Kamuti, Defoligny and Wolfgarten for the first meeting of the Medical Commission organized after the FIE Congress, to thank them for the work done in so many years in the Medical Commission.

Article: Revision of articles o.99.7 and t.160

Proposal from: Rules Commission

Motivation: Clarification of the consequences of a black card given to an individual team member during a team match

The purpose of this proposal is to clarify what happens if a team member commits an offence resulting in a black card during a team match. A team that has lost a match due to a black card is not allowed to continue the competition and the mutual responsibility for all team members and team officials to respect the rules should be made quite clear.

Motivation: Proposal: The distance between the score machine table or stand and the edge of the piste should be a minimum of 1 meter where recommend where possible a distance of 1.5 meters.

Rationale: Currently, there is no specification for how far the scoring table is from the edge of the piste. Conventionally, the minimum distance has been 1.0 meter, a distance which does not allow a fencer to safely fleche, nor does it provide security for the scoring apparatus.

Motivation: By putting the rule and the exception to the rule together, to make it easier to understand

Proposal:

t.94 The Referee must take note of **possible failures** of the electrical equipment and must annul the last hit registered in the following circumstances:

1. If a hit **made on the guard** of the competitor against whom the hit was registered or on the **conductive piste** causes the apparatus to register a hit;

However, the fact that the épée of a competitor has large or small areas of insulation formed by oxidation, by glue, paint or any other material on the guard, on the blade or elsewhere, on which his opponent's hits can cause a hit to be signalled, or that the electric tip is badly fixed to the end of the blade so that it can be unscrewed or tightened by hand, cannot justify the annulment of hits registered against that competitor

2. If a hit **properly made** by the competitor against whom the hit was registered does not cause the apparatus to register a hit;

3. If the apparatus **fortuitously registers a hit** on the side of the competitor against whom the hit was registered, for example, after a beat on the blade, by any movements of his opponent, or as a result of any cause other than a properly made hit;

4. If the registering of a hit made by the competitor against whom the hit was registered **is annulled** by a subsequent hit made by his opponent.

5. Special cases

- If a double hit is registered and **one hit is valid and the other is not valid** (such as a hit made on some surface other than on the opponent (cf. t.93) or a hit made after leaving the piste (cf. t.33ss), only the valid hit is scored.

- If a double hit is registered by **an established hit and a doubtful hit** (failure of the electrical apparatus) the fencer who has made the established hit may choose to accept the double hit or ask to have it annulled.

The Referee must also apply the following rules regarding the annulment of hits:

1. If the incidents mentioned in Article **t.94** occur as a result of the competitor's **bodywire being unplugged** (either near the hand or at the back of the fencer), they cannot justify the annulment of the hit registered. 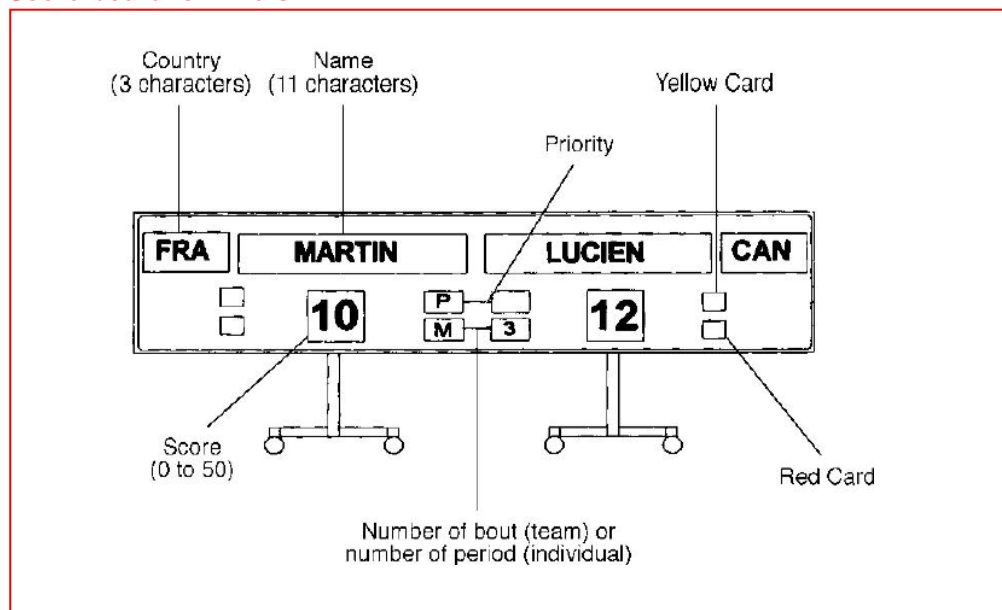

Team composition (o.103.2.b)

It is intended to provide the best reasonable means by which teams can compete while recognising that some countries do not have the spread of age groups that enable them to fill all team places at all weapons. A fencer fencing their 'second' weapon in a team event is not necessarily seen as giving that team an unreasonable advantage.

Team Championships (o.103.9)

The Veterans Council proposes not to fight the matches for the places after 5th, because the team final classification is not relevant after the podium positions. There is no Veterans Teams ranking and the pools composition is calculated based on the final classification of the team members in the relevant individual competition.

Motivation: The Grand Prix of Nations is the highest award in the world of fencing, which is given to a national federation for winning a world championship. After the analysis of the recent years world championships results,

we came to the conclusion that the system with the points awarded for the places up to the 64th (FIE Organization Rules, Chapter 2, article o.110) is not quite fair and often counteracts with the common system of the medal count at determining of the world championships winner.

We believe that the determination of the Grand Prix of Nations winner should be based firstly on the highest results of the athletes in the individual and team competitions, i.e. the medals they have won. This approach helps to avoid a situation when a national team winning the most number of competitions in the tournament does not receive the well-deserved award. We therefore propose to determine the Grand Prix of Nations winner by the medals count, and only when the teams have equal number of medals to use the existing scale of points from the FIE Organization Rules article mentioned above.

Proposal:

The FIE gold medal, the Grand Prix of Nations, is awarded each year to the federation which has obtained the best results at the Junior and Senior World Championships, according to the **number of medals scale of points below**. ~~Strict count is kept of the total number of points won~~ in all the individual and all the team events.

The winner will be the Federation with the most gold medals.

If both Federations have won the same number of gold medals then the award goes to one of them - the winner of the most silver medals, and if there is still a tie, to one of them -the winner of the most bronze medals; and if there is still a tie, a strict count is kept of the total number of points according to the scale of points below:

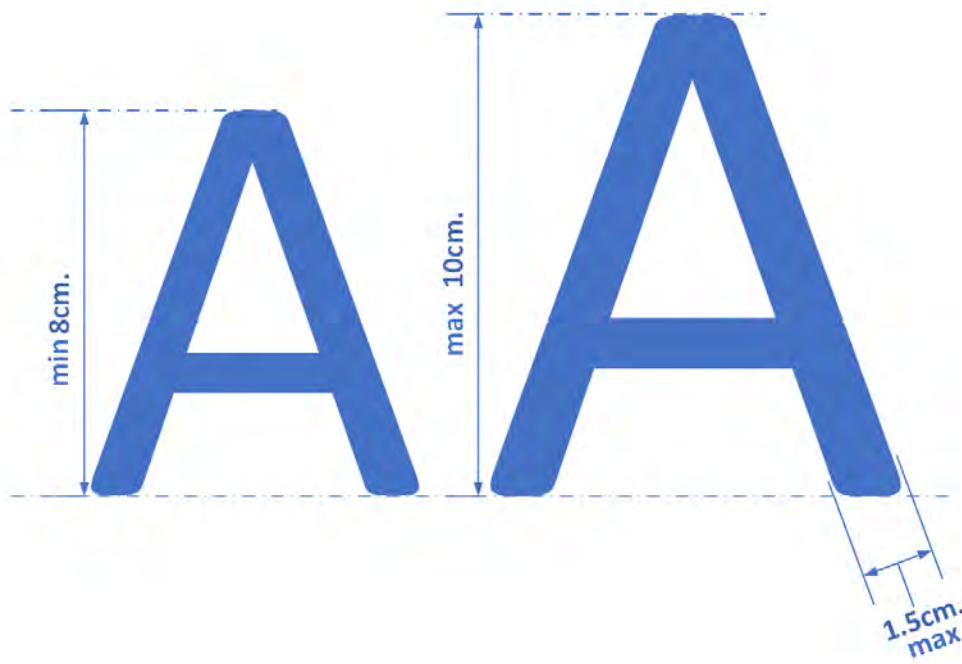

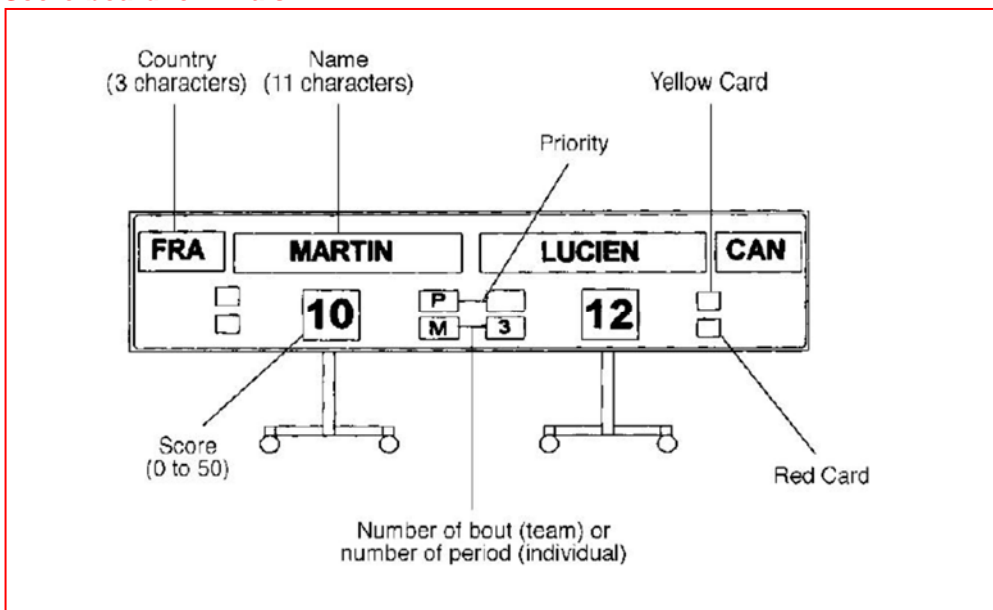

Actually, we don't have in our book rule the obligation of the periodical check of the blades. It is only written on the header of the blades list. We think that this periodical test is extremely important for the safety of the fencer and to keep high the attention of the manufacturer.

