**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We now move to the second item of the agenda, The Addresses to the Congress, and I invite the President of the Swiss Federation to come to the tribune.

**Lars Frauchiger (SUI):** Dear Mr President, Dear members of the Executive Committee, Commissions and Councils, Dear delegates, fencing family, FIE personnel, Dear friends, It is a pleasure to meet here in Lausanne for an Annual Congress. I wish to welcome all of you here in Switzerland.

It is a great honour for me to address Congress again. Last year we were still struggling with a lot of Covid issues. The competitions had just resumed at the international level. A lot of efforts had been made in terms of security and measures against Covid. The organisers of the competitions had a great responsibility. For the athletes and the delegations, it was not always easy. But we stood together, and fencing became possible again at the international level. On top of that, we all had to work for the number of fencers in our Federations to rise again. We had to fight against the problem of losing the number of fencers who no longer came to training. We had to do everything to bring them back. We had to fight for our members. It took us a lot of work, and I think we all succeeded. For this, I am also proud of our fencing family.

Today, Covid is still present. We see it right here, but we face other, maybe bigger problems. We suffer from the energy crisis, inflation, and war – problems we did not see coming one year ago. We also do not know how this will develop in the future. But nevertheless, our sport, sport in general, still exists. We love our sport, and we want to be joyful. We want to be able to meet, to train, to compete. But can we close our eyes to the world around us? This Congress will discuss this matter later. I sincerely hope for the right decision.

Last but not least, I would like to thank the office of the FIE for organizing this Congress one more time. Dear Madame Rodriguez, dear Nathalie! Many thanks to you and your team for this effort and big work. And thank you for the work for the FIE and our sport in general. I know the last years were not easy at all. Your team and you did an amazing job.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you very much.

**Lars Frauchiger (SUI):** I wish you, I wish us a good Congress. Let's work for our sport. Thank you.

This Congress is an historical Congress because it is the 100th Congress in the history of the International Fencing Federation.

It is such a great pleasure to be with you again, in person, and to enjoy this gathering of people from all parts of the world. Our agenda is very heavy today and contains various very important items.

So my speech will be short because we have a lot of work. I am certain that our Congress will conduct its work on that basis and will do its best to ensure the smooth continuation of the FIE and our sport, leading to its further development in the future. I understand that the FIE constitutes a global family made up of many different cultures, points of view, of course, and backgrounds. But above all, a family, we are a family. Always say this because we need it. And it is this diversity that creates our strength. It comes from an understanding of combining each other's best qualities and collaborating with each other, always in the spirit of solidarity, respect, and unity.

Standing united will allow us to face any obstacle and move forward, always protecting the interest of our Federation and our sport, of course.

I am convinced of the strong foundation on which our fencing community is based and confident that fencing will reach new heights in the future. I wish us a very successful Congress. Thank you very much.

*Applause.*

### 3. Ratification of the New Federations

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We move to the next item, which is the Ratification of the New Federations. We will skip this point because though we received some applications this year, they are still in process. So, we have no new Federations to ratify.

Just a reminder, the voting will be done electronically, and you have received on your table the explanation on the voting device, which you know perfectly by now.

The Congress participants who want to speak must announce their Federation and name and then come to the microphones installed in each alley.

The Commission of Honours, which is made of all the Members of Honour present at the Congress will meet just after the photo of the Congress during the lunch break.

## 4. Ratification of the Executive Committee's decisions regarding the appointment of the Interim President

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item on the agenda is the Ratification of the Executive Committee's Decisions Regarding the Appointment of the Interim President. You all have received the urgent letter regarding this item, and if you do not have any questions, we are going... Yes?

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Good morning, everyone. Good morning, Mr. President, and Fellow Fencers and Friends of Fencing. On this point, I would like to ask, as the President of the Swedish Fencing Federation, why, since the self-suspension of Mr. Usmanov was enforced earlier this year, why has there not been an appointment of a new Secretary-General knowing, that our current President, Mr. Katsiadakis or Interim President, if you will, has then stepped down from the position as Secretary-General and assumed the Interim Presidency? We are currently missing a Secretary-General. Why has there not been an appointment for such a position?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Because the Interim President also assumes the role of Secretary-General.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Assuming you would answer that, and interpreting the Statutes of the FIE, we in Sweden interpret them in a way that we cannot have two Presidents at one time. There is no part of the Statutes of the FIE that enables someone to self-suspend oneself. Therefore, according to us, we only have one President now, and the President now of the FIE is Mr. Katsiadakis, who started off as Secretary-General and then took over as President when President Usmanov took his self-suspension, and therefore, we are missing a Secretary-General at the moment.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Not exactly.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** That is exactly how we interpret it. I would be very surprised if all of you would agree with me because you have never agreed with me. But that is how we interpret the Statutes, and we are allowed to make interpretations, Madam.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** I sometimes agree with you, not always, I agree.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** No, I was not referring to you, Madam, to the audience.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** No, but there is a gap in the FIE Statutes on that issue, and an interpretation is not a clear text. We do not have it, Congress and the FIE did not plan for that situation. So we can interpret it, that's clear. What we are asking now is the Congress to ratify the decision of the Executive Committee, which was sent to all Federations at the beginning of March.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** And then my reply to that is that the Swedish Federation is absolutely against that, and we think that Mr. Katsiadakis should be appointed the real President, if you will, not Interim, until the next presidential elections in 2024, and swiftly a new Secretary-General should be appointed.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** This is, again, an interpretation because Alisher Usmanov has been elected by the Congress; he self-suspended himself. And the Executive Committee made the decision to appoint the Secretary-General of the FIE as Interim President.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** We believe that is against the Statutes. And we also know that from the past when similar situations have occurred in the Executive Committee, for instance, a number of years ago when there was a change in political leadership in China, at the same time, there was an Executive Committee member from China who then suddenly could not travel and meet up in the Executive Committee meetings for a repeated or prolonged period of time, then that person was removed from the Executive Committee because of no show, and currently, we can conclude that the former President, Mr. Usmanov, is not showing up at the meetings, and therefore, cannot be the President of the Executive Committee and the FIE.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Not exactly. It is true that in the past, one Chinese member of the Executive Committee was absent. The Statutes say that in case of absence after two years, two years, then that person is considered as having resigned. And this is why, at that moment, the next member non-elected of the Executive Committee came into the Executive Committee. It was after two years, and this is what the Statutes say, two years.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Then we can agree on that part of the Statutes. That at least leaves me with the problem that there is no definition that there is no such thing as self-suspension with the right to come back. And that is why Mr. Katsiadakis must be appointed President of the FIE until the next elections.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** I think it is up to Congress to decide if they want to ratify the decision of the Executive Committee or not.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Absolutely. So now I have made my voice heard. It is all being recorded. And I can just encourage all of you; I remember a year ago I was here talking about Olympic qualifications, it is not the topic I will mention now, again. But I was speaking in extreme silence. You could hear needles fall. I just remind you that in a few years, things might be different in the world, and things might be different in the FIE. This is always good to think ahead on which side you want to end up with. So, there with those words, I do not rest my case, but I will stand down. Okay, thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** I would like to remind you of the decision of the Executive Committee, which you received on March 2nd. "The Executive Committee accepted and ratified the decision of Mr. Alisher Usmanov to suspend the exercise of his duties as President of the FIE. Pursuant to the FIE Statutes, the Executive Committee unanimously appointed the Secretary-General of the FIE, Mr. Emmanuel Katsiadakis, as Interim President. Mr. Emmanuel Katsiadakis has accepted and will therefore assume all the duties provided for in the FIE Statutes and Rules." We are going to open the vote. If you agree with the decision of the Executive Committee, you will vote yes. If you disagree, you will vote no.

The vote will open.

*[Exclamations in the audience]*

Please open the vote.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The vote is open. I can confirm.



**Emmanuel Katsiadakis:** Nathalie, can you confirm?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** It is working. I can confirm. If you have two voting devices, you vote with both because you have a proxy.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Just a second. We stop the vote. We are going to make a test to make sure that all is working. So, we are going to make a test and check that you don't have any problem. So, the test vote is open. Is everything working? Do you have any problem with the voting device? Nobody has any problem? So, we close the vote, and we will see the results. It is interesting that for a test vote, we have 17 no.

*(Laughter)*

Okay. So, it looks like it works. And some people didn't want to vote, which was fine for a test. So now we will return to the real vote, and you have to vote this time.

We open the vote on item 4. If you agree with the decision of the Executive Committee, you vote yes; if you do not agree, you vote no.

I wish to remind you that the decisions of the Congress are reached by a simple majority vote cast. And that the total number of votes cast must be at least equal to the majority of all the Federations present or represented at the Congress.

The vote is closed. Item 4 is ratified. I think we can congratulate Emmanuel Katsiadakis.

*Applause.*

## 5. 2021 Annual Report of the Executive Committee

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item on the agenda is the 2021 Annual Report of the Executive Committee, which you all have received, and the floor is to Mr. Katsiadakis.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** During this year, we lost a few people from our fencing family. I would like to ask you to stand up for a few minutes, for a few moments, in memory of these friends who passed away.

*(Movie and minute of silence)*

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** You have already received the Annual Report of The Executive Committee, and if you do not have any questions, we will open the vote on the Annual Report 2021.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The Annual Report 2021 is approved.

## 6. 2021 Financial report, auditors' report, approval of the accounts, discharge of the Executive Committee and of the auditors.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item on the agenda is the 2021 Financial report, the auditors' report, the approval of the accounts, and the discharge to the Executive Committee and to the auditors, and the floor is to the Secretary-Treasurer.

**Ferial Salhi (ALG):** Good morning everyone. What should be noted about 2021 is that we came out positive because we had a revenue surplus. Our receipts were 20,753,629 CHF, and expenses were 8,123,611 CHF. We also ended up with a capital of 37,018,011 Swiss francs.

There is an error in the transcription and translation into English, as there was actually a profit of 12 million. Do you have any questions to ask?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** If you do not have any questions, we are going to open the vote on this item.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed.

Item 6 is approved.

## 7. 2023 Budget

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item is the Budget for 2023, and the floor is to the Secretary-Treasurer.

**Ferial Salhi (ALG):** For 2023, we had to reduce the budget because we no longer have the same resources. So, it is a budget that is reduced, but essentially on the CMTV part and the part of the employees, because the employees who left the International Federation have been replaced by service providers. These are the major changes. Do you have any questions?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** If you do not have any questions... yes. You should maybe keep the microphone, Mr. Drakenberg.

*(Laughter)*

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Budget 2023, background information. We have over the past years in FIE, we have run an expense budget in a non-Olympic year of about 10 million Swiss francs while receiving annual donations of a single individual of about 5 million Swiss francs. The FIE appears to have reserves of around 20 million Swiss francs. The benefactor is Mr. Usmanov, whose status in the FIE is unclear, at least to me. He has suspended himself from exercising his duties as President of the FIE and has been subject to severe restrictions and sanctions issued by at least ten nations in the free world since February 2022. He is now being investigated by countries prosecutors' offices in various countries for tax evasion and money laundering. This puts the FIE in dire financial straits if all funds are associated with Mr. Usmanov and are frozen.

I have a couple of questions that I would like answers on, and if I cannot get those answers today, I will return and request those answers. These questions are addressed to the Treasurer of the FIE, and I ask that they be recorded in the minutes of the Congress. And as I said, if any of the information is not readily available today, which I, of course, have respect for, I ask that the Treasurer submit the requested information in writing no later than ten calendar days after the closing of today's FIE Congress.

First, question - As of today, November 2022, how many bank accounts and how much does the FIE have, and in which bank and country are they located? And who are the signatories on the accounts?

Question #2 - Who has control and discretion in the use of these funds?

Question #3 - Are reserve funds part of Mr. Usmanov's frozen assets, and if so, how far back do restrictions on these funds apply?

Question #4 - There is no doubt that as of March 2022, sanctions are in place that cannot be circumvented until the sanctions against Mr. Usmanov are lifted. What measures has the FIE Executive Committee proposed or adopted to deal with the sudden freezing of these funds and a possible international investigation for tax evasion and money laundering led by the German Federal Prosecutor's Office?

Question #5 - What about the fiscal and financial responsibility of an association that depends almost exclusively on the generosity of a single individual?

Question #6 - What are the immediate plans to face the cash flow crisis in the medium term and long term?

Question #7 - What is the role of Mr. Usmanov and his associates in the FIE? Is it acceptable to maintain indirect links of FIE Management with one or more persons subject to international sanctions, and especially if in a state of self-suspension?

Question #8 - This is the final question. Right now, the most urgent issue is to establish where the reserves are. Who controls them for the distribution? What about funds already dispersed from such accounts after March 2022?

Do you want me to repeat any of the eight questions?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** No, as you did not send us your questions in advance, we will have to gather the information and provide it at a later stage. But I can already provide you with some information.

The FIE currently has three banks: one in Switzerland, one in Africa, in Egypt, one in Asia, in the United Arab Emirates. And we are possibly searching for a bank for the Pan American continent, this to avoid the rising bank charges and taxes when we are making payments.

The amounts that are in the FIE bank accounts are currently 30 million Swiss francs. This money is actually the reserve that the FIE constituted with the subsidies we had received from the International Olympic Committee: 15.1 million after the Olympic Games in Tokyo and 15.1 million from the Rio Olympic Games. This money belongs to the FIE completely.

The persons who, according to the Statutes can handle these assets are the Interim President, the Secretary-Treasurer, and I am authorized to make payments for the daily expenses.

These are the main answers that we can provide so far. None of our assets belong to anyone else than the FIE, and none of our assets are frozen.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Thank you, Madam.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** You are welcome.

*Applause.*

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Will you commit to providing the answers within ten days, or what do you think is a reasonable time for coming back to Congress?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We will do it as quickly as possible, as usual.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** With that, I say thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** You are welcome. So, if you have no more questions on the budget, we are opening the vote.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The budget is approved.

## 8. Appointment of auditors

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item, item 8, is the nomination, the Appointment of the auditors, and we propose to renew Ernst and Young, which for years have audited our accounts.

We open the vote on item 8.

The vote is closed.

Ernst and Young are re-conducted for another year.

## 9. Vote to award the World Championships

### 2024 Juniors/Cadets, candidature of KSA

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item is the Vote to award the World Championships. So, this year we have the candidature of the Federation of Saudi Arabia for the Junior and Cadet World Championships 2024, and I invite the Federation to come to the tribune to make a presentation on its candidature.

I would also like to precise that the Executive Committee has received a letter from the Federation mentioning and they have the full support of the government on their candidature, that all participants will be granted a visa and a lot of them will even receive an e-visa on arrival. And that all Federations, male and female, will be able to participate. So, the floor is to the Federation.

**Abdullah AlSunaid (KSA):** Good morning, Ladies and Gentlemen, Mr. President, Dear FIE members, It is a great pleasure and honour to be with you here today.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the FIE for giving us, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, the opportunity to represent our capital city Riyadh as a candidate city to host the Cadet and Junior World Championships. Words cannot describe what you might expect if Saudi Arabia could host this prestigious and important event. Therefore, may I present this video, which I hope will catch the essence of what you might expect from our nation.

*[Video presentation]*  
*Applause.*

Ladies and Gentlemen, we are conscious that article 10.4.1 of the Statutes mentions that the Junior and Cadet World Championships should be held during the first two weeks of April. However, due to a month-long worldwide and national celebration ending just after the first week of April, we will be able to start the competition on Friday, the 12th of April, through Saturday, the 20th of April. As a result of these days, we are kindly requesting approval from Congress on our proposed calendar, changing from the 12th to the 20th of April 2024. I will leave the microphone now to Mr. President of the Saudi Fencing Federation, Mr. Ahmed AlSabban. Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Ahmed AlSabban (KSA):** Good morning, Ladies and Gentlemen, Mr. President and Dear fellow FIE members, It is a great pleasure to be with you tonight, representing my country Saudi Arabia.

I would like to thank you for giving us this amazing opportunity. I look forward to seeing you in Saudi Arabia in 2024 and experience the beauty of this yourself. Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We are going to open the vote on this item, even if we have only one candid... Sorry, yes. Shall I install a microphone at your table?

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** I need to talk about this point before the Congress goes to vote, and the severity of what I am saying forces me to take the podium again, although it feels very much now as a one-man show, but I do not take that blame on myself.

So after recent events inside and outside of fencing, the FIE needs to take care and not to further damage the image of fencing in the world. Saudi Arabia is a country at war. Furthermore, the country has a poor reputation when it comes to human rights. The international organization...

*[Exclamations in the audience]*

the international organization, Human Rights Watch, is explicit, and I quote. "Saudi Arabia spends billions of dollars hosting major entertainment, cultural and sporting events as a deliberate strategy to deflect from the country's image as a pervasive human rights violator."

In the presentation of the Federation of Saudi Arabia, there was no mention of the critical human rights questions that needs an answer. For example, how welcome will LGBTQ fencers be? What restrictions...

*[Exclamations, noise in the audience]*

What rest ...?

*[Exclamations, noise in the audience]*

My plane leaves tomorrow afternoon, so if you want to continue to be undemocratic, take your time.

**Someone in the audience:** Excuse me, excuse me. ...to send to your place.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** What restric...?

*[Exclamations, noise in the audience]*

**Someone in the audience:** Excuse me. We want to stop. Excuse me, please stop.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** What restrictions will be applied...? What restrictions will be applied for female participants? How will the security situation be during the course of the Championships, in view of the fact that the country is at war?

**Abdelmoneim Elhamy ElHusseiny (EGY):** Excuse me, excuse me, now we are here to speak on the sport. Nothing to do with what you are going to say now. Please stop it immediately.

*Applause.*

**Someone in the audience:** Yes.

*Applause.*

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** We ...

**Abdelmoneim Elhamy ElHusseiny (EGY):** Mr. President, please...

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** The Swe...



**Abdelmoneim Elhamy ElHusseiny (EGY):** You should stop immediately.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** No. You should know who you are talking to Mr. Elhamy, then you would not say that to me because I will never refrain from speaking my word in a democratic world.

*[Exclamations, noise in the audience]*

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** We, in the Swedish Federation...

*[Exclamations, noise in the audience]*

**Abdelmoneim Elhamy ElHusseiny (EGY):** Mr. President...

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** We urge the Congress not to take a decision before the questions I just raised are answered. Therefore, the Swedish Federation suggests that the decision on this proposal is transferred by the Congress to the Executive Comex, which should be responsible for taking an informed decision or finding a replacement for the organiser of these Championships.

Upon taking the decision, the Comex must communicate to all member Federations its assessment of the risks that participating LGBTQ fencers or female fencers will be subject to emotional suffering due to the legislation of the country where the Championships are held and the risks and threats to the brand of fencing that the choice of organizing Federation will cause.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, to answer Mr. Drakenberg. Visas will be provided to all participants from all Federations, male and female. We have that letter.

If the Congress wants to award the World Championships to the Federation, the member Federation of Saudi Arabia, you will vote yes. If you do not want to do it, you will vote no.

*Applause.*

We open the vote.

The vote is closed.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The 2024 Junior and Cadet World Championships are awarded to the Federation of Saudi Arabia.

*Applause.*

## 10. Call for candidatures for the organisation of the World Championships:

- Juniors/Cadets 2025, 2026
- Seniors 2025, 2026
- Veterans 2025, 2026

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The next item is the Call for candidatures for the organization of the World Championships 2025 and 2026 for the Junior and Cadets, the Seniors, and the Veterans. Is there any Federation which would be interested by a candidature for these events.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Sweden?

*(Laughter) Applause.*

**Aivar Paalberg (EST):** Hello. The Estonian Fencing Federation would like to organise the Junior and Cadet World Championship in 2025.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Estonia, 2025. Thank you, we will send you the candidature form for this, but you have time.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes.

**Kyle Chan (HKG):** Hi. Hong Kong would like to organise the 2026 World Championship for Seniors.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** You still have time. Yes?

**Mohamed Soufiane Chaouchi (TUN):** The Tunisian Fencing Federation would like to organise the 2026 World Championship for the Veterans in the Island of Djerba.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Any other announcements? You still have time to do it until the end of the Congress and also in the coming days. Thank you. Yes.

**Arno Perillier Schneider (BRA):** Brazil wants to propose for 2026, using the legacy from the Games.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Which one, Junior, Senior, or Veterans?

**Arno Perillier Schneider (BRA):** Junior and Cadets.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you.

**Jorge Castro (MEX):** Mexico would like to propose its candidature to organise the 2025 World Championship for the Junior and Cadets in Cancun.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Excellent. I suggest now having a few minutes for the coffee break.

*(Coffee Break)*

## 11. Proposals submitted to Congress, reports from the Commissions, Councils, and Ethics Committee. Urgent decisions regarding the Rules. Progress reports from working groups

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Please take your seats; we are going to resume the meeting. Can you please take your seats? We are moving to the next item of the agenda, which is Proposals submitted to Congress, reports of the Commissions, Councils, and Ethics Committee, and urgent decisions regarding the Rules. I would like to remind you that you have a voting device, and you must use it and vote.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We are starting with the modifications to the Statutes. Proposal #1 from the Legal Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal as revised by the Legal Commission; if you have no comments, then we can move to the vote.

The vote is open.

Please remember that for the Statutes, two-thirds of the votes are needed for the proposal to pass. The number of the Proposal is #1, as written on the screen, article 1.2.7.

The vote is closed.  
The proposal passed.

Proposal #2 from the Legal Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal. We are opening the vote on Proposal #2.

The vote is open.  
The vote is closed.  
The proposal passed.

Proposal #3 from Sweden.  
The Legal Commission was against, and the Executive Committee was not in favour of the proposal. Sweden is asking for the floor.

**Ana Valero-Collantes (SWE):** The aim of this proposal is to have a clarification for the Statutes article that we already have. This is the aim of this proposal, and we think because it is not regulated the process of expulsion or suspension in the article, so this is a proposal. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, as I said, the Legal Commission was against the proposal, and the Executive Committee was not in favour of the proposal. We open the vote on this proposal. So, if you agree with the proposal, you vote yes. If you disagree with the proposal, you vote no.

The vote is closed.  
The proposal did not pass.

Proposal #4 from the Legal Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal, and we are going to open the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open.  
The vote is closed.  
The proposal passed.

Proposal #5 from the Legal Commission. The Legal Commission proposed that we think again about this proposal to make Congress manageable, and it suggested delaying this proposal until 2023. The Executive Committee agreed with the Legal Commission and would like to postpone this proposal to the next year in order to discuss how Congress could be managed. So, we will have to wait to vote on this proposal. We will move directly to Proposal #6.

Proposal #6 from the Legal Commission, and the Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.  
We move to the vote, and the vote is open.

The vote is closed.  
The proposal passed.

Proposal #7 from the Legal Commission, which has revised its proposal, and the Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal as revised by the Legal Commission.  
We open the vote on this proposal. The vote is open.

The vote is closed.  
The proposal passed.

Proposal #8 from Sweden. There were various comments on this proposal, and the Executive Committee was not in favour of the proposal. So, we are... yes, Sweden.

**Ana Valero-Collantes (SWE):** Thank you very much for the opportunity. In sports organizations, term limits are increasingly used at the national and international levels today. Why is it not valid for the FIE? The IOC has 12 years of term limits. Several International Sports Federations have introduced term limits, among them important players like FIFA, International Athletics, International Tennis Federation, International Cycling Union, and International Ice Hockey Federation. The use of term limits is highly recommended by organizations in modern sports' good governance like IPACS and organisations like Play the Games and numerous others.

Both Associations of Summer and Winter Olympic International Federations have recommended that all Olympic International Federations should introduce term limits for their Presidents or other key positions. It promotes better governance and avoids monopoly of power around a few individuals. The perceptions and problems with the comments from all the Commissions having an opinion can be perceived as a conflict of interest for some individuals. Therefore, it is up to the Congress today to decide how to implement this decision for the reason we suggest. Our suggestion is to start counting the time limit from the 2024 elections. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. So, the Legal Commission, the Ethics Committee, and the Executive Committee were not in favour of this proposal. We are opening the vote on this proposal. If you agree with the proposal, you vote yes; if you don't agree with the proposal, you vote no.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, Proposal #12 is withdrawn.

Proposal #1 from the Refereeing Commission. The Commissions were in favour, and the Executive Committee was also in favour.

Proposal #2 from the Rules Commission, which has been revised by the Medical Commission. Both the Refereeing Commission and the Executive Committee favour the proposal as revised by the Medical Commission, except that in article t.170, the word injury should not be scratched.

Proposal #3 from the Legal Commission, and the Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

Proposal #4 from Sweden. The Executive Committee was not in favour of the proposal. Sweden, please.

**Ana Valero-Collantes (SWE):** Thank you very much. The aim of our proposal is that we believe that the Executive Committee should not be in place to change the selection of referees. For this issue, we do have the experts in the Refereeing Commission since there is no expertise in these matters among the 28 members. However, we appreciate and accept the arguments of the Legal Commission and the Executive Committee. We will return with a new proposal for coming Congresses. Therefore we will withdraw our Proposal #4. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the proposal is withdrawn.

Proposal #5 from the Veterans Council. The Executive Committee, in principle, is in favour of the proposal. However, as this proposal may involve some changes, which have to be tested, the Executive Committee proposes that a test be done in 2025 during the Veteran World Championship to assess the implementation consequences and impact on the organisers. And then, if no major problems are noted, it will become final. However, if some adjustments have to be made based on the experience of 2025, then we will come back with an adapted proposal. The proposal is to make a test on that new text and new proposal in 2025 during the Veterans World Championships and then to see if nothing has to be changed. We vote on conducting a test in 2025, being in principle in favour of the proposal.

We open the vote on this proposal.

The vote is closed.

Proposal #6 from the Rules Commission, and the Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

We move to the vote on this proposal, and the vote is open.

Therefore, increasing the coefficient for the zonal championships would not offer more qualifications to each zone. So, if you are in favour of the proposal, you vote yes; if you are not in favour of the proposal, you vote no.

The vote is open on this proposal. Yes? We stop the vote, please.



**Wahabou Zorome (MLI):** Hello, Everybody. I am the President of the Malian Fencing Federation. I would like to try to explain the motivations that led us to make this proposal. In fact, the zonal competitions, the zonal Championships, are the most important after the World Cup and the others. So, we think it is a better platform for the continents of Africa, Asia, and America to be able to benefit from specific points and to qualify for a major tournament like the Olympics. That said, we know that other continents organise 75% more tournaments than us. So we make a plea for these points to be brought to what is in the request that we made. Thank you for everything. Thanks very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We are going to reopen the vote on this proposal. If you agree with the proposal, you vote yes; if you do not agree, you vote no.

Proposal #15 is a duplication of Proposal #16. We will not vote on Proposal #15 but move directly to Proposal #16 from the Refereeing Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

Proposal #17 is a proposal from the Executive Committee on non-combativity. The Refereeing Commission was in favour, the Athletes Commission was in favour, and the Promotion Commission was in favour. The Rules Commission was in favour with some corrections, and the Executive Committee was in favour with the additions from the Rules Commission.

We move to the vote and open the vote for this proposal.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #18 from the Rules Commission. This proposal is actually an Urgent Decision made with the Rules Commission. Therefore, we are not going to vote on Proposal #18 as we will vote on the Urgent Decision.

We move to Proposal #19 from the Refereeing Commission. This proposal is also an Urgent Decision, so we are not going to vote on this proposal. We will vote on the Urgent Decision. We move to Proposal #20.

Proposal #20 from the SEMI Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #21 from the SEMI Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

We open the vote on this proposal, and the vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #22 from the SEMI Commission. As we still have not found a suitable solution, we discussed with the SEMI Commission on the chipping issue. We are searching for a cheaper solution for the manufacturers. Therefore, if you do not mind, we will put a hold on this proposal and on the current text in the Rules until the Congress 2023. We will work with the SEMI Commission on a suitable proposal for 2023. So, if you do not mind, this proposal remains on hold, and the current text of the Rules remains on hold also until we have found a better and cheaper solution for the manufacturers in 2023.

Do you have any objection to this? Thank you.

Proposal #23 from the SEMI Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

We open the vote. The vote is open. The vote is closed. The proposal passed. Proposal #23 passed.

We move to Proposal #24 from the SEMI Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal.

We open the vote, and the vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #25 from the SEMI Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal with the revisions from the SEMI and Rules Commissions.

We vote on this proposal, and the vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Proposal #26 from the SEMI Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal with the revisions from the SEMI and Rules Commission.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed on Proposal #26.

The proposal passed.

We now move to the Urgent decisions regarding the Rules.

Urgent Decision #1 is a proposal from the Rules Commission and the Refereeing Commission. The Executive Committee was in favour of the proposal and urgent decision. Yes. Sorry, yes.

We open the vote on Urgent Decision #1, and the vote is open.

The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

Urgent Decision #2 is a proposal from the Executive Committee on the calendar.

We open the vote on this proposal.

The vote is open. The vote is closed.

The proposal passed.

The last urgent decision from the SEMI Commission has already been dealt with, with the relevant proposal. We have finished with the Proposals regarding the Rules.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Please take your seats. We will resume the meeting, and we are now dealing with the Progress reports from the working groups.

The working groups met online several times during the year, and they established a progress report of their work. However, the work is still ongoing. There were meetings after the reports were issued, and new meetings will be held at the beginning of next year.

We believe we will be able to present to the next Congress final proposals for your consideration. Do you have any questions on this? Thank you.

I would like to inform you that Sri Lanka has arrived. Sri Lanka had given a proxy to Nepal. So, Nepal now will no longer vote for Sri Lanka. Thank you.

## 12. Decisions regarding athletes and officials from Russia and Belarus

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We move to item #12 of the agenda, Decisions regarding athletes and officials from Russia and Belarus, and the floor is to Emmanuel Katsiadakis.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** So, as a preamble, let me remind you the following. The FIE is a non-governmental and autonomous organisation, and its role is to manage and rule the sport of fencing worldwide.

The FIE ethical code states that the FIE family members will work to maintain harmonious relations with the authorities of the countries of the member Federations in accordance with the principles of universality and political neutrality. The FIE family shall take all necessary measures to ensure security on the premises where the competitions are held, primarily considering the physical and moral well-being of everyone involved in this event.

The FIE Statutory aims include:

- to ensure that international competitions open to member Federations are organised with the FIE rules, and
- to establish rules and appropriate measures to protect athletes' health and prevent any abuse.

Therefore, it is the duty of the FIE Executive Committee to protect the integrity of FIE competitions and to ensure the security of athletes and participants. After the incidents that occurred in various competitions at the end of February, and following the IOC recommendation, the Executive Committee initiated, with a heavy heart, the following decision that was published on the FIE website. "On March 2nd, and following the IOC recommendation, the FIE Executive Committee decided not to invite or allow the participation of Russian and Belarusian athletes and officials in FIE competitions until further notice."

The Executive Committee's decision was not a sanction; it aimed and allowed to protect the integrity of FIE competitions and to ensure the security of all athletes and participants. As of today, the IOC recommendation is still in place. However, we all know that we will start the Olympic qualification in four months. The Olympic Games are within the jurisdiction of the IOC, and it belongs to the IOC to decide on the participation in the Games, and the qualification path is within the responsibility of the FIE to be approved by the IOC.

The Executive Committee does not want to exclude the Russian and Belarusian athletes from the Olympic qualification. Therefore, the Executive Committee unanimously decided during its meeting of 25 November 2022, to organize an online extraordinary Congress at the beginning of March 2023, to make decisions regarding the possible options for the Olympic qualification.

The Executive Committee will meet in January 2023 to establish proposals that will be submitted to the online Extraordinary Congress.

And finally, the Executive Committee unanimously submits to the Congress the following motion: "Do you accept that the Executive Committee continues with its decision of March 2, 2022, for the time being, while reviewing and reconsidering the situation in case of any new circumstances?" Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** I assume that some Federations wish to express their opinions. In case there are a lot of Federations, we will have to make a list so that they can speak in turn.

So, for a better understanding of Congress, let me clarify once again. There will be an extraordinary virtual Congress at the beginning of March in order to discuss the Olympic qualification of the Russian and Belarusian athletes. It is a decision of the Executive Committee, which was made unanimously yesterday.