Proposal:

Modification management:

1) The homologation is valid for the duration specified in the technical handbooks as long as no modification is made to the equipment or its manufacturing process.

For blades the first homologation process has to be confirmed with a periodical check done every 2 years (see page 64 item 7)

2) Any change must be immediately reported to the FIE SEMI Commission President. These changes cover all aspects of the homologated items (appearance, composition, internal content, software and all other material changes).

3) The modified equipment must pass the whole homologation process again.

In particular, if a manufacturer intends to change the material or the manufacturing of his FIE certified equipment, the manufacturer must submit it for a new homologation process and wait for the result.

Page 64 of the Annex A – Material Rules

7. Results of tests and examinations

For each of the tests and examinations detailed in point 6 the results must comply with the following table.

The blades, after the first homologation remain valid, under the condition that the manufacturers send the blades for a periodical test at least once every two years. These periodical tests have to be carried out at least once every two years in simplified mode: 3 blades will be tested for the following:

Fatigue resistance (by bending) quality of the steel
Chemical test
Traction test
Tensile test
Test of fracture resistance (K1°C)

If the periodical tests are not be done for 5 years, the blade will be scratched from the FIE official blades list. The manufacturer can ask for a new complete homologation process.

Article: Annex A Section 4, Material Rules

Proposal from: SEMI Commission

Motivation: In February 2020, the FIE Executive Committee made a decision on the obligatory chipping of fencing equipment. This became the basis of the work carried out. A new, universal label for all manufacturers was developed and the places for its and chips installation were determined. This proposal adds this to the material rules.

Proposal:

4. LABEL OF QUALITY

As far as the quality label is concerned, the Committee has established that it must be indelible, must be circular in shape with a diameter of 25 mm for the mask and 50 mm for the uniform, and must include the following data:

- the emblem of the manufacturer;
- the date (year and month) of manufacture;
- the FIE emblem.

On blades, the label must be 7 mm wide

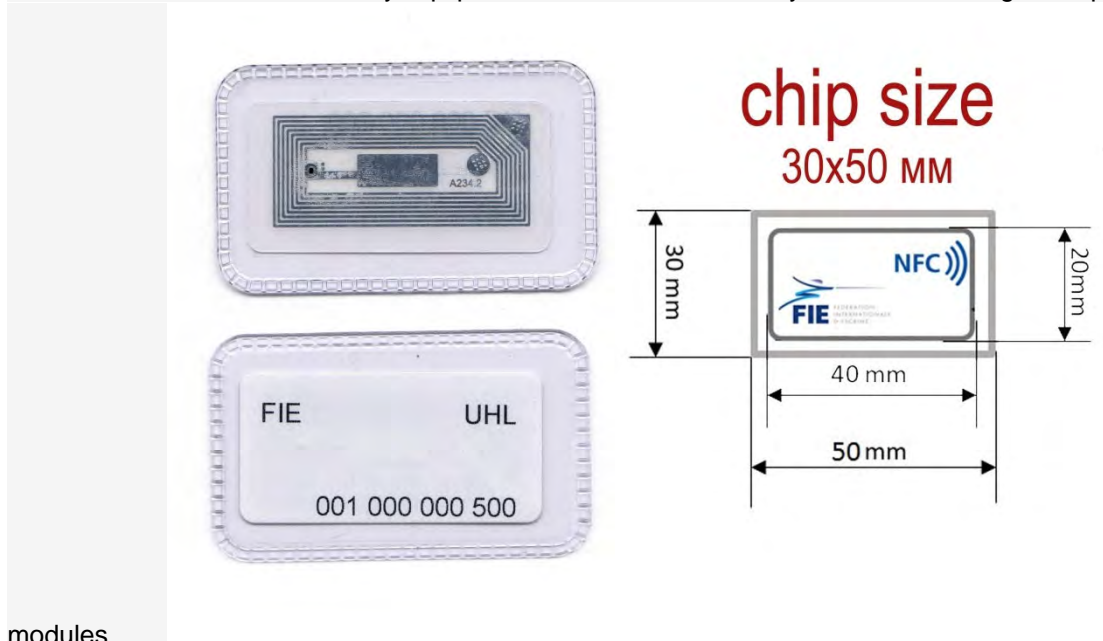


Figure A.7. FIE quality labels (not to scale)

From 01.03.2021, the obligatory chipping of new fencing equipment (jacket, trousers, plastron mask) is introduced. The appearance and geometrical dimensions of the chip are shown in Fig.1.

The chip contains information about the type of product and the name of the manufacturer. Reading of the information can be done both by equipment manufacturers and by consumers using smartphones with NFC



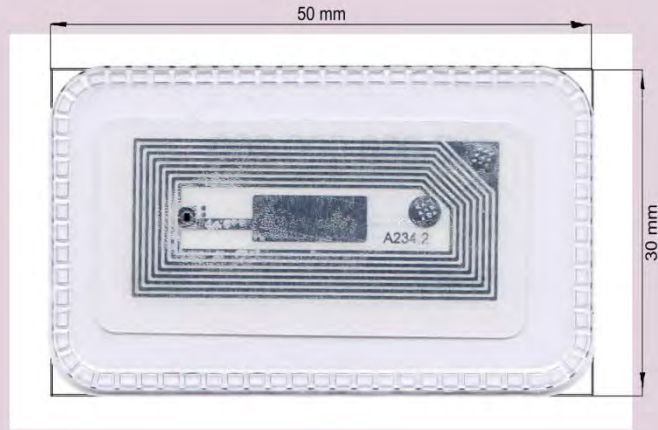

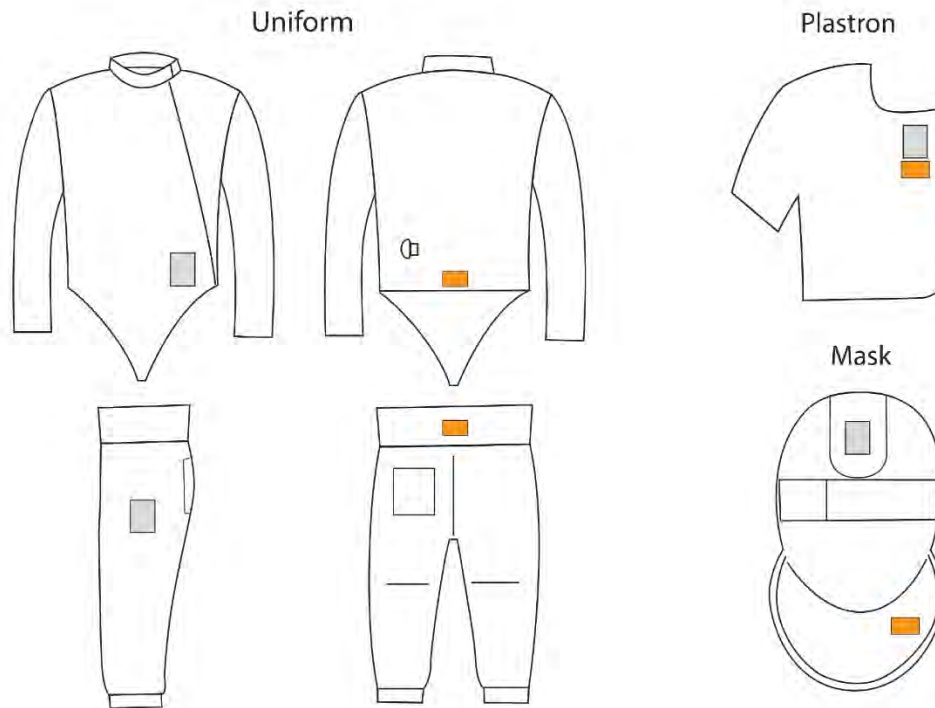

Several documents relating to the SEMI on the FIE Web site are out of date and need updating. One in particular RULES FOR COMPETITIONS FENCER'S WEAPONS AND EQUIPMENT CONTROL has not been updated since December 2013 and contains old regulations and omits important rule changes. JH to send the document that exists on the web site and a draft revision out by email to commission members. In his email reply SR agreed that we would go ahead with getting this replaced.

8. Report on Restructuring of "material rules" (JH)

JH reported that she has recently spoken to Steve Higginson (Rules Commission). He is currently working on the French version but it will not be ready to present to Congress this year.

9. Preparation for the Tokyo Olympics (AH)

Planning Olympics have to take into account the measures to deal with Covid. They will be offering Covid vaccines to all NTO's

The organising committee say that it is not possible to increase the size of the Weapon Control and Call room. The weapon control will run 12hr days and the staff of 24 will be divided into 4 teams of 6 technicians and will work in shifts, dealing with approximately 70 fencers per day.

The organising committee are still awaiting operational details of the Weapons Control input system operated by Duma

The Call room is going to be very crowded especially on team event days SR and GV have asked if there is anyway more room could be found.

10. Junior and Cadet World Championships Cairo (GE)

Attached is SEMI report of these championships
Delegates GE/GG/SA/ME

Due to Covid the fencers waiting for Weapon control they queued outside in the fresh air. Actual processing time 10/15minutes per fencer.

The call room was more of a problem especially on team event days with up to 16 teams at any one time. Teams had to be queued in the corridor.

The Scoring machines were Absolute, Favero and for the first time in a major competition Inspiration and these were used on the coloured pistes and is a good design.

The quality of the test machines provided for use by the technicians in the call room should be improved to a professional standard.

The eddy current machines were not received for use in Cairo. They had been sent to USA for the Junior and Cadet Championships which were cancelled due to Covid. The eddy current machines will be sent to Tokyo for use at the Olympics.

After the event a report was made to FIE CEO that a jacket was refused at Weapon Control because of an advertisement on the back.

It is not known who refused this jacket but it does appear to conform with the Publicity Code and should not have been refused.

11. New Video system for finals on 4 cameras

Swiss Timing are developing this new system. Due to Covid it has not been possible to run tests on the system, but it is hoped to continue next year and it could be ready for use at the Olympics in Paris 2024.

12. New project "Wireless system" (Poland).

Jacek Bierkowski will be joining the meeting tomorrow and may give more details of this developing system. When the testing takes place they will need to comply with the technical European rules on electric magnetic pollution which are difficult to achieve. A pro-type is awaited.

13. Report about the final document of the workgroup for the Maraging Sabre Blades

Copy of the report attached

Blades were obtained from all manufacturers and were tested on two new Sofrenell machines one from each of the test houses at Breda and Franchini.

The number of tests was set at 12000 cycles.

Some abnormal fractures near the tip were found in the blades from two manufacturers. It is possible that these have occurred during the process of bending in order to make the tip.

All manufacturers will be contacted and asked to supply details of how they make the bend for the point, so that the systems can be compared.

Update to the rules will be required in accordance with those shown in the report. First the opinion of the test houses will be sought.

Subject: the incident in USA and the collar.

Jeremy Summers (Medical)

Gave a report on the incident giving details of the injury.

15 year girl v 16 boy both beginners. Hit to chest the blade bent and broke slid up under the bib and nicked the carotid artery. She was rushed to hospital and received emergency surgery she survived due to the immediate actions of the coaches present.

Another injury occurred when a broken epee blade went the bib and up and hit the side of the cheek. Asked if there were any stopgap measures that can be taken.

TL gave a report on the sabre accident in the USA and showed two proto-type neck protectors made by Absolute and Branimir Zivkovic. The merits/demerits

of the two systems were discussed, as well as the safety requirements it must be comfortable for the fencer. It could be possible that in the future the neck protection and plastron could be combined.

Clare Halsted (Medical)

The white jackets for foil and sabre already have a blade catcher but it is made ineffective by the electric jacket worn over it. If the targets at foil and sabre were changed to remove the collar from the target it would allow the blade catcher on the cloth jacket to come into play.

JB Also pointed out that the current specification of 800N may not now be strong enough as fencing is getting faster and more athletic.

Investigations should be made into new materials which have a greater strength but are still light enough to be suitable for fencing uniforms.

The FIE only have jurisdiction over equipment used at FIE events but many countries do not require this level of clothing for club and national levels. The FIE could campaign that countries consider implementing the higher level of clothing.

GV Suggested pro-type protectors and new target without collar test and further investigation to be presented to Executive.

Also coach should help educate the fencers on matters of safety.

Article: t.18

Proposal from: SEMI Commission

Motivation: Proposal: *The distance between the score machine table or stand and the edge of the piste should be a minimum of 1 meter where recommend where possible a distance of 1.5 meters.*

Rationale: *Currently, there is no specification for how far the scoring table is from the edge of the piste. Conventionally, the minimum distance has been 1.0 meter, a distance which does not allow a fencer to safely fleche, nor does it provide security for the scoring apparatus.*

Proposal:

t.18.4 The distance between the score machine table or stand and the edge of the piste should be a minimum of 1 metre and where possible a distance of 1.5 metres

SEMI Commission: In favour with the following modification:

t.18.4 The distance between the score machine table or stand and the edge of the piste should be a minimum of 1 metre ~~and where possible a distance of 1.5 metres~~

P. 8

Article: Transfer article t.95.2 and add it to article t.94.1

Proposal from: Rules Commission

Motivation: By putting the rule and the exception to the rule together, to make it easier to understand

Proposal:

t.94 The Referee must take note of **possible failures** of the electrical equipment and must annul the last hit registered in the following circumstances:

1. If a hit **made on the guard** of the competitor against whom the hit was registered or on the **conductive piste** causes the apparatus to register a hit;

However, the fact that the épée of a competitor has large or small areas of insulation formed by oxidation, by glue, paint or any other material on the guard, on the blade or elsewhere, on which his opponent's hits can

cause a hit to be signalled, or that the electric tip is badly fixed to the end of the blade so that it can be unscrewed or tightened by hand, cannot justify the annulment of hits registered against that competitor

2. If a hit **properly made** by the competitor against whom the hit was registered does not cause the apparatus to register a hit;

3. If the apparatus **fortuitously registers a hit** on the side of the competitor against whom the hit was registered, for example, after a beat on the blade, by any movements of his opponent, or as a result of any cause other than a properly made hit;

4. If the registering of a hit made by the competitor against whom the hit was registered **is annulled** by a subsequent hit made by his opponent.

5. Special cases

- If a double hit is registered and **one hit is valid and the other is not valid** (such as a hit made on some surface other than on the opponent (cf. t.93) or a hit made after leaving the piste (cf. t.33ss), only the valid hit is scored.

- If a double hit is registered by **an established hit and a doubtful hit** (failure of the electrical apparatus) the fencer who has made the established hit may choose to accept the double hit or ask to have it annulled.

The Referee must also apply the following rules regarding the annulment of hits:

1. If the incidents mentioned in Article **t.94** occur as a result of the competitor's **bodywire being unplugged** (either near the hand or at the back of the fencer), they cannot justify the annulment of the hit registered. However, if the safety device prescribed by Article **m.55.4** is missing or not functioning, the hit should be annulled if the plug at the fencers' back has become unplugged.

Motivation: Rule already exists in sabre but is missing from foil.

2. The part of the bib that is beneath a horizontal line 1.5 - 2 cm below the chin, must be entirely covered with a material that has the same conductive characteristics as the conductive jacket.
 3. Means of connection: the electrical contact between the conductive jacket and the bib of the mask must be ensured by means of a white coloured or clear covered wire with two crocodile clips. The wire must be attached to the bib of the mask with one crocodile clip and to the jacket with the other. This wire must be between 30cm and 40cm long. A coiled mask wire is not allowed.
The crocodile clips, the design and size of which must conform to the conditions laid down in Article m.29.2(c), must be soldered to the ends of the wire. In addition, the electrical resistance in this wire (between the two crocodile clips) must not exceed 1 ohm.

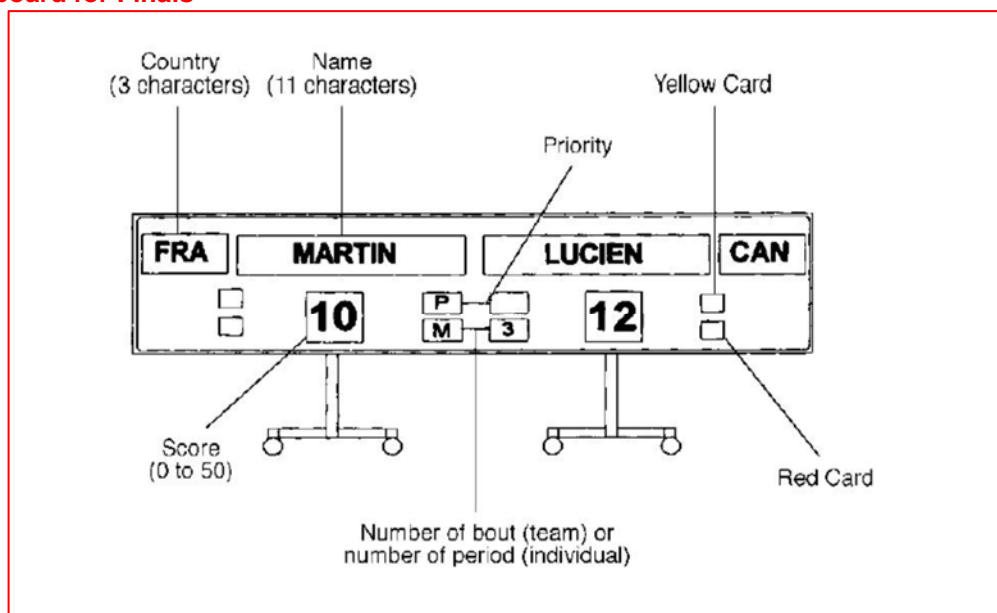

Motivation: Proposal for the Periodical tests for blade

Actually, we don't have in our book rule the obligation of the periodical check of the blades. It is only written on the header of the blades list. We think that this periodical test is extremely important for the safety of the fencer and to keep high the attention of the manufacturer.

Proposal:

Modification management:

1) The homologation is valid for the duration specified in the technical handbooks as long as no modification is made to the equipment or its manufacturing process.

For blades the first homologation process has to be confirmed with a periodical check done every 2 years (see page 64 item 7)

2) Any change must be immediately reported to the FIE SEMI Commission President. These changes cover all aspects of the homologated items (appearance, composition, internal content, software and all other material changes).

3) The modified equipment must pass the whole homologation process again.

In particular, if a manufacturer intends to change the material or the manufacturing of his FIE certified equipment, the manufacturer must submit it for a new homologation process and wait for the result.

Page 64 of the Annex A – Material Rules

For each of the tests and examinations detailed in point 6 the results must comply with the following table.

The blades, after the first homologation remain valid, under the condition that the manufacturers send the blades for a periodical test at least once every two years. These periodical tests have to be carried out at least once every two years in simplified mode: 3 blades will be tested for the following:

Fatigue resistance (by bending) quality of the steel

Chemical test

Traction test

Tensile test

Test of fracture resistance (K1°C)

If the periodical tests are not be done for 5 years, the blade will be scratched from the FIE official blades list. The manufacturer can ask for a new complete homologation process.

Motivation: In February 2020, the FIE Executive Committee made a decision on the obligatory chipping of fencing equipment. This became the basis of the work carried out. A new, universal label for all manufacturers was developed and the places for its and chips installation were determined. This proposal adds this to the material rules.

Proposal:

4. LABEL OF QUALITY

1. As far as the quality label is concerned, the Committee has established that it must be indelible, must be circular in shape with a diameter of 25 mm for the mask and 50 mm for the uniform, and must include the following data:
 - the emblem of the manufacturer;
 - the date (year and month) of manufacture;
 - the FIE emblem.

On blades, the label must be 7 mm wide

2. Chip and label installation requirements.

From 01.03.2021, the obligatory chipping of new fencing equipment (jacket, trousers, plastron mask) is introduced. The appearance and geometrical dimensions of the chip are shown in Fig.1.