As of today, the Executive Committee unanimously submits to Congress the following motion: "Do you accept that the Executive Committee continues with its decision of March 2, 2022, for the time being, while reviewing and reconsidering the situation in case of any new circumstances?"

Please say your name if you wish to take the floor. I cannot see very well because of the lighting.

*[Remarks in the audience]*

No. First, I am going to make a list of all the Federations that want to take the floor. So, Ukraine is wishing.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Hello. Ukraine, Sergii Mishchenko, Vice-President.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Who else would like to take the floor? Can you please say your name? I cannot see very well because of the lighting.

**Olga Kharlan (UKR):** I am sorry. Olga Kharlan, Ukrainian fencer.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Your name, please, and Federation. Niger. Sweden. Ghana. Belarus. Venezuela. Russia.

Nobody else? Sorry? The USA. Great Britain. Member of Honour Peter Jacobs.

Anyone else would like to take the floor? Nobody else? Fine.

Senegal. Is that all? Yes. Finland. Nobody else? So, we will start with Ukraine.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** May I take the microphone?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, of course.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Your Honour Interim President, Dear Members of FIE, National Federations. First of all, I asked for a word to thank all the Federations, international organizations, and individuals who, in this difficult time for Ukraine, extended their help to our fencers. To their families during a very difficult period for Ukraine. Many thanks to FIE, many thanks to European Fencing Confederation, National Federations, and all those who extended help and provided roofs, shelter, training facilities, and the ability to travel and participate in international competitions.

Why the Ukrainian Federation and Ukrainian fencers needed this and are still in need? They needed it because of the war, which was waged against Ukraine. It is a vicious, aggressive war, and Ukrainian fencers are suffering a lot. There is no safe place in Ukraine now. Fencers who would like to train often have to break the training lessons because of the signals of the air attack warning. The places are cold because there is no electricity. And

because of all that, it is very difficult to continue any serious regular training in our country.

That's why we were fully supporting the International Olympic Committee Executive Board's recommendation regarding banning Russian and Belarusian athletes and officials from international competitions. This is a true and just decision. It is not only for the sake and because of what happened in Ukraine. It is also in the interest of the Olympic community and in accordance with the Olympic principles to be helped and to be respected. There are many arguments now that, for example, what has been proposed and implemented by the International Olympic Committee Executive Board is inefficient and is not working, but it's not true.

There are wars. Historically, there have been many wars, and during those wars, no one in the Olympic movement took such a decision. But there is a straightforward answer to it. First of all, are we happy that there are many wars, and do we want to have more wars? No. The answer is no. The question is can we do something as an Olympic community to try to stop the wars and prevent more wars? The answer is yes. And the actions which now taken by the Olympic community, by the International Olympic Committee, are a small step to prevent wars, to bring the end of the war maybe ten minutes closer to us or ten days closer to us.

The second argument is that these actions, which have already been taken, have very little effect. But I believe it is not true because, first of all, dozens of International Federations who follow the International Olympic Committee's recommendations are already a very important force in the world sport. Secondly, you probably don't even imagine how helpful it is to Ukrainian people, to Ukraine, that we feel the solidarity of the Olympic movement.

That is why I strongly urge you, ask you, appeal to you to continue with the application of the recommendations of the International Olympic Committee as it is now proposed by our Board. I believe that following this recommendation at the moment and closely monitoring the situation will help us a lot. So please keep with the recommendations of the International Olympic Committee Executive Board until the war ends, until the decision will be fully satisfying to world peace, to the Ukrainian people, and to the fencing community. Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Ms Kharlan.

**Olga Kharlan (UKR):** Dear Olympic Fencing Family, Thank you for giving me the floor. I can be emotional, I will be short, so please let me finish. Many of you know me for many years. I am Olga Kharlan, and I am Ukrainian. I am from Ukraine. Taking the floor, I would like to thank the National Federations for your generous support provided to the national team of Ukraine. Today's life is essential for us. Your help is the true value of the Olympic solidarity and Olympic principles and actions, which our Federation is guided by in its activity to. I am here to make a voice and appeal of Ukrainian fencers and fencers from all over the world to be heard.

Athletes are the core of the Olympic-centered system and the heart of the peaceful world for sports development. What does the athlete feel coming to compete? Everyone knows that mental balance is fragile, but it is not only the key to win. For us Ukrainians, it is a key to survive; nine months of war, nine months of missile attacks, nine months of ruins of cities, civil and sports infrastructure, and the loss of sports friends and their family members. My Beijing 2018 teammate, an Olympic champion, Elena Komarova's father, was killed by this war in Mykolaiv city. Dying kids, athletes, and coaches, nine months of forced immigration, away from home, months of electricity shutdowns causing lights to go off, hitting the Internet, and even a war lockdown.

Now ask yourself a question. What is fair play in the sport today? Which Olympic values weigh more: friendship,

excellence, respect, or friendship to those who keep silent and shelter their tyrant head at state and public events? Do we have to pay respect to them? Do we have to let show them excellence in competitions to promote the power of terrorist state recognized so by international institutions such as NATO and the European Union Council? What is the highest value, the right to live or the right to compete? When the Ukrainians were standing it all, where were the Russian and Belarusian athletes all these nine months, and what did they do while we felt touching support from all the Europe and the world fencing family and friends?

Nine months ago, Russia violated the Olympic Truce, not for the first time, and Belarus also by providing its borders for the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Does the Olympic Charter have a selective approach to some countries or personal responsibility? I think not.

The quote that Russian and Belarusian athletes are not responsible for their government does not help when the social polls show that 80% of the Russian Federation citizens support their government and the war as a tool, as genocide in Ukraine. Did you see what Russian Federation did in Bucha, Izyum, Irpin, Mariupol, and Mykolaiv, my motherland? Will you be able to shake hands with the Russian Federation or Belarusian athletes, then?

As you may know, many Russian and Belarusian athletes are army or police, or state border service contractors. They are still there for all these nine months. What will happen if they receive an order? Mr. Pozdnyakov, the Chairman of the Russian Olympic Committee and Olympic champion fencer, is a colonel of the Russian army that is shelling every day my native city Mykolaiv. Sofya Velikaya is a ruling party athlete and Putin's representative. It is not a secret that Russian athletes are the propaganda tools for whitening and keeping the face of Russian government crimes. Should we, the fencing world, provide the stage for this face? I think not. Fencing is a noble sport based on respect and fair play, observing its history's rules and Olympic values.

Together we are able to stop the aggressors' countries' politics and their state propaganda through the sport of international stages. I think, yes. Sport is a place for people who bring peace, unconditional peace without twisted values. Stand with Ukraine. Thank you for your attention.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Niger.

**Halilou Sani (NIG):** Hello. Thank you for giving me the floor. Really, I understand everything that happens in the world. Niger is also a victim. I have the right to remind you that in the Sahel, many people are killed. In Yemen, many people are killed. In Eritrea, many people are killed. In Ethiopia, many more people are killed. Do you think we should bring political issues into this room? If so, then let's do it. Thanks.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Sweden.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Sweden thinks it is a very wise idea of the Executive Committee to postpone the decision regarding athletes and officials from Russia and Belorussia. And we insist that once the postponement has been done, the decision whether to include again or continue to exclude these athletes should be taken either by the Executive Committee or by an extraordinary physical Congress, the reason being that the extraordinary virtual Congress would not be the best and most democratic way of taking this kind of decision. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Ghana.

**Mohammed Mahadi (GHA):** Dear Delegates, I would like to call attention to a few things. I would recall in one of the series of Olympic Games, there was a situation whereby an Algerian fencer was banned for ten years for refusing to shake hands with one of our brothers, who is also, I think, an Israeli fencer. Sorry, Israeli judoka. He was banned because the IOC, sorry, the IJF, that is, the International Judo Federation, said that his actions were introducing politics into sports. That issue was taken to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS).

Therefore, if today we are also turning the line from politics to sports, we are undermining the autonomy of sports. The autonomy of sports separates politics from sports. In any decision we are going to take, we should stick to the autonomy of sports, which is the pride and the milestone we have achieved as an organisation.

I think it is about time to call the Russian and Belarusian fencers and officials back to the stage, to come and compete as a family because we are not politicians, we do not influence, and we do not have any influence in politics. And I want to remind you of the situation that happened between CONI and the Ministry of Youth and Sports of Italy. I just read this article regarding the case with the law they are introducing that nearly led to Italy being banned from Tokyo 2020. But it was clear that the Minister mentioned that sports and politics are definitely two different things. So, my humble appeal is to let's get our athletes back because we cannot manage it if we keep them longer outside the competition arena; we will end up introducing the situation that happened in IJF. My humble appeal is, let's get them back. Thank you.

*Applause.*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Belarus.

**Vitali Sokolovski (BLR):** Dear President, Dear Officials, and Members of the International Fencing Federation. On behalf of the Belarusian Fencing Federation, let me convey the official position of our Federation on the current situation in Ukraine, as well as on the participation of Belarusian athletes and officials in events under the auspices of the FIE.

The Belarusian Fencing Federation is a public organisation whose task is exclusively to develop and popularize fencing. Members and officials of our Federation do not take any part in political decisions and do not have the opportunity to influence them in any way. We do not support war anywhere and in any form. Athletes of Belarus, coaches, and the entire fencing community of our country want just one thing, peace and unity in the world. We have never had and do not have any conflict with the Ukrainian Fencing Federation, Ukrainian athletes, coaches, and officials, as well as with other countries in the world. On the contrary, we respect all these people very much and wish the military conflict on their territory to end as soon as possible.

There is no doubt that people in Ukraine should be given all kinds of help. Still, the question remains, how does the non-participation of Belarusian athletes contribute to helping the Ukrainian people? The answer is that the isolation of the Belarusian and Russian fencers does not contribute to this assistance in any way. I think everyone has been convinced for more than nine months that the isolation of Belarusian and Russian athletes in no way affected the events taking place in Ukraine.

The International Olympic Committee President Thomas Bach made a comment during a keynote speech at the

Oceania National Olympic Committees' General Assembly in Fiji. "We will only sanction those people that are responsible for something. We will not sanction a National Olympic Committee for the actions of its government as long as the NOCs' leading individuals do not support their actions. None of you, none of you should be held responsible for the actions of your government."

We fully and completely share this position and do not consider it right in this situation to isolate innocent Belarusian fencers, coaches, and officials solely on a national basis. We believe that any decision on non-admission should be personalized and imposed taking into account the actions committed by a particular person. Once again, I would like to emphasize the fact that Belarusian athletes, coaches, and the Fencing Federation in no way influence and will not be able to influence political and military issues. Just try to answer the questions for yourself. Do you seriously consider it fair and right to apply any sanctions to athletes and coaches solely on a national basis, only because they were born in Belarus, live in Belarus, or abroad, but have a Belarusian passport?

We urge the entire international fencing community to unite and truly remain an FIE family in the most difficult times. It is necessary to prevent the incitement of discord, anger, and hatred within the sports community and be an example of solidarity and tolerance for politicians in all countries. Of course, we will respect any decision you make. However, I urge all of you not to mix sports with politics but to make decisions solely in the interests of the development of world fencing. Thank you for your attention.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Venezuela.

**Francisco Rafael Marín Alvarez (VEN):** Good afternoon to the Executive Committee and to all Brother Federations. I want to reflect on what my previous colleagues have said about not mixing politics with sports. Venezuela has been economically isolated and blocked for more than four years, and we have experienced firsthand discrimination and xenophobia. Our athletes and coaches have stopped attending competitions because the governments of other countries have denied us visas, even though the Federations have always been ready to help us. But for being a small country in South America, we go unnoticed. We have experienced what it means to want to attend competitions and not be able to participate in them due to political problems.

Every April 6th is celebrated as the International Day of Sport for Development and Peace. Hopefully, on April 6th of next year, we can all celebrate that day for sport and peace, with the participation of athletes and officials from Russia and Belarus, because we want to change the world. Let's do it from here, and let's demonstrate unity. Nobody agrees with wars. We also suffered power outages. Our kids also have a hard time training. We also have feeding problems. We also have issues that sometimes no one knows about. The comrade from Africa said it. There are military interventions in many parts of the world, but we are not in the UN. We are at the International Fencing Federation, and here we have to discuss sport and unity and send the world a message that we can contribute to peace through sport. If we can contribute to the brotherhood, the teammates from South Africa are a great example of how violence can be changed with a game of rugby. They can teach us a lesson about that.

So, from Venezuela, we call on everyone to unite, to solidarity, to teamwork. I repeat, hopefully, on April 6th, we can all reject any kind of war and always open our arms to peace. But I repeat, nobody, nobody remembered that Venezuela has been blocked for four years, that Venezuela has been facing xenophobia for four years, that our athletes have been attacked at airports, that I, as a Federation, have been attacked at airports due to our problems with migration, due to our displacement problems.

So, we all have to deal with world problems. Politics is not the way to solve it in this space because we are not the ones who make the political decisions of our countries. We make sports decisions, and I invite you to make a decision for the sport.

I express my solidarity with the Ukrainian comrades; we have experienced it. We have experienced those power outages also under another style, but we have lived through them. We have experienced discrimination; we have also experienced attacks.

We are going to work together as we want to change the world. Let's start the change from here. Let's change it with sport and send a message that it is possible to work in peace and unity. In the same way, we will abide by the decisions issued by the International Olympic Committee, which is our rector, and we owe it to it.

Thanks to the fellow interpreters for carrying my voice, thanks to the Executive Committee for giving me the right to speak. We want to make peace. Let's do it together. Thanks.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Russia.

**Ilgar Mamedov (RUS):** Dear Friends, Dear Colleagues, Dear Nathalie. In addition to the COVID test, it is necessary to conduct a test for mental sanity. The behaviour of some Members of Congress is unacceptable. If you remember, Mr. Khrushchev, from the Soviet Union, made this gesture, and he was a leader. We must respect each other, even if we have a difficult time here in the FIE. The FIE Congress is a chance to elevate global understanding about the threat posed by the division of the fencing community. This situation is the most dangerous crisis our fencing family has ever faced.

Olga Kharlan is a young athlete. And if you know, I was born in Baku, and I moved from Baku to Moscow because we had a war between Azerbaijan and Armenia. Here is the President of the Armenian Fencing Federation, and we have very good relations, even though we had a war in the 90s as well as two years ago. These are human relations; we must respect each other, and we are a sports family. We never talk about politics because we are not politicians.

No one has ever connected American athletes with their country's military operations. What is the difference between American athletes from the USA and athletes from Russia? Or, you do not know the history? No one urged them to protest against the decisions of their State Department and White House.

How does the non-participation of Russian sportsmen help Ukraine athletes? If politicians cannot do something to make peace, we, as a sports family, must do something. Therefore, I want to make an offer to the Ukrainian Fencing Federation. I would like to provide training and participation of their teams in competitions in the next six months. I understand that it is difficult directly, but through any intermediary, if it is possible, I can organise everything for your team. I already wanted to arrange this before the World Championships in Cairo, but unfortunately, it was dangerous for the Ukrainian side.

Our athletes have already suffered if you know. For example, the women's sabre team was the first in the ranking. Now, I just checked it on the FIE website; they have 43rd or 42nd place in the ranking. It means one more competition, and we no longer exist in the fencing. And it was the number-one team after the Olympic Games. What else can we do to not participate in competitions?

Six months ago, we had a meeting here in Lausanne when I arrived for the court hearing. We had with Manolis Katsiadakis a court meeting. It was not a real court hearing but a meeting to analyze the situation, find a solution, and a compromise. It was the first of June, and I told Manolis, "You always say that all athletes are your kids." And that was International Children's Day. "Let our kids participate in competitions." Because what I told you before, non-participation does not stop the war. Unfortunately, unfortunately does not stop. They have their plans, and we have our plans to be in the fencing family. Dear Delegates, we all remember the address of Mr. Thomas Bach, "Give peace a chance." Only sport can help us to unite people. Only through a peaceful competition, we can show the world our unity. Only if sports remain neutral, if sports stay out of politics, we have a chance to build a bright and strong future. Together. Together with you, my colleagues, thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** USA.

**Samuel Cheris (USA, MH):** Mr. President, Madam CEO, Members of the Bureau, Members of the Executive Committee, Congressists. The Russian-Belarusian war has not only attacked the country of Ukraine, has not only attacked the armed forces of Ukraine, but it also attacked Ukraine's civilian population, is has attacked the athletes of Ukraine. How can we permit a country that is preventing civilian life, including the training of athletes, to come in and say we are entitled to compete because we are peaceful fencers when our country is demoralizing the athletes of another country and preventing them from training? Many of the members of the Russian and Belarusian teams are members and officers of their military. How can we allow those who personally are part of the aggression to be permitted to compete as if they were not complicit? Have they resigned from their military commissions? Have they protested against the war?

It was talked about the U.S. protest, yes. I mean, U.S. athletes, if they do not like what their government is doing, they protest. Have the Russian athletes protested? If this was merely a philosophical issue, why has a representative of the foundation for the Future of Russian Fencing been going around the world, giving out money? Allegedly to administrators to be able to attend competitions and meetings, but with the quid pro quo, here is the speech I want you to give at the Congress, here is the vote I want you to take, and here is the money that I have provided you. Will it help? Will it help to stop them from competing? I do not know. The FIE and the IOC banned South Africa from competing because of apartheid and isolated them from the sporting community. And it was one of the elements that finally caused the apartheid to end. So yes, it can have an effect. We can vote with our conscience and say if you want to join the family, be part of the family, and do not be going around killing the family. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Peter Jacobs.

**Peter Jacobs (GBR, MH):** Mr. Interim President, Members of the Executive Committee, Fencing Friends. I want to put a stiff, slightly different slant on what I want to say. I want to talk about the IOC and our relationship with it because we are indeed an independent sports organisation. But we are also affiliated and members of the IOC. Do not forget that our Statutes state right at the beginning that any new Federation must be accredited with their National Olympic Committee as the sole representatives of fencing in their country.

Why do I stand up and speak in front of you? I think because maybe, in some vanity, I am the most senior FIE person here. I was first elected to a Commission 45 years ago. I have been in the Executive for 24 years and

the Treasurer; and also fenced into the Olympics and been accredited to ten others. So, I hope that my advice may, by some, be taken as useful.

And what do I see as the first priority, therefore, of the FIE? It is to be an Olympic sport. And what do I see as our second priority? To remain an Olympic sport. And what do I see as our third priority? It is not to do anything that endangers our position with the IOC and endangers our being an Olympic sport. End of story, because every one of your Federations also relies on the IOC directly or indirectly.

Not only does the FIE finances are underwritten by the IOC with its money from each Games every four years, and that is the most stable support that the FIE has. There may well be sponsors at the moment who support fencing, and there may be in the future. But who, in the end, would want to spend their energies and money supporting a sport that is not an Olympic sport and is not that well known? Who will find sponsors, and who will support the Federations? Each of your Federations relies on your National Olympic Committee, and it relies on your sport, our sport, fencing, being an Olympic sport and therefore having standing and status, and attraction. Do not endanger it.

Thomas Bach said in March that he wanted every International Olympic Federation to support the IOC in its current activities, and no more, and no less. I understand that the IOC has said exactly the same thing to the FIE in the last few weeks. So why would we attempt to risk committing a fencing suicide by going against the IOC now? Rather than supporting the Executive Committee in their decision to continue supporting the IOC as they wish, at least until March. And personally, I hope that then as well, we will continue to support the IOC in whatever they do, whether it is to maintain the current situation or to welcome the Russians and Belarusians back into fencing. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Senegal.

**Mbagnick Ndiaye (SEN):** Thank you so much. Mr. Interim President, Madam Executive Director of the FIE, Ladies and Gentlemen Members of the Executive Committee, Ladies and Gentlemen Delegates, Dear Congressists, The problem opposing us and that concerns us today is a problem of extreme sensitivity. It is speaking or making decisions according to a situation that is born out of politics. The war in Ukraine was started by politicians and not by sportsmen. This war has terrible consequences. Athletes cannot train. In Africa, the consequences are disastrous for the populations. The cost of living has increased, like it or not.

But pose here, today, this problem of exclusion of athletes who were not at the root of this situation, athletes who are strangers to the current events, insisting on their exclusion today in 2022, is for us, who have been here for several years, a novelty.

When Afghanistan was invaded, did you make the decision to punish the invader? When Syria was invaded, did we make the decision to punish the invader? When Armenia and Azerbaijan were in conflict, did we care who was wrong, who invaded, and who did not invade? I think we are mixing two domains: politics and sports. Our goal must be to defend sports so that war does not create hatred between athletes. The sportsmen must be at the base of the reconciliation, after the catastrophes of the political decisions made.

Yes, there is war, and its consequences, on athletes but also on populations. That is what I want to say. This is why we must try to find a solution to this problem; it is not by excluding the athletes that we will find the best

solution. I honestly think as a President of a Federation and not as a Member of an Executive Committee, I think we have to know how to be reasonable. To know how to be reasonable is to ensure that we try to find the appropriate solutions to this problem. By doing what? By following the decision of the FIE Executive Committee, which is looking for ways and means, to ensure that our family is united, that our family goes in the direction wanted by the athletes and not in the direction wanted by the politicians. This is why, as a free and independent federation, free and independent, free and independent, we follow the decision of the Executive Committee of the International Federation.

Certainly, we are not here to see the fencing family divided into two, those who are for and those who are against. Wars will always take place in this world. People will always take positions, dramatic ones for some. Are we going to spend all our time at the International Federation saying, yes, there is war here, we sanction, yes, there is war here, we sanction, yes, there is war here, we sanction? Why did not we do it when Afghanistan was invaded? Why did not you, you from the FIE?

And in Africa, these undeclared invasions, these invasions that are not officially declared, harm us by creating prejudice. Why do not you look for these European countries that are invading us, these European countries, which are creating problems for us Africans?

Why do not you want to talk about it? And because a country has invaded another country in Europe, in Europe, in Europe, you raise to say no, no, and no. Why do not you say it for Africa? Why, my dear delegates, do you not say it for Africa? Why? Do you want to divide us? Because on one side, there are those who suffer, and on the other side, there are those who invade.

I think that Senegal, as an independent country, a responsible country, follows the decision of the Committee and asks all those who have the same thought, orientation, and vision to follow the Executive Committee of the International Federation. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Finland.

**Joonas Lyytinen (FIN):** Mr. President, Dear Friends, It is very true that the international community has failed many times before, it has made mistakes, and it has not made decisions when decisions should have been made, especially related to Africa, but also to other places, and Europe has had a big part in this. But the way to respond to past mistakes is not to make the same mistakes again and fail again in the same way we have failed in the past. We have heard many pleas about not mixing sports and politics in this room. I would remind everybody that in Russia, President Putin is parading the Olympic medalists in pro-war rallies, and Mr. Pozdnyakov, who is the President of the National Committee of Russia, is publicly supporting the war.

So, we may ask, who is the party mixing sports and politics here? Is it us or the parties guilty of starting this war of aggression? It is also true that Russian athletes and officials are victims. They are victims because they cannot participate in the sport they love, and they have trained for years. They are victims like the million young men who have fled Russia in order not to be mobilized and sent to fight an illegal war in Ukraine and die. They are victims like the 100,000 Russian men who have already been killed and wounded in the war in Ukraine.

But they are not victims of the decisions we have made, or the IOC has made, or the international community has made, or the United States has made, or any other party you might name. They are the victims of the decisions made by the Russian and Belarusian governments and not victims of our decisions. We have here pleas that we have to be independent, and we have to make our own decisions and not mix sports with politics. I would like to remind everybody that by excluding the Russian and Belarusian athletes for at least until March, we are not following the orders of any other external party. We are following the recommendation of the International Olympic Committee, which is the highest governing body of sports in the world. So, we, as a sports community, are making these decisions following the recommendation of the IOC. I would strongly recommend that we follow the IOC and vote for the proposition made by the Executive Committee to continue the exclusion until March and make the decision then in an extraordinary Executive Committee. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the motion that is presented to the Congress, I repeat, is the following: “Do you accept that the Executive Committee continues with its decision of 2nd March, 2022, for the time being, while reviewing and reconsidering the situation in case of any new circumstances?”

Therefore, the Executive Committee unanimously decided during its meeting on 25 November, 2022, to organise an extraordinary virtual Congress at the beginning of March 2023 to make decisions regarding the possible options for the Olympic qualification. The Executive Committee will meet in January 2023 to establish proposals that will be submitted to the extraordinary Congress.

And the decision that you have just voted is that you accept that the Executive Committee continues with its decision of 2nd March, 2022, for the time being, while reviewing and reconsidering the situation in case of any new circumstances.

For the Second item, I will ask Jacek Bierkowski to make a presentation on the preparations for the Olympic Games. But with the First item, I will deal myself. I must admit, and I hate it, not being perfect. I have to tell you that I just forgot – it is entirely my fault – to submit to your approval the 2021 Congress Report, which you received, and which is posted on our website, but we did not vote on it. It is entirely my fault. So, if you agree, I would like you to vote on that item, in order not to forget it. So, I will open the vote on the 2021 Congress Report, which you had received, and which is posted on our website.

The vote is open.

The vote is closed.

Thank you very much for approving it, and my apologies.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Jacek, will you please come to the tribune? Jacek Bierkowski and Dieter Lammer are the two technical delegates for the Olympic Games, and they wanted to update you on the ongoing preparations for the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris.

**Jacek Bierkowski (POL):** Firstly, I would like to say thank you to the Honour Commission for this title. It was a big surprise for me. Thank you.

*Applause.*

My friend Dieter Lammer and I would like to show you the situation of the preparation for the Olympic Games in Paris 2024.

Everybody remembers the Grand Palais, one of the most beautiful buildings in Paris, and this is the building we will use during our Olympic Games in Paris. You also remember that this building hosted the Senior World Championship in 2010, then we celebrated our 100th anniversary in 2013 and 105th anniversary in 2018. This is our visit in September of this year. The Grand Palais looks like this.

*[Exclamations in the audience]*

Not too bad, not too bad. Yes.

*(Laughter)*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** It will be better.

**Jacek Bierkowski (POL):** This gentleman, maybe this is Dieter.

*(Laughter)*

Now back to the serious topic. This is the renovation of the Grand Palais, which is a huge, huge project. The cost

of the renovation is €500 million, and it is a huge money. Of course, the cost of the Olympic Games organised in France is just €7.6 billion. They will demolish everything, but everything must stay quite the same as many years before.

The audience of this palace is 8000 seats, including the wheelchair seats and dimensions of the field of play. This is a place where we should install the platform with a four-colored piste, and the center final piste is 46 meters in length and 60 meters wide. This is the way how the site is looking at this moment, and I'd like to ask Dieter to explain how everything should be positioned.

**Dieter Lammer:** Okay. Highlighted in blue, you see the venue; in the middle, you see the four-colored piste and the podium piste. On the right side is the entrance; below, you see the warmup area.

On the left side is the waiting area for the boxes. And in blue, and on the left side of the field of play, you see the final warmup area and the call room. The warmup area is on the first floor of this venue. Maybe we can see another plan also, but this is the construction right now.

**Jacek Bierkowski (POL):** The construction of the Grand Palais does not easily allow us to describe the competition's setup. The blue one above shows the completed condition of the call room, and the referees and the fencers come down by the stairs to the field of play – next slide.

**Dieter Lammer:** Here, you see the competition schedule. As usual, we start with three days of individual competitions, followed by the team competitions, as you see here on the screen. This schedule is most similar to Tokyo.

**Jacek Bierkowski (POL):** You can see the men's and women's weapons rotations, every day we change, it is absolutely the same condition. This is the Olympic village. I am sorry, I do not use this laser because it is forbidden in Europe. The Olympic village is a huge area that is in the north of Paris. The name of this district is Saint-Denis. The blue area you see is the dining hall, and this part is the training zone. Okay, you can see the Polyclinic, the main bus station, etc. Everything is there. The two buildings in blue are our training hall. Dieter will show you.

**Dieter Lammer:** Yes. This is the training hall until now. The training halls are located in two old cinemas. We have two training venues. Each training venue has eight pistes, and we will have to share the pistes for a few sessions with Modern Pentathlon. But in general, I think these venues are not too far for the athletes and for the coaches because they are located inside the Olympic village.

**Jacek Bierkowski (POL):** The size is also sufficient. Both studios, Studio A and Studio B are the same size; they are 432 square meters together. The repair table and the toilets should also be near these studios, and by the walls should be the benches for the coaches. Dieter is preparing a schedule for the training, so the pentathlon athletes can also use it. One more piece of information, please. The opening of the hall is scheduled for the 20th of July.

## Location and the distance.

The Grand Palais is situated exactly in the center of Paris. It is close to Champs-Élysées, Place de la Concorde, and the Alexandre III Bridge, easily reachable by walk. It's a maximum of three minutes from the metro station named École-Militaire. Not too far from Franklin Roosevelt. It's a very beautiful place, as you know. Please show the next slide. The Olympic village is not far from Paris, and it is about 15 kilometers from Grand Palais, 35

minutes by bus or minibuses. The Organizing Committee, like in Tokyo, like in London, is preparing a special lane, an Olympic lane on the street, on the road to be used by the minibuses and Olympic buses without traffic. So, we hope it will not take much time to get from the Olympic village to Grand Palais.

For your information, the ITOs, delegates of the SEMI, the Medical, of the Refereeing Commissions, the Technical Commission delegation, also the FIE family will be staying at the same hotel, which is about two kilometers walk away from Grand Palais. It takes a maximum of twenty minutes to walk, and we do not need to use any local transportation. It is a very nice location, and it's very close to our venue.

**Dieter Lammer:** The current planning for the test event will be held in the Grand Palais on 9-10th of August next year. The test event will include individual women's foil, individual men's épée, and team women's sabre. As you can see, it is very close to the end of the World Championship, but we have no other possibilities to host this test event at this stage.

**Jacek Bierkowski (POL):** You see the names of the representatives of the FIE. **Helen Smith (MH, AUS):** Nathalie, is Congo here? Congo?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Congo? Where?

**Helen Smith (MH, AUS):** Is it present? Because I thought they did not answer when you first call.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Lumi, is Congo connected?

**Lumi:** Which Congo you are referring to?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Congo. C-G-O. The other one is the Republic Democratic of Congo, I am calling Congo.

**Lumi:** CGO is not connected to the platform.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Is not connected. So, it means they are absent.

**Democratic Republic of Congo:** Present.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Who is present?

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** The two Congo are there. Congo is there with its general secretary.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Both?

**Michel Maunza (COD):** Congo Democratic present.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Lumi, are CGO and COD connected?

**Lumi:** COD is connected; CGO is not connected.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, Congo is not connected to the Lumi platform. Congo, CGO has to connect on the Lumi platform, not only on Zoom.

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** What does that mean? Madam Nathalie?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes?

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** I want to understand. Which of the Congo? Democratic or Congo Brazza?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** No, C-G-O, C-G-O. Not COD, C-G-O.

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** Ok, but what are they connected to?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** They are connected on Zoom, but not on Lumi.

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** So, are they valid or are they not valid?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** No, they have to connect to Lumi.

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** Ah, ok. It is a problem of understanding.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** COD is connected. CGO is not connected.

**Mbagnick Ndiayé:** Ok, I will call them. It is connection problems.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, we move now to the proxies. Afghanistan has given proxy to Kyrgyzstan. Does Kyrgyzstan accept?

**Kyrgyzstan:** Yes, yes, yes.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** You accept. Ok. Austria has given proxy to Germany. Does Germany accept?

**Germany:** Yes.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Bahamas has given proxy to Guyana. Does Guyana accept?

**Guyana:** Yes.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Barbados has given proxy to Venezuela. Does Venezuela accept?

**Venezuela:** Yes, I accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Belize has given proxy to Costa Rica. Does Costa Rica accept?

**Costa Rica:** Yes, we accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Cyprus has given proxy to Greece. Does Greece accept?

**Greece:** Yes, I accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Honduras has given proxy to Uruguay. Does Uruguay accept? Uruguay?

**Uruguay:** I accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Monaco has given proxy to France. Does France accept? Does France accept the proxy of Monaco?