The chip contains information about the type of product and the name of the manufacturer. Reading of the information can be done both by equipment manufacturers and by consumers using smartphones with NFC

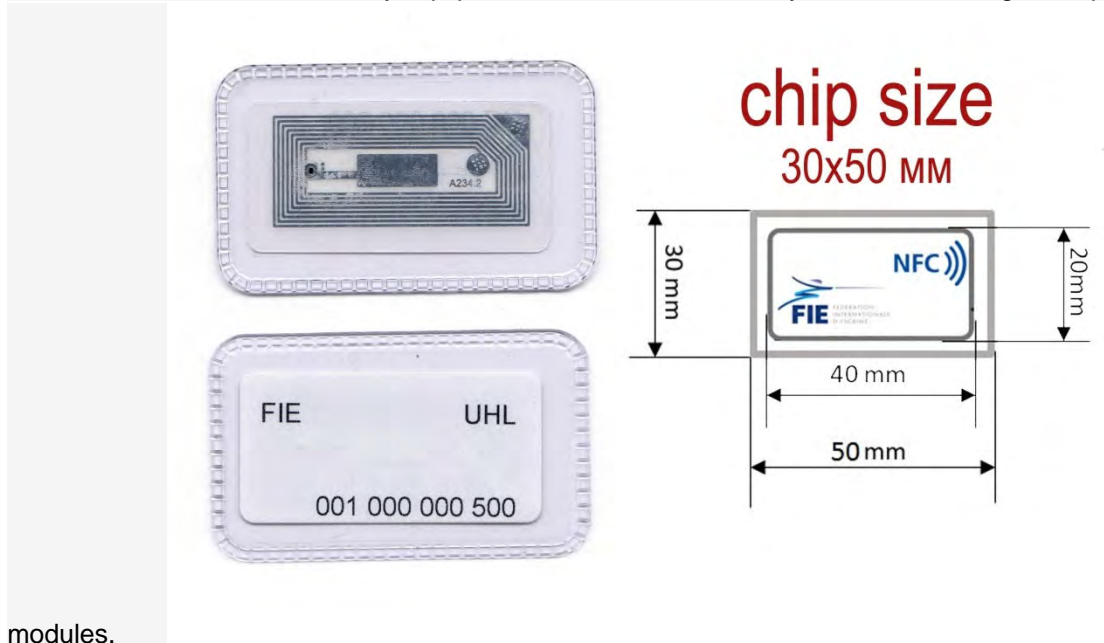
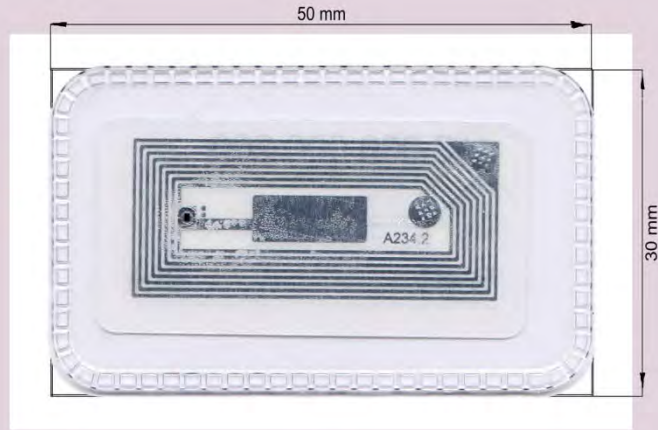

The S 800 label is sewn onto the jacket, trousers and plastron. The M1600 label is sewn onto the mask. Places of installation of chips and labels on equipment are shown in Fig.3

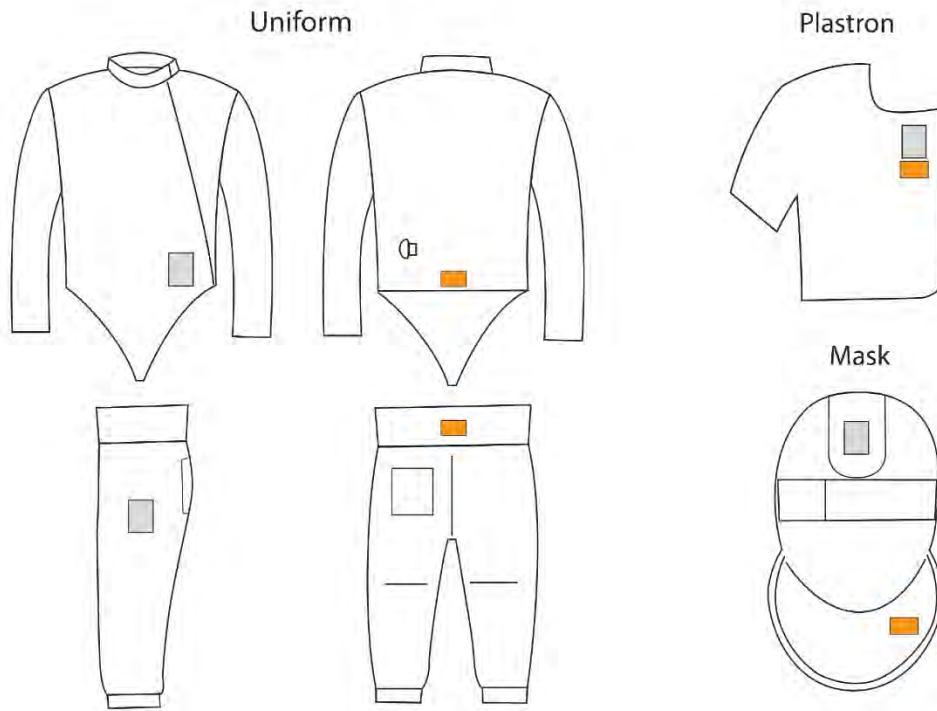

Both variants of the FIE seal of quality are acceptable up to and including the 2025/6 season.

For the 2026/7 season, masks, jackets, breeches and plastrons must have the new quality seal with a chip securely located underneath.

The SEMI Commission will oversee the approval of the chip placement during the equipment homologation process.

2. The Coaching Council President's report on work done by the Council in 2020 – 2021:

Dr. G. Tyshler gave a short report on the Council's work during 2020 – 2021. It was not much to discuss due to the global pandemic.

General discussions took place on the situation concerning fencing around the world. Members of the council shared their experiences in conducting fencing activities in different countries during the Covid 19 pandemic. Each member provided up-to date information on training and competitions that took place in their countries.

3. Proposal for the 2021 Congress. Modification of the Status.

Article: 9.1.9 (new article)

Proposal from: Legal Commission

Motivation: Rationale: To clarify the means of securing a coaches license for both those coaches who carry of passport from the country for whom they are coaching and those who carry a passport from another country.

Proposal:

- a) A National Federation can obtain a license for a coach who is a citizen of the country of such National Federation and whose license will specify the nationality of the coach.
- b) A National Federation can obtain a license for a coach who is not a citizen of the country of that National Federation, but which National Federation is intending to send the coach to an official competition of the FIE as a member of the delegation of such National Federation. The license for such coach will specify: i. the nationality of the coach's passport; and
ii. the nationality of the country of National Federation the coach is representing at the competition.
- c) If a coach changes the country s/he is to represent at a future competition, the coach shall inform the FIE of the change and the FIE will note such change on the coach's license. The coach will not need to secure a new license.

d) A coach needs only one license, even though s/he may represent more than one country at official competitions of the FIE.

e) A coach needs a license as a coach, even though such person has another license as a fencer, referee, official at the World Championships or Olympic Games or member of the Executive Committee, a Commission, a Council or Ethics Committee.

Coaches Council:

After the discussion, the Coaches Council agreed with the proposal from the Legal Commission.

In Favor

These are some of the comments and questions raised by the Council members during the discussion:

- Can anybody register as a coach, or is proof of qualification required?
- Will the coach lose his/her license if the coach is unable to pay for the following year?
- It is more important to register people who have qualifications and education.
- “Supporters” must not be registered as licensed FIE coaches.
- It would be better to create a name – “ Support staff ”
- It is not clearly stated why and how a coach should inform the FIE when relocating to a different country.

The Coaching Council’s opinion is that it would be better to register all coaches in the world.

4. The Coaching Council’s work for the last 4 years

Members of the Council briefly looked at the matters that were discussed during the last 4 years.

- Sabre sensor - Reports on the FIE committee tests. Analysis of the Council’s decisions on the matter
- “White light” in Foil - Reports on the FIE committee tests. Analysis of the Council’s decisions on the matter.
- Reintroduction of flesh attack in sabre fencing - Reports on the FIE committee tests. Analysis of the Council’s decisions on the matter.
- “Digital rules “- Analysis of the Council’s decisions on the matter.
- FIE Coaching Academies.

The Coaching Council’s opinion is that more tests should be done on different levels before new rules are accepted and implemented by FIE.

The council met for a virtual meeting for all councils and commissions, that was set up by the FIE Office.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved.

There were 2 proposals for a Fair Play Award.

1. An epee fencer that in the first round at the junior world championships in Cairo voluntarily announced that she had hit the floor.
2. The FIE organization and management for the way they have dealt (and still do) with the effects that the Covid-19 pandemic has on our sport.

After discussion it was decided that the action of the young fencer was very nice and showed good sportsmanship, but the fact that he won all of his matches in the first round, causes her action to not have the same impact as those where fencers act similar in moments that cost them the match or even and Olympic direct elimination like e.g. award winner Jiri Beran in the Rio Olympics.

It seems however a good idea to do something to acknowledge this good behavior and for situations like this the council decided that similar to the International Fair Play Committee a diploma should be created for this and future situations where there is clearly Fair Play, but the impact is not enough to warrant the award.

The FIE organization and management were the topic of a lengthy discussion where we hoped to get input from the absent members as well. So it was decided to have a second meeting 3 days later. This had alas no effect and during the meeting on the 28 of June it was decided that the Fair Play Council proposes the FIE Executive Committee (including the president) as the receivers of the Fair Play Award.

We like to stress that we think that the office deserves as much praise for the excellent way in which they tackled the problems, gave form to the Covid protocols etc.

The reasons for the Award are:

The FIE Executive Committee and its President have showed great leadership and made all decisions on a very fair basis where no favoritisms were shown, attention was paid to all parties in our fencing family and assistance was given where needed. No group was forgotten. The means that they made available enabled the office to successfully implement all the actions that were needed.