**France:** France accepts the proxy.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Myanmar has given proxy to Uzbekistan. Does Uzbekistan accept?

**Uzbekistan:** Yes, we accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Oman has given proxy to Kazakhstan. Does Kazakhstan accept?

**Kazakhstan:** Yes, I accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Papua New Guinea has given proxy to New Zealand. Does New Zealand accept?

**New Zealand:** Yes, I accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. San Marino has given proxy to Italy. Does Italy accept?

**Italy:** Yes, accept.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Slovenia has given proxy to Croatia. Does Croatia accept?

**Croatia:** Yes, we accept Slovenian proxy.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Yemen has given proxy to Iraq. Does Iraq accept? Iraq?

**Iraq:** Accept, yes.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Ok, thank you. So now, Lumi. I would like to know if Congo has connected. CGO?

**Lumi:** No, CGO is not connected to the voting platform.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** CGO you are connected to Zoom but not to Lumi. CGO, please, connect on Lumi.

**Lumi:** CGO has still not connected to the Lumi platform. We are not sure if they are connected to Zoom. If someone wants to check that.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** CGO is not connected to either Lumi or Zoom. If you are not logged in within 30 seconds, we will be forced to consider you as absent.

*30 seconds waiting time*

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Good. The floor will be now to Lumi and to the notary to check and to display the number of federations present and the number of federations represented. If Congo or another federation arrives later after this, Lumi will inform us.

**Lumi:** Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, we have 132 federations present and 14 represented, for a total of 146 for the moment. Thank you.

**Lumi:** That is correct. I confirm. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the floor is now to the Interim President, Emmanuel Katsiadakis.

## 2. Address of the FIE Interim President

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Dear Members of Honour, Dear Members of the Executive Committee, Dear Members of Commissions and Councils, Dear Presidents, and Representatives of the National Federations, I welcome you in Extraordinary Congress of FIE.

As you know, the Executive Committee unanimously decided during its meeting of 25th November 2022, to organise an extraordinary Congress at the beginning of March, as the Olympic Qualification period starts in April 2023, and a decision must be made on the participation or not of athletes and officials from the Russian Fencing Federation and the Belarusian Fencing Federation.

Since the 2022 Congress, several events occupied in the Olympic Movement, including an Olympic Summit on December 9th, 2022.

Following this Summit, the IOC held consultation calls with the IOC Members, the Global Network of athletes' representatives, the International Federations, and the National Olympic Committees (NOCs) on 17th and 19th January 2023.

The IOC published a press release on January 25th, 2023, indicating that:

I quote:

"With regard to the athletes with Russian and Belarusian passports, the vast majority of the participants in each of the consultation calls expressed the following:

- a) Strong commitment to the unifying mission of the Olympic Movement, requesting and encouraging it to live up to this unifying mission, particularly in these times of division, confrontation, and war.
- b) Respect the rights of all athletes to be treated without any discrimination, in accordance with the Olympic Charter.
- c) Governments must not decide which athletes can participate in which competition and which athletes cannot.
- d) No athlete should be prevented from competing just because of their passport.
- e) A pathway for athletes' participation in competition under strict conditions should therefore be further explored."

End of quote

As of today, the recommendations of the IOC of February 28th, 2022, are still in place.

However, the IOC Executive Committee shall meet from March 28th to 30th, and we expect to receive recommendations or decisions regarding international competitions.

IOC decisions regarding the Paris 2024 Olympic Games are not expected at this stage. Therefore, item 4 of the agenda cannot be dealt with today, as IOC decisions on the Paris 2024 Olympic Games from the IOC have not been made.

In January and February, the Executive Committee met several times to discuss in depth the situation of athletes and officials from the Russian and Belarusian Federations in the FIE. A vote took place, and the Executive Committee was in favour of their participation in FIE competitions. As a reminder, and as stated during the 2022 Congress, the Executive Committee does not want to exclude the Russian and Belarusian athletes from the Olympic qualification. It is, however, up to the Congress to decide.

The Executive Committee has therefore prepared the questions that are submitted to you and which you have received one week ago.

I am sure that everyone in this congress will show respect to the FIE values and its code of conduct. We are all members of the same FIE family. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Now, the last few days, we received two letters. One from Mr. Joonas Lyytinen, if I say correct the name, of the Nordic Fencing Union. And one from the Ukrainian Fencing Federation.

The letter from Mr. Lyytinen has 9 questions to be put before the Congress. We believe that they are of general interest. Therefore, we will read these questions together with our answers. And I ask from Nathalie Rodriguez: to help me to say... to start to say the questions and after I will say the answers. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, question number 1: What does the "personal eligibility" mentioned in the questions put forward to the Extraordinary Congress mean in practice, what is the process of determining this eligibility and who will make the decision on compliance to these?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ok. FIE administrative rules article 1.2 means that athletes who participate in FIE competitions undertake to first abide by the provisions of FIE rules and statutes, second respect the FIE adopting rules, use neither prohibited substances nor prohibited methods and agreed to undergo any in-competitions and out of competitions tests. In addition, the athletes will have to respect the Congress decisions, respect the Executive Committee decisions. Decisions as to non-compliance with these conditions will be made according to the FIE statutes and rules. IOC full recommendations, decisions are to be received at the end of March.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 2: What will the consequences be if Russian and Belarusian athletes are allowed to participate and fail to be "in compliance with the conditions of neutrality"? What will be the process to investigate and validate suspected instances of non-compliance and who will make the decision on possible consequences?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ok, IOC statement of January 25th, 2023, the point 3.F says in the event of any athlete failing to respect the eligibility criteria or failing to respect the strict participation conditions, the IFs, special for us the FIE, and all the sports event organisers concerned should immediately remove them from the competitions. The FIE should suspend them from the further competitions and report the incident to the IOC for its consideration for further measures and sanctions. Violation of conditions of neutrality will be investigated by the FIE, taking into consideration the recommendations and decisions of IOC.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 3: Several countries do not issue visas to Russian or Belarusian citizens and do not allow them to enter the country. What steps are FIE going to take to tackle this problem if international competitions are organised in these countries?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** FIE will take all necessary steps to avoid organising international competitions in any country that does not respect the principle of equality for all athletes, including issuing visas to all participating athletes. As per article 2.6.5 of the Administrative Rules, the Executive Committee will try to relocate the competition as it did when other similar cases happened in the past. And with the refusal of visas all due to the COVID-19 measures which were not in line with the FIE rules.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 4: Many governments have stated that they will withdraw monetary support from national sports organisations participating in competition with Russian and Belarusian athletes. Will FIE reimburse these financial losses to these national fencing federations?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Terms and conditions for monetary support by governments being domestic matters of each country, the FIE does not intervene in such matters. The FIE is an autonomous non-governmental organisation which is recognized by the IOC as the organisation which governs the sport of fencing worldwide in accordance with the rules of the Olympic charter. Article 2.1.1a Statutes states the national federation must have an independent role in accordance with the principles of Olympic charter. The FIE cannot be held responsible for decisions of governments. The FIE is committed to follow the decisions of the FIE Congress and to be compliant with the IOC recommendations and decisions.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 5: Several national federations are at risk of losing sponsorships from private enterprises if they participate in competitions with Russian or Belarusian athletes. Will FIE reimburse this lost revenue to the national fencing federations?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** The FIE does not intervene in matters concerning terms and conditions regarding sponsorships of federations by private entities. The FIE cannot be held responsible for decisions of private enterprises.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 6: What are the concrete plans and actions that FIE will implement for security and safeguarding if the Russian and Belarusian athletes are allowed to participate in international competitions?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** The FIE is well aware that the safety and security of the competitions is a matter of the utmost importance in these times. In collaboration with the organisers of each competitions, the FIE undertakes to organise safe and secure competitions for everyone involved. Organising federations will have to hire a private security company at the expenses of the FIE to ensure security. Members of the Executive Committee and senior staff will also be present to support the supervisor or event manager or safeguarding officers for possible safeguarding issues.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 7: What kind of consequences or penalties will athletes from other countries face from FIE if they decline to fence against Russian or Belarusian athletes in international competitions due to personal ethical and moral reasons?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** If the athletes are absent or if they are not present on the piste, on the strip at the start of the match, the article of the rules such as o.74 or o.79 etc. apply. For other circumstances this would not be in the first instance of athletes refusing to fence against athletes of other country for personal reasons there are specific provisions in the FIE statutes and rules.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 8: The IOC is trying to uncover the possibilities for Russian and Belarusian athletes to participate in tournaments again. In what way will it be beneficial for fencing to be among the first Federations to take a position?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** The IOC is aware of the situation of each International Federation in terms of Olympic qualifications system and period. The IOC also approved the FIE Olympic qualification system. Fencing is starting its Olympic qualification in April 2023 and has no other choice than to make a decision before that period. Recommendations, decisions of the IOC are expected at the end of March. The Executive Committee does not seek to establish any benefit by proposing a vote on the questions put before the Congress. Simply put, it wishes to have in place a reliable ranking in the qualification system, if, and only if, the IOC decides that Russian and Belarusian athletes are allowed to compete in the 2024 Olympic Games. Should the IOC decide to exclude the Russian and Belarusian athletes at the Olympics, the position in the ranking will be off. No consequence.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Question number 9: Since we still have not elected a new president due to our president's self-suspension, will the bond between the FIE and Russian interests be perceived as too tight, and could damage FIE's public image and lead to loss of goodwill in the IOC and general public?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** I am sorry... so, this is a question for me.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** No, question number 9. Question number 9. Yes, number 9.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Question number 9? It is a question very close of mine. So, the FIE is an independent body with no ties to the self-suspended President. The appointment of the Interim President has been confirmed by the Congress of November 2022 and the IOC has confirmed about it. The Interim President maintains bonds of friendship and respect with the 155 members federations and the FIE does not have special interest with any of them. I am a really independent President. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, these are the answers that can be provided to the questions that were sent by the Nordic Fencing Union. Do you have any questions on this or any comments?



### 3. Decisions regarding athletes and officials from Russia and Belarus

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So now we will move to the second letter that the FIE has received. Mr. Katsiadakis will inform about the letter of Ukraine.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Yes, yes. We received this letter from the Ukrainian Fencing Federation and the request of the Federation is the following. The first question is to exclude from the agenda for the FIE online Extraordinary Congress scheduled for 10th March 2023 the point for discussion, voting or any other actions, including directives or instructions by FIE authorities, regarding the admission of Russian and/or Belarusian fencers from the qualifying competitions to participate in the Olympic Games 2024 and any other international competitions. This is the first request.

And the second request is to refrain from deciding the matters specified in paragraph 1, until the complaint of the Ukrainian Fencing Federation is duly considered with making a final decision in accordance with the FIE ethical code and the FIE disciplinary code, including the consideration of the complaint in all instances of the Court of Arbitration for Sport and if necessary, in Swiss courts. These are the two requests from the Ukrainian Fencing Federation.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, I see that Vadym Guttsait and Pascal Tesch want the floor. So, Vadym Guttsait, the floor is yours.

**Vadym Guttsait (UKR):** Hello my friends, hello my colleagues, hello my fencers brothers, my family fencers. Some words about the situation. A year has passed since the Russian troops with the support of Belarus invaded the territory of independent Ukraine, violating the Olympic Truce. The basic Olympic principles and values of peaceful coexistence, friendship and mutual respect were violated. The decision and recommendation taken by the IOC to prevent Russian and Belarusian athletes from participating in international competitions were logical and absolutely fair. Introduction of sanction against violators of the Olympic charter, the international sport order, the fair restriction of the rights of athletes and entourage, they can be lifted only after correction of the violation, the end of Russia's war with the support of Belarus against Ukraine. I must emphasize that the war is supported by the head of NOC of Russia and Belarus, by the vast majority of the sport federations of these countries including fencing one, judges, coaches. In my opinion, we do not have the... Russian and Belarusian to sport arenas, while Ukraine and sport community suffers new losses. During this war, 251 Ukrainian athletes and coaches were killed. About 40'000 athletes were forced to move abroad, about 350 sport facilities were severely destroyed or damaged. The war affects every Ukrainian fencer. Someone lost their family or friends. Colleagues, someone lost their home; someone lost their training opportunities. We do not have understand what equal conditions with Russian and Belarusian athletes can be discussed in principle. The IOC recommendation on ban for Belarusian and Russian athletes is still valid. This why there is not background for us to discuss any change. I believe until war stops, we cannot let Russian and Belarusian fencers to come back to the competitions within the FIE authority in any status. I ask you to support the idea of prolongation of the ban. I thank you and I ask you for that solidarity with Ukrainians during this difficult time. Thank you so much.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Pascal Tesch, Luxemburg.

**Pascal Tesch (LUX):** Thank you, Madam Chairman. Thank you also, Mister President ad Interim, for these

extensive and creative answers put forward. I want to come back to question number one about neutrality. When I researched about neutrality, I inspired myself with International Red Cross. The word “neutral” comes from the Latin “neuter” and it means neither one thing nor the other. So, it could be considered someone neutral whoever refrains from participating in a conflict or altercation and abstains from any interference. The reasons for that can be numerous. So, the definition can also take various aspects. However, I missed to hear any of the reasons, any of the aspects in the explanation we heard a few minutes ago.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Thank you Pascal. So, I give again the floor to...

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Excuse me, excuse me. Venezuela wants the floor.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ah! Sorry.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Venezuela.

**Francisco Rafael Marín Alvarez (VEN):** Hello, good afternoon, greetings to all the fencing family. I just want to come back to the intervention I made at the last congress. Let’s not turn this congress, let’s not turn this working table into a political debate. I would like to emphasize, again, my country; I am not going to talk about other countries. Venezuela has been subjected to a blockade for more than five years in which people have died. Those presidents in the neighbourhood here who like to look at the figures and statistics of international organisations, look at the number of deaths in Venezuela. In the last five years, the number of displaced people as a result of the crisis has become a point of discussion for decisions that are purely political. Because it does not apply for me, as president, to ask for the sanction of the athletes of those countries that for political reasons have a blockade on Venezuela, which also generates deaths, which also generates displaced people, which also generates problems such as...

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** I think Venezuela has a connection problem.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Yes. There is another person.

**Avinash Somir (GUY):** Hello everyone, I would like to thank the FIE for supporting athletes within a difficult time. You know, future of fencing relies on family, friendship, and youth development. Athletes are not politicians and should not be treated as such. Us, as adults, we should be the mentors that set the right example of humanity and respect so that the youth can learn. So... Just wanted to thank the FIE again for doing the best that they can to support athletes in this difficult time and I appreciate all that the FIE is doing already. Thank you.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Any others?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Ghana?

**Mohammed Mahadi (GHA):** Hello. Ok, Madame Nathalie, greeting to everyone. I sympathize with every country that has suffered the great casualties in all wars. Can you hear me?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** We hear you, yes.

**Mohammed Mahadi (GHA):** Ok, I sympathize with every country that has had great losses in many, many wars in the history, going back to what happened in Afghanistan, in Iraq, in Libya and then what is going on in

Ukraine and then Palestine which is ongoing. But then the greatest achievement of sports is autonomy of sports. Which was the resolution passed by the United Nations in its 69's Congress. Now, that resolution separates us and gives us the autonomy to take decisions separately from what politicians do. If we should go on and say that we are going to sanction every athlete who has no direct involvement or has no say in national policy, because the country is in war, we suspend athletes then we are taking the path of destroying our lovely sport. I believe the mutuality and autonomy of sports should be respected and we should separate the athletes and athletes are driven by our rules and regulations of the various disciplines. I believe that if we maintain this mutuality of us being sportsmen and the politicians deal with their matters and then we play the mutual rule of communicating our solidarity in enhancing and promoting peace in our activity by opening our arms and calling everyone to demonstrate in the peace, that we can live or have coexistence with everyone by allowing our athletes from Russia and Belarus to come and compete and demonstrating solidarity and peaceful coexistence. Because by allowing them to come and compete is demonstrating to the world that we truly stand for peace as athletes. But if we keep them aside and allow the Ukrainian to compete, where is our neutrality? Fairness should be applied by allowing every athlete to compete on the FIE tournaments so we can demonstrate that indeed fencing really stands for peace and fencing really promotes coexistence and then mutuality. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. So, we will come back to Venezuela, then we have Ukraine, Sweden, and Finland. So, Venezuela, Ukraine, Sweden, and Finland. Venezuela please.

**Francisco Rafael Marín Alvarez (VEN):** Yes, thank you. Sorry, I had connection problems. I was saying that, given the point of neutrality, political neutrality is laid down in the UNESCO charter, in the Olympic charter and this political neutrality speaks of what the colleague from Ghana referred to. None of our athletes, none of us presidents have the capacity to influence the directives and the political guidelines of our rulers. Therefore, please, let us not turn a sporting debate into a political debate. I repeat: all my solidarity with those countries that are in a war. All my solidarity with all the lives lost because we are also experiencing it in a different way, but we are also experiencing it. However, at this moment, we are called by sport, by Olympism and by the great fencing family that we are, to set an example of peace, unity, and integration on a fencing piste. Just as in previous years, other sports have done in other conflicts. This is our opportunity to be united and at peace and not to give political responsibility to those who do not have it. Because the athletes of the world, not of any country, are not politically responsible for the actions of their rulers. So, let's talk about the Olympic Charter, let's talk about the statutes of the FIE. That is all that can be discussed here, let's talk about sport, please let's not turn this space into a political debate. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Ukraine.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** We do not hear you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** You are muted.

**Olga Kharlan (UKR):** Yes. Hello everyone. You can hear me, right?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes.

**Olga Kharlan (UKR):** Dear fencing family, I am the same Olga Kharlan, I will always be Ukrainian from Ukraine. Four months ago, I was standing in front of you and questioning which Olympic values weight more; friendship, excellence, respect. Due to agenda of today's Congress, it is evident that some of you are still questioning themselves. Do the apply of the Olympic values value more than human live? Yesterday from 12 a.m. to the

morning 7 a.m., Russians and Belarusians had blown and strike with all existent type of missiles including ballistic. 12 cities and regions of Ukraine: Kiev, Mykolaiv, Odessa, Lviv and more were under shelling, simultaneously targeted with 81, 81 missiles and 8 drones. They were infrastructures ruined, but civil victims again who did not wake up and were burned under their houses. What is the fair play in sport today? Could the fair play be more... more when, how Vadym said, the more than 300 sport facilities in Ukraine are destroyed? 231 athletes are killed in war already and you need to find the courage to train despite the life testing you hardly without electricity and heating, internet connection failures, daily air alarms. To respect to those who keep silent still, how in order of friendship to shake hands with the Russian and Belarusian fencers as fencing etiquette requires... Sorry? ... requires after bout on the strips. Knowing that just one more attack, one more fight in Bakhmut or where else in Ukraine costs another life or Ukrainian soldiers and new shelling took away one more civil life. You do know that many athletes and officials from Russia, Belarus are calling themselves sergeants, soldiers, and officers of the State institution as military forces, polices, borders services. Those who give and swear allegiance, swear allegiance to them and are paid as well as preparation is financed by their terrorist state. Is already more than one year of the war its full-scale invasion, one year of the war itself is of Ukraine. More than one year of terrorist attacks, missiles attacks, authority of crimes, murders of Ukrainians by Russians military forces. Today, speaking here, I am asking each of fencing family what future do we stand for? Yes, sure, we stand for peace, and we should point the way that Russian, Belarus participation is not possible until the war is not finished. No use of athletes in State propaganda. You might not know, but the leader of sabre women team was visiting military base in Syria as Russian armed forces captain right after the Olympics of 2016. Is in public domain. Europe faces this terrible war; the world faces this terrible war. It is not finished. We keep... We have to keep fencing crystal clear, not compromise in this war crimes executed by state, Putin's shared responsibility on individuals. Together we will win, we can win. We have to be strong and united to protect sport from terrorism and its policy on sport stages. Glory to sport, glory to peace, glory to Ukraine. Thank you for your attention.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Sweden?

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Can you hear me, Nathalie?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, I can.

**Otto Drakenberg (SWE):** Very good. Thank you and hello everyone in the FIE Congress. We, in the Swedish Fencing Federation firmly believe that given there has been no change in the situation regarding the Russian aggression in Ukraine and it is an imperative for fairness and solidarity toward the Ukrainian athletes, whose facilities has been destroyed and who have to leave the country or to stay to fight for the defence of Ukraine in which very many have lost their lives. There is no practical reason to move away from the exclusion regime for Russian and Belarusian athletes set by the FIE in its 2022 statement. The Swedish Fencing Federation also note that through their choices, actions, and ongoing invasion, Russia broke the Olympic Truce that has been continuously supported by the United Nations General Assembly since 1993. In Russia and Belarus, sport and politics are closely intertwined. We have strong concerns on how feasible it is for Russian and Belarusian Olympic athletes to compete as neutrals under the IOC conditions of no identification with their country when they are directly funded and supported by their States. The strong links and affiliations between Russian athletes and Russian military are also of clear concern. Our approach throughout has therefore never been one of discrimination simply on the bases of nationality but this strong concerns need to be dealt with by the FIE. As long as these fundamental issues are not addressed, we do not agree that Russian and Belarusian athletes should be allowed back into competition. We, the Swedish Fencing Federation, strongly therefore urge the FIE to address the questions, identify, and reconsider its proposal accordingly. We also note that Russia and Belarus have it in their own hands to pave the way for their athletes' full return to the international sports community namely by

ending the war that they themselves started. In summary, Swedish fencing is strictly against allowing Russian and Belarusian athletes to participate in FIE competitions, whether individually or in team, from the second half of April 2023. And we are strictly against allowing Russian or Belarusian officials to attend FIE competitions from the second half of April 2023. Nor should any official from Russia or Belarus be allowed to hold positions within any organisational body of the FIE. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Finland?

**Joonas Lyytinen (FIN):** Thank you Nathalie, dear friends. The heart of all sports is a fair competition. And under the current circumstances, there cannot be fair competitions for the Ukrainians fencers. As we heard hundreds of Ukrainian athletes have been killed by the war that was illegally started by the Russian Federation and supported by the Belarusian government. There is no possibility of having fair competition when your athletes are killed by aggressive military actions from another state. The Ukrainian facilities have been destroyed; they cannot practice. Millions of Ukrainians has been forced to leave their country. And nobody can believe that Ukrainians can compete in a fair competition under these circumstances. And the least thing we can do, is to not to allow the people representing the aggressor in sport, to compete either. The Russians athletes as I thought I said in the Congress already are also victims of the Russian Federation and of the actions of the Russian government. But that is the decisions of the Russian government and that is not something that is in our power. And if you think that we can stay neutral when another country invades and kills people and athletes and countries and destroys facilities of another country, in our fencing family, I would like to remind you, my dear friends, that the sports community and the International community was not neutral when the South African apartheid government denied humans rights and questioned the humanity of black South Africans. We took the sports community as a collective ...big... a very strong stand and excluded the South African apartheid government from international sports. And we can go through, be different injustices of yesterday and the past and think when should have acted and why we did not act in the past. But we cannot change the past, only thing we can change is the future and the current situation. And for all my friends from the global south that think they have been mistreated or neglected I would strongly suggest that you would raise your voice and ask people and ask the international sports community to take action against injustice. We will support you. The European fencing federations and the EFC has been very clear, it is a war namely affects the Europe and Europeans as we all know. And the stands of the great majority of member federations of the European Fencing Federation have been very clear. We do not see that the Russians and the Belarusians can come back to international sport at this point. And people from other zonal confederations, I would ask you to respect the will of the Europeans in this intra-European conflict. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Russia?

**Ilgar Mamedov (RUS):** Hello everybody, dear Congress, dear colleagues, I would like to say one remark concerning our military organisation, as all, everybody has in their own country, we have military games and we have CISM, therefore we have, for example, in our country, CSKA centre sport club army. And Olga Kharlan spoke about our attitude, and it is absolutely incorrect information. In Ukraine, in Belarus, in Romania, in France, in Germany, in Korea, in China everybody has military organisations. This because without military organisations we cannot participate in military games and military world championships. If someone does not know about it, this is just information for you. And I agree with the colleague from Venezuela and from Ghana that we are athletes, we are sportsmen and how is more participations if our athletes cannot support this military problem in the two countries. How it will be if, for example, we are not participating two years more. We are not working for the government; we are only athletes. Coaches and athletes, we are all, we are always in our sport venue, we work, and we can fight only on the piste, only on the piste. And I was thinking that maybe someone does not

want to compete against us because Russian Fencing Federation is the strongest federation, fencing federation in the world. Last two Olympic games showed that we had more medals than other teams and maybe someone has a good chance to not have opponent like Russian athletes. This is a big problem in my understand. And I do not want to speak about politics again. We are athletes and I hope you understand me, you understand my words, because many, many years we are organizing the games [not audible] my relationship with you colleagues. If you remembered in the last Congress in Lausanne, I proposed to Ukrainian Fencing Federation my personal help, but they refused. How can we show to everybody that we want to have peace between our two countries? We can do it through our sport. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Burkina Faso? We cannot hear you. Please open your microphone. Can you raise the sound volume of your microphone? Mister Zeba, we cannot hear you. The volume of your microphone is too low. Your microphone is off. We cannot hear you. Your microphone is off. We are going to hear Ghana, then we will come back to Burkina.

Ghana you wanted to talk. Is there anyone else who would like to take the floor?

Burkina we still cannot hear you.

Nobody else wants to take the floor. So, Botswana? And then Ghana.

**Mandlenkosi Masuku (BOT):** Thank you, Madam CEO, am I audible?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, who is speaking?

**Mandlenkosi Masuku (BOT):** Oh, Masuku, Botswana.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Botswana, fine. Thank you.

**Mandlenkosi Masuku (BOT):** Thank you. As much as fencing is a combat sport, is not an army and should not be associated with political differences and unrests. Fencing must be seen as a sport that promotes unity and peace and bringing all humans together. It is unfortunate that there are losses of lives, and we are sympathetic about it. But sport should bring nations together. Segregation of any athletes by virtues of political unrests in war will only fuel unrest. If fencing was the reason for the war, then FIE should take drastic measures but it is not the case. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Ghana?

**Mohammed Mahadi (GHA):** Yes, I am back again. All I wanted to say again is that the war and wars will still continue as long as we are human beings who agree to disagree. We just hope that, in our discords, we should always value peace. Apartheid and a lot of these have been giving references. And I believe that it was an error when politics or politicians were dictating even who the head of federations should be until the passage of the UN resolution which I keep making reference to. Which separated politics from sports. I was tense in taking a political line of side-lining or punishing our athletes based on country or governmental discords. It's like throwing ourselves again and throwing the autonomy which we have won to the bin again on throwing ourselves in the hands of the politicians. Sport is a global language as our president, Thomas Bach, said. Sport is the only endeavour that brings us together regardless of our political, religious, or racial differences. Therefore, I urge and call against that. Let us give the platform to all fencers so that we can demonstrate as fencers, as FIE seeing

fencing from Belarusians and from Russians competing with their brothers, not as the enemies from Ukraine and other parts of the world. So, we do not emulate the example that we have witnessed that we cannot control, whenever Israeli athletes are competing with other Arab athletes. We should be careful in the path we are taking, and we should correct a mistake by allowing them to come and we manage the situation. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Cameroon? Your microphone is not open.

**Dieudonné Marcel Amougou Nguina (CMR):** Can you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, we can.

**Dieudonné Marcel Amougou Nguina (CMR):** So, I wanted to say that I am making the constate... Can you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** We hear you.

**Dieudonné Marcel Amougou Nguina (CMR):** I wanted to say that I see that we are in the same situation as at the Lausanne Congress in November, where people took the floor to express their position on the Russian or Belarusian athletes. I think that it was in view of the long debates we had in Lausanne that we decided on this Extraordinary Congress. So, we would do better, we all know why we are here today. We would do better to go to the votes instead of everyone taking the floor to say that they are for or against. The ballot box will tell us, we are in a democracy. The ballot box will be able to tell us whether the majority is for or against. I think that we have been wasting time for, well, nothing, as far as I am concerned. That is it.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Niger? Your microphone.

**Tiemo Adamou Idrissa (NIG):** Yes, good morning. So, first of all, I would like to thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak. As the senior member just said, Amougou, I think it would be better to go straight to the vote than to dwell on debates that will prolong the time. And that there are other points that are perhaps more interesting. As he says, this is a democracy, so let's let the ballot box speak. Thank you very much.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. USA?

**Rita Comes (USA):** Thank you. I want to read a statement from USA Federation. It was in a press release by Sam Cheri, and he spoke these words during the Congress in November.

"Today is a critical day, when the member federations show whether their ethical and moral values are stronger than political experience of pleasing those who are lobbying for their votes with promises of a quid-pro-quo. I and the US Federation are firmly against permitting the competitors of any country, some of whom are in or supported by its military establishment that is committing war crimes against civilians of another country, to compete. If these athletes wish to compete let them resign any military ties and financing, renounce their citizenship, and disavow their support for the atrocities. If this sounds like drastic and extreme measures, they are. But invasion of a sovereign country and the killing of its civilians is also drastic and extreme. An extreme transgression calls for extreme responses. Many of these competitors are guilty, directly, or indirectly, of supporting actively or passively their aggressor government. Those in Russia who passively watched give tacit approval to the current reprehensible activities." Thank you.



**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Does anyone else wants to take the floor?

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** So, there is any other, Nathalie?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Virgin Islands.

**Joyce Bolanos (ISV):** Yeah. Can you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, we can.

**Joyce Bolanos (ISV):** Yes. We must remain neutral. If we take side, half of the countries of the world will not be competing. There is blood in every country. We must remain neutral. We are a sport under the Olympic flag. We are a family, sport should unite. If we start taking sides, then half of the countries will not be competing today. There are still conflicts around the World. In the future there will be conflicts, you know, war, there will be many wars. But we must remain neutral. We are a sport; we are a family. And think about it, if today we applied by taking sides half of the countries would not be competing. So, we must remain a sport, a family and keep... You know... When we are competing, we are a family. We must be united. And yes, you know, it is horrible, terrible what is happening, but this is the moment that we must unite as a family, and no one is... no one... most of the countries have been in conflict. And I think just very, you know... I want everybody to really think the decision we are going to take today. And that is what I have to say. We have to unite as a family and keep sport sport. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Lebanon?

**Jihad Salameh (LBN):** I just want to say something about what we are talking about. If we take the Olympic Charter, the fundamental principles of Olympism, there is Article 4 which says: The practice of sport is a human right. Every individual must have the opportunity to practice sport without discrimination of any kind, of any kind. And in the Olympic spirit which requires mutual understanding, the spirit of friendship, solidarity, and fair play. So, if we base ourselves on the fundamental principles of the Olympic Charter, we cannot discriminate any athlete in any form. If we are all under the Olympic Charter.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to take the floor? Nobody? Nobody wants to take the floor? Norway.

**Bjørn Faye (NOR):** Hello, can you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, we can.

**Bjørn Faye (NOR):** In a way I can agree with those who said we should vote. But I also think that since this is a democratic organisation, people should be able to have their say. I also feel that we owe an apology to the President of the Swedish Fencing Federation for the way the Congress behaved when he was talking. That was a disgrace, absolutely not a good way of showing sportsmanship and allowing different opinions to be forwarded. Ok. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. Anyone else wants to take the floor? No one else wants to take the floor? Nobody else wants to take the floor?



**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ok, so its ok now? Nobody else? Do you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes. We can hear you.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** ok, so if there is no other person to take the floor, I think during this discussion and opinions of our representatives, I think the Congress will now consider this letter of Ukrainian Fencing Federation and the two propositions sent to us. So, I think the CEO takes the floor and start the procedure for these two requests.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, as the Interim President said, there are two requests from the Ukrainian Federation. And these requests are a change in the agenda. As you know it was decided in November that there would be an Extraordinary Congress to vote on these issues. The Federations have received the agenda for the Congress one month ago and the Ukrainian Federation is asking to exclude the vote on this topic and to postpone the vote on this topic. So, as we are in a case of item which is a modification to the agenda, we will include these questions in the vote. However, to reach a decision, a majority of three fourths is required. So, I remind you that request one from Ukraine is to not vote today and request two is to postpone the vote to a period which is not yet determined. Before moving to these two requests on which you will be requested to vote, I suggest that we make a test vote just to make sure that everything is clear for you and that you do not have more question on how to vote. So, I propose to make a test vote, this is not a real vote. We are not going to vote on the questions, we first move to a test vote. And I give the floor to the notary and to Lumi for the test vote, just for you to check that everything is fine. So, this is just a test question for you to test your voting device and check that everything is fine, and I give the floor to the notary.