The Fair Play Council realizes that the Executive Committee decides who will get the Award. We only propose. And it is not done to award a prize to oneself. That is why we think that in this exceptional case we would like to make the decision for you..

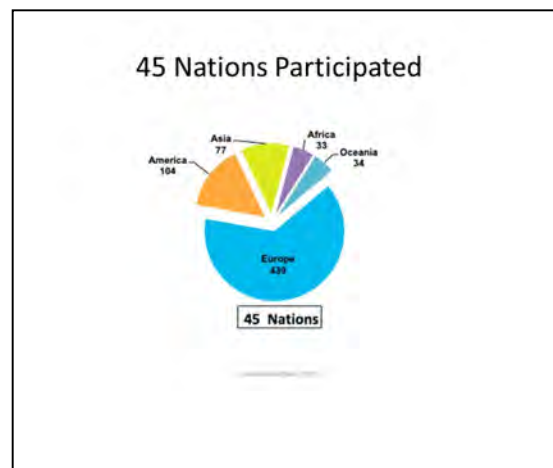

4.1 Overall comments of Cairo Championships

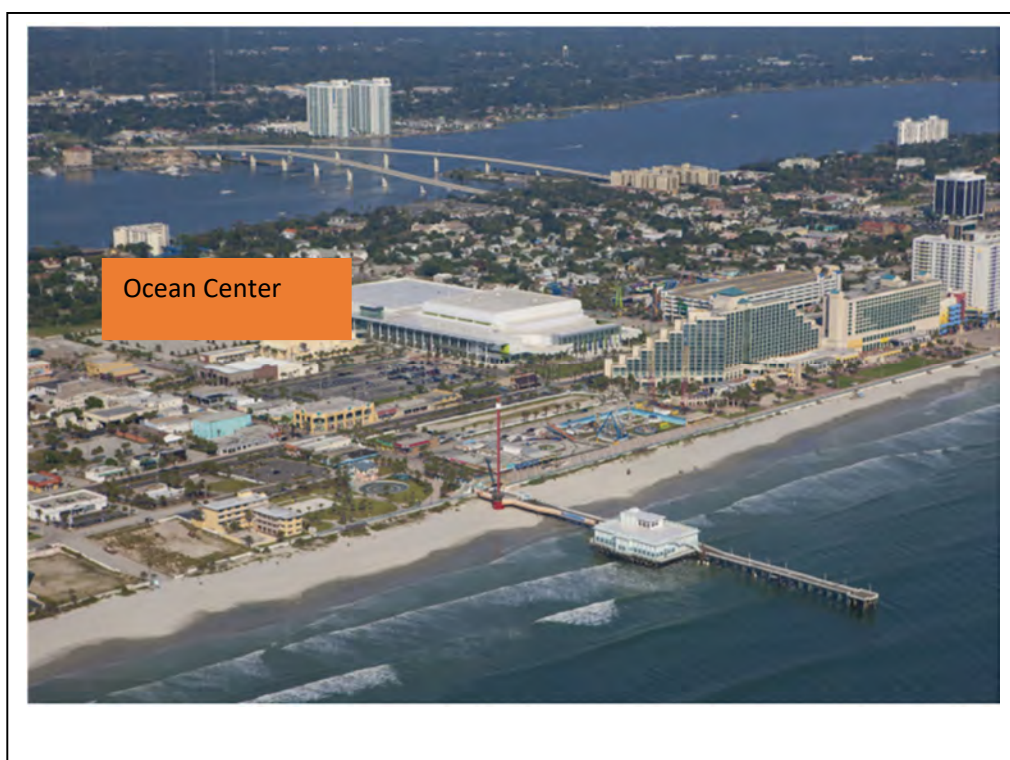
- A very well organised Championship
- Hosts were flexible and willing to listen and made changes in a timely manner.
- Volunteers were very helpful and proactive.
- Excellent tours arranged for fencers.
- DT team was very professional, excellent organisation, with very little down time. With discussion with head of DT, the Council suggested that for subsequent Championships, 4 DTs should be engaged, one appointed by FIE, one from the host Federations, one from Veterans Council and one from the Country organizing the next World Championships.
- Medal presentations were very well executed, and presented by local Federation/City Officials, Veteran Council members and Head of Federations.
- The High Participation Diploma started by Mr Max Geuter MH was very well received and with the Diploma being presented prior to the medal ceremonies and during Gala Dinner provided good acknowledgement for the recipients.
- Good changing rooms with hot water and kept clean all day.
- Live Streaming with commentary was very well received and should be made a standard feature for future Championships.

5. Porec, Croatia 2020 World Championships. This unfortunately had to be cancelled due to COVID-19 pandemic, Croatia will now host the 2022 World Championships. Porec will have a 7-days schedule due to the size of the venue. The organising committee will re-open the website in Q1 2022, they have indicated that a member of the organising committee will be attending the Daytona World Championships as a volunteer to learn and familiarise the complex scheduling and also to observe the Risk-Mitigation procedures.

6. Daytona Florida 2021 World Championships. The Council started to engage USA Fencing in January this year via zoom meetings. Below are some of the details:

- 6.3 Schedule: 6 days

- 7. Joint meeting with Medical Commission: USA Fencing’s preparation of the Championships is progressing well, what the Council’s concerns are the changing pandemic mitigation policies not just in the host Country and Florida State but also participating countries. Below are points raised:
 - 7.1 Will I be allowed to travel to US? Will there be flights to the US from my home country? (Info from your home Country)
 - 7.2 Will I be allowed to land and enter US and onward to Florida? (Info from US State Department? CDC? Florida State?)
 - 7.3 What are the tests I need to take before I board the flight and upon arrival? PCR? Antigen? Antibodies?

- 7.4 Do I need to be quarantined upon arrival in the US?
 - 7.5 Do I need to be quarantined when I return from the US to my home Country?
 - 7.6 What test(s) I need to have upon entering the Championships?
 - 7.7 With vaccines becoming more available in some countries, if I am vaccinated, do I still need to take the tests?
 - 7.8 What additional Medical Insurance will I need for the USA?
8. We are pleased to have Jeremy Summers and Lisa Huzel from the Medical Commission to help us search for information pertaining to entry restrictions and any waivers for entry into the US. RC our Council member from the US will assist USA Fencing to post relevant information on the Championships website. Federations planning to send fencers to the World Championships should ensure their fencers comply to the entry requirement mandated by the host nation and to apply for any entry waivers should that is needed.
- With reference to the 124707 FIE Outline Risk-Mitigation Requirements for National Fencing Federations and Competition Organizers in the Context of COVID-19, Medical Commission will update the diagnostics tests (and any procedures) fencers need to take, as the document was prepared over a year ago and we already have vaccines available now. We will need USA fencing to confirm all the clauses are in compliance to the items listed in Appendix A of the said document (RC to help liaise)
9. Day 1 of the meeting was adjourned at 5pm CET and will reconvene on Saturday 1pm CET.
 10. EK welcome Council members back for the second day.
 11. Rules Update: Confirming updates of Rules o.75.1, o.103.1, o.103.9 and o.108. EK suggested a slightly different points structure for 0.108. A short meeting was requested by Rules Commission to clarify o.108. Discussion was to continue post Meeting.
 12. World Veteran Fencing Facebook page, this page was set up in 2015 originally as Senior Plus, but this name was not popular hence an update of the page name to World Veteran Fencing. The posts are mostly veteran fencers showing fencing photos of bygone years and some veteran competitions worldwide. There are about 5K followers, this is not an official Council page, just a social group for general fencing information exchange for veterans.
 13. Joint meeting with PCM commission, the meeting was requested by the PCM commission to see if they can help with promoting the Daytona World Championships. A few ideas were put forward, David Baker will collate and to discuss post meeting between the 2 groups.
 14. Veteran competitions to “add-on” at the last day of Senior, Under-23 or Junior Competitions, this is a European Veterans initiative being explored by LP to utilize competition set up with pistes and referees available to host a veteran competition (of the same weapon as the host event), most likely on the last day of the competition. LP discussed with a few organizers and will continue to explore this and hope to arrange a test event if one is available.
 15. Regional Challenges: All regions have regular veteran events, and some have already started a structured competition circuit, although not all these regions are at the same development rate. CO mentioned that

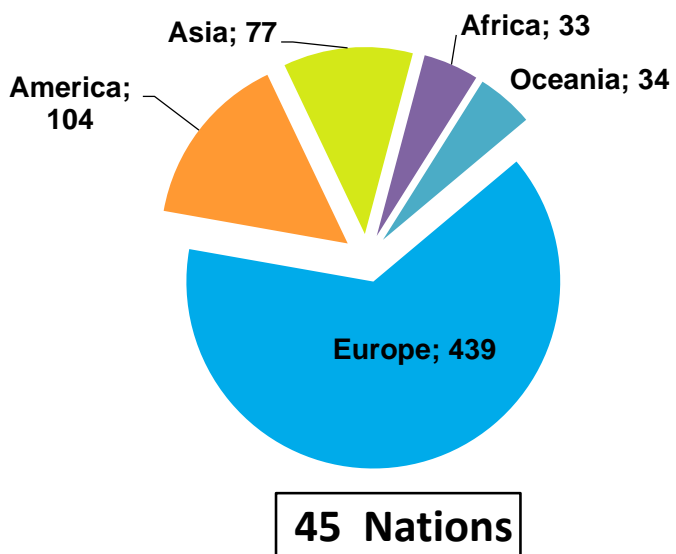
Europe has established veteran circuits and ranking system. RC indicated US has Regional Organized Circuit event (ROCs), Oceania has well developed veteran competitions in concurrent with their senior competitions (MR), FK indicated that quite a few countries in Asia have regular veteran events and a veteran circuit was started 2 years ago, it is now on hold due to the pandemic. We do need more information from Africa and South America to complete the picture. With the growth and interest shown in veteran fencing in mind, CO suggested that we should investigate a Confederation Challenge to aid exchange and add excitement among regions especially after the prolong period of lockdown. CO will put together a discussion document on how a regional challenge might work.