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you Nathalie. And just to remind all voting delegates that all voting will be done through the Lumi voting platform. So, the test vote is as follows: Was fencing on the programme of the 1896 Olympic Games in Athens? And the vote is now open.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, you remember that only the voting delegates have access to the Lumi voting platform. All the other delegates can see the question displayed on the screen. And I was informed by Lumi that Congo had arrived. Is that correct? Mister Gardiner, can you confirm that Congo had arrived?

**Edward Gardiner:** We are just checking this, thank you. Nathalie for Congo, we have the second delegate logged on, but not the voting delegate.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Ok. So, Congo is absent.

**Edward Gardiner:** So, the poll will close in 1 minute.

The poll will close in 30 seconds. And just as a reminder that all voting needs to be done on the Lumi online voting platform.

The poll will close in 10 seconds.

The poll is now closed, and the results will be displayed shortly.

The results of the voting were as follows: **there was 130 Federations voted, there were 4 abstentions, there were 126 valid ballots. The majority required 64. Yes: 119. No: 7.** Thank you, and I hand

the floor back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you. So, we can see that 16 Federations did not vote. So, please, we ask you to vote. I think that if you are attending that Congress, it is for that reason. So now that we have... Yes, Bolivia. Bolivia?

**Viviana Chacón Urdininea (BOL):** Yes, Madame I did not have the chance to vote because the poll was open, but it did not let me vote.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** But are you on a computer or on a telephone?

**Viviana Chacón Urdininea (BOL):** I am on a computer.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** And do you have two screens in front of you? One for Zoom and one for Lumi?

**Viviana Chacón Urdininea (BOL):** Yes, yes, yes. It was on the Lumi, but it said "you are connected to the Lumi" but the poll was open. It said "the poll is open" but it could not be accessed.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** No, "poll open" was written only on the Zoom platform.

**Viviana Chacón Urdininea (BOL):** Ah. Ok.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** On the Lumi platform, you should have something else. Do you have your screen split in two? Do you have Zoom in one side and in the other Lumi?

**Viviana Chacón Urdininea (BOL):** No.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, is your Zoom screen full screen or can you reduce your screen?

**Viviana Chacón Urdininea (BOL):** Yes, I will reduce it. Pass to another person's question, I will try and if I have problems, I will call you back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Who else? Colombia?

**Mariana Vila Carvajal (COL):** Nathalie, it did not let me vote. I am on an iPhone.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** On the iPhone, you have to be logged in on both pages: Zoom and separately Lumi. If you are only logged in on Zoom, you cannot vote because you are not logged in on Lumi.

**Mariana Vila Carvajal (COL):** Ok, I am looking how to connect to Lumi. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Any other questions? Ok, so we are going to first vote on the questions from the Ukrainian Federation. The Ukrainian Federation wants not to vote today on the Russian and Belarusian athletes and officials. This is their request number one. As that question is a modification of the agenda, it cannot pass if it is not voted with three fourth of the votes. The second question is to postpone the vote until there is a final decision on their complaint. Again, as it is a modification of the agenda, it requires three fourth of the votes. So, I will give the floor now to the notary for the display of the first question from the Ukrainian Federation and to handle the vote.

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you, Nathalie. I will first read out the matter they will be voting on, which is as follows: Request 1) from Fencing Federation of Ukraine: **Do you agree to the following: To exclude from the agenda for the FIE Online Extraordinary Congress scheduled for the 10th of March 2023 the point for discussion, voting or any other actions, including directives or instructions by FIE Authorities, regarding the admission of \*Russian\* and/or \*Belarusian\* fencers for the qualifying competitions to participate in the Olympic Games 2024 and any other international competitions?**

And the vote is now open.

The vote will close in 1 minute.

The vote will close in 30 seconds.

The vote will close in 10 seconds.

The vote is now closed, and the results will be displayed shortly.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So please...

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you. The results of the voting are as follows: **133 Federations voted, there were 3 abstentions, there were 130 valid ballots and the majority required is 98. Yes: 46. No: 84.** Thank you and I hand the floor back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the proposal did not pass. We move now to the second request from the Ukrainian Federation. And I give the floor to the notary.

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you. And we now move to the next item to vote on, which is as follows:

Request 2) from the Fencing Federation of Ukraine: **Do you agree to the following: To refrain from deciding the matter specified in paragraph (1) above until the complaint of Ukraine Fencing Federation is duly considered with making a final decision in accordance with the FIE Ethical Code and the FIE Disciplinary Code, including the consideration of the complaint in all instances of the Court of Arbitration for Sport, and, if necessary, in Swiss courts.**

And the vote is now open.

The vote will close in 1 minute.

The vote will close in 30 seconds.

The vote will close in 10 seconds.

The vote is now closed, and the results will shortly be displayed.

The result of the voting is as follows: **134 Federations voted, there were 4 abstentions and 130 valid ballots. The required majority is 98. Yes: 46. No: 84.** Thank you and I hand the floor back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, request number 2) did not pass. We will now move to the 3 questions that were sent to you and on which we are going to vote today. You have received these questions and I will give the floor to the notary for question number 1).

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you. And the next item to vote reads as follows, which is question 1): **Do you agree to allow athletes with an FIE Licence registered by the National Federation of Russia or Belarus and holding the respective passport (or citizenship) to participate in FIE individual competitions from the second half of April 2023, subject to possible future IOC recommendations/decisions, and in compliance with conditions of neutrality and individual eligibility?**

And the vote is now open.

The vote will close in 1 minute.

The vote will close in 30 seconds.

The vote will close in 10 seconds.

The vote is now closed, and the results will be displayed shortly.

The results of the voting were as follows: **136 Federations voted, there was 1 abstention, and 135 valid ballots. The required majority is 68. Yes: 89. No: 46.** Thank you and I hand the floor back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the proposal passed. We now move to the second question, and I give the floor to the notary.

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you. And the second question to be voted on is as follows: **Do you agree to allow athletes with an FIE Licence registered by the National Federation of Russia or Belarus and holding the respective passport (or citizenship) to participate in FIE team competitions from the second half of April 2023, subject to possible future IOC recommendations/decisions, and in compliance with conditions of neutrality and individual eligibility?**

And the vote is now open.

The vote will close in 1 minute.

The vote will close in 30 seconds.

The vote will close in 10 seconds.

The vote is now closed, and the results will be displayed shortly.

The results of the voting were as follows: **139 Federations voted, there were 3 abstentions, there were 136 valid ballots. The required majority is 69. Yes: 85. No: 51.** Thank you and I hand the floor back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The proposal passed. We now move to the last question, question number 3). And I give the floor to the notary.

**Edward Gardiner:** Thank you. And the next item to be voted on is question 3) which is as follows: **Do you agree to allow officials (referees, coaches, trainers, medical staff, technical staff, members of commissions and councils) registered by the National Federation of Russia or Belarus and holding the respective passport (or citizenship) to attend FIE competitions from the second half of April 2023, subject to possible future IOC recommendations/decisions, and in compliance with conditions of neutrality and individual eligibility?**

And the vote is now open.

The vote will close in 1 minute.

The vote will close in 30 seconds.

The vote will close in 10 seconds.

The vote is now closed, and the results will be displayed shortly.

The result of the voting is as follows: there were **138 Federations voted, there were 2 abstentions, there are 136 valid ballots. The majority required is 69. Yes: 88. No: 48.** Thank you and I hand the floor back.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the proposal passed. So, I will give... We have finished with that item on the agenda. As said earlier, the next item will not be dealt now because we are...there is no decision from the IOC on the Olympic Games. So, we are not going to deal with that item and the floor now is to the Interim President.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Thank you Nathalie. Thank you everybody for your participation in our Extraordinary Congress. And I hope altogether to try for the best of our Federation and to stay united in the near future. And of course, we respect in any case the decisions and the recommendations or future recommendations and decisions of IOC. Thank you very much for your participation. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, with these words from the Interim President, we have now finished with the items that had to be discussed today.

And I would like to thank all of you for your collaboration in this Extraordinary Online Congress. And I would like also to thank the translators, Lumi for the voting platform, Vector.Com for the IT management, Mr. Gardiner the notary, Mr. Ibarrola the lawyer and, last but not least, all the staff in Lausanne who has done an extraordinary and very difficult job in order to organise that meeting today. I thank them very much and I thank all those who contributed to the organisation of that event. Thank you very much.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Hello.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, we can hear you.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Thank you very much and thank you very much for this important meeting. We will continue, of course, our efforts. And regarding the letter which we placed with Ethics Committee I believe it will be a fair proceeding as fair as the existing regulation. And I also would like to have for the record if you could prepare and then pass to us, maybe to allow the members, whether all the present delegates with their

federations have paid the annual fees. That is important to understand because, as I understand, only Delegations, Federations who paid the annual fees are allowed to vote. So, we would make a request, an official request to send us a list of the Federations who have paid the fees at the moment, until the moment of the Congress. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the floor is to the Interim President and to the Treasurer regarding the decision that was made by the Executive Committee a few weeks ago, regarding the payment of the annual fee for the Extraordinary Congress.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** So, the floor is to the Interim President and then to the Treasurer. Unmute your microphone.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ok, now you can hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes, we can.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ok. So, during the last Executive Committee it was... some questions from a few Federations who was not easy to pay for practical reasons. And we accept this... to accept to participate to this Congress for this Federations. And I think the Treasurer knows the names of these Federations, to say exactly the names of these Federations.

**Ferial Salhi (ALG):** Yes, in one of the last meetings, the Executive Committee decided to let all the Federations participate to the Extraordinary Congress. Because most of our Federations pay at the World Championships and it is difficult for them to make transfers and as it is an Extraordinary one, so, they have time to pay at the World Championships and before the Ordinary Congress in November.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The rule is that the annual fee should be paid one month before the Congress except when the Executive Committee allows the Federations to pay later on. This is one of the prerogatives of the Executive Committee and it has allowed this exception because the administrative rules say the annual fees should be paid in March and the invoices that was sent was for March, while the Extraordinary Congress was held also in March. So, the rule that applies is that the Federations have to pay their annual fees one month before the Ordinary Congress which will be in November and the Executive Committee, as it is its right, has accepted that annual fees would be paid during the Junior and Cadet World Championships or at the Senior World Championships. This was recorded in the list of decisions of the Executive Committee of the past weeks. And this is stated at that Congress and announced at that Congress.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Hallo? Can you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes.

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** Thank you very much for information. We would like to have that decision, the list of decisions of the Executive Committee. I think it is available on site. If not, then we will ask to send us such a decision. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** The lists of decisions of the Executive Committee are not public. They are internal to the Executive Committee. And the possibility of postponing the payment of FIE annual fees is provided for in the Statutes of the FIE. This decision was made by the Executive Committee several weeks ago and it is announced

at that Congress. So, the reasons why this has been postponed is that usually the Congress is held in November and therefore the annual fees must be paid one month before the Congress. However, this year we had an Extraordinary Congress which is an additional Congress of the FIE and the Executive Committee knows perfectly well that a number of Federations cannot make bank transfers. This is impossible for them. They pay in cash at the Junior and Cadet World Championships or at the Senior World Championships or one month before the Congress or in March when we issue the invoices. It is the prerogative of the Executive Committee to accept exception of payment and the Executive Committee made this decision, which is announced at that Extraordinary Congress.

Is there any other questions or comments?

**Sergii Mishchenko (UKR):** On my side, no questions.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Any other comment? Any other question? So, in that case I think the Interim President can close the Extraordinary Congress. Please unmute.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Now do you hear me?

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Yes.

**Emmanuel Katsiadakis (MH):** Ok. Thank you. I repeat, Nathalie, first of all, thank you very much for your help and all the staff. You already said thank you very much for all the participants in this Extraordinary Congress. And without to have any other items, I close this Extraordinary Congress. Thank you.

**Nathalie Rodriguez:** Thank you everyone. Have a good afternoon, evening, and night.

## **OBITUARY**

The International Fencing Federation has been affected by the loss of several friends and it is with deep sadness that the FIE has learned of the passing of:

### **Olga Orban-Szabo 1938 - 2022**

Olga Orban-Szabo (ROU), multiple-time Olympic medallist and world champion and a member of the FIE Hall of Fame, passed away on January 5, 2022.

Born on October 9, 1938, in Cluj, Ms. Szabo was the first Olympic medallist and world champion for Romania, and competed in five Olympic Games (Melbourne 1956, Rome 1960, Tokyo 1964, Mexico City 1968 and Munich 1972). She earned her first Olympic medal, a silver in women's individual foil, in Melbourne, and then a bronze in women's team foil in both the Mexico City and Munich Games.

She became individual women's foil world champion at the 1962 Buenos Aires World Championships. As part of the Romanian women's foil team (including Maria Vicol, Ileana Gyulai, Ecaterina Stahl, and Ana Pascu), she took a gold medal at the 1969 Havana World Championships, another first for her country.

In all, Ms. Orban-Szabo earned 11 Olympic and World Championships medals in women's foil, including three from the Olympic Games and eight at the World Championships between 1961 and 1970. Prior to that, she was a junior world silver medallist in 1959.

She also won three medals at the Universiade, including individual silver and team gold in 1961 and team silver in 1965.

As member of the army club "Steaua Bucharest", she won the Romanian national championship seven times, and was awarded the national title of "Emeritus Master of Sport" as well as numerous Romanian orders and titles. She graduated from the Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj-Napoca and was also a fencing master. Following her retirement from competition in 1972, she worked as a youth fencing coach at her club in Bucharest.

"She was a distinguished Lady of the Romanian fencing team", stated Marius Florea, Romanian Federation President. "The Romanian Fencing Federation would like to express its deep gratitude for Mrs. Olga Orban-Szabo's contribution to the foundation of the Romanian fencing family."

### **José VALARINHO 1935 - 2022**

José Valarinho (POR), member of the FIE Hall of Fame, passed away on March 30, 2022, at the age of 87. He was a member of the FIE Disciplinary Commission from 1996 to 2004.

He was awarded a special FIE gold medal three times for his academic work on fencing as well as organising the 1988 FIE Congress in Madeira and the 2002 Lisbon World Championships. He also received the Olympic Order of the Portuguese Olympic Committee and the Medal for Sports Merits by the Portuguese government.

Mr. Valarinho was president of the Portuguese Fencing Federation for two terms beginning in 1992. He joined the organisation in 1969 as president of the Technical Commission, and over several decades he had a significant impact on the growth and

development of fencing in Portugal. He participated in a “Plan for the Development of Sports” with a special programme, “500 Foils”, and worked to support Portugal becoming more active in international fencing.

Mr. Valarinho took part in organising the first European Championships in Lisbon, 1983, as well as multiple other continental and world competitions held in Portugal during the 1980s and 1990s. His vision for Portuguese becoming a strong participant in world fencing was realised fully when his country’s men’s foil team won the gold medal at the 2000 European Championships in Madeira. After his departure from the presidency, he successfully organised the 2002 Lisbon Fencing World Championships.

Having a traditional Portuguese military education, Mr. Valarinho ultimately became an Army officer, and it was during his schooling where he first experienced fencing along with becoming a skilled equestrian. He graduated with honours as a maître at the Military Sports Centre in Mafra, where he was a competitive fencer and took part in the 1959 Universiade as a member of the men’s sabre team. Following school, he became a fencing master, specialised in recruiting and developing young fencers.

He was the author of two books on the history of Portuguese fencing and was in the process of preparing a third edition.

“He was a fencer to his dying day”, said his son, Frederico Valarinho, who has been a member of the Portuguese Fencing Federation since 2006.

### **Ana PASCU (MH) 1944 - 2022**

Ms. Ana Pascu (ROU), FIE Member of Honour and Hall of Fame member, passed away in Bucharest on April 6, 2022. She was born on September 22, 1944.

Elected in 2000, Ms. Pascu served as a member of the FIE Executive Committee, including being vice president from 2004 to 2021. Prior to that, she was a member of the FIE Rules Commission from 1984 to 1988 and of the FIE Refereeing Commission from 1988 to 1996. She was also an FIE international referee in foil and epee.

She holds the record as the longest-serving president of a Romanian Fencing Federation. From 1982 to 2013, Ms. Pascu headed the Federation, contributing to the sporting achievements of Romanian fencers who won 134 medals during her tenure, including nine at the Olympic Games, 57 at the World Championships and 68 at the European Championships. Following her retirement as president, she was appointed honorary president of the Romanian Fencing Federation. She was also vice president of the Romanian Olympic and Sports Committee.

As an athlete, Ms. Pascu was a five-time Olympic foilist, and in team foil she won a bronze medal at the 1968 and 1972 Olympic Games and the gold medal at the 1969 Havana World Championships. In individual foil, she won the Junior World Championships in 1963 as well as the bronze medal at the 1971 World Championships. As part of the Romanian Women’s Foil Team, she won the team foil silver medal at the 1970 World Championships and bronze medals at the 1961, 1967, 1971, 1973, 1974 and 1975 World Championships. In 1961 and 1965, her team won gold and silver, respectively, at the World University Games (“Universiade”).

Ms. Pascu also had a career as a fencing coach and physical education teacher until 1982, having earned a doctorate in physical education and sport. Her doctoral thesis was titled *The Strategy for Enhancing Sports Preparation in Competitions*. She also held a “Doctor Honoris Causa” from Vasile Goldis University in Romania. She authored numerous scientific and sports publications and was awarded several titles and decorations, including the National Order of Merit in the rank of Officer and Knight.

Ms. Pascu dedicated her entire life to fencing, fencers, Romanian Fencing and the FIE, and the many successes resulting from this are testament to her incredible talent and passion for our sport. In the words of Emmanuel Katsiadakis, FIE Interim President, “She tirelessly, generously and with infinite kindness helped, supported, and motivated all those who sought her help and advice. She was an outstanding mentor and role model for athletes, officials, and leaders in fencing, as well as for girls and women in sport. The fencing family has lost a great lady and an emblematic personality with rare and invaluable

human and professional qualities. She will remain in our memories, in our hearts and in our history.”

### **Mark RANCE 1963 - 2022**

Mark Rance (NZL), on May 3, 2022, passed away in Christchurch, New Zealand. He was the current president of the FIE Veterans Council until his passing and had been a member since 2016. Mr. Rance was elected to the Oceania Fencing Confederation board in 2020 and then elected vice president by the board, serving from 2020 until now. He was president of Fencing New Zealand from 2017 until October 2021.

In 2016, Mr. Rance was the chair of the organising committee for the Christchurch Commonwealth Veterans Fencing Championships, named as a finalist in the Canterbury Sports Awards. He also took a silver medal as part of the men’s epee team at the same event.

“Mark combined his love of fencing and sound business skills when working with the Veterans Council to get the best outcomes for veteran fencing worldwide”, said Rita Comes (USA), on behalf of the FIE Veterans Council. “His presence will be missed.”

Originally from England, and born on February 7, 1963, Mr. Rance was a competitive swimmer before discovering fencing at the age of 10. He fenced at the Reading Club and then at the London Thames Fencing Club for several years, achieving strong results in both regional and national events, and later participated in European tournaments and finished in the top 12 epeeists in the 1983 Junior World Championship. In the 1980s, he was considered for being a member of the British Olympic team, although several issues and an injury prevented him from attaining that goal.

Mr. Rance moved to New Zealand in the 1990s, where he lived in the South Island town of Ashburton. After a hiatus from fencing, in 2008 his passion for the sport reignited after attending an epee tournament in Christchurch; he shortly thereafter made the podium at the New Zealand Men’s National Championships. From there, he went on to represent New Zealand in both senior and veteran events globally, and in 2010 won a bronze medal in veteran individual men’s epee and silver in veteran men’s team epee at the Commonwealth Fencing Championships in Melbourne, Australia.

“Mark was always a man who was willing to help, particularly with the young people of our sport who he coached and mentored for several years”, stated David Elder, Fencing New Zealand president. “Many young fencers will sorely miss his advice and expertise.”

According to Mr. Elder, for a significant period Mr. Rance was the highest-ranked men’s veteran epeeist in Australasia (Australia and New Zealand).

### **Daniel R. DECHAIINE Jr 1934 - 2022**

Daniel R. DeChaine, Jr. (USA), was a member of the FIE SEMI Commission for more than 30 years.

Born on October 29, 1934 in California, USA, he was best-known for his extensive work as a fencing armorer. He was elected to the SEMI Commission in 1985, serving until 2016. In that role, he was the chief armorer/technician and SEMI Commission representative at numerous world fencing events, including the Pan American Games; Junior, Cadet and Senior Fencing World Championships; and numerous other events. At the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games, he was the technical manager of fencing and the manager of armorers.

In addition to armoury, Mr. DeChaine invented, designed, and constructed test devices for fencing, including ones used at the 1976 and 1984 Olympic Games.

“For decades, Team USA athletes put their trust in Dan DeChaine”, said David Arias, chair of the USA Fencing Board of Directors. “With Dan in their corner, our athletes knew they were in good hands. Through his work with the SEMI Commission of the FIE, Dan helped design rules for fencing equipment and invent the test devices that ensured all fencers had an even

playing field. With the passing of Dan DeChaine, the international fencing community has lost a legend of the sport. His legacy will be felt at local, regional, national, and international fencing tournaments for generations.”

In 2007, Mr. DeChaine was inducted into the USA Fencing Hall of Fame, in part for his extensive contributions as the national team armorer at the Olympic Games, World Championships, World University Games and Pan American Games dating back to 1967. He was also the official fencing armorer for the Modern Pentathlon World Championships as well as a consultant to many national fencing federations on armoury, equipment and equipment selection. He served terms as the chairman and co-chairman of the National Technical Commission of the United States Fencing Association and authored numerous articles on equipment repair, maintenance and troubleshooting.

Mr. DeChaine earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Zoology from Pomona College in 1956.

### **Ahmad Akbari JAVID 1947 – 2022**

The FIE is saddened to learn of the passing of Mr. Ahmad Akbari Javid (IRI), on Oct. 17, 2022. He was a member of the FIE Veterans’ Council from 2012 – 2016.

Mr. Javid was born on Feb. 10, 1947 and spent seven decades of his life in fencing. He competed for Iran in individual and team foil and team sabre events at the 1976 Montreal Summer Olympic Games. At the 1974 Asian Games, held in Tehran, Iran, he was a gold and bronze medallist in foil and sabre. In addition to many other achievements in international and Asian competitions, he also received bronze medals in individual men’s foil and the team sabre event at the 2017 Asian Veterans’ Championships.

He served as secretary-general of the Iranian Fencing Federation from 1993 to 1998 and 2009 to 2011, and was a member of the Veterans’ Commission of the Asian Fencing Confederation. He worked for many years as an international foil referee.

Mr. Javid founded the fencing department in the Iranian Ministry of Sports and was responsible for it from 1991 to 2009, and was the director of the Tehran Province Fencing Department from 1989 to 1999. During his life, he also held numerous other roles in Iranian fencing, including being the head of the Iranian University Sports Department. He worked as a sports professor at the Amir Kabir Polytechnic University from 1993 to 2009, chaired the Iranian Training Committee from 2010 to 2017 and was the Iranian national foil coach.

In a statement from the Iranian Fencing Federation, Mr. Javid “...was a coach who contributed all his life to fencing and sport” and “tirelessly, generously and with infinite kindness helped, supported and motivated all those who sought help and advice in fencing and sport”.

### **Alexey KUZNETSOV 1967 - 2022**

Mr. Alexey Kuznetsov (CAN) passed away on Nov. 1 of 2022, born on September 2, 1967, in Luhansk, Ukraine. He was an FIE international referee.

As an FIE foil and epee referee since 1999, Mr. Kuznetsov served at many World Cups, Grand Prix events, Zonal Championships and Games, World Championships and the University Games as well as the Rio 2016 Olympic Games.

He was president of the Pan American Fencing Confederation Federation Refereeing Commission since 2016.

For Canada, Mr. Kuznetsov was a member of the Canadian Fencing Federation Refereeing Committee and the Canadian national coach for the senior men’s foil team from 2013 to 2016. Since 1996, he coached athletes in both Canada and the USA, achieving national and international results. He also was a technical adviser for national and international competitions in Canada, for numerous years providing coaching and refereeing mentorship for the CFF.



Mr. Kuznetsov held a bachelor's degree as a fencing coach and in physical education from the Pedagogical University in Ukraine (1988).

### **Semen RIKHTMAN 1946 - 2022**

Semen Rikhtman (RUS) passed away on Dec. 6, who retired last year from the FIE SEMI Commission. He was born on August 6, 1946.

Mr. Rikhtman was president of the SEMI Commission from 2012 to 2021 and had been a member since 1992. A frequent SEMI delegate to FIE events, he worked at multiple Fencing World Championships as well as the London 2012, Rio 2016 and Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games.

From 2000 to 2012, Mr. Rikhtman was a member of the European Fencing Confederation SEMI Commission.

Mr. Rikhtman graduated with a university degree in radio electronics and was an expert in radio technology. He began developing referee and information systems in 1976 and took part in designing equipment used at major sports events, including at the Olympic Games. Over the course of his career, Mr. Rikhtman was awarded numerous patents and copyrights under his name.

### **Igor TŠIKINJOV 1961 - 2022**

Igor Tšikinšov (EST) passed away on December 8, at the age of 61. Born on June 26, 1961, in Kohtla-Järve, Estonia, he was a renowned Olympic and national coach and former fencer.

Mr. Tšikinšov participated in four Olympic Games as an epee coach, including Sydney 2000, Athens 2004 and Beijing 2008 for the Swedish national team, and Rio 2016 for the Estonian national team.

He was the senior coach of the Estonian women's epee team from 1991 to 1992, after which he was the head coach of the Swedish fencing team from 2003 to 2012. He coached the Estonian epee team from 2013 to 2018, and then from 2020 to 2021. In-between those periods with Estonia, he coached the Uzbekistan fencing team from 2018 to 2019.

His athletes won numerous international medals in epee, including Oksana Jermakova, individual world and two-time Olympic team champion; Erika Kirpu, world, and Olympic team champion; Nikolai Novosjolov, two-time world champion; and Peter Vanky, who competed in four Olympic Games and won numerous international medals. In 2015, his Estonian women's epee team won the European Championships, and the Swedish and Uzbekistan teams also achieved medals in major competitions under his coaching.

Mr. Tšikinšov began fencing in 1973. As an athlete, he became Estonian team champion in 1981 in epee and 1984-1985 in foil.

We express our sincerest condolences to the bereaved families and federations of the deceased.

## 1.3 Antidoping

### 1.3.1 CONTROLS

Antidoping measures were continued throughout the period and one antidoping rule violation occurred.

Under the FIE Testing Authority, 395 in-competition tests and 85 out-of-competition were performed. 474 urine tests and 6 blood tests were performed.

### 1.3.2 CLEAN SPORT EDUCATION

In cooperation with International Testing Agency, the FIE provided one-hour, interactive anti-doping webinars available to all athletes, coaches, and officials, prior to the Junior and Cadet World Championships and prior to the Senior World Championships.

The webinars took place respectively:

on March 12 and March 26, 2022 (total number of participants: 118)

on June 28 and June 29, 2022 (total number of participants: 69)

The programmes were presented in English, French and Spanish and covered key clean-sport topics including prohibited substances, medications and supplements and therapeutic-use exemptions (TUEs).

The webinars were presented by the ITA, by Jeremy Summers, President of the FIE Medical Commission and Dr Sabrina Halaimia, Member of the FIE Medical Commission. Attendees received an official certificate of participation as well as a PDF of the presentation and links for useful related resources.

Furthermore, the International Testing Agency (ITA), in partnership with the FIE, presented five multi-language webinars addressing anti-doping and Clean Sport principles, information and practices for athletes, coaches and federations.

These Clean Sport webinars were part of the FIE educational programmes, and all FIE athletes and coaches have been highly encouraged to participate in all sessions; for those who attended, a certificate of completion was awarded. A total of 124 participants registered and participated in the webinars.

## 1.4 **Media - Digital, TV and Magazine**

### 1.4.1 **FIE MEDIA IN 2022**

During 2022, the FIE continued to increase its communication through multiple media platforms include its website, magazine (both online and printed issues) and social channels of Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube. The media coverage on signature events (Senior World Championships and Grand Prix) resulted in fruitful outcomes that guaranteed the continuous growth of digital channels.

The FIE Grand Prix staged six events in 2021-2022 season, including 11-13 November 2021 in Orleans, 28-30 January 2022 in Doha, 04-06 March 2022 in Budapest, 29 April 01 May 2022 in Cairo, 13-15 May 2022 in Incheon and 20-22 May 2022 in Padua.

The partnership with Eurosport and collaboration with global rightsholders has driven the growth of our global audience and media exposure.

### 1.4.2 **DIGITAL CHANNELS**

2022 was the first year following the Tokyo 2020 Olympics, and some metrics experienced anticipated post-Olympic decline to some degree. However, as the Senior World Championships (Cairo 2022) were held for the first time since the pandemic, as well as six Grand Prix events being staged, the FIE managed to keep all the digital channels growing robustly by fully leveraging these events. In addition, some initiatives such as World Fencing Day and Donate Your Fencing Gear also brought abundant content for non-competition coverage.

Through a promotional collaboration with Eurosport, the FIE digital campaign on the Eurosport website and application generated 39.3 million impressions.

During Cairo 2022, the videos produced by ICARUS provided with high-quality content for the event coverage.

Below are some key facts:

#### Website

In 2022, the FIE website reached 8.9 million page views, increasing by 48.3% (six million in 2021); it was visited by 850K million new users (1.1 million in 2021) and received 2.5 million sessions, increasing by 25% (2 million in 2021).

Among all countries/regions, USA (13%), Hong Kong China (9.6%), China (8.6%), France (7.6%) and Italy (5.5%) were the top five with the most users. The ranking was the same for new users.

#### YouTube

In 2022, the FIE YouTube channel experienced 4.6 million views, 21% more than 2021. The viewing time was 557K hours, a 46% increase. Even while the 767K video views represented 49% less than 2021, the 3.9 million live views were 66% more for the same period.

With 10K new subscribers added, the subscriptions reached 84,854 by the end of 2022, a 13% increase.

#### Facebook

In 2022, the FIE Facebook account received 29 million impressions and a reach of 11 million, a decrease of 19% and 53%, respectively. But the engagement reached 641K, a 21% increase. The number of followers reached 131,569, with 5.4K new followers added.

#### Twitter

In 2022, the FIE Twitter account received 1.47 million impressions (a 66% decrease) and engagements of 55K. The number of followers reached 22,426 with 1.6K new followers added.

#### Instagram

In 2022, the FIE Instagram account experienced 11 million impressions, 8.9 million reach and 872K engagements, a decrease of 26%, 29% and 31.5%, respectively. With 26K new users added, the total amount reached 98K by the end of 2022.

#### During the Cairo 2022 World Championships

The FIE website had 684K page views and 213K sessions, with 68K new users visiting the site.

The YouTube channel had 1.7 million views and 2.8K new subscribers. "The FIE YouTube channel aired by far the most content – 362 hours of broadcast time", according to Nielsen analytics.

- Facebook received 5.1 million impressions, a 2.3 million reach with 158K engagements
- Twitter had 244K impressions and 12K engagements
- Instagram received 1.7 million impressions, 1.4 million reaches with 144K engagements

The decline of some metrics, such as impressions and engagements, was expected due to the expected post-Olympic period, but there were still some surprises from Facebook, YouTube and the FIE website –for example, livestreaming on YouTube obtained more views than 2021. In general, growth was observed on all the channels, and the strategy of focusing on the commitment and interaction of athletes and the public on social media continues.