16. Immediate actions/follow up:

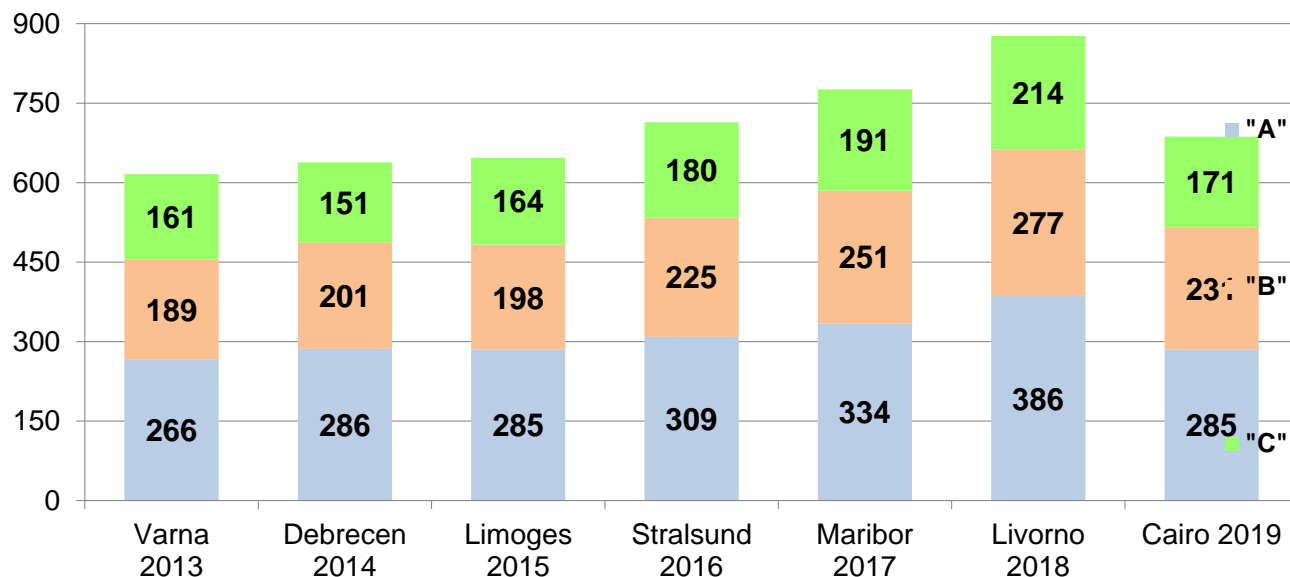

FIE Women and Fencing Council Minutes of the Meeting

Friday, June 25 2021

Meeting started at 13:06 (Lausanne time)

1. **Member check-in** – please share with us the status of COVID in your country and tell us how fencing is doing and what kind of impacts COVID is having into the future of fencing (3 minutes).

Georgina – New strain with new restrictions. fencing in clubs but with restrictions. No worries with local fencing though local businesses are challenged. The challenge is for Brits to be allowed to compete abroad.

Therese – professional and national teams allowed to train. 19 fencers caught the virus. Clubs closed due to curfews. May: minors fencers allowed but outside; June 9 venues opened for adults. Lost 30% of licenses, cannot pay fencing masters. Government pays for licenses, economic support for employers including sports. FFE provided Euros 1,200,000.00 for clubs. Federations lost 20% of members.

Marilee – Delta strain is causing new restrictions.

Helen – 910 people died of COVID in Australia in 2020-21, each state/territory has its own border restrictions; strict tracking, Sydney currently stricter due to presence of Delta strain; Fencing had no competitions until 2 months ago; some states/territories are on lockdown so fencers cannot travel; Oceania: have planned competitions but not sure if they will be postponed until all countries in the region are able to travel.

Veena- Severe lockdown; all sports affected (no fencing at all) but plan to start in July; Government is supportive of sport so expect renewed interest by July. Alexandra – went to Kenya brought equipment for new interest in fencing in Kenya.

Mirani – Brasil has 35% vaccinated; competition started with restrictions; separated per weapon; some do not follow restrictions during competition; 2,000 deaths per day. Each state has different restrictions; National team is training in Europe. Austria is opening with restrictions very limited number per slot, scheduling required.

Melissa- El Salvador since June 2020 free from lockdown; Since September activities are “normal”. Situation for sport is limited; only national team allowed to fence. Fencing has no competitions yet. Only a few sports have “free space” such as surfing. Now fencing is training by weapons with different schedules, hopefully by

August training for beginners might start again; by Sept maybe competition will start. Generally, conditions are good: not too many restrictions; masks required and people are cooperating. 2M vaccinated; 500,000 with 2 doses. There's a big hospital just for Covid. Hope everything will be better soon.

Ahmed – In Algeria very strict; sanitary protocol inside and outdoors; Masks and social distancing obligatory; Specific Holiday for women with children working; People with comorbidities are advised to stay home; no restaurants allowed to operate. Sport: Only football allowed to train but with no spectators; only those training for Olympics are allowed. Massive number of vaccinations are being performed as quickly as possible; 5 or 6 deaths per day is the rate.

Stacey – With 326.68 M population, USA has vaccinated close to 70% of the country; currently vaccinating children; 14,000 new cases daily. Worried now about UK variant but mostly for those who are not vaccinated. Everything has been open for a while, with 2 major fencing competitions being held so far. The national team has been in a bubble training in Colorado Springs. US Fencing is receiving funds. There's a new fencing administration for USA Fencing. Schools are now open too. Maybe within a year everything might be getting back to normal.

2. Prepared for meeting with Legal Commission – Discussion of new policy draft

(See attached).

Stacey: Georgina will do the presentation since she had the larger hand in preparing the document. Stacey will outline the Safe Sport discussion from Bucharest (2017) as a forerunner before turning over to Georgina. Safe Sport – gave example of women sabre fencers complaining of harassment from referees.

Georgina: Fencing is done in a respectful environment. Off the back of respect, you can educate and discuss equality. Start a conversation of what a future council will look like and how we get there.

Helen: Quoting the Basic Principles under the FIE Statutes:

'The FIE objective is "to place sport at the service of the harmonious development of humankind, with a view to promoting a peaceful society concerned with the preservation of human dignity. The practice of sport is a human right.

In order for the fencing world to progress as a whole, solidarity between the strong and the weak is an undeniable requisite, whether it be between continents, federations or athletes. This vision must become real. Our common singular motto: fencing together, universal fencing.

Fencing combines with cohesion and balance physical and mental skills, among other things: athletic qualities, dexterity, reaction, speed, creativity, anticipation and adaptability. Fencing is based on the fundamental values of the Olympic Movement, especially: respect of the athletes, officials, referees and spectators, politeness, loyalty, sportsmanship, discipline and observance of the rules.'

And under the FIE Mission:

‘j) to ensure that the principle of non-discrimination on the grounds of race, sex, ethnicity, religion, political opinions, family status or other, is respected. ‘

Georgina suggested to Helen to bring in the Statute during our conversation with the Legal Commission. Helen highlighted how the Statute is aligned with our proposal.

Georgina:

Rationale:

The FIE is committed to supporting a world of fencing that provides equality of opportunity to all. We are very proud to have increased the numbers of countries that are represented in fencing and therefore also increased the diversity of people with the opportunity to participate in the sport. We recognise that there are groups of people that are under-represented. Providing more equality of access and opportunity for under-represented groups in fencing across the world will accelerate global participation in fencing and create a stronger, more diverse and inclusive sport. This in turn will demonstrate our ongoing commitment to upholding Olympic values and continue to maintain the FIE’s reputation for leadership in these issues.

The Women & Fencing Council (WFC) is currently working on behalf of women and fencing, this proposed new Council will address the needs of other under-represented groups.

Stacey: Suggested a 15-minute break then discuss Safe Sport before meeting with Legal.

BREAK

Stacey: discuss Safe Sport and asked Georgina for an update.

Georgina: On the global level of Safe Sport; the pandemic has given athletes time to think about what has happened to them. Not aware if lockdown has caused fencers to come out complaining about problems. Before lockdown there was some resistance to the Safe Sport message. It was viewed as an attack on coaches and referees. Create presentations about respect and inclusion as the key message. Not to say that “you are a criminal”, push that to the side and emphasize that we are building a better environment together. Second opportunity to create the message (carefully). Perhaps set up webinars to have different countries talk about Safe Sport situation in their country. Opportunity to offer a conversation so that people can translate it in terms of fencing. Can start this after the Olympics since Bureau is currently focused on Tokyo.

Veena: Have other countries talked about their safeguarding situation?

Georgina: We need to be able to conduct this training in different languages. Spanish for Spanish speaking countries, etc.

Stacey: Safeguarding people for FIE to create a grid of countries that have started on Safe Sport just not find out where we are. Suggest for FIE to send out a survey.

Melissa: Last training course for coaches in 2019 Safe Sport was talked about. Discussed the form that’s on the FIE website. It showed that coaches were afraid. Everybody believes that it’s not happening in sport, but needs

to be introduced in a programme. Maybe include a few sessions in Coaches Training and perhaps also in Referee seminars in Panamerica. Fighting to include the topic in the training course but very difficult to convince the national federations. Everyone is in denial.

Georgina: Trying to encourage referees and coaches that they can create an environment that is more friendly and open.

Mirani: In general people think Safe Sport is just about sexual harassment. Show coaches that there's more to Safe Sport than sexual abuse, also teach them about other forms of abuse.

Stacey: Asked Helen if COMEX has discussed Safe Sport.

Helen: Not discussed in any detail in the past 1.5 years. The focus of the discussions in the COMEX has been mostly on the Olympics and Covid.

Stacey: Opportunity to ask Ahmed his view on Safe Sport and if he's heard from any of the coaches on their view on Safe Sport. He can discuss now and pick up on it after Legal meeting.

Ahmed: Algeria is a Muslim country so we don't speak about this issue, but groups of intellectual people who think about the issue discuss this problem. Everybody is responsible for his own life and nobody has the right to interfere in the life of others. Algeria is a Muslim country so it's difficult to discuss this. Muslims do not want to hear about this.

Meeting with Legal Commission at 15:00H.

Stacey:

Background: This is a proposal that may be put forward in the next quadrennial. In 2017 the Women and Fencing Council introduced the idea of Safe Sport in the FIE, and in a year or two, the IOC came to mandate this work. In the US with the Black Lives movement and problems with different governing bodies in sport (gymnastics, swimming, etc.) started the idea of introducing a broader perspective of attention that needed to be paid to diversity, equity, and inclusion. WFC discussed this and worked with Sam on an appropriate approach. Stacey asked the Legal Commission to focus on two areas: get feedback on the proposal itself and provide comments or recommendations on the best process to take it forward.

Georgina's presentation: diversity, equity and inclusion are now becoming common discussion and focus points all over the world.

Helen: brought up the Basic Principles of the FIE Charter and connected them with the basis of our proposal.

Georgina: presented the Rationale and then the Proposed Statute.

Sam Cheris: Any council can request a change in their charter. WFC proposes to expand from representing only women to that of care and concern for any under-represented group(s). One approach is to get several countries or groups to propose the same or similar proposal to make it easier.

Sam Cheris: We cannot decide where to go right now but leave that decision to the next Council and next Legal Commission.

Stacey: The WFC will come to Legal at a later date and ask how to best proceed. The Council believes that going through the Legal Commission ensures a good review and sound grounding within the current FIE Statutes.

After discussion concluded, Stacey thanked the Legal Commission, and the Women and Fencing Council moved back to their own meeting room.

After Legal Commission meeting

3. A brief discussion of how the meeting went with Legal. Next, discuss any Safe Sport issues such as Therese's report on sexual violence work in France.

Stacey: It was a very good conversation with the Legal Commission and they committed to include the topic of change in their next agenda after the November elections. Stacey believes that a most likely way to proceed might be that they will eventually choose one Council.

Helen: Having one Council will be good. The next council will have at least 30% gender representation. Hopefully 50:50, which will be perfect for the new broadened council and agenda.

Veena: Peter's view on having two councils moving in different directions needs to be taken into account.

Stacey: Happy with how the WFC presented and believes Legal was pleased with the process as well.

Mirani: In the next quadrennial it might be good to have the next Women Fencing Council composed of 50:50 gender then it would be easier to suggest just one commission.

Stacey: The minutes of this meeting will help the next Council to have a better feel of the topic.

Report on France and work on Sexual Violence:

Therese: The situation in France is moving little by little. The Minister is a woman and very sensitive to this topic. Many women have recently come forward to complain about sexual harassment. Unfortunately, women are speaking after 13 years which is past the statute of limitations. However, as a consequence more women are coming forward. The actions of the athletes have resulted in the Minister conducting the National Convention on the Prevention of Sexual Violence in Sport.

The National Federation doesn't seem to be concerned about the issue.

Axe 1: collect all alerts and administrative proceedings begin. Sports ministry investigate and legal proceedings next, if necessary.

Axe 2: Before legal action.

Axe 3: Prevention Call 119 for complaints then post on gymnasiums, etc. or other places where minors frequent.

Axe 4: Creation in each territory of France and obligation of Ministry of Sport. In FFE not many cases, but more women are beginning to speak on this problem. Evolving because the athletes have started to discuss the issue. More attention to Minors. Minors should be protected. A Link has been proposed for anonymous reporting but personal information needs to be added for follow up. Women are afraid of being accused of defamation so they hesitate to file a complaint.

Stacey: Fantastic of Therese to present what is happening in France. At least in the US there are two things happening. Sexual violence will fall under Safe Sport. What has happened in gymnastics and swimming and other sports, Safe Sport has been developed to address this. But other issues of harassment are building.

Therese: ASOIF sent information on results of survey. FIE is among those mentioned in good governance section. Looked into other Federations. Integrity. In the FIE link there are 4 chapters but 2 of which need log in. First chapter in the FIE link where any person can request to report anonymously but personal information might be good to add for follow ups. Suggest to make it the FIE's responsibility to investigate (this was found in other federations).

Stacey: Therese to write a one-page recommendation for a number of types of complaints and for Georgina and Sam to bring this to FIE through Safe Sport.

Georgina: This was already discussed with FIE and the cost of setting up an international structure for such a number, plus the complexities of the legalities of dealing with other countries were the problems. Check administrative rules on Safeguarding and base proposal on that. Mechanisms have already been introduced, for example, Coaches are required to have licenses.

Helen: Disagrees with the idea of having an international hotline for the FIE as a whole. It might be better for each national federation to have one. This will also avoid the legal issues in each country. However, it is important to have something like this.

Georgina: Suggests conducting a survey with national federations on what they are doing with Safe Sport. Wonder if this kind of information is what is needed to decide on what the FIE can do regarding how to tackle the issue. *Note: for next Council to take up this issue.*

Mirani: The sports federations working with the NOCs created a hotline for Federations to use. Each Federation has a hotline. More cases coming out.

4. Discussion of WFC accomplishments to date and created a final list to be given the new Council this Fall.
5. Will IOC hold a Women's Conference in 2021 or 2022? Find out who is available and interested in attending so the Council can move quickly (pending reappointments of course).

Melissa and Georgina interested to go. Veena 3rd person in case one of the others is not available.

6. Stacey asked the Council members to please not give up on creating Women's Leadership Training – discuss possibilities.

Stacey: Hopeful that the next Council will not lose this desire. Sam Cheris started a training course with USA Fencing. It includes diversity and inclusivity information and how US Fencing basically works. If the Council expands to diversity and inclusion this would be good to start. *Note: Something for the next group to discuss.*

Mirani: Suggest the Leadership training offered by ASOIF under Gabriela Mueller.

Stacey: Suggest having the ASOIF training and also providing information about the history and functioning of the FIE within the Olympic family.

Mirani: Austria is starting a program with Gabriela and could possibly be used by the FIE, perhaps in different languages

Veena: Suggest that the FIE conducts the same program.

Helen: The FIE has been conducting administrative webinars for Confederations and it might be a good idea to offer leadership training in the same format.

7. **Discussion of key work with other Commissions to consider enlisting their help/support for future activities.** For example, what about work connected to offering further education and training, particularly around racism and sexism? Recommending books to read for all Commissions/Councils, etc.

Stacey: Assignment for the next day because day one is coming to a close: Each one to make a list of what has been accomplished by the WFC. Next task is that we will provide suggested key objectives for the next quadrennial to give WFC a place from which to start.

Helen: Happy with how Stacey has led the Council in coming up with the new proposal and preparing and working with Sam and Georgina on it.

Georgina: Points out that everybody should be giving each other a pat on the back. Everyone has contributed through the great conversations we've had.

Stacey: Thanks Therese for bringing up topics that can be discussed and connecting them with what the Council is working on.

Stacey: Recaps first day meeting to bring Evelyn up to date.

- Covid Update from everyone.
- Prepared for Legal meeting
- Very good dialogue/meeting with Legal potentially changing Council's name & remit. Legal divided on whether creating another Council or just expanding remit of WFC. Legal willing to work on it in the first year after elections.
- To create an award and recommend to the new Council they might consider Celso Dayrit as the first recipient.
- Helen asked to add plans of the members who are standing for elections.

Stacey called to each Council member to share their list of the WFC's accomplishments. Secondly, we will discuss key objectives to leave for suggestions for the next WFC.

Georgina: In 2019 there was a huge amount of work to put safeguarding into the rules of the FIE. She completed IOC training in Safe Sport. The initiative has started, though much more work is needed to be done.

Helen; The big accomplishment is finally getting the 30% gender representation. Although it took a long time but it was certainly a big win. Initially, it was 30% in the COMEX then 30% in Councils and Commissions.

Mirani: more communication with other Commissions was developed by reaching out to other Commissions. We improved communications as well. We have shown what is happening in the world and helped to motivate others in support of gender equity.

Veena: Being part of the Council has given us a voice in the world of fencing. We have more confidence and opened the door to opportunities for fencing in our respective countries.

Melissa: Evident in the last competition before Covid that there has been an increase in appointments of women in the DT and more very good women referees. In Pan American Confederation having more women is always in the agenda. Nice to see more women in competitions.

Stacey: Thanked Melissa for always pushing for more referee and coaching training for women.

Therese: New FFE president wants the formation of more women as fencing masters, more referees, but unfortunately, no women. There's a new law in France that in the executive committee that gender representation should be 50:50. In effect, women are encouraged to come forward.

Stacey: Data that Therese has collected through the years has given us a new level of data gathering techniques for WFC.

Helen: That data has been used in our proposal to show that there are not enough training/exposure of women and new referees in FIE competitions. FIE has then come back and proposed that there would be 15% in 2020 ,20% in 2021 and 25% in 2022. The Referee Commission has agreed to using 2 women and 2 new referees in Junior World Cups, unfortunately this has been held off by Covid.

Stacey: Therese to hold on to the idea that there's a lack of accurate data on the FIE website. This is something for the next Council to keep in mind and work with the FIE to resolve.

Helen: I can provide data on referee/ITO assignments in the last 18 months.

Veena: Experience in collecting data in previous years: many of the data provided is obsolete.

Georgina: FIE has promised to collect data on referees. No need for us to collect data and publish something that might be proven incorrect.

Helen: The Referee Commission produces detailed data on referee activities that is presented to the COMEX. The question is the WFC allowed to have access to it?

Stacey: We started with working with the Referee Commission on training more women. The FIE provided support and funding to these efforts.

Evelyn: For Coaching courses there's the opportunity to send 2 coaches if you send 1 woman.

Stacey: One of the ways of addressing coaches' training is working with the Athletes Commission because future coaches will come from Athletes.

Marilee: We've changed the culture in the FIE by making people aware and thinking about under-represented groups, we helped to introduced Safe Sport program, we started discussions on sustainability, among others.

Helen: The fact that 3 women were sent to the ASOIF leadership training which was a result of the proposal Stacey made to the FIE in 2020 on Women Leadership training. We didn't get far with it, but we do have the document and we can use that for a further proposal for the new Council.

Georgina: We have to collect and choose which materials we will share with the new Council.

Stacey: FIE has not had the habit of posting all of the minutes/handouts of our previous meetings.

Georgina: She is happy to create a shared drop box.

Stacey: Elena Murdaca has been provided all the materials; we just need to get them shared to a public place.

Georgina: We must prepare all materials we need to share with the next Council in case FIE doesn't do it.

Stacey: We can ask Elena to put up all documents.

Helen: I've collected all materials in all these years and happy enough to share it with the FIE in case the FIE does not have them.