### **1.4.3 TELEVISION**

#### Grand Prix Events

(\* for the Grand Prix, the metrics of the "2021-2022 season" include Orleans GP in Nov 2021 but not the Orleans GP in Dec 2022)

The rightsholders include the Olympic Channel, Eurosport (tv) and PCCW (streaming).

FIE Grand Prix broadcasting accumulated an audience of 18.24 million viewers, including the top-five markets by cumulative audiences: France (8.3 million), Hungary (5 million), Germany (2 million), Russia (0.7 million) and South Korea (0.6 million). Grand Prix events total broadcast time reached 984.5 hours while visibility reached 478 hours. Eurosport channels across European countries top 10: Estonia, Iceland, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Belgium, Hungary, Norway, France, and Switzerland contributed to the major segments.

Grand Prix events received 256 million impressions, with 62 million of them coming from France (the most among all countries) and France 3 (57.3 million), the most of all TV channels.

#### Cairo Senior World Championships

Cairo 2022 received nearly 148 million audience views via the FIE's YouTube channel, Olympic Channels and rightsholders in multiple countries (Brazil, China, Colombia, Egypt, France, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Poland, Russia, South Korea, Spain, Ukraine, USA). The top five markets by total audiences included Italy (50.2 million), China (27.7 million), France (24.8 million), Japan (15.7 million) and South Korea (10.29 million). China's CCTV5 topped all TV channels as it contributed a 27.7 million total viewing audience.

Cairo 2022's total broadcast time reached 1633 hours, while visibility reached 3410 hours. The top five countries/regions, in terms of total broadcast time, included Italy (56.5 hours), Belgium (56 hours), Malaysia (47 hours), Pan-Asia (47 hours) and Hungary (44 hours).

The event obtained 1.91 billion impressions in total, with Italy (303.5 million) accounting for the largest share, followed by China (93 million), Hungary (84 million), France (63 million) and Egypt (59 million). Among all TV channels, Rai Sport+ HD and CCTV5 were the top two contributors, providing 153 million impressions and 93 impressions, respectively.

#### Eurosport

In the 2021-2022 season, FIE events (Grand Prix events, European Championships, World Championships) had a duration of 157 hours, 6 minutes for global TV broadcasts on Eurosport 1, Eurosport 2 and Eurosport Asia. 150 TV spots recorded 56.1 million impacts on Eurosport 1&2, reaching 13.6 million unique viewers.

### **1.4.4 OFFICIAL 2022 FIE PRESS RELEASES**

In 2022, the FIE continued direct communication with the press and other interested parties subscribing to official FIE news, publishing and distributing with more than 50 press releases to media and press worldwide. This represents more than 168,000 individual emails sent with FIE news and information about events, projects, and other newsworthy bulletins.

### **1.4.5 DIGITAL MAGAZINE – ESCRIME XXI**

In 2022, with three issues (No.120-122) published, the online magazine received 3.6K page views, a slight decrease compared with 2021 (3.9K). The average time on each page was 1min 30s, an increase of 1 minute, 19s from 2021.

### **1.4.6 CHANGES & EVOLUTION**

In 2022, the FIE started to consider improved ways to utilise media content as well as protecting our rights. As a result, it was decided to launch in 2023 a new image hub that will be a library for all FIE photos, including a monetising feature, and to launch an OTT platform that will be the hub for displaying and storing FIE videos. Both programmes are in process.

By the end of 2022, about it was decided to consider an alternative to the digital magazine to increase exposure and reach to readers worldwide, and this programme is in process.

Every member of the Fencing Family had the opportunity on World Fencing Day, to convey how being involved in fencing becomes a natural and essential part of one's personal identity, giving strength and shaping each person's life and future.

With global support for World Fencing Day, more than 4,500 media tags across multiple social media platforms expressed a diversity of fencing perspectives, activities, and postings from 65 countries and reaching more than 130,000 accounts, using their favourite platform with the following tags:

The "Fencing is for Life" theme resonated around the world as a message of inspiration and life experience, a perennial sport that has endured the ages and will continue to do so.

## 1.7 FIE Safeguarding trainings

### 1.7.1 WEBINAR FOR MEMBERS OF THE FIE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, COMMISSIONS, COUNCILS AND COMMITTEES.

As part of ongoing work to implement its safeguarding policy, the FIE organised a safeguarding training webinar that took place on June 23 on Zoom.

The training programme was led by the FIE safeguarding officers Georgina Usher (GBR), president of the FIE Women and Fencing Council and Samuel Cheris (USA, MH), president of the FIE Legal Commission. The objective of the event was to provide members of the Executive Committee as well as the commissions and councils and the FIE staff with a thorough understanding of safeguarding concepts and the different tools the FIE puts at the disposal of all its members to provide a sport environment free from harassment/abuse/neglect.

The session included an introduction to safeguarding in sport, an overview of the legal framework in place and a focus on the FIE safeguarding policy and procedures, with a specific emphasis on the responsibilities of the supervisors at World Cups and Grand Prix competitions to manage and report disclosures.

The webinar consisted of three parts:

- A main session
- Discussion groups
- Q&A final session

About 70 people took part in the webinar.

### 1.7.2

#### WEBINARS FOR NATIONAL FEDERATIONS

The FIE hosted two Safe Sport webinars to help federations implement, review, and improve safeguarding policies at the national level. They took place on Tuesday, Dec. 13 at 1400 CET and Wednesday, Dec. 14 at 2000 CET to provide the widest-possible reach around the world. Simultaneous interpretation in French and Spanish was provided.

Approximately 60 people attended the webinars, which were organised by the FIE and led by Georgina Usher, president of the FIE Women and Fencing Council, FIE safeguarding officer and certified IOC International safeguarding officer in sport.

The presentations included two parts:

- The definition of safeguarding, the definition of the different kinds of abuse and harassment and practical references and examples of the impact the different kinds of abuse and harassment can have and FIE, IOC and international organisations and members.
- Thorough guidelines and practical steps presented to support drafting safeguarding policies, including preparation, development, content, application, and implementation.

The FIE is committed to ensuring fencing is practiced in a safe environment, where athletes harmoniously and all the members of the FIE family are granted respect and protected from all forms of harassment and abuse.

### 2.2 Training camps for athletes

## 2.3 Oceania Fencing Master Academy (OFMA)

### Oceania Fencing Confederation (OFC) Coaching Commission

- The Commission met monthly via Zoom technology and phone during 2022 to plan and progress various OFMA projects.
- A 2022 Coach Education Plan was developed to assist the post Covid-19 restart of Fencing activities in Oceania. Two of the planned activities were an online Level 1 Foil Course and supporting Fencing New Zealand with their Olympic Solidarity Technical Course for Coaches (Foil).
- The Commission continued development of the OFMA Coach Assessor Training Course and continues to administer the operational activities of OFMA.

### OFMA Coach Education

- Under the auspices of OFMA, the OFC partnered with Global Fencing Masters (GFM) to advertise and conduct an online Level 1 Foil Course. Using a web-based learning platform, a phone app and Zoom technology, the Course was presented over 3 months to 25 Coaches from Australia, New Zealand, Fiji, Guam, and Papua New Guinea.
- With Covid-19 restrictions being lifted, the Regional Development Officer was able to travel to Guam, Brisbane, and Melbourne to conduct face-to-face review of the course content and assessments for most participants in the online Course. Coaching Commission members in New Zealand also conducted reviews and assessments at four locations.
- Fencing New Zealand (FeNZ) received funding from the IOC and New Zealand Olympic Committee for an Olympic Solidarity Technical Foil Course for Coaches. This course was also supported by the FIE. The Course was held in Christchurch from 12-20 December 2022. OFMA assisted with planning and delivery. Maître Zoltan Bernat of the FIE Coaching Academy, Budapest was the Head Coach for this extremely successful event. 33 student coaches enjoyed the benefits of his high-level fencing knowledge & experience.
- OFMA established a panel including Maître Bernat and representatives of the OFC Coaching Commission to conduct Level 2 Foil Assessments. 14 coaches chose to be assessed and were successful in gaining their Level 2 Foil accreditation. Each received a Level 2 Certificate from OFMA.
- The IOC provided FeNZ with a certificate template for the Course & all 33 participants received a personalised copy.

## 2.4 Training academies for coaches

All 2022 Class students successfully finalised Academy programme and received their FIE recognised Fencing Coaching Diploma. Diplomas were delivered by the FIE Sport and Technical Director Mr Dieter Lammer.

At the graduation Ceremony each student received a complete set of the coaching equipment donated by the FIE.

### 2.4.2 BUDAPEST

Budapest Coaching Academy 2022 returned after two years of no activity due of Covid-19 Pandemic. The Academy strategy, as decided on 2016, is to open education center for coaches, where coaches from all over the world could come to learn and improve their level, so they can return home with updated and first level knowledge.

During 2022, three 3-month courses were organized:

**Sabre:** from January 17th to April 18th 2022, attended by 8 selected students (4 from Asia, 3 from Europe and 1 from Pan America), we had 2 women and 6 men.

**Epee:** from April 25th to July 26th 2022, attended by 8 selected students (6 from Europe, 1 from Asia, and 1 from Pan America), we had 3 women and 5 men.

**Foil:** from August 1st to November 1st 2022, attended by 8 selected students (6 from Asia and 2 from Europe), we had 1 woman and 7 men.

The training sessions were scheduled from Monday to Friday, 6 hours per day, for 12 weeks.

The Hungarian University for Physical Education joined the program and provided theory lessons on psychology, physiology, biomechanics and theory of sports. As part of this agreement, the University acknowledges the Academy training and awards internationally-recognized Level 2 diplomas to those Academy students who pass the final exam.

At the end of the program both practical and theoretical exam were done to demonstrate and proved learned knowledge.

The experts selected to provide the specific fencing training are renowned fencing coaches:

**Sabre:** Maître Zsolt NEMCSIK

**Epee:** Maître Bela KOPETKA

**Foil:** Maître Zoltan BERNAT

- 19 out of 24 students were experienced coaches, with more than 5 years' experience before getting into the Academy.
- All graduate students are encouraged to return to their home countries to pass their knowledge and to improve the fencing in their own countries.
- All students graduate with scores over 80%
- Almost 30% women participation, increasing the number of participation leading to a 50% equity for the next few years.

Local authorities of Budapest help to find ideal facilities to rent where coaches could learn and practices under the best conditions. Full accommodation and catering were given to students during all their course.

## 2.6 Equipment aid

The criteria used to perform the analysis and allocate the equipment were as follows:

- Specific requirements: participation in FIE competitions or competitions other than the FIE ones.
- Federations in need of equipment for organising important competitions (Olympic Games, World Championships, Grand Prix, World Cup, Continental Championships, Regional Games, Universiades).
- Special cases.

The budget for 2022 was 600'000 CHF.

The FIE awarded equipment to be received by 103 federations: 25 in Europe, 25 in Asia, 3 in Oceania, 25 in the Americas and 25 in Africa. The federations received equipment worth CHF 6000.

The operations for the equipment distribution started in August 2022.

## 2.7 Donate your fencing gear.

After a stop of two years, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the FIE was able to resume the solidarity programme "Donate your fencing gear".

Two collection events were carried out in Dubai during the Junior and Cadet World Championships and in Cairo during the Senior World Championships.

In total, over 300 pieces of equipment were collected and examined by the dedicated SEMI delegates, respectively Samer Hashem (EGY) and Baiba Brandule (LAT).

5 countries, having previously presented solidarity and grassroots projects, received equipment:

- Brazil
- Colombia
- Guam
- Kenya
- Paraguay

All the donors received a certificate in recognition of their contribution and generosity and their pictures, when permitted, were published on the FIE social media.

## **2.8 Assistance with athletes' participation programme 2022**

Since 2009, the FIE has implemented a special aid programme for the athletes from federations participating in senior regional championships and the World Championship (junior and senior).

For each national federation taking part, all the confederations received a subsidy intended to cover expenses (plane ticket and hotel) for an athlete entering for:

- The Junior and Cadet World Championships
- The Senior Zonal Championships
- The Senior World Championships

## **2.9 Assistance for Confederations**

All confederations received an annual subsidy and a subsidy for their administrative expenses.

The confederations employing a sport director received an additional subsidy to pay this director's salary.

## **2.10 Assistance for competition organisers**

National federations having organised an FIE competition (senior World Cup, Grand Prix) and applying, received a subsidy of CHF 3 000 to cover the cost of video refereeing.

The FIE subsidised the cost of the Swiss Timing equipment for the Grand Prix events and Senior World Championships.

## **2.11 Fencing Equipment Repair Course in South Africa**

A workshop focused on fencing weapons repair was held at the FIE Coaching Academy in Johannesburg, South Africa from Sept. 22 – 26, with attendees participating from five African nations. The FIE invited Mr. Gilles Martinage (FRA) to lead the course.

Some of the topics covered in the programme included: an overview of electrical signalling systems (e.g., in cables, reels, scoring apparatus, pistes); general basics regarding electricity and electrical equipment; specifics of electrical circuits in epees and foils; diagnosing and localising various systemwide failures, from weapon to scoring machine; fitting weapons with new blades and ensuring they are secure, wired and operating correctly; details about foil and epee points, including proper weights, connections and operation as well as how to diagnose problems; and weapons control operations and logistics at a competition, including rules, organising weapons control and ensuring safety measures.

“The trainees were particularly attentive and eager to learn”, said Mr. Martinage. “They made the most of the numerous practical exercises to acquire the initial know-how necessary for the maintenance of the various types of equipment.”

The topics covered included theoretical and practical elements and included recalls in connection with FIE rules.

#### *2.12.2.1 FIE COMPETITIONS IN ASIA*

In 2022, 16 FIE competitions were organised.

Also, in Kuwait, U23 was successfully organised where more than 23 countries participated.

#### *2.12.2.2 CONFERENCES AND SEMINARS IN THE ASIAN REGION*

With new initiatives and framework for the development and promotion of fencing globally, the Fencing Confederation of Asia successfully organised significant events in 2022:

- FCA General Assembly in Dubai, where important decisions were taken for the growth and development of the FCA
- Intercontinental Conferences in Tashkent, where a cooperation between 3 Confederations; Pan- American, African, and Asian was signed.

#### *2.12.2.3 NEW REFEREES IN ASIA FOR FCA IN INTERNATIONAL CATEGORY*

From 1st to 6th of October 2022, Kuwait City welcomed 70 candidates from 14 countries, who were entered in the FIE refereeing exam.

#### *2.12.2.4 2022 FCA REFEREES' EXAMS CATEGORY C IN DUBAI*

50 participants from 11 Asian countries took part in these seminars and exams. 11 female referees also took part in these seminars and exams.

Referees successfully received category C- In foil - 21 licenses, In epee - 29 licenses and in sabre - 10 licenses.

#### *2.12.2.5 INTERNATIONAL SEMINAR IN MALAYSIA, 2022, WITH FOCUS ON EMBRACING WOMEN AS FENCING REFEREES*

In August 2022, the International Women's Judicial Seminar and Group C Exams were held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, which was attended by more than 61 potential women referees. This proved to be major progress in the education of a new courts in the Asian continent as well.

#### *2.12.2.6 FIE COACHING COURSES*

The main goal of these seminars is to increase the level of knowledge in the preparation of top-level athletes. It is very important for the Asian Fencing Confederation to increase the quality of the training system for the developing National Federations/ Associations and have more high-level athletes in the region. The following courses were organised:

- EPEE - September 18-28, 2022, Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia
- SABRE - October 17-27, 2022, Bangkok, Thailand
- FOIL - October 24 – November 2, 2022, Tashkent, Uzbekistan

More than 70 coaches from several developing countries in Asia participated in these international courses.

#### *2.12.2.7 INTERNATIONAL PHILANTHROPIC MISSION*

FIE maraging blades, fencing bags, and FIE masks were awarded to 17 Asian countries. This mission was a vital support for the development of National Federations.

The President of the Asian Fencing Confederation H.H. Engr. Sheikh Salem Sultan Al-Qasimi, presented the fencing equipment to the National Fencing Federations during the JCAFC 2022 in Tashkent.

#### *2.12.2.8 DEVELOPMENT OF FIE AID PROGRAMME*

In the framework of FIE AID programme 2022, 25 Asian Fencing Confederation countries were selected to receive the equipment for fencing as per FIE competition standards. Some of the countries received pistes for competitions upon their request while some received the FIE maraging blades and others received FIE full competition uniforms.

### **2.12.3 PAN AMERICAN FENCING CONFEDERATION**

#### *2.12.3.1 PAN AMERICAN CADET AND JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS 2022*

They were held in the city of Lima, Peru, from 21 to 27 March 2022. After two years without holding this event due to the pandemic, the activity was resumed with the dynamic participation of young athletes from our continent. The competitions were held in the National Sports Village (VIDENA) and had more than 300 athletes in the cadet and junior categories.

#### *2.12.3.2 PAN AMERICAN SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIP 2022*

In the city of Asunción, Paraguay, from 2 to 8 June 2022, the 2022 Pan American Senior Championships were held, which was also the qualifying event for the Santiago 2023 Pan American Games. The competitions took place in the facilities of the central sports centre of the Olympic Park in Asunción.

#### *2.12.3.3 PAN AMERICAN CHILDREN'S AND VETERANS' CHAMPIONSHIP 2022*

From 22 to 26 August 2022, the Pan American Children's and Veterans' Championships took place in Lima, Peru,. After 2 years, the competitions in these categories were resumed. The participation was massive in this event.

#### *2.12.3.4 2022 COACHES' COURSES*

During 2022, 3 coaches' courses were held in the Pan American zone. All 3 were held in Lima, Peru.

SABRE: From 9 to 20 August the sabre coaches' course was held with master Zoran Tulum (USA), the venue on this occasion was the Punta Roca complex in Lima. Twenty-one coaches took part and made the most of the teachings and experiences of an Olympic coach.

FOIL: from 6 to 17 October the course for foil coaches was held in the city of Lima, on this occasion the venue for the activities was in the VIDENA (National Sports Village of Peru), 19 coaches saw activity from the hand of the master Petru Kuki (ROU) with his extensive experience in the training of athletes and coaches.

EPEE: From 10 to 20 December 2022, the epee course was held at the Club Terrazas, Lima. For this last course the presentation was given by master Jerzy Konczalski (POL), with a long record as a coach and now as a teacher; he shared with all the participants his experience at competitive and training level. There were 20 participants who had the opportunity to acquire the master's knowledge.

#### *2.12.3.5 CPE 2022 CONGRESS*

In Panama City, Panama, the annual Pan American Congress was held on 22 October 2022, at the Hotel Las Americas Golden Tower, where the presidents and delegates of the affiliated national federations met. An atmosphere of friendship, cordiality and enthusiasm reigned to prepare for the upcoming activities. The president, Mr. Vitaly Logvin interacted with all delegates to work together on all projects and challenges for 2023.

### **2.12.4 OCEANIA FENCING CONFEDERATION**

#### *2.12.4.1 DEVELOPING NEW FEDERATIONS IN THE PACIFIC*

The OFC currently has six full members (American Samoa, Australia, Guam, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, and Samoa) and two Associate Members (Tahiti and New Caledonia).

Post-COVID travel restrictions, we have continued to support the Fiji Fencing Federation by including two coaches in our coach education activities and assisting with future planning.

#### *2.12.4.2 DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES AFTER THE ARRIVAL OF COVID-19*

- Due to the Covid-19 pandemic in the first half of the year, the OFC adapted its mode of delivery to online activities as it did in 2020 and 2021.
- The OFC Annual General Meeting was held in July on Zoom and attended by the Mr Katsiadakis, Interim President of the FIE. Five OFC Board meetings were also held on Zoom.
- OFC Administration was carried out on email, Skype, and phone, with regular meetings between the OFC President, Regional Development Officer and the OFC Secretary/Finance Officer.
- The OFC Coaching Commission met online fourteen times using Zoom.
- As the Regional Development Officer was not able to travel to carry out his usual activities face-to-face with member federations, the OFC and the Oceania Fencing master's Academy (OFMA) partnered with Global Fencing Masters (GFM) to carry out a three-month trial of the GFM Level 1 Online Foil Course in order to investigate remote learning opportunities for coaches. 25 student coaches from Australia, New Zealand, Guam, PNG, and Fiji participated and the trial was deemed to be very successful.
- The online trial was followed up in the second half of 2022 with face-to-face content review and assessments of the trainee coaches which were funded by a grant obtained from the Organisation for Sports Federations of Oceania (OSFO).
- A very successful Referee Development Seminar was held in Auckland, New Zealand from 18 to 20 October, delivered by the President of the FIE Refereeing Commission, Ms Irina Knysch. Thirty-nine (39) people participated across three sessions, plus 16 participated online. About 20 of the referees were coached and mentored by Irina during the championship that followed the seminars. This had a very positive effect on the expertise and knowledge of the participants and will be very important in lifting the level of refereeing in Oceania.
- Thanks to the IOC, New Zealand Olympic Committee and the FIE, an extremely successful Olympic Solidarity Technical Course for Coaches in Foil was hosted by Fencing New Zealand in Christchurch from 11 to 20 December. The course was delivered by Maître Zoltan Bernat, Head Coach at the FIE Coaching Academy in Budapest and 33 coaches from Australia, New Zealand and Guam participated.

#### *2.12.4.3 OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIPS*

- The Oceania Cadet Championships were held in Sydney, Australia from 1 to 2 July.
- The Oceania Veteran Championships were held in Auckland, New Zealand from 22 to 24 October.
- The Oceania Senior Championships were held in Adelaide, Australia from 25 to 30 November.

The events were attended by fencers from Tahiti, New Zealand and Australia, but we are hoping that more of our member federations will be able to compete in 2023, with the return to travel around the Pacific.

#### *2.12.4.4 PARTICIPATION IN FIE EVENTS INCLUDING THE ASIA-OCEANIA OLYMPIC QUALIFICATION TOURNAMENT*

OFC President Helen Smith, Mr Vince Elias (Australia) and Mr Matthew Baker (New Zealand) were appointed in 2022 to the FIE Working Groups on the FIE Competition Calendar, the Review of the Olympic Qualification System and Fencing and the Environment respectively.

Fencers from Oceania participated in the World and Asian Junior, Cadet and Senior Championships, the World Veteran Championships, as well as in many other FIE events and the Commonwealth Championships.

Fencers from New Zealand participated in the FIE Training Camps held before both the Junior and Senior World Championships in Dubai and Cairo.

Three Oceania referees were successful in the FCA C Licence Referee examinations held in 2022. All are hoping to continue along this path to become FIE B Category referees.

With the help of a travel subsidy from the FIE, all Oceania federations were represented either by a Delegate or Proxy at the FIE Congress held in Lausanne on 26 November.

#### *2.12.4.5 SUPPORT FROM FIE*

The OFC appreciates the invaluable and generous administrative and technical support it receives from the interim President, the CEO and all the staff at the FIE office.

The OFC acknowledges the important financial support it receives annually from the FIE. The OFC greatly appreciated the additional support received during the Covid crisis.

Unfortunately, with a substantial cut to FIE funding as of 2023, it may be difficult in the future to maintain the same number and quality of OFC development activities.

- The CAE Secretary General participated on 22nd of October 2022 in Panama City, Panama, to the Congress of the Pan-American Fencing Confederation.
- Alongside the Seniors African Championship, the CAE Board meeting was organised on 18th of June 2022, at the Complex Sportif Mohamed V in Casablanca.
- Some African countries are founding members of the Alliance Francophone d’Escrime and they were involved in activities of this alliance.
- The CAE Extraordinary Congress was on 25th of November 2022 in Lausanne
- Presidents and representatives of African National Federations participated in the FIE Congress in Lausanne, November 26th 2022.

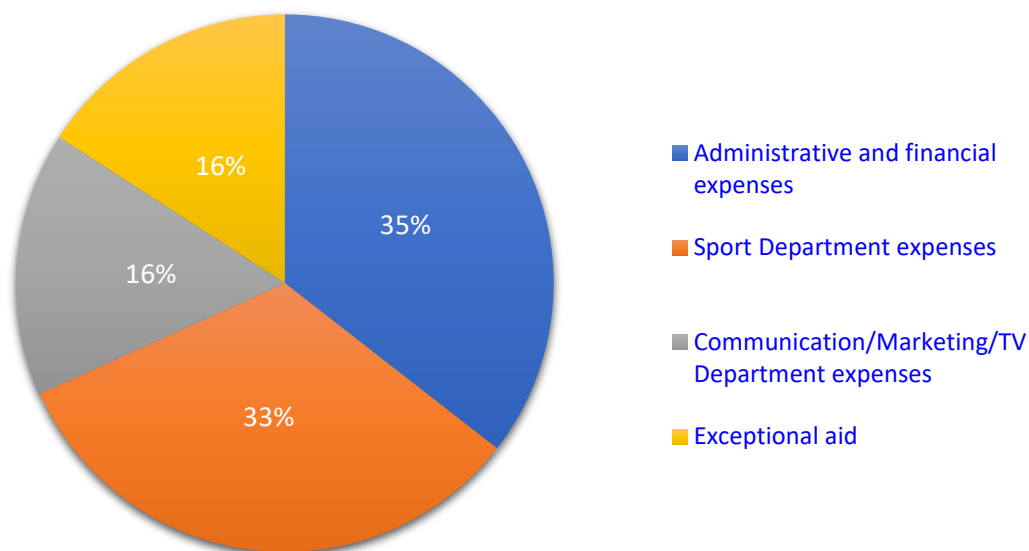

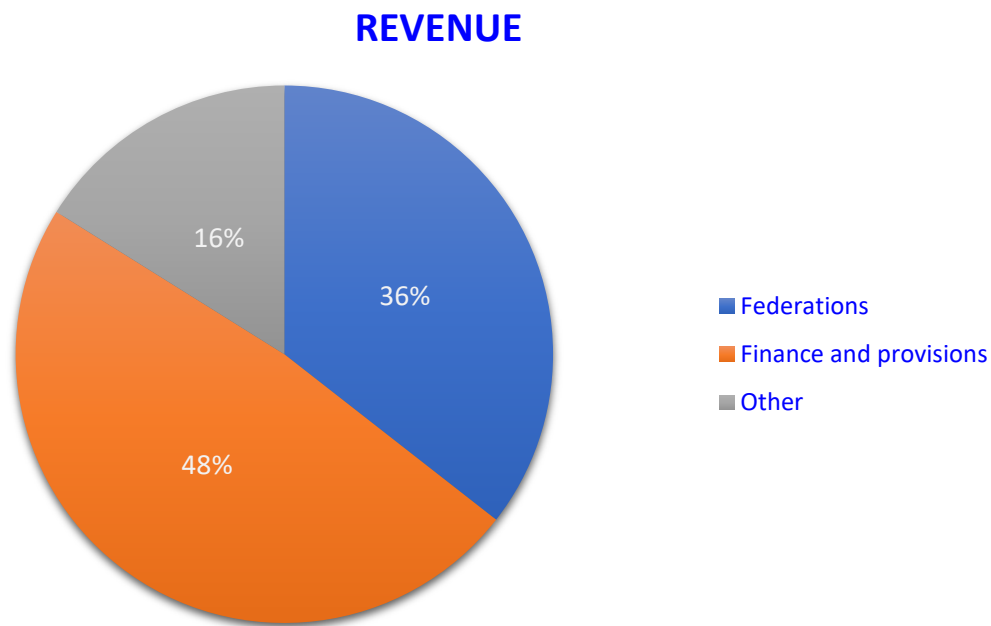

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AT 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### 1. Accounting policies applied and not prescribed by law :

- 1.1. The Fédération Internationale d'Esime (hereinafter the "FIE") is a non-governmental, non-profit-making international organisation, having the legal form of an association under Swiss law, with its registered office in Lausanne, Switzerland.

It is recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) as the world governing body for fencing. The FIE lays down the rules governing the organisation of international competitions and supervises their application.

- 1.2. The financial statements are presented in Swiss francs (CHF) in accordance with the accounting standards governed by the Swiss Code of Obligations, the regulations and statutes of the FIE and the accounting methods set out below.

- 1.3. *Investment securities*

*Investment securities are managed by a recognised banking institution and are marked to market daily.*

- 1.4. *Items denominated in foreign currency*

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted into Swiss francs (CHF) at the exchange rate in effect at the time they are made. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are converted at the exchange rate in effect on the year-end date.

- 1.5. *Federations and other short-term receivables*

Receivables from Federations and other short-term receivables are carried at their nominal value. Individual value corrections are made, with the residual balance being subject to a flat-rate value correction of 5% and 10%.

- 1.6. *Stocks*

Stocks are valued at acquisition cost or production cost. The acquisition cost and production cost of stocks are determined using the weighted cost method.

- ❖ The Organising Committee must comply with all the FIE Rules, Statutes, Administrative Rules and the Handbook of Regulations of the FIE from its inception up until its dissolution. The member Federation which applies as a candidate to organise congresses, official competitions, or any other FIE international events will document that the organizer will use all means to enable all the member Federations to take part in those events, without any discrimination whatever.
- ❖ The FIE retains the right of final say on all questions pertaining to the World Championships.
- ❖ The bid must be sent by the national federation and reach the FIE Head Office **three (3) years before** the date of organization of the World Championships, before the Congress. On this occasion the candidates will be announced.
- ❖ The complete file of candidature must reach the FIE Head Office before the 1<sup>st</sup> of September.
- ❖ The candidate federation will have to make a commitment, in front of the Congress, to respect the FIE Handbooks of regulations and its financial obligations. A signed protocol between the FIE and the organizing federation will state its perfect knowledge of its obligation
- ❖ The bid procedure has to take place according to the FIE statutes
- ❖ The Organising Federation must provide a written agreement from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs guaranteeing the granting of visas to all the participants of the member national federations of the FIE.
- ❖ As specified on the relevant articles of the questionnaire it is obligatory to present plans and dimensions of all the competition venues attached to this document.