Veena: Some of us may join the new WFC for virtual handover.

Stacey: Marilee won the IOC Women and Sports Trophy for Asia then consequently has been appointed into the IOC Communications Commission – this is a big accomplishment!

Veena: Stacey, Mirani and Veena attended the IOC Women's Leadership Training.

Stacey: We created plans for ourselves each quadrennial that we have worked collectively to achieve. We may not have achieved everything, but we have achieved most of our plans in increasing gender equity in governance, helping more women get opportunities for refereeing, DT; we also started to build data for our uses; and finally we have improved Communications and Social Media as you will see in Mirani's report.

Melissa – All the work has had an impact. One club in Chile started to have meetings and the president of the club is now president of the Chilean Federation; He wants to introduce a Week for Women and wants to involve more women in the federation. It has a strong impact in the fencing community. It is the beginning of more such activities.

Stacey- When we started there were no Women and Fencing Councils in other countries and now they are in many countries. The US has a very strong one now, for example.

Helen – Women and Fencing Council in Asia unfortunately has not been active in recent years probably because of cultural issues.

Stacey: France pledged for an all-female DT and more women referees in one of their junior events.

Veena: wants to talk to Helen offline on establishing Women and Fencing Council in Africa.

Helen: Can provide with documents of Asian Women and Fencing Council.

Georgina: Suggest to start with Equality, Diversity and Inclusion since there has been an explosion on EDI.

Veena: Might not be a good idea as situation in Africa is different. As a first step it might be better to start with women.

Stacey: In the US Olympic Committee, many of the national governing bodies have EDI directors now. There is a big push on EDI and on the collection of data to prove efficacy.

Evelyn: High focus in recent years. In the Aussie OC, there's been a big push on inclusion.

Therese: Not a big push in France but with Laura Flessel as new Minister, she believes there will be. A new law might be introduced to encourage inclusion in all sports.

Ahmed: On the first year of the French coaching school in Algeria, there were 9 participants 2 of which were Algerian Women. On the second year, there were 4 from Algeria and 3 other African women. After moving to the Cultural Ministry, there were 3 Algerian Women and 3 other African women. There's also an Algerian female referee who is of international calibre. Out of 25 referees in Algeria, 4 are women.

Stacey: Support the efforts of Africa with Novak on training more women as referees and coaches.

Ahmed: Asked to be excused from the meeting because he is working today.

Yuko: Apologized for not having contributed much but being a member of the commission has been useful to her with her work in Japan Fencing Association and Tokyo 2020. In February, Tokyo 2020 President resigned and now we have a female president and thanks to that they have established the group on gender equity, diversity and inclusion. Now more women in high positions in Tokyo 2020 structure. Changes are happening in Japanese sports and hopefully what's happening in Tokyo 2020 will cascade down to the rest of the sporting community in Japan. Now, everybody is more tolerant and supportive of me despite being a new mom, which wouldn't have been possible in previous years.

Helen: Tokyo 2020 has produced a lot of change in Japan due to the IOC's influence.

Stacey: Women and Fencing Council has impacted all of us individually in our own personal growth. Through each of us we are able to connect with others that helped our work ultimately to move forward.

8. Review proposals and elections information that we know about concerning the 2021 FIE Elective Congress. Does the new group want to plan a quick meeting at this Congress? Who will be there?

Mirani, Melissa, Therese, Georgina, Marilee and Veena are interested in being reappointed. . The deadline for nomination is on October 17, midnight Lausanne time and the Congress will be on November 27.

Helen: Congress will be 1 day and will be available virtually, but not yet sure if election can be done online, but proxies can be handed to others.

Except for Stacey, everyone is planning to go, but depends on the Covid situation.

Helen: Not sure yet if she will be reappointed as the liaison between COMEX and Women and Fencing Council, but is interested in continuing to do it. Current members should let the WFC know if anyone is interested in nominating for any Commission.

Stacey: Sada Jacobson will be put forward by the US for WFC.

Helen: I volunteer to pull together a meeting during Congress.

Audience together we are stronger.pdf

Growing number of people reached (numbers in 2020 jumped by 62% as compared with 2019). The graph shows that people reached are growing every year as well as engagements (engagements numbers rose by 48% from 2019 to 2020). In 2019 and 2020 the increase was because more people were online due to the pandemic. We can also see who is watching. More men are reading our materials and from which countries. We have to think about the materials we use to put out the correct messages about whatever we want to share. We can use this to introduce Safe Sport.

People are hungry for new information and hungry for inspiration. Aside from fencing videos, it would be good to use other materials because people are obviously hungry for information.

We have growing numbers and we can reach more, but we need to think more about our message.

Since more men are reached, we can choose what message we want to send that could influence men's thinking regarding SafeSport, etc.

Helen: Suggest we prepare a communication plan and convince the FIE to provide funding for this.

Mirani: Prepare suggestions on materials to post. Has communicated with Elena on whatever the FIE posted and post it right away on the WFC page. So WFC and FIE cooperating on this.

Mirani then asked to be excused as she has work matters to attend to.

Key 2024 Objectives

- Request confederations to appoint Safeguarding officers at zonal events. Recommend more training for Safeguarding officers. The next iterations should be linked with other Commissions and Councils; recommendations from them. Improvement in training and gathering a group of people that the FIE can draw from.
- All World Cups to provide Safeguarding officers (can be local organizer's person) Supervisor is safeguarding officer.
- Make recommendations to improve or enhance safeguarding obligations in FIE Code of Conduct. Ongoing review and enhancement of FIE Code of Conduct and Safeguarding. Seek clarity where safeguarding will reside and how the new WFC will play into it. Perhaps education and prevention training is better suited for WFC.
- Mirani to create Media/Communication plan linking it with the different FIE commissions and councils and the Bureau.
- Rebrand leadership training program. Revisit our proposal on Leadership training based on the previous proposal. Preferably available online. And maximizing use of existing programs already available. Use ASOIF training and the FIE to handle the FIE structure.
- In year 1 for the new Council interview women in other commissions and councils to talk about what they are doing.
- Request funding for female coaches shadowing program at FIE major events. Reach out to Coaches Council to increase training opportunities for female coaches.
- Explore hidden systemic barriers to licensing officials (referee pathways) In the European Fencing Confederation, referees are required to work at a certain number of competitions before they can be recommended to be an FIE referee. However, if a female referee stops because of childbirth then she has to start over. Federations are not cooperative in sending out women to FIE referee examinations. There should be a mechanism for an independent route where female referees can come forward because they are not supported by the national federation. Mechanism where somebody can complain that they are suffering prejudice.
- Identify candidates for annual IOC Women and Sports Trophy. Create a list in advance. Clarify with FIE (Nathalie) on the sign off process so that deadlines can be met.
- Conduct an active research survey onequity. Continue the data collection work on women's activities in fencing and maintain the historic view about how things are changing. Conduct surveys with FIE endorsement to make it mandatory to ensure everybody responds to create more balanced data. Make it mandatory for federations to respond to surveys to collect data. Explore reporting methods.

- Engage more with Athletes Commission about what they want in equity, diversity and inclusion. Suggest “listening” events where WFC can invite athletes and listen to what they want.
- Encourage education and training to help us achieve equity. The education that we engage with should be focused in this area. It should address topics including systematic racism, social injustice, bias and microaggressions, in addition to sexual, emotional and physical violence training. Georgina suggests though that we focus more on biases that actually exists in fencing such as in coaching, refereeing, etc. and not too much on the higher social issues.
- Engage more with Communication, Marketing and Promotion Commission to clarify image and communication
- Social media messages/engagement with materials to communicate safeguarding in the Zonals as well.

On the impact of gender focused committees, essentially, the organizations where 21% of male make up the group are more effective than having less men. If gender quotas are enforced, then it is effective but there should be some follow through with it, otherwise it will have an opposite effect.

12. **Closing comments from all Council members.**

Perhaps our Commission could reflect on the impact of women in the Olympics through the years. I’ve enjoyed my time in the Council.

Note: Add to Objectives: Support the development of the historical perspective of women in the Sport.

Melissa: Thank you Everybody. It’s a new experience for me and I learned from everyone. Thank you, Stacey for being such a great role model for us. Hope we can continue to work together in the future. Whether we are together in the council or not. Everything I have learned from everyone is helping me in achieving my goals.

Evelyn: It’s been great to have worked together in the last few years. Didn’t put my hand much because with involvements in the Olympic Committee and diversity committees in other areas. Will keep in touch with everyone and interact in areas where we can.

Georgina: Thank you Stacey. It was difficult for us to get anything achieved and thank you Stacey for keeping us together and pushing us. We should be proud of what we’ve done though we might want to do more. Enjoyed all my time and hope it continues in the next council and am inspired at what everyone has achieved so far. Thank you, Stacey and everyone. It has been inspiring. Good luck to everyone going to Tokyo.

Yuko: Very happy to hear Georgina's comments on Tokyo 2020 but really happy that it is getting organized and sad about Celso's passing away who recommended me to this Council. Very happy to have been a member of this Council. The most important thing is meeting everyone. I was inspired and happy for everyone's support. It has been challenging because of my little English. I was really happy to watch all our efforts in the Congress. I know this is not the end and I will keep in touch with everyone and will try to use everything I have learned. Stacey you will be influential in sports and the fencing world. Not sad to see you leave because I know we will have a different relationship. Thank you, Helen for all the support in all the COMEX meetings.

Stacey: It will be ok. Anyone of us will help you. Know that and take that courage with you.

2. Future female leaders need: TRAINING, SUPPORT AND ENCOURAGEMENT.
3. Women's Committees need: STATUS AND POWER and men need to be involved.

On Wednesday July 1st 2020, Sports Minister Roxana Maracineanu organized the "Time 2" of the **National Convention on the Prevention of Sexual Violence in Sport** to take stock of the actions implemented in recent months:

- 445 reported cases in April 2021
 - * 90% sexual including 17% of high level athletes
 - * 10% psych-physical (during training)
 - * 83% women including 82% minors (65% - 15 years old)
- Where
 - * mostly in clubs. Rarely in high-level structures
- Who
 - * +70% of educators (80% of whom are professionals)
 - * referees, athletes between them (egg: hazing)
 - * 46 federations concerned