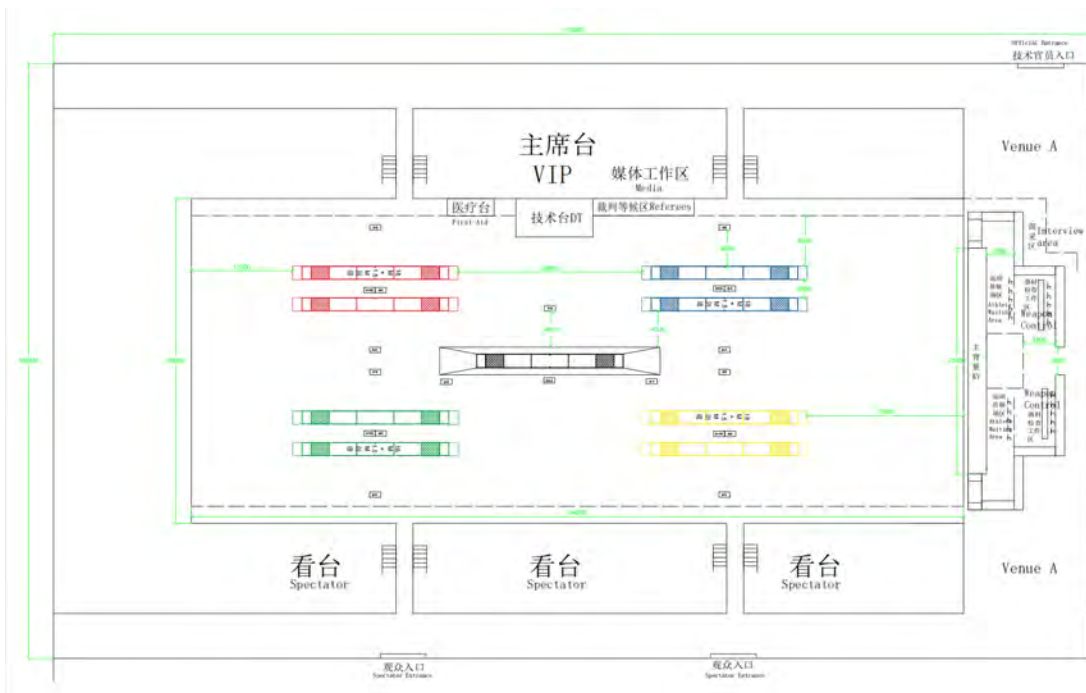

**DRAWING OF THE HALL FOR DIRECT ELIMINATION**



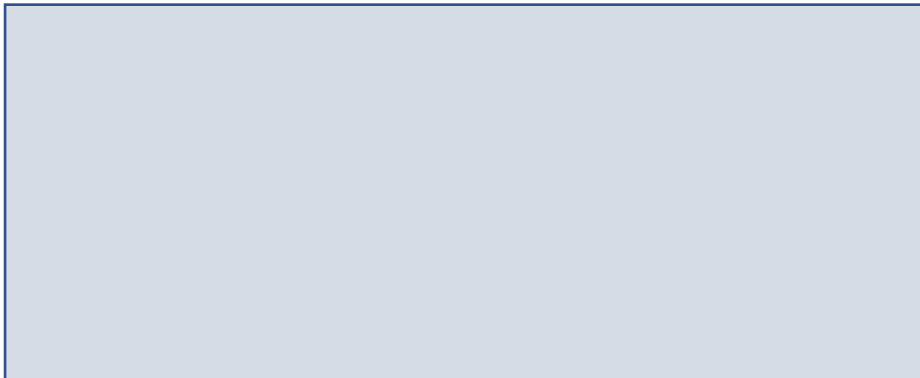

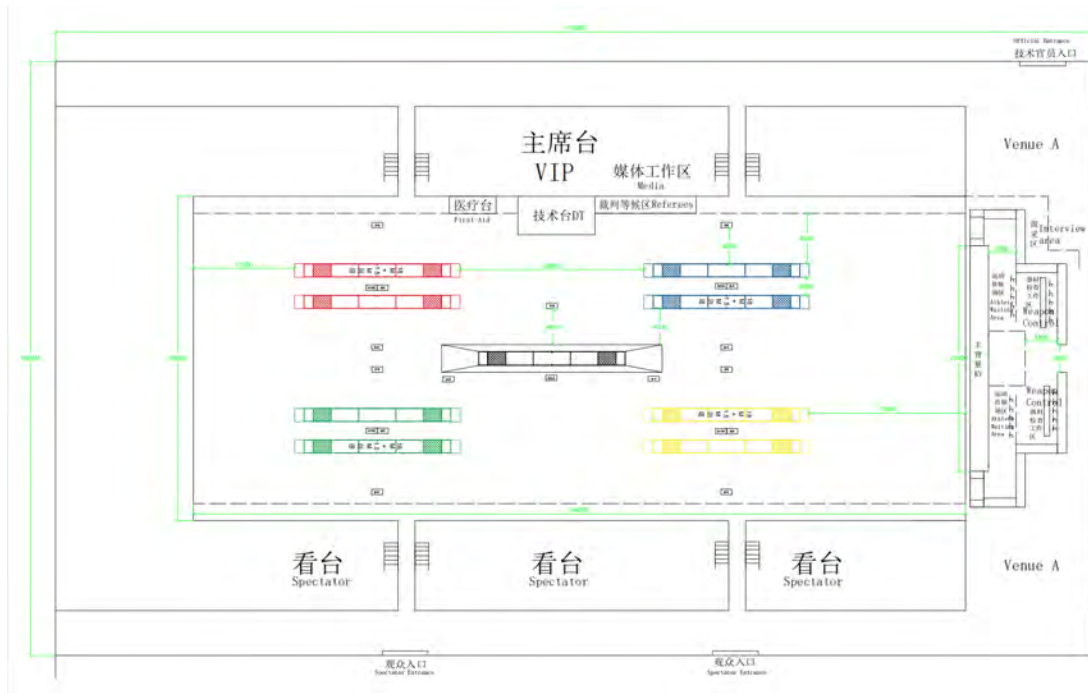

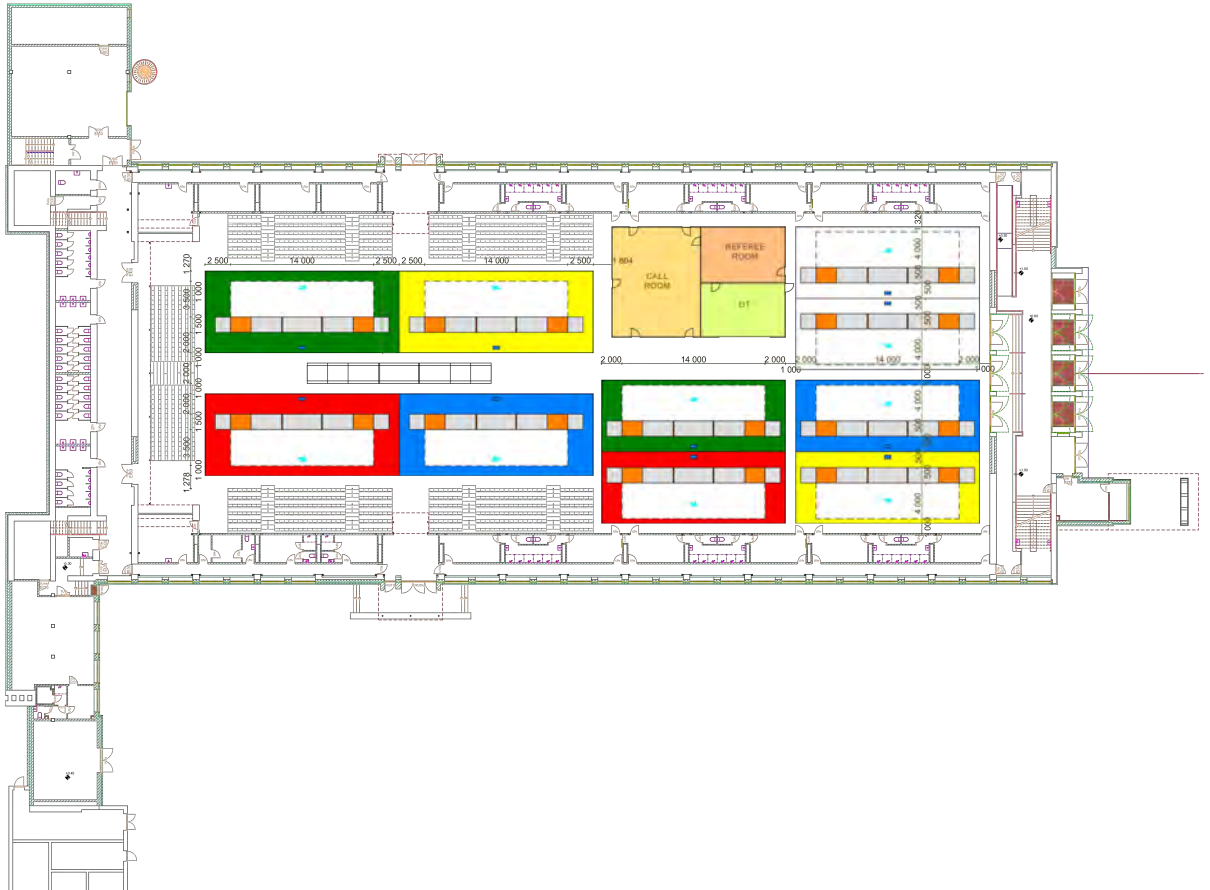

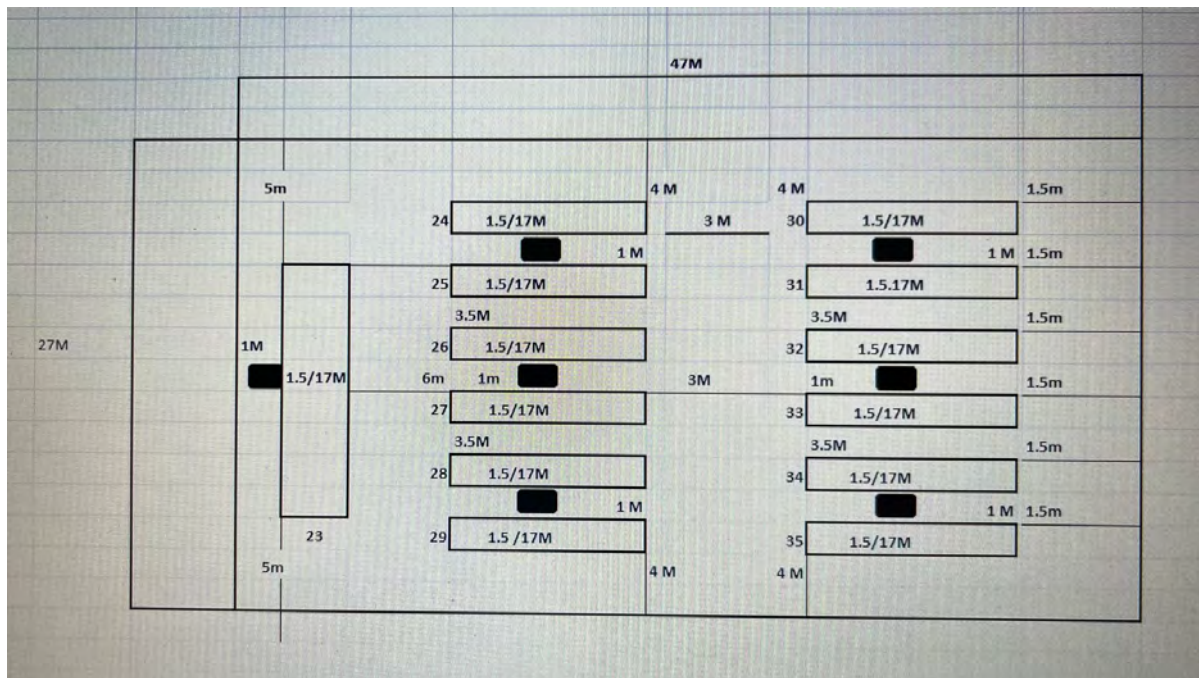

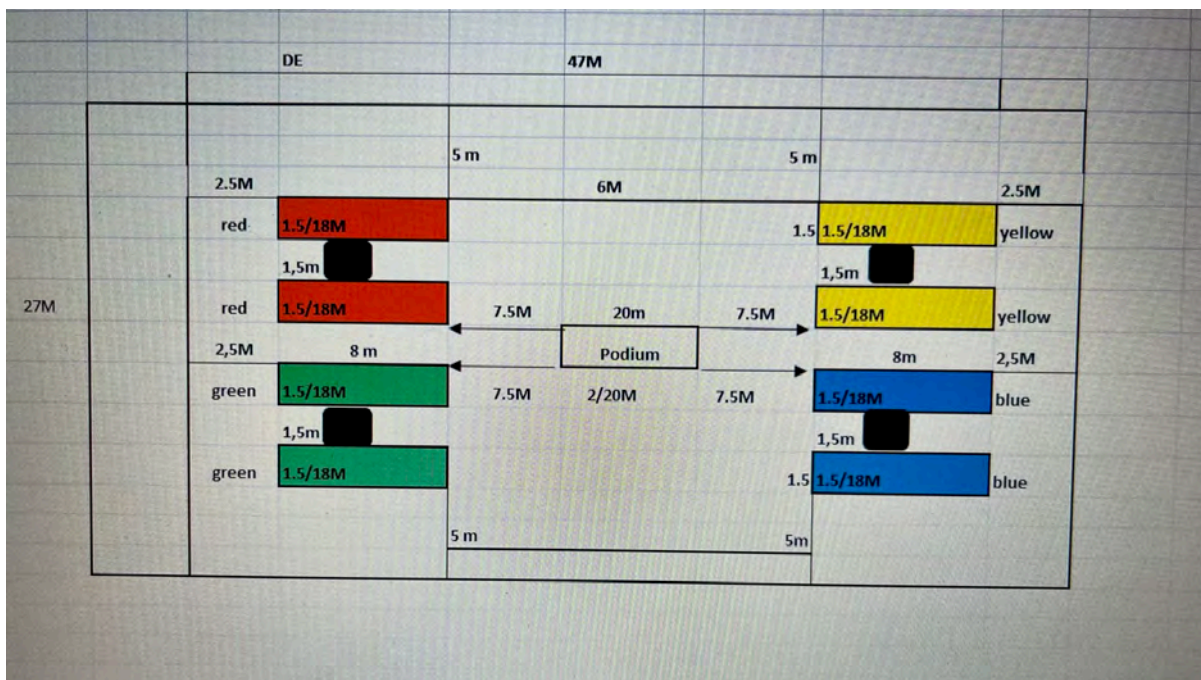
**DRAWING OF THE HALL FOR DIRECT ELIMINATION**

**DRAWING OF THE HALL FOR FINALS**

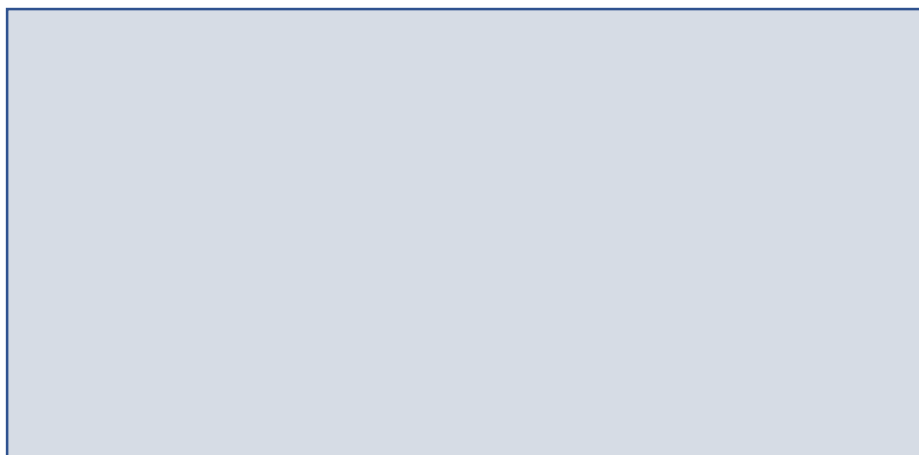

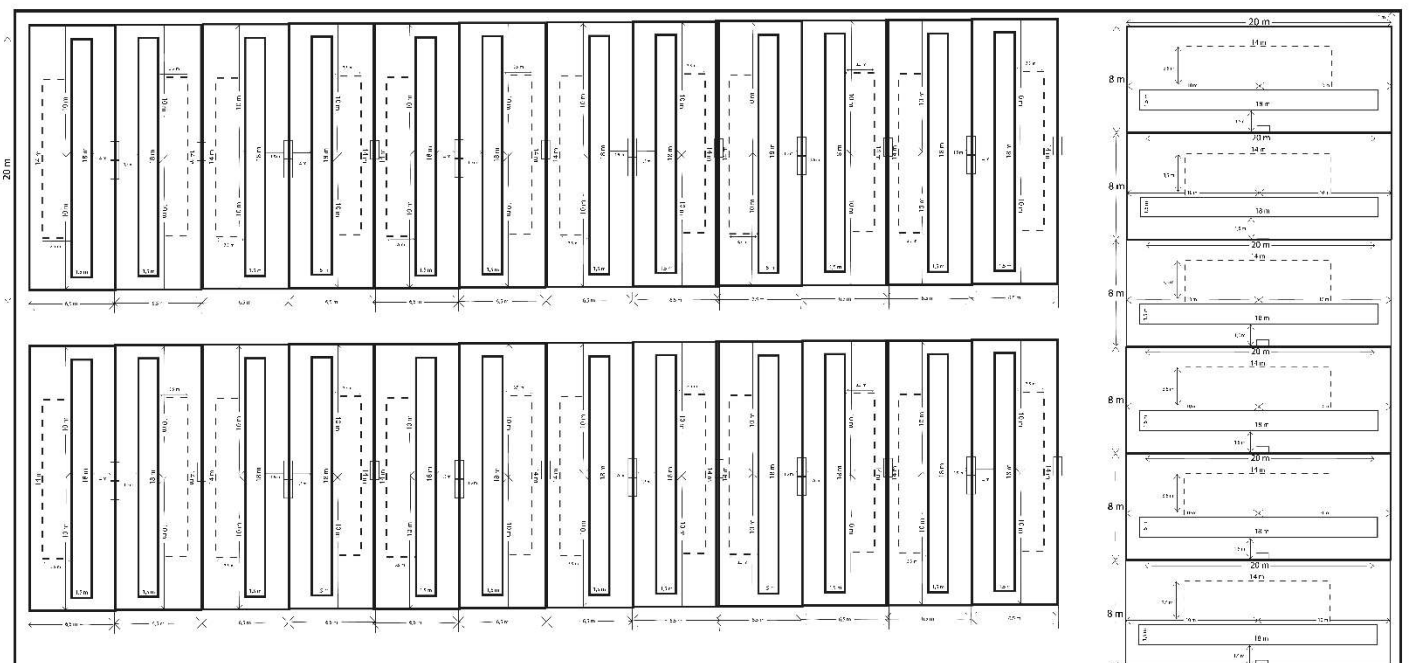

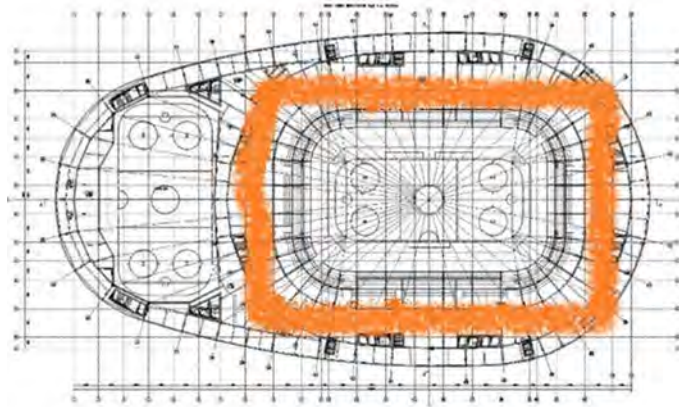

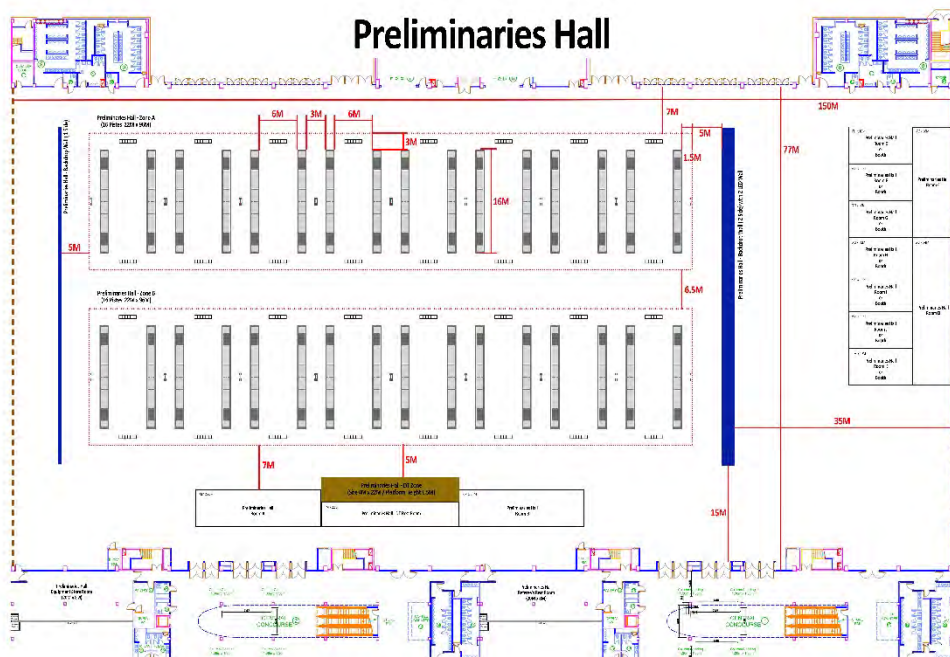

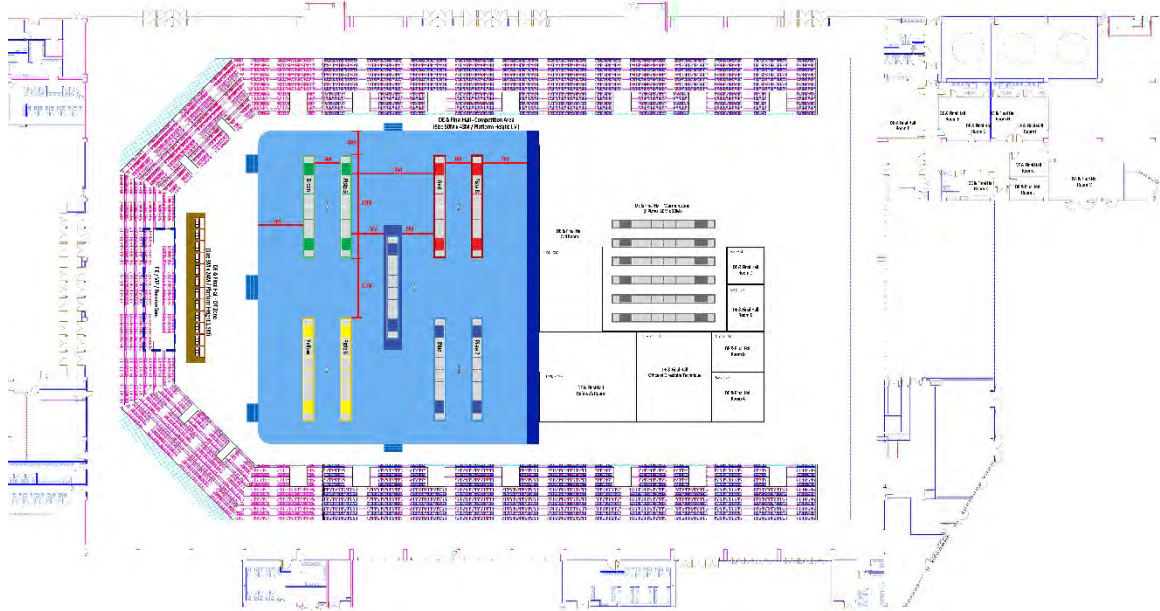

## Direct Eliminations and Final Hall



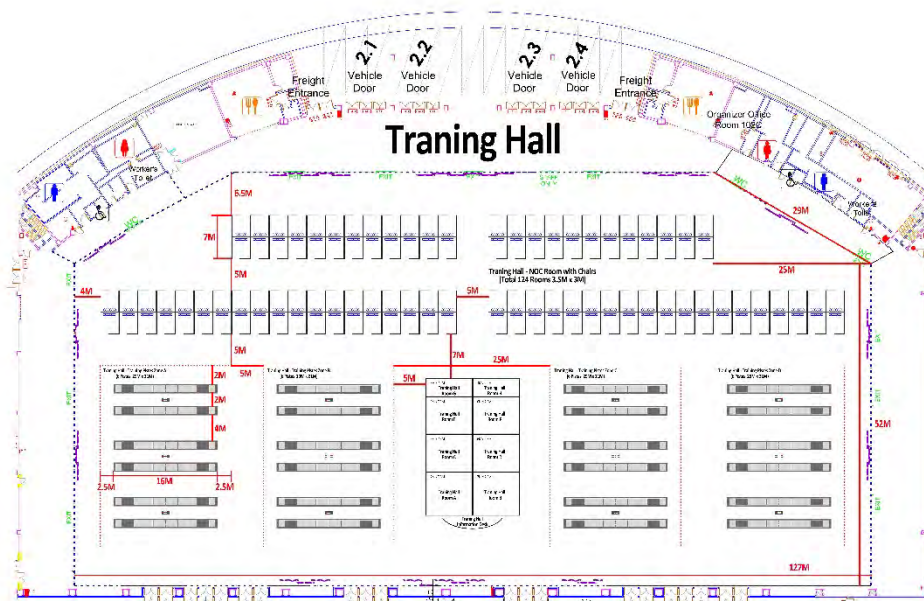

## Proposals for the 2023 Congress

### Modifications of the Statutes

The texts below are applicable on January 1st, 2024, unless mentioned otherwise.

---

**Article:** 3.1. Introduce real-time streaming from the FIE Congress

P.1

**Proposal from:** Swedish Fencing Federation

**Motivation:** The purpose of this proposal is to increase the transparency of the FIE Congress procedures. The discussions and the decisions of the Congress are of interest to fencers, coaches and fencing volunteers around the world. It is also of importance that the decision-making process of the FIE is transparent to media to the largest possible extent.

#### 3.1 MEETINGS

f) The proceedings of every Congress must be transmitted live (video and sound) via the Internet and the link to the transmission made publicly available on the FIE web-site before the start of the Congress.

**Legal Commission:** Not in favour of the proposition.

There are no legal reasons for this requirement, it is not necessary for transparency as the congress report is published later in the year and it is contentious in terms of outside pressures, of the implications for congress attendees of unwanted social media attention.

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** Agrees with the opinion and arguments of the Legal Commission. Not in favour of the proposal as the current process is fully transparent:

- the documentation for the Congress is issued in 3 languages, sent to NFs and published on the FIE website.
- the list of decisions of the Congress is issued in 3 languages, sent to NFs and published on the FIE website.
- the verbatim report of the Congress is issued in 3 languages, sent to NFs and published on the FIE website.

**Article: 3.3 and 4.1****Proposal from: Legal Commission**

**Motivation:** To allow candidates for commissions and the Ethics Committee to attend Elective Congresses.

**3.3 COMPOSITION AND REPRESENTATION**

3.3.1 The FIE member Federations may be represented at a FIE Congress by 2 delegates, ~~whose names must be made known to the FIE Head Office one month before the Congress in writing~~. Members of the Executive Committee, the Commissions, ~~and~~ the permanent councils ("Councils") ~~and of the Ethics Committee~~ have the right to take part in the Congress.

At FIE Elective Congresses, the FIE member Federations may be represented by 2 delegates. Members of the Executive Committee and candidates to elected positions have the right to take part in the FIE Elective Congresses.

All participants in the FIE Congresses must be registered by their national federation, 40 calendar days before the opening day of the Congress and using the platform or tool that will be made available by the FIE.

**4.1 GENERAL RULES**

4.1.2 Candidates for the Executive Committee, a Commission, a Council, the Ethics Committee or the Disciplinary Panel may be proposed by an FIE Member Federation, subject to the following conditions ~~and requirements~~:

- only one candidate may be proposed by each Member Federation for each post
- a candidate can only be presented by the Member Federation (treated in 4.4.1, 4.6.2 and 4.7.1) whom the candidate has nationality.

~~4.1.3~~ - ~~A~~ all the candidatures ~~must be received on the FIE platform or tool shall reach the FIE Head Office~~ no later than 00:00 hrs Lausanne time ~~40~~ 50 calendar days before the opening day of the Elective Congress.

- ~~¶~~ the candidatures submitted on the FIE platform or tool must include a CV (maximum length of one page of A4 format) ~~stating must be presented by means of a form provided by the FIE (one single page of A4 format) which must include~~ the languages spoken as well as the degrees or other qualifications for the particular ~~position~~ ~~commission~~. A photocopy of an identity document stating the candidate's date of birth and nationality (passport, identity card, driving licence) must be provided with the candidature.

4.1.3 The ~~administrative office of the FIE will include the~~ list of all the candidates as well as the CVs that have been received ~~will be included~~ in the documents relating to the Congress.

4.1.4 The FIE Bureau rejects candidatures which do not respect the FIE Statutes or the IOC Code of Ethics. Each national federation can contest the list of the candidates communicated by the Bureau. All questions will in the last instance be considered by the Executive Committee, after advice from the Legal Commission and the persons concerned. In case of urgency an opinion can be obtained by fax or e-mail.

**Legal Commission:** In favour of the proposition.

The Commission would like to add the attendance of presidents of commissions, councils and committees, so that paragraph 2 of the proposal would read (added words highlighted in yellow):-

At FIE Elective Congresses, the FIE member Federations may be represented by 2 delegates. Members of the Executive Committee, presidents of commissions, councils and committees and candidates to elected positions have the right to take part in the FIE Elective Congresses.

The commission considers that as the congress might discuss matters relating to the work of these bodies their presidents should have the right to be present to represent them and to assist the Congress better to understand the topic concerned.

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** In favour of the modifications in paragraphs 1 and 3 of article 3.3.1. Paragraph 2 of 3.3.1 is reviewed as follows for the sake of clarity:

At FIE Elective Congresses, the FIE member Federations may be represented by 2 delegates. In addition, the following individuals have the right to take part in the FIE Elective Congresses:

- current members of the Executive Committee
- current presidents of commissions, councils and committees
- candidates to elected positions

In favour of 4.1, 4.1.2, 4.1.3 and 4.1.4.

~~It is desirable that the candidates for various Commissions have specific professional knowledge or credentials as follows:~~

**Medical Commission: Not in favour.**

The core issue of discussion pertains to the expansion of criteria for Medical Commission Member candidates to include Doctors of Osteopathy (DO) and Doctors of Chiropractic (DC) proposed by the Legal Commission. While the proposal was rejected by the majority of the Medical Commission with a vote of 8-2, the dissenting and advocacy votes raised significant points that merit further consideration.

**Legal Commission: In favour** of the proposition.

The Commission however proposes the modification of the proposition as follows:-

A candidate for the Medical Commission - must have completed the educational requirements for being an MD, DO or DC ~~or have practiced as a physiotherapist, or have been a member of the Commission for at least 8 years~~ and hold a valid and active licence, or be qualified and be practicing as a physiotherapist.

The Commission considers that to ensure they maintain their knowledge and skills up to date through continuous professional development it is necessary that its members are currently qualified to practice, and that therefore the clause in the following propositions accepting previous membership of the commission as a criterion for candidature, in order to benefit from their experience, is not appropriate.

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** In favour of the deletion of the sentence below and in favour of the revised proposal below:

or final of the individual or team event of a senior World Cup, or a Grand Prix, or a World Championships or the Olympic Games of the 4 fencing seasons preceding his candidature **or have been part of the master list.**

Being a member of the Refereeing Commission is incompatible with the national roles of technical director, referee, chief of delegation and team captain, **President, Secretary General or member of the governing body of a National Federation.** Once elected, the Refereeing Commission member shall send to the FIE head-office a letter of commitment signed by both the Refereeing Commission member and his/her national federation.

**Refereeing Commission:** Not in favour.

**Legal Commission:** In favour of the first half of the proposition (up to “been part of the master list”). The commission proposes however to replace “have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of 32/16 or eight... etc” by “have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of 16 or eight ..... etc”.

Not in favour of the second part modifications (“Being a member ..... National Federation” as being too wide-ranging and potentially penalizing smaller federations where members fulfill multiple roles:-

A candidate for the Refereeing Commission must:

- be or have been an FIE category B or A referees in at least two weapons; and
- be a current member **or have already been a member** of the Refereeing Commission, or have refereed in official FIE competitions in at least two weapons in at least two (2) of the 4 fencing seasons (1 September to 31 August) preceding his candidature; and
- have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of 16 or eight or semi-final or final of the individual or team event of a senior World Cup, or a Grand Prix, or a World Championships or the Olympic Games of the 4 fencing seasons preceding his candidature **or have been part of the master list.**

Once elected, the Refereeing Commission member shall send to the FIE head-office a letter of commitment signed by both the Refereeing Commission member and his/her national federation

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** In favour of the following:

A candidate for the Refereeing Commission must:

- be or have been an FIE category B or A referees in at least two weapons; and
- be a current member **or have been a member for at least two mandates** of the Refereeing Commission, or have refereed in official FIE competitions in at least two weapons in at least two (2) of the 4 fencing seasons (1 September to 31 August) preceding his candidature; and
- have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of eight or semi-final or final of the individual or team event of a senior World Cup, or a Grand Prix, or a World Championships or the Olympic Games of the 4 fencing seasons preceding his candidature.

- 4.5.2 All athletes who, in the weapon in which they fence, have been entered to compete in either one of the last two Olympic Games or at least one of the **Open Senior** World Championships held over the last 5 years can be a candidate for the Athletes Commission.
- If the fencer has fenced several weapons during such competitions, he must choose only one of those weapons for this candidature.
- Each member federation can nominate one single athlete ~~for~~ **to** the Athletes Commission
- 4.5.3 Each member federation shall indicate to the FIE the name of its candidate two months before the first day of the **Open Senior** World Championships in the year following the Olympic Games.
- 4.5.4 One month before the **Senior** World Championships, the FIE shall send to each member federation the list of the candidates.
- 4.5.5 The athletes who will participate in the **Open Senior** World Championships in the year following the Olympic Games will elect ~~six-seven~~ representatives (always among the athletes nominated by the member Federations) ~~for a four year term~~.
- 4.5.6 A list of candidates will be established, all weapons combined, and each participant shall vote for ~~6~~ **seven** athletes maximum, whatever weapon the athletes are applying for.
- 4.5.7 The voting athletes will personally go to the **voting** office of the FIE at the competition site **in order to proceed with the vote** ~~to fill in their voting slip and deposit them in the ballot box~~, after having verified their identity by presenting their accreditation.
- The athlete's accreditation will be scanned or the athlete will sign and having signed** the attendance sheet.
- 4.5.8 **Voting may be conducted electronically. If the vote is not organised by electronic means but by means of paper ballots,** ~~o~~One single ballot box will be provided for all weapons.
- 4.5.9 The voting will be open for all weapons and will begin on the first day of the **Senior** World Championships and will end at noon local time on the last day of the World Championships.

#### Proposal from: National Fencing Federation of Kazakhstan

**Motivation:** Our federation regularly reads and continues to study the Statutes of the FIE. We are also reviewing modern conditions of the development of the Fencing world.

In this regard, the Kazakhstan Fencing Federation would like to inform you that in Chapter V. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, in paragraph 5.2 STRUCTURE OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, contains paragraph 5.2.1. which does not include all members of the executive committee of the FIE, and thus automatically limits the rights of a certain number of full members of the executive committee in the right of appointment or selection for certain positions, for example: the appointment as Secretary General or Treasurer, or in the election for the position of three vice presidents of the FIE. However, the FIE executive committee currently consists of 22 full members (see paragraph 5.2.4 and paragraph 5.2.5.)

a) To revise article 5.2.1 as follows, and to remove articles 5.2.4 and 5.2.5:

The Executive Committee consists of the following members with full rights including voting rights: the President ~~on the one hand, and~~, fifteen elected members ~~on the other~~, the President in office of each of the five geographic zones and the President in office of the Athletes Commission.

The five geographic zones are the following: Africa, America, Asia, Europe and Oceania.

b) To remove article 5.2.4

~~The President in office of each of the five geographic zones is an ex-officio member with full rights of the Executive Committee of the FIE. As such, he has the right to vote. The five zones are the following: Africa, America, Asia, Europe and Oceania.~~

c) To remove article 5.2.5

~~The President in office of the Athletes Commission is a member of the FIE Executive Committee with full rights and obligations. As such, he/she has the right to vote.~~

**Legal Commission:** Not in favour.

The proposal would allow a president of a confederation or the president of the athletes' commission to become secretary general, secretary-treasurer or a vice president of the FIE. But these persons' situation in the Executive committee is different from that of the other members, in that they have been elected to that position by a body other than the Elective Congress of the FIE and therefore do not carry the mandate of all the FIE members. They are also likely to perceive their role as representing the interests of their confederation or the athletes rather than the whole FIE; and at a practical level the workload of a confederation president is incompatible with taking on the heavy burden of FIE secretary general or secretary-treasurer.

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** Not in favour.

The FIE shall ensure that the FIE Safeguarding Officers receive appropriate training and support for carrying out their responsibilities under this policy.

Zonal Confederations shall appoint at least one person to serve as a Safeguarding Officer at each Zonal Championship. All safeguarding reports which are not resolved through mediation must be reported to the FIE.

**Women and Fencing Council:** Agreed.

**Legal Commission:** In favour. The commission would however like to modify the text of the proposition by adding the clause highlighted in yellow as follows:

Zonal Confederations shall appoint at least one person to serve as a Safeguarding Officer at each Zonal Championship. All safeguarding reports which are not resolved through mediation must be reported to the FIE **in accordance with the underlying safeguarding rules of the FIE.**

The commission asks for this addition to help ensure the confidentiality of such reports.

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** The delegates proposed by the commissions are based on the availability of these delegates to the different competitions. - 3** A fencer who has been replaced because of an injury may not fence again during that match. If both a fencer and the reserve are forced to retire, or if a fencer is excluded, their team is deemed to have lost the match.
- 4** The relay system is always applied. The three fencers of a team fence against their opponent of the same category. Each fencer fences his/her opponent twice giving a total of 6 relays. The relays are for 5 hits (5-10-15-20- etc.). Exceptionally, a relay may end at more than 5,10,15 etc. if a fencer scores a valid last hit of the relay and is at the same time awarded an additional penalty hit: in this case both hits will be counted; the maximum time for each relays is 3 minutes.
- 5** The team that first reaches the maximum score of 30 hits, or that which has scored the greatest number of hits after the expiry of regulation time, is the winner.
- 6** The order of categories for each match is established by the referee with the captains on the piste prior to the start of the match: The referee will draw lots and the winning captain will choose the first category in the order. The losing captain will choose the second category.
- 7** The competition consists of a round of pools of 3 or 4 teams, in which all the teams participate, and a direct elimination phase for the highest placed 16 teams; the other teams will be classified according to their ranking after the round of pools.
  - a)** The order of matches in a pool of 4 is as follows:
    - Match 1 : The team ranked 1 vs the team ranked 4
    - Match 2 : The team ranked 2 vs the team ranked 3
    - Match 3 : The winner of Match 1 vs the loser of Match 2
    - Match 4 : The winner of Match 2 vs the loser of Match 1
    - Match 5 and Match 6 : The two remaining matches.
  - b)** The order of matches in a pool of 3 is as follows:
    - Match 1 : The team ranked 2 vs the team ranked 3

Match 2 : The team ranked 1 vs the loser of Match 1  
Match 3 : The team ranked 1 vs the winner of Match 1

The initial ranking on which the drawing of the pools is based is established from the results of the fencers in the individual events. (cf. o.103.2.c)

The composition of the direct elimination table of 16 teams (or 8 if there are less than 16 teams) is established according to the general ranking established by the results of all the teams in the pool round. In the event of an absolute tie between the teams ranked 16 and 17 (or 8 and 9), the highest ranked team in the initial pool ranking shall qualify.

However, in no case, teams which have already fenced each other in the pools should meet again immediately in the direct elimination. To avoid this, the lower ranked of the two teams in question may be moved:

- in the case of a tableau of 16, the team ranked 9 may change places only with the team ranked 10, the team ranked 11 may change places only with the team ranked 12, the team ranked 13 may change places only with the team ranked 14 and the team ranked 15 may change places only with the team ranked 16.
  - in the case of a tableau of 8, the team ranked 5 may change places only with the team ranked 6 and the team ranked 7 may change places only with the team ranked 8.
- 8** If fewer than 6 teams participate in the competition, they all fence in a poule unique; a match for the 3rd and 4th places is then held, followed by a match for the first place between the teams who came 1st and 2nd in the pool.
- 9** Ranking matches from 5th place onwards will not be fenced and teams will be ranked, in each round of the table, according to their ranking after the pools.

## 1 Participation

Each country may enter one team per category (Veterans and Grand Veterans) per gender and per weapon, thus giving a total of twelve competitions.

The teams shall be composed of fencers who participated in the individual competition of the corresponding weapon, but c.f. o.103.2 b below.

## 2 The rules for team competitions are applicable with the following exceptions:

**Veterans:** teams of three composed of fencers belonging to either age group 40-49 or to age group 50-59, with at least one fencer belonging to age group 50-59, plus up to two reserves.

**Grand Veterans:** teams of three composed of fencers belonging to either age group 60-69 or to age group 70 and over, with at least one fencer belonging to age group 70 and over, plus up to two reserves.

Fencing mode is 45 hits relay described in o.99 with application of non-combativity rule at any match.

The competition begins with a round of pools of 3 and 4 teams -established according to o.103 c) - and followed by a direct elimination phase according to o.103 7.

Particular cases depending on the number of teams:

- only 1 team: the organisers must inform all nations that there will be no competition at that weapon.

- 2 teams: only one match between these two teams.
- 3 teams: one poule of three followed by D.E. from an incomplete tableau of 4.
- 4 teams: one poule of four followed by D.E. from a tableau of 4.
- 5 teams: one poule of five followed by D.E. from an incomplete tableau of 8.

The losers of the semi-finals have to fence for the Bronze medal.

- In the case of a team being short of a fencer in any of the weapons, the team may use a fencer who has competed in the individual championships at another weapon or who is registered but has yet to compete, but his/her ranking will be deemed to be last in the individual competition at the weapon of the team in which he is going to fence plus 1.
- The teams are placed in the pools according to the ranking of the three fencers in the individual championship. The number 1 team is the one with the least points. All the fencers registered for the team event must be present at the piste before the start of each match.
- Each team may request, before a given relay, the substitution of a fencer. However, in case of injury or other medical reason, duly recognized by the medical delegate, the substitution can be immediate, even during the relay.

There can be up to two substitutions of reserves per match but must maintain compliance with the age category representation requirement.

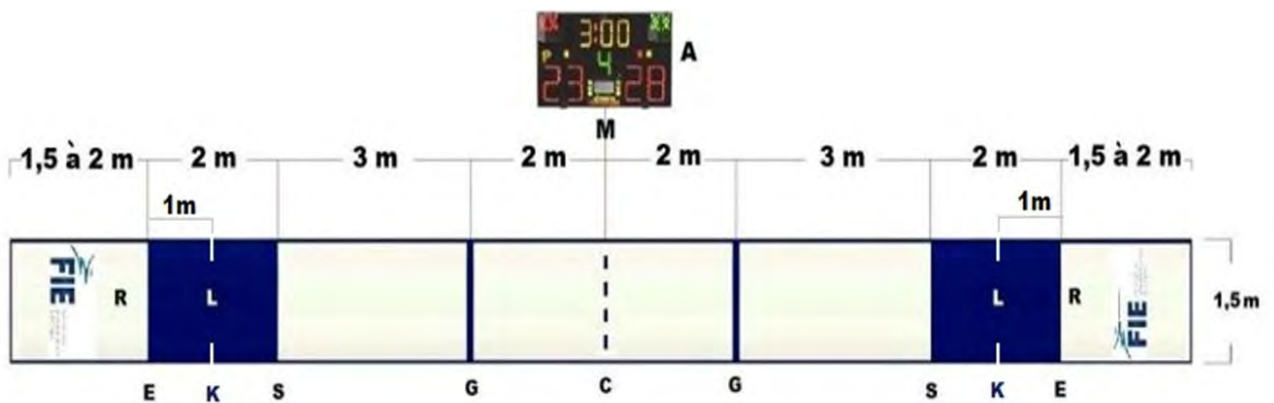
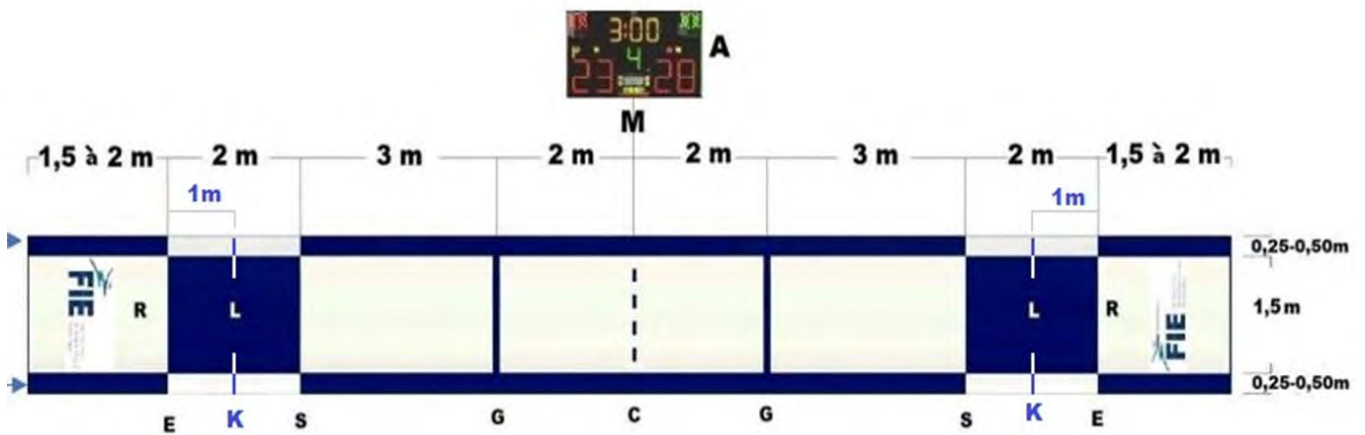

**Motivation:** In the last 2m of the piste, draw a line down the middle (1m). This allows the Referee to define more precisely the lateral exit of the foot(s) to judge whether or not the rear limit has been left.





**Refereeing Commission:** Not in favour.

**SEMI Commission:** Not in favour. Unless the Referees Commission can justify the benefits versus the high cost and technical difficulties of altering existing pistes with conductive replacement sections

**Rules Commission:** Proposal deleted.

**Opinion of the Executive Committee:** The proposal has been removed by the Rules Commission and will not be dealt with.

**Article:** t.18.2

**Proposal from:** SEMI Commission

**Motivation:** Based on the experience on the field of play, the metal frames, when hooking one element to another, leave a gap of 2/3 mm, this means that a tolerance of 4 cm must be foreseen in the total length; the same tolerance has to be considered for the carpet piste because off the material is more stretching, so when the piste is fully extended, there may be a stretch of the material similar to the metal piste.

**t.18.2**

The piste is 14 metres long, with a total tolerance on the whole length of 4 cm, so that each competitor, being placed at 2 metres from the centre line, has at his disposal for retreating a total distance of 5 metres without it being necessary for him to cross the rear limit of the piste with both feet.

- 6 The Referee may not allow a fencer to **leave the piste**, save in exceptional circumstances. If a competitor does so without permission he is liable to incur the penalties enumerated in Articles t.158-162, t.165, t.170~~-,~~ [for the offences of the 1st group](#).

#### t.25

- 2 **At all three weapons** it is forbidden for a fencer to **cause corps à corps intentionally** to avoid being hit, or to jostle his opponent. Should such an offence occur, the Referee will penalise the fencer at fault as specified in Articles t.158-162, t.165, t.170~~-,~~ [for the offences of the 1st group](#) and any hit scored by the fencer at fault is annulled.

#### t.26

- 1 The 'flèche ending systematically in a corps à corps' referred to in this article must not be confused with the 'flèche resulting in a shock which jostles the opponent', which is considered as an act of **intentional brutality** at all three weapons and is punished as such (cf. t.121.2, t.170)~~-,~~ [for the offences of the 2nd group](#).

- 3 During the fight, the fencer must not, under any circumstances, **take hold of any part of the electrical equipment** with his non-sword hand; [the referee imposes him/her the penalties for the offences of the first group](#) (cf. t.158-162, t.165, t.170); any hit scored by the fencer at fault is annulled.

#### t.35

- 3 A competitor who crosses one of the lateral boundaries of the piste with both feet — e.g. when making a flèche — **to avoid being hit** will be penalised as specified in Articles t.158-162, t.165, t.170~~-,~~ [for the offences of the 1st group](#).

If a fencer appears on the piste:

- with only **one** regulation **weapon** (cf. t.114, 115); or

Under no circumstances should the fencers **dress or undress in public** except in the case of an accident duly recognised by the doctor on duty or by the representative of the Medical Commission (cf. **t.126, t.158-162, t.165, t.170.**)-, Any infringement will be sanctioned for the offences of the 1st group.

**t.120**

Should a fencer **abandon a bout** by leaving the piste (cf. **t.23.6**), he will be penalised as specified in Articles **t.158-162, t.165, t.170.** , for the offences of the 1st group.

**t.123**

During or after a bout, even if the fencer has already left the piste, any act against the spirit of sportsmanship such as violently or dangerously throwing one's mask or any other piece of equipment will be penalised as specified in article **t.169 (c.f. t.108.1, 2 and t.109)**- , for the offences of the 4th group.

**Motivation:** It is incomprehensible that for a match or a round of 3 min. a medical break of 5 min. can be given, so the medical break time exceeds the time of a match.

If it is a real injury then the athlete cannot continue because the health of the athlete is much more important than the competition. 3 minutes is enough time to diagnose if the athlete wants to continue or if it is an injury that can be managed very quickly.

A great majority of athletes now use the 5 minutes as a tactical break and especially when the athlete is in difficulty either physically or when he is behind in the score, and this is a kind of cheating and it is necessary to safeguard our sport from these practices. We have found ourselves in many situations where the athlete uses the 5 minutes much more to be able to recover physically or to stop the progress of the opponent.

In other individual sports, the medical break does not exceed 3 minutes in the most mediatized sports, because it is considered that if the athlete is injured, he cannot be healed during a medical break, so he must leave the competition because his health is much more important.

For example, in tennis, the individual sport with the most media coverage in the world, the athlete has the right to only one break for a match that can last 3 or even 4 hours, this break is 3 minutes, in judo the athlete does not have the right to any break, it is the direct intervention of the doctor who must determine if he can continue or not, if the athlete must be touched to intervene has an injury, it is considered that it is a serious injury and the athlete must leave the competition because in judo it is considered that the state of health of the athlete is much more important than the competition in itself

It is necessary to change the concept of the medical intervention. We propose that, on request of the referee, the doctor can intervene directly or on request of the official doctor and the 3 minutes are counted as soon as the intervention is done by the doctor of the team, the delegate his role is to diagnose if the athlete wants to continue or not in a maximum time of 3 minutes. These 3 minutes are valid only once per match. As in the boxe, the official doctor intervenes only to decide if the athlete can continue or not.

We suggest to make the test during the 2024 Junior and Cadet World Championship in Saudi Arabia, the 3 minutes of medical break will be applicable from the season 2024/ 2025 from September 2024.

**Medical Commission:** The Rules Commission has proposed an amendment to Article: t.45 to reduce the duration of a medical timeout from five minutes to three, based on the belief that the existing rule is occasionally or often misused by athletes for strategic advantage. They suggest trialing this rule change at the 2024 Junior and Cadet World Championship in Saudi Arabia.

While the Medical Commission recognizes the need to prevent misuse of medical timeouts, the proposal was **unanimously rejected** due to the lack of empirical evidence supporting the claim of misuse and potential compromise on athlete health due to reduced time for medical evaluation and

treatment. Additionally, the proposed three-minute medical intervention period may not offer sufficient flexibility to manage diverse medical situations effectively.

The Commission acknowledges the need for an evidence-based approach to such decisions. To this end, there is significant potential to collect and analyze data across FIE events. Recording and examining crucial data points—such as strip calls, medical timeouts (awarded and denied), quick interventions, time taken to award a timeout/medical assessment and intervention/treatment duration, athlete's country, handedness, and bout score at injury time and which opponent was down in correlation to injury request—can create a substantial evidence base.

This approach aligns with the IOC Consensus Statement of 2020 and provides crucial epidemiological insights into sport-specific injuries. It also offers an excellent opportunity to improve the quality of medical coverage at over 97.5% of international events through targeted training for local organizers and healthcare professionals. This strategy could encompass a brief 10-15 minute educational presentation and a subsequent quiz, enhancing adherence to FIE competition rules and reducing medical assessment and treatment times.

In conclusion, while the motivation behind the proposed amendment to Rule t.45 is understood, it requires comprehensive, empirical data to underpin any modifications. The Commission believes that capturing and analyzing pertinent data from FIE events, and bridging educational gaps among local organizers and medical staff, will serve the interests of athlete health, ensure fairness, and improve the effectiveness of the rules across all competitions. Such an ambitious proposal has a strong endorsement from the Medical Commission and would be interested in a joint proposal to the executive committee to improve the healthcare quality of and running of international events.

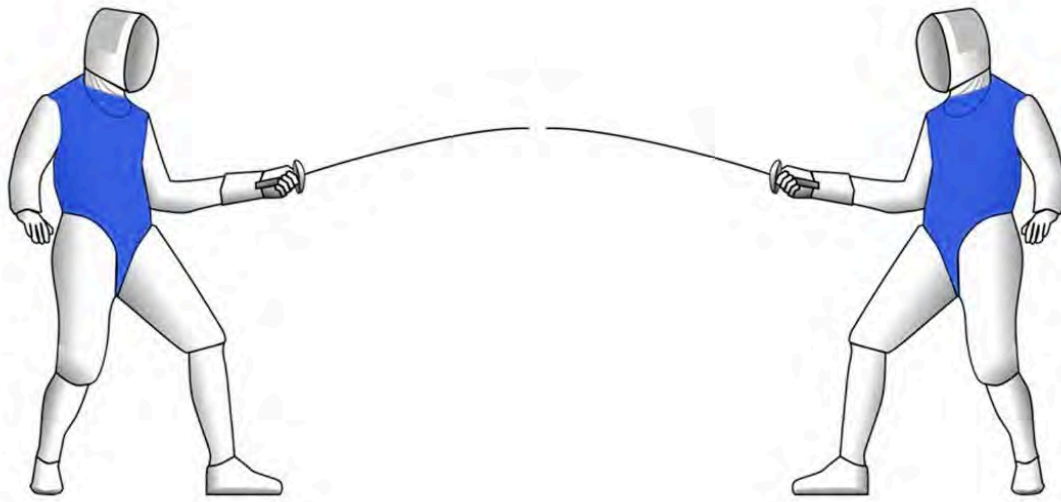


Figure 4 Valid target at foil

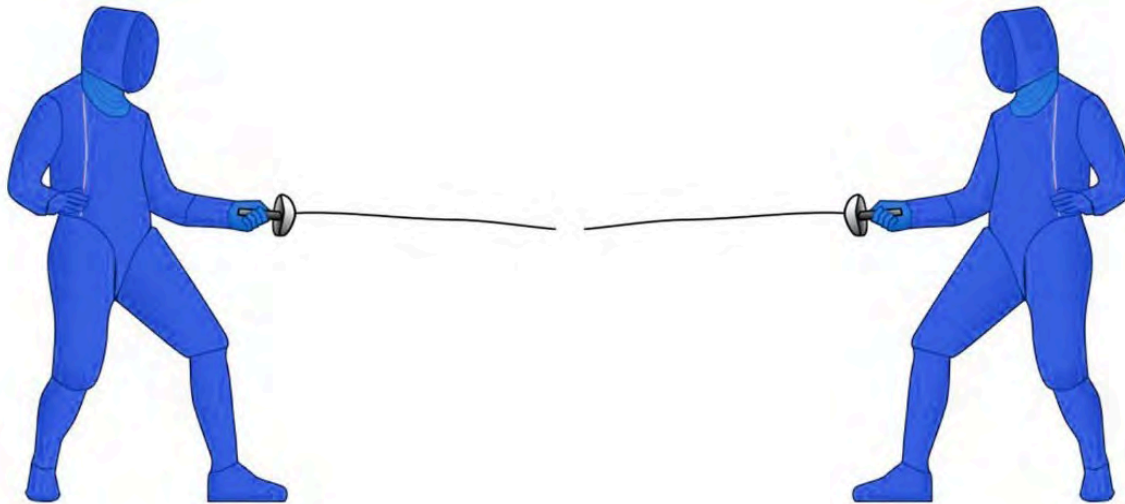


Figure 5 Valid target at épée

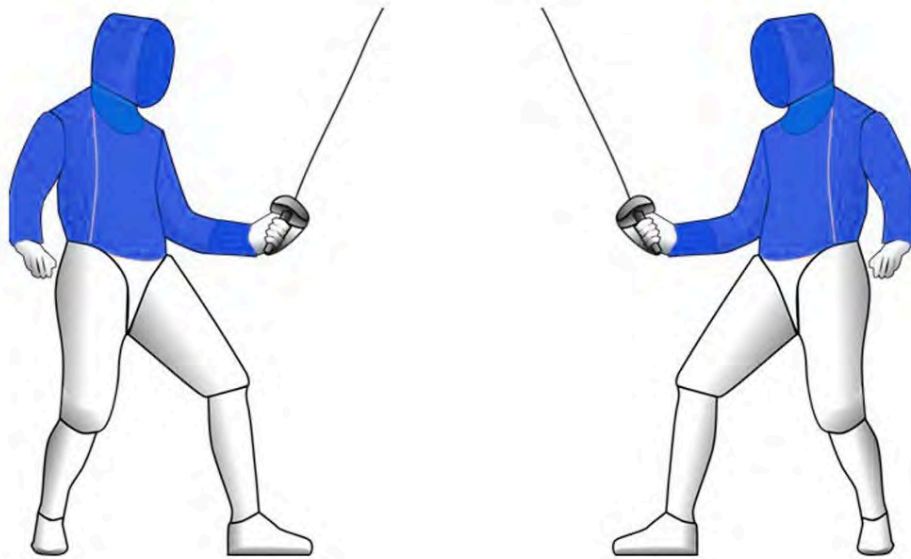


Figure 6 Valid target at sabre

a) If a federation and/or a fencer have signed a **sponsorship contract** with a commercial or other company, the logo of that sponsorship partner may be fixed **at a rate of maximum of 3 logos, with a maximum area of 85 cm<sup>2</sup> each;**

**In foil and epee:** at the top of the sleeve of the non-sword arm of the fencing jacket; **in sabre:** at the top of the thigh of the non-sword side of the fencing breeches and clearly separated from the national logo.

The Ethics Committee held a number of meetings between July 2022 and the end of June 2023 to deal with the cases referred to it and to consider certain improvements to procedures in the area of ethics.

In summary, the activities were as follows:

### **1. Cases referred to the Ethics Committee**

4 cases were referred to the Ethics Committee.

For reasons of confidentiality inherent in the activities of the Ethics Committee, this report cannot give further details on the cases referred to it, which in summary concern the European Fencing Confederation, the proceedings of the last FIE Congress and the problematic situation arising from Russia's war in Ukraine.

All these cases were dealt with, and answers were given to the various stakeholders.

The Ethics Committee notes that, in certain cases, its role is not yet very well perceived by the members of the fencing family, given that the said Ethics Committee can only intervene within the framework of the prerogatives and competences conferred upon it by the FIE Statutes.

It is therefore recommended that, in the future, efforts be made to improve communication and information for FIE members on the exact role of the Ethics Committee, which is available to intervene in this area if the FIE so requests.

### **2. Code of procedure for handling ethical cases**

As the Ethics Committee has had very few cases referred to it in recent years, it has been able to act with due regard for the rights of those involved, in particular their right to be heard, but has had to proceed without being able to rely on the rules of procedure established for this activity.

For this reason, he asked the FIE to appoint a lawyer to draw up a code of procedure along the lines of what other international federations have done.

After various discussions with the FIE Legal Commission and the Executive Committee, this request from the Ethics Committee was accepted and a mandate was given to a specialist in sports law, Mr Jorge IBAROLLA, Libra Law ([libra-law.ch](http://libra-law.ch)), who worked on drawing up this code of procedure.

The Code has been examined by the Ethics Committee, which has approved it in its entirety, given that it is an excellent piece of work, subject to a few minor amendments which will be discussed and made to the text.

This text has also been submitted to the FIE's Legal Commission with a view to its adoption at the next FIE Congress, which will take place in Sharm El-Sheik on 25 November 2023.

The adoption of this text, which the Ethics Committee would like to see, will also enable the FIE to submit to the Congress delegates the possibility of increasing the number of members on the Ethics Committee in order to facilitate the management of cases, particularly with regard to the skills, nationalities and potential conflicts of interest that a member of the Ethics Committee could have in relation to certain cases.

It should also be noted that, in the current context, the Ethics Committee operates with 5 members, which makes discussions considerably more cumbersome when urgent decisions have to be taken.

The Procedural Code will make it possible to appoint a panel of 3 people who can, on a case-by-case basis, act with greater ease when deadlines are short, while also taking into account the various criteria mentioned above in order to avoid any conflict of interest.

The Ethics Committee would like to thank Mr Jorge IBAROLLA and the FIE for their excellent collaboration in putting this code in place, which will enable significant progress to be made in the area of ethics procedures.

### **3. New recommendations**

As the role of the Ethics Committee is also to suggest improvements or new ideas, we thought it would be a good idea for it to be involved in the analysis of candidates when a new Chairman or Executive Committee member is elected.

After internal discussions within the Ethics Committee, it came to the conclusion that this idea should be proposed to the Legal Commission, but in a restricted form, i.e. that the Ethics Committee should only be involved in analysing possible candidates for the presidency, and not those for the Executive Committee, as this would represent too much work and would therefore be difficult for the Ethics Committee to manage.

On the other hand, it notes that other international federations have put in place certain rules whereby they involve the Ethics Committee in the analysis and acceptance of candidates for the presidency.

This idea has been submitted to the Legal Committee for consideration and, if it is successful, to define the framework.

In this context, the Ethics Committee is of the opinion that its power, at this stage, should be that of a recommendation to be made to Comex as to whether or not to accept a candidacy for the presidency, but without giving the Ethics Committee the power to decide on a candidacy.

\* \* \*

The Ethics Committee has worked smoothly over the past year and looks forward to continuing its work in this context until the end of 2024, when new elections will be held.

**Point 1 / Item 1 / Punto 1:**

Not in favour of the proposition.

There are no legal reasons for this requirement, it is not necessary for transparency as the congress report is published later in the year and it is contentious in terms of outside pressures, of the implications for congress attendees of unwanted social media attention.

**Point 2 / Item 2 / Punto 2:**

In favour of the proposition.

The Commission would like to add the attendance of presidents of commissions, councils and committees, so that paragraph 2 of the proposal would read (added words highlighted in yellow):-

At FIE Elective Congresses, the FIE member Federations may be represented by 2 delegates. Members of the Executive Committee, presidents of commissions, councils and committees and candidates to elected positions have the right to take part in the FIE Elective Congresses.

The commission considers that as the congress might discuss matters relating to the work of these bodies their presidents should have the right to be present to represent them and to assist the Congress better to understand the topic concerned.

### **Point 3 / Item 3 / Punto 3:**

In favour of the proposition.

The Commission however proposes the modification of the proposition as follows:-

A candidate for the Medical Commission - must have completed the educational requirements for being an MD, DO or DC ~~or have practiced as a physiotherapist, or have been a member of the Commission for at least 8 years and hold a valid and active licence, or be qualified and be practicing as a physiotherapist.~~

The Commission considers that to ensure they maintain their knowledge and skills up to date through continuous professional development it is necessary that its members are currently qualified to practice, and that therefore the clause in the following propositions accepting previous membership of the commission as a criterion for candidature, in order to benefit from their experience, is not appropriate.

### **Point 4 / Item 4 / Punto 4:**

In favour of the proposition.

The Commission however proposes to change 'the' to 'this', for the sake of clarity, and delete the last 4 words (for at least 8 years), as unnecessary, so as to read:-

A candidate for the Legal Commission – must have the educational requirements or ~~be practising~~ have practiced as a lawyer, judge or notary or have been a member of this Commission

### **Point 5 / Item 5 / Punto 5:**

In favour of the proposition.

The Commission however proposes to change 'the' to 'this', for the sake of clarity, delete the last 4 words (for at least 8 years), as unnecessary, so as to read:-

A candidate for the Promotion, Communication and Marketing Commission must have a college or university degree in marketing or communications and have held a management position in marketing or communications or have been the producer of films, or have been a member of **this** Commission.

**Point 6/ Item6 / Punto 6:**

In favour of the first half of the proposition (up to “been part of the master list”). The commission proposes however to replace “have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of **32/16 or eight... etc**” by “have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of **16 or eight ..... etc**”.

Not in favour of the second part modifications (“Being a member ..... National Federation” as being too wide-ranging and potentially penalizing smaller federations where members fulfill multiple roles:-

A candidate for the Refereeing Commission must:

- be or have been an FIE category B or A referees in at least two weapons; and
- be a current member **or have already been a member** of the Refereeing Commission, or have refereed in official FIE competitions in at least two weapons in at least two (2) of the 4 fencing seasons (1 September to 31 August) preceding his candidature; and
- have refereed, at least once, in one weapon, in the table of **16 or eight or semi-final or final** of the individual or team event of a senior World Cup, or a Grand Prix, or a World Championships or the Olympic Games of the 4 fencing seasons preceding his candidature **or have been part of the master list**.

Once elected, the Refereeing Commission member shall send to the FIE head-office a letter of commitment signed by both the Refereeing Commission member and his/her national federation.

**Point 7/ Item7 / Punto 7:**

In favour of the proposition. The Commission however proposes to change ‘the’ to ‘this’, for the sake of clarity, and delete the last 4 words (**for at least 8 years**), as unnecessary, so as to read:-

A candidate for the Rules Commission must have been an active ‘A’ or ‘B’ rated referee or have officiated, at least twice, as a president of the DT at a Zonal Championship or as a member of the DT at a World Championship or as a member of the DT at an Olympic Games, or have been a member of **this** Commission.

**Point 8/ Item 8 / Punto 8 :**

In favour of the proposition. The commission would like to modify the text of the proposition by changing ‘the’ to ‘this’, for the sake of clarity, deleting its last four words (**for at least 8 years**), and adding an additional paragraph (**‘Be a member or ....’**) as follows:-

A candidate for the - SEMI Commission **must** have a college degree in engineering or science or be practising as an engineer **or have been a member of this** Commission, **and**

**Be a member or have already been a member of the SEMI Commission of a National Federation or fulfilled an equivalent role, or have officiated at least twice at weapon control or as a technician at Zonal Championship or a World Championship or an Olympic Games**

The commission notes the risk of candidates for the commission having all the academic qualifications required but no experience of the sport of fencing and therefore of practical fencing-related applications, and therefore proposes this additional second paragraph.

**Point 9/ Item 9 / Punto 9 :**

In favour.

**Point 10/ Item 10 / Punto 10 :**

In favour.

**Point 11/ Item 11 / Punto 11 :**

Not in favour.

The proposal would allow a president of a confederation or the president of the athletes' commission to become secretary general, secretary-treasurer or a vice president of the FIE. But these persons' situation in the Executive committee is different from that of the other members, in that they have been elected to that position by a body other than the Elective Congress of the FIE and therefore do not carry the mandate of all the FIE members. They are also likely to perceive their role as representing the interests of their confederation or the athletes rather than the whole FIE; and at a practical level the workload of a confederation president is incompatible with taking on the heavy burden of FIE secretary general or secretary-treasurer

**Point 12/ Item 12 / Punto 12 :**

In favour.

**Point 13/ Item 13 / Punto 13 :**

In favour. The commission would however like to modify the text of the proposition by adding the clause highlighted in yellow as follows:-

Zonal Confederations shall appoint at least one person to serve as a Safeguarding Officer at each Zonal Championship. All safeguarding reports which are not resolved through mediation must be reported to the FIE in accordance with the underlying safeguarding rules of the FIE.

The commission asks for this addition to help ensure the confidentiality of such reports.

**Other points**

A) The commission met with the Ethics Committee at their request. They raised two points:-

1) The need to draw up a procedural code for ethical issues. Maitre Carrard informed the Legal Commission that the lawyer Jorge Ibarrola, who has already advised the FIE on other matters, had been commissioned to prepare this code. It was agreed that the Ethics Committee will send it to the Legal Commission for review when it is finished.

2) They informed the Legal Committee that they had discussed as a proposal amongst ideas new ideas, to improve the contributions of the Ethics Committee, the suggestion that they should analyse the compliance with ethical requirements and principles of candidates for the most senior FIE positions; they suggested that it should only consist of an opinion, without going any further in its consequences. This idea would be given further consideration by them.

B) The commission met briefly with the Medical Commission at the Legal Commission's request to obtain technical medical confirmation of aspects of the text for Medical Commission. The discussion contributed to the Legal Commission's subsequent finalizing of its recommended text (see point 3 above).

C) The commission met briefly with the president of the Women and Fencing Council at the Legal Commission's request to discuss their second proposition (point 13 above) – there was concern in the Legal Commission over the confidentiality implications of the proposition. After some discussion it was mutually agreed that adding the final clause 'in accordance with the underlying safeguarding rules of the FIE' satisfied this concern.

### **1.1: Mission**

  - An honorary member is an corporate or individual person who was invited by the Board of directors/Executive Committee and/or a General Meeting/Congress to membership for honorary reasons;

### **2.2 Membership conditions**

#### **2.2.1. Clubs or similar member**

Any club or group wishing to become or remain a member of the Federation as a corporate member must, each year, pay the required dues and fill the membership documentation.

The conditions for corporate membership are the following:

- Be a corporation created under the Corporation law (name the precise law applicable to the constitution of corporations in the country) or comply with whatever regulations and requirements the country or other administration applicable requires for the establishment of a sports club, organisation or national federation.
- Have its head office/venue on the territory of (name the country)

#### **2.2.2. Individual member**

Any person wishing to become or remain a member of the Federation as an individual member must, each year, pay the required dues and fill the membership documentation.

To become or remain an individual member, the person must be one of the following:

- An administrator of a corporate member

- An athlete
- A coach
- A referee or other official
- A member of the Board/Executive Committee, a committee, commission etc of the Federation or one of its sub-divisions
- Any other entity/person supporting fencing in a category that the Federation desires as members and satisfies the membership conditions



### **2.2.3. Honourary member**

To become an honorary member, a person or moral person must meet the following criteria:

- Has made a highly significant contribution to the Federation;
- Has been accepted by the Board of directors;

### **2.3 Membership dues**

The amount of the dues for each category of membership is set by decision of the Board of directors. The Board of directors/Executive Committee can impose a special additional membership fee for a specific period of time. No paid or owed membership fee is reimbursed in case of resignation, suspension or expulsion of a member.

### **2.4 Suspension, expulsion, withdrawal and sanctions**

The Board of directors/Executive Committee can suspend, expel, or sanction in any other way deemed appropriate, any member who fails to respect the Statutes, Rules and Policies of the Federation or who adopts a conduct prejudicial to the Federation, as provided in chapter XXX (put the chapter number)

**Item 7 (Part I) – IOC / LA2028 Report & COMEX Proposal for Implementation of Injury Surveillance**

– Created and presented by Dr. Jeremy Summers

**Review of IOC / LA2028 Report on FIE Sports Injury Data** – below are key highlights of information from the Medical Commission report that must be addressed in the immediate future. Additionally, it must be stated that Professor Peter Harmer, PhD, ATC, FACSM was contracted to complete this request from the IOC / LA2028 due to his 16+ years of service and experience in collecting FIE Injury epidemiology data and as the pioneer and developer of the initial FIE Injury Surveillance system. The information below will outline deficiencies in our current system and support our proposal for a unified and updated FIE Injury and Illness Surveillance system that can be sustained even with changes in FIE Medical Delegates as well as become in compliance with the 2020 IOC Recommendations for International Federations of Sport to implement best practices on Sports

Injury and Illness Surveillance System to ensure the health and safety of our athletes in the sport of fencing.

**Background:** In order for the FIE Medical Commission to collect sports injury and illness data for the FIE it first must review all supervisor reports submitted following competition. Currently there is an average of 120 FIE competitions annually. These reports are online for the Medical Commission to access, however, providing supervisor reports online is helpful but only if they are available/accessible and complete. For this request we only analyzed senior events. Below there are key highlights from the report that are important for this meeting and the FIE injury surveillance proposal.

### 1. IOC / LA2028 Questionnaire and Data Request:

- Across the 3 years of current analysis ('18-'19, '19-'20, '21-'22: Senior World Cups and GP only), a total of 40 supervisor reports were missing.
- The reports that are available are only useful to the FIE Medical Commission if the supervisor provides accurate information, meaning that the data from our investigation in injury surveillance shows that the majority of injuries were not reported by FIE supervisors and that supervisor's quality of injury reporting has consistently decreased its reporting of injury of 10% each year from the 18'-19' – 21'-22' seasons.
  - '21-'22 season = only 6 of 29 injuries are reported - approximately 21% of injuries were reported in the '21-'22 season.
  - '19-'20 season = only 5 of 16 injuries are reported - approximately 31% of injuries were reported in the '19-'20 season.
  - '18-'19 season = only 12 of 30 injuries are reported - 40% of injuries were reported in the '18-'19 season.
- A common explanation to underreporting is that supervisors are not medical specialists but FIE supervisors do not need to be specialists in medical issues; however, they must ensure that local medical staff understand their duties of documentation during the competition and that all medical withdrawals from competition must be accompanied with an FIE Medical Withdrawal form with all relevant medical reporting data filled in and submitted in their final reports.
  - All medical information from the competition will be documented by the local medical team and assigned FIE Medical Delegates at major events. The DT and supervisor should ensure that they collected sport injury and illness data which includes but not limited to all medical withdrawals from competition.
- *This is a critical breakdown in the system that the FIE must emphasize to competition organizers and local medical staff.*

### 2. Bolster the FIE supervisor system:

- 2.1. **Step One:** if an athlete must withdraw from a bout for a medical reason, the referee makes a note to the DT to help ensure step two.
- 2.2. **Step Two:** The DT collects the medical report from the event medical team (i.e. – local medical team should athlete name, country, diagnosis, and contact information with the FIE Medical Withdrawal Form).
- 2.3. **Step Three:** Supervisor includes all medical information including injury/illness withdrawals in their final supervisor report.

- 2.4. **Step Four:** Supervisor reports accessible for the Medical Commission to follow up with athletes to fill specific sports injury surveillance criteria as described in the IOC Consensus. Specific diagnosis, mechanism of injury, time-loss etc.
- 2.5. **Step Five:** Medical Commission compiles data sets for each season based upon gender, age category, right-left handed, injury location, injury tissue type and categorization.
- 2.6. **Step Six:** FIE Medical Commission inputs athlete injuries into a database for surveillance and monitoring.
- 2.7. **Step Seven:** FIE Medical Commission drafts yearly and quadrennial reports.
- 2.8. **Step Eight:** Strongly consider a FIE Supervisor minimum competency examination or license, experience/grading system, and/or penalty for non-compliance and poor reporting duties for event supervision. Below are examples of sports that provide examples of a similar process into their supervisor competencies.
  - 2.8.1. **FIBA:** Commissioners, who supervise games, must maintain their license by passing a written exam and attending a clinic every four years. They are categorized into Zonal, National, and Licensed based on their experience and performance.
  - 2.8.2. **FIG:** "Supervisors" that oversee competitions progress through several certification categories from national to international levels. Higher categories necessitate passing written and practical exams along with experience in lower categories.
  - 2.8.3. **World Athletics:** Technical Delegates, the top authority at a competition, must attend seminars and pass written exams to maintain their certification.
  - 2.8.4. **UCI:** Commissaires, who oversee competitions, follow a structured training program that involves progressing through national, continental, and international levels and passing exams at each stage.
  - 2.8.5. **FIFA:** Match Commissioners, akin to supervisors, oversee entire match operations. They reach this level through rigorous training and examination processes.

### 3. Solutions/Recommendations:

- 3.1. Bolster and fix the FIE Supervisor reporting system to ensure quality reporting.
- 3.2. The report recommends requiring event management software developers to include a code that indicates medical withdrawals as opposed to not showing up or not finishing the competition. Currently, both of these situations are classified as 9999. This adds considerable difficulty to the task of evaluating injury risk because potentially every who misses a competition could be counted as a withdraw for injury. This proposal was initially made more than 15 years ago but not acted on by the Executive Committee or SEMI.
- 3.3. COMEX approval of an updated and sustainable FIE Injury & Illness Surveillance System Proposed by the Medical Commission - obtain sports injury and illness platform to become in full compliance with IOC Recommendations.
- 3.4. Consider contracting Professor Harmer as a consultant to transition and assist FIE Medical Delegates for the season of 22'-23' and 23'-24'to help initiate changes in how the FIE collects and manages medical data. Additionally, this will establish a commitment to adhering to the IOC Recommendations for the future.

**Establishing the FIE Injury Surveillance and Intervention System (SIIS):** “A Long-Term Strategic Initiative for Enhancing Athlete Health and Safety in Fencing”

#### Executive Summary

The Fédération Internationale d'Escrime (FIE) is acutely aware of the importance of injury and illness surveillance in the world of sport. In a concerted effort to protect the health of athletes, the Medical Commission has identified the need for well-structured injury surveillance programs, precise data collection, and careful data analyses. This comes as an evolution of over a decade's worth of recommendations and advancements in sports epidemiology, pushing our focus towards overuse injuries and illness in athletes.

Following the request from the IOC and LA 2028 for comprehensive injury and illness data subsequent to the Tokyo 2021 Olympic Games, the FIE Medical Commission has worked relentlessly to provide accurate information, despite the drawbacks of our current methods. A thorough examination of 128 supervisor reports, 168+ international senior competitions and more than 15,000 bouts underscores an urgent need for systemic improvements, particularly as a substantial number of injuries went unreported across three seasons.

Our study also exposed limitations in our current fencing event management software, which fails to distinguish between medical withdrawals, no-shows, and non-completions, leading to potential misclassifications and clouding our understanding of injury rates.

In light of these findings, the Medical Commission proposes the implementation of the FIE Injury Surveillance and Intervention System (SIIS). In alignment with the 'IOC Consensus Statement: Methods for Recording and Reporting Data on Injury and Illness in Sports 2020,' the SIIS is designed to provide a consistent, standardized method for capturing and analyzing fencing-specific injury and illness data.

Our proposal appreciates fencing's unique characteristics by incorporating bout exposure metrics similar to those used in other sports, which could include time spent, number of 5-touch and 15-touch bouts, as well as touches scored and received.

Examining examples from IF like FIFA, FINA, IAAF, and the IOC, our proposal extends the 2020 IOC Consensus Statement principles to meet fencing's specific requirements. This method will empower researchers with accurate tools for analyzing and comparing injury and illness incidence, fostering a broader understanding both within fencing and across other sports.

With the introduction of SIIS, our objective extends beyond enhancing fencing's safety. We also aim to increase its appeal, contributing to a more diverse sporting environment.

In conclusion, SIIS is designed to provide a comprehensive, reliable, and fencing-focused surveillance system, emphasizing the health benefits of fencing, and contributing to a standardized approach to injury and illness surveillance across different sports. Our ultimate goal is to foster a safer, more engaging, and healthier sports environment globally, thereby promoting the broader appeal of fencing.

**Project Background and Motivation:** At the request of the International Olympic Committee and the 2028 Los Angeles Olympic Games' organizers, the Fédération Internationale d'Escrime (FIE) Medical Commission, with crucial support from Professor Peter Harmer, conducted an in-depth review of injury and illness data from international events from 2018 to 2022. The study's primary purpose was to gain critical insights into athletes' health and safety, recognize patterns and potential areas for improvement, and better inform the upcoming 2028 Olympic Games' preparations.

However, during this study, two significant issues were identified. First, the traditional pen-and-paper reporting system, reliant on the completeness and accuracy of FIE supervisors' data, was found to be challenging. Second, an alarmingly low injury reporting rate was found across the seasons under review, indicative of widespread underreporting. For instance, only 20.7% and 31.25% of injuries were reported in the 2021-2022 and 2019-2020 seasons, respectively.

The current event management software also fails to distinguish between athletes who medically withdraw and those who do not appear or complete competitions, affecting the ability to accurately determine injury risk and incidence rates.

Recognizing these issues, the Medical Commission has proposed the creation of the FIE Injury Surveillance Programme, in line with the IOC's 2020 Consensus Statement recommendations, to ensure better health monitoring and safety for athletes.

### 4-Step Project Process

1. **Step One:** System Implementation and Data Collection - The project involves setting up a sustainable Sports Injury and Illness Surveillance System (SIIS), which includes a dedicated database platform to collect, store, and analyze detailed injury and illness data from all FIE events. Members of the FIE Medical Commission will oversee the data collection, ensuring it's thorough and accurate.
  - 1.1. Before each competition, a communication strategy will be implemented to remind all Director Technique (DT) and FIE supervisors of their data collection responsibilities.
  - 1.2. They will be given detailed documents to hand to the local medical team, covering all medical contacts and withdrawals.
  - 1.3. After each competition, they are expected to compile all medical data, include it in their supervisor reports, and email it to the designated Medical Commission delegate and president for that event.
  - 1.4. Proposed solutions to address the identified issues, the FIE Medical Commission is recommending mandating event management software developers **create a specific code that distinctly identifies medical withdrawals, thereby improving data accuracy.** The SIIS

will introduce standardized definitions and classifications for health problems, injuries, and illnesses. This request has been discussed and repeatedly mentioned from over the following years June '09; September '10; July '11; July '13, and July '23.

- 1.5. The system will also include a comprehensive database to systematically record and analyze data, track key metrics, and provide insights into preventive measures and improved athlete care.

### 2. Step 2: Project Deliverables align with IOC 2020 Recommendations

- 2.1. The SIIS will provide a clear and uniform definition of health issues, injuries, and illnesses, precise athlete exposure tracking, injury and illness classification using OSIICS coding system, a comprehensive database for pattern analysis, systematic risk assessment, and the ability to compare data across demographic groups and sport categories.

### 3. Step 3: Resource Allocation The project

- 3.1. Will extend over ten years.
- 3.2. Will rely on access to medical records, collaboration with the Medical Commission and external professionals.
- 3.3. A software platform (FITSTATS) costing \$3,500 annually for ten Medical Commission members, and the cooperation of the athletes for providing necessary data.

### 4. Step 4: Conclusion and IRB Approved Research Project

- 4.1. The SIIS, a ten-year prospective study approved by an Institutional Review Board (IRB), is designed to enhance the welfare and performance of athletes within the FIE. The system will provide comprehensive and data-driven insights into the prevalence, causes, and impacts of sport-related injuries and illnesses in fencing, guiding the creation of preventive measures and improvements in the sport's quality.
- 4.2. The project's objective is to develop, test, and implement an injury surveillance system for international fencing competitions.
- 4.3. The methods will align with the IOC's Athlete Monitoring OCSIIS and SMDCS protocols. The study population will include participants in all FIE-sanctioned international events across the 2022-2032 seasons.
- 4.4. Although the observational study may not provide direct benefits to participants, it poses no foreseeable risks. The data collected will be kept confidential, stored securely, and reported in aggregate form.

**Item 8 – Concussion in Fencing Data Review and Proposal – Proposal created and presented by Dr. Jeremy Summers.**

Meeting discussion: General agreement of updating the FIE Medical Handbook – working group created.



**Proposal within Medical Commission:** We agree that editing the FIE Medical Handbook to include comprehensive protocols for concussion and cervical spine injuries, encompassing the identification, prevention, and management of these injuries during FIE competitions. A dedicated working group, led by Dr. Summers, Dr. Halaimia, and Dr. Huzel, is proposed to guide this essential revision process.

**Motivation:** As the international governing body for fencing, the FIE must continually prioritize the health and safety of its athletes worldwide. Initial documentation of concussion in fencing was recorded in July '14 with discussion of the risk of concussion in fencing and regulations related to evaluation. Harmer (AUS) indicated that his research shows that the risk of concussion in fencing is very low (approximately 1 time in 74,000 bouts). However, the Medical Commission will consider a concussion protocol for future use". This injury type has resurfaced the need for updating protocols with recent epidemiological research within USA fencing (2015-2020) with robust system of protocols and documentation underscores the pressing need for an inclusive revision of the FIE Medical Handbook, reflecting our commitment to remain aligned with emerging findings on athlete safety.

The retrospective analysis conducted by USA Fencing presented crucial insights into mild traumatic brain injuries, or concussions, in fencing. This investigation, which spanned five competitive seasons and involved 98,000 competitors, yielded a concussion rate of 0.144 per 1,000 athlete exposures. These figures may offer some insight into potential injury rates at the FIE level, given its oversight of an estimated 100,000 to 150,000 bouts per season. Using this analysis as a loose guideline, one might anticipate between 14 to 22 potential concussions annually within FIE competitions. It is important to note that even though this projected incidence is lower than in contact sports, it serves as a sobering reminder of the risks in fencing, which could lead to serious long-term health implications for fencing athletes.

Further concerns arise regarding the potential underreporting, mismanagement, or overlooked concussions within our fencing community. These concerns mandate a rigorous re-evaluation and strengthening of the current concussion management strategies of the FIE.

The risk profile in fencing extends beyond concussions to encompass potential cervical spine injuries due to sudden head movements or falls. Consequently, it's crucial that we also integrate prevention and management protocols for cervical spine injuries into the FIE Medical Handbook.

In addition, specific guidelines for the safe removal of fencing masks following a suspected injury must be established to avoid exacerbating potential head or neck injuries. This initiative must take into account the unique constraints of fencing gear to ensure immediate, safe access to injured athletes.

### **Proposal motivation:**

1. Inclusion of recent epidemiological data: The FIE Medical Commission handbook should incorporate current research and understanding of concussion and cervical spine injuries in fencing, reflecting the latest scientific findings.
2. Enhanced athlete and staff education: The Medical Commission aims to provide essential knowledge on injury risks, recognition, and management to athletes, coaches, referees, and medical teams, facilitating a swift, effective response at FIE-sanctioned events.
3. Development of safety protocols: We need practical guidelines for fencing mask removal in the event of an injury, ensuring athlete safety during emergency responses.

By enacting these proposed changes, the Medical Commission upholds its commitment to athlete safety, sporting integrity, and the enduring appeal of fencing. By strengthening safety protocols and fostering an environment that prioritizes athlete well-being, we enhance the safety of our sport and contribute to a healthier, safer fencing environment globally.

### Review of head injury data in fencing –

#### Abstract

- **Background:** Mild Traumatic Brain Injuries (mTBI) or concussions pose significant public health risks, affecting athletes across a spectrum of sports. Despite fencing's classification as a non-contact sport, concussions can occur due to rapid head movements or incidental contact with an opponent's weapon.
- **Study Design:** This research is a retrospective analysis of data collected over five competitive seasons (2015-2020) from the Sport Event Medical Encounter System (SEMES) at USA Fencing sponsored domestic events and international involvements.
- **Methods:** Data encompassing all fencing categories from youth to veteran competitors were analyzed, focusing on the incidence and prevalence of concussion, identified as indirect head trauma from an opponent's weapon guard or direct posterior trauma from falling.
- **Results:** Among 98,000 competitors, there were 70 head injuries requiring medical intervention, leading to 49 withdrawals from competition due to concussion evaluation. The concussion rate was calculated at 0.144 per 1,000 athlete-exposures. Male fencers and saber users showed a higher predisposition, with a median age at diagnosis of 20.7 years.
- **Conclusion:** Despite the relatively low incidence of concussion in fencing, it's crucial to acknowledge each injury's potential significant implications. The lower concussion rate should not lead to complacency but should promote enhanced education, robust concussion guidelines, and a commitment to athlete safety.

#### Proposal Summary:

- In the context of this study, "AE" stands for "athlete-exposures as in-competition bout exposures," which is a term used in sports medicine to measure the number of times an athlete participates in a sports activity where they are exposed to the potential of an injury. In this case, each bout, or match, an athlete participates in counts as one "athlete-exposure."
- The study found that there were 0.144 concussions per 1,000 athlete-exposures. To translate this into a larger, perhaps easier to understand figure: this rate equates to approximately 1.44 concussions for every 10,000 bouts fenced. This means that for every 10,000 bouts played,

around 1 to 2 fencers experienced a concussion. It's important to note that this is an average, so the actual number can vary.

## **Article: 4.4.2 Proposal from: Legal Commission – P.3**

### **Executive Summary: Medical Commission Vote: 8 NO – 2 YES – rejection of the proposal**

The core issue of discussion pertains to the expansion of criteria for Medical Commission Member candidates to include Doctors of Osteopathy (DO) and Doctors of Chiropractic (DC) proposed by the Legal Commission. While the proposal was rejected by the majority of the Medical Commission with a vote of 8-2, the dissenting and advocacy votes raised significant points that merit further consideration.

### **Primary Arguments Against the Proposal:**

1. **Certification Requirements:** Critics stress the importance of having individuals with the highest level of certification recognized in conventional medicine in their respective countries on the Medical Commission (MC), due to the potential of unforeseen medical emergencies at fencing competitions.
2. **Standardization of Training:** Critics of the legal proposal underscore the worldwide variances in training and recognition between MDs and other healthcare practitioners. They argue that MD training enjoys a more globally standardized model compared to that of DOs or DCs, who lack authorization to practice medicine in several countries. The consensus is that medical decisions for events ought to be made by a medical doctor, whether they are a medical delegate or an assigned event medical doctor.
3. **Liability Concerns:** The potential liability of the FIE in a situation where an MC representative who is not a licensed physician has to handle a medical emergency is a central concern. Critics argue a non-physician MC delegate might not be equipped to recognize medical malpractice or incompetence.
4. **Relying on Local Medical Expertise:** There are concerns about over-reliance on local medical expertise during FIE events. Critics advocate for maintaining a high standard of medical licensing and competence among its MC delegates, rather than delegating and/or potential issues in relying on only with responsibilities to local organizers.

### **Key Advocacy for the Proposal:**

1. **Delegate Duties:** Supporters argue that the FIE medical delegates' role does not involve practicing medicine but rather identifying and managing health issues, therefore negating the necessity for an MD qualification only but rather with qualified and licensed sports medicine healthcare professionals.
2. **IOC Requirements and Safety Considerations:** Advocates reference the IOC Medical Code (1.6.2), asserting that all healthcare providers must have relevant sports medicine training, education, and experience. They argue this ensures that qualified professionals, irrespective of their designation, can provide competent care.

3. **Recognition of Other Healthcare Degrees:** Advocates of the proposal acknowledge the global disparities in educational standards and the legalization of practice. Even so, they highlight that many countries uphold rigorous international standards for education and licensure. It would be unfair, from their standpoint, to exclude individuals such as Doctors of Osteopathy (DOs), Doctors of Chiropractic (DCs), and physiotherapists who meet these stringent qualifications from candidacy for the Medical Commission. They contend that these professionals, having attained an internationally standardized education, are fully equipped to assess athletes effectively and cooperate with local medical teams as necessary. This perspective aligns with the stipulations of the FIE rules and the responsibilities of a Medical Commission member. Supporters advocate for the inclusion and recognition of DOs, DCs, and physiotherapists, insisting that these professionals can proficiently fulfill the duties set forth by the FIE and the Medical Commission.
4. **Relying on Local Medical Expertise:** The argument proposed by the opposition with the medical commission, voicing concerns about reliance on local medical expertise at all FIE events, inadvertently overlooks the substantial 97.5% of events not attended by Medical Commission delegates. If their assertion - the supposed inadequacy of local medical teams - holds, it implies a larger, systemic issue requiring immediate attention across all FIE events, not just the major ones. This viewpoint carries significant implications, as it seems to suggest that only major events warrant attendance by a medical commission member as a MD only, thereby sidelining the 97.5% majority of FIE events. However, this argument is presented without any data or empirical evidence demonstrating the local medical staff's ill-preparedness, leaving it as a potentially unsubstantiated claim. Moreover, it's concerning that the proposition underscores the need for medical commission members as MDs only to be present only at major events, rather than addressing the alleged deficiency of local medical coverage at all FIE events. This discrepancy reveals a possible flaw in the argument and questions the actual intention behind this point. If the assertion about local medical teams' competence were indeed factual, the correct approach would involve providing comprehensive solutions to enhance the medical coverage across all FIE events rather than focusing in on the 2.5% of major events that FIE Medical Delegates are assigned too. The focus should shift from being centered only MDs at major events to ensuring optimal medical care during all FIE-sanctioned competitions licensed and trained healthcare providers in the specialty of sports medicine, thus truly prioritizing athlete safety. We must collaborate and rely on the local organizers event medical staff for the implementation of emergency procedures.
5. **Diverse Skills and Competencies:** Supporters stress the diverse competencies that professionals other than MDs can bring to the MC, cautioning against focusing solely on a delegate's degree which might overlook a range of relevant expertise that could benefit the FIE and serve the complexities within sports medicine umbrella of expertise.
6. **Historical Contributions:** Supporters point to the historical contributions of non-MDs, such as Peter A. Harmer's 17-year service and significant work for the sport of fencing and the FIE Medical Commission and his work on Fencing Sports Injury Epidemiology.

7. **Expert Opinions:** Prominent figures like Richard Budgett, IOC Medical Director, and Roald Bahr, a leading expert in sports medicine, corroborate that the IOC does not mandate specific professional qualifications for the international Medical Commission delegates or events as MDs only, but leaves it to the IF's discretion. They elucidate that non-MDs can fulfill their roles, except ordering tests or prescribing, even if they're not in a clinical role.

### **Article: t.45**

#### **Proposal from: Rules Commission P.24**

#### **Executive Summary:**

The Rules Commission has proposed an amendment to Article: t.45 to reduce the duration of a medical timeout from five minutes to three, based on the belief that the existing rule is occasionally or often misused by athletes for strategic advantage. They suggest trialing this rule change at the 2024 Junior and Cadet World Championship in Saudi Arabia.

While the Medical Commission recognizes the need to prevent misuse of medical timeouts, the proposal was unanimously rejected due to the lack of empirical evidence supporting the claim of misuse and potential compromise on athlete health due to reduced time for medical evaluation and treatment. Additionally, the proposed three-minute medical intervention period may not offer sufficient flexibility to manage diverse medical situations effectively.

The Commission acknowledges the need for an evidence-based approach to such decisions. To this end, there is significant potential to collect and analyze data across FIE events. Recording and examining crucial data points—such as strip calls, medical timeouts (awarded and denied), quick interventions, time taken to award a timeout/medical assessment and intervention/treatment duration, athlete's country, handedness, and bout score at injury time and which opponent was down in correlation to injury request—can create a substantial evidence base.

This approach aligns with the IOC Consensus Statement of 2020 and provides crucial epidemiological insights into sport-specific injuries. It also offers an excellent opportunity to improve the quality of medical coverage at over 97.5% of international events through targeted training for local organizers and healthcare professionals. This strategy could encompass a brief 10-15 minute educational presentation and a subsequent quiz, enhancing adherence to FIE competition rules and reducing medical assessment and treatment times.

In conclusion, while the motivation behind the proposed amendment to Rule t.45 is understood, it requires comprehensive, empirical data to underpin any modifications. The Commission believes that capturing and analyzing pertinent data from FIE events, and bridging educational gaps among local organizers and medical staff, will serve the interests of athlete health, ensure fairness, and improve the effectiveness of the rules across all competitions. Such an ambitious proposal has a strong endorsement from the Medical Commission and would be interested in a joint proposal to the executive committee to improve the healthcare quality of and running of international events.

**Proposal Overview:** The Rules Commission has put forth a proposal to curtail the duration of a medical timeout from five minutes to three. The proponents of this amendment argue that the current regulation allows athletes to misuse this duration as a strategic advantage in challenging situations or when lagging behind in scores. The proposal suggests implementing this rule change as a trial during the 2024 Junior and Cadet World Championship in Saudi Arabia.

## **Detailed Analysis:**

1. **Assertion of Misuse:** The proposal initiates its argument by suggesting that athletes frequently manipulate the five-minute medical timeout as a strategic maneuver when they face physical strain or score deficits. While the Medical Commission delegates take such a claim with utmost seriousness, it's important to note that it lacks the substantiation of empirical evidence or statistical data. The argument principally leans on the subjective observations of referees, whose views we respect, but the absence of quantitative evidence weakens the robustness of the claim.
2. **Emphasis on Athlete Health:** The proposal underscores the primacy of athlete health and proclaims that in case of a significant injury, the athlete should discontinue the competition. The juxtaposition of this assertion with the objective of reducing the medical timeout is somewhat contradictory. If the wellbeing of the athlete is indeed the focus, curtailing the timeframe allocated for medical professionals to assess and treat an injury seems counterproductive.
3. **Proposal of a Three-minute Medical Intervention:** The proposition implies that a duration of three minutes should suffice for a medical professional to evaluate an athlete's condition, establish a diagnosis, and determine whether they can continue with the competition. This implication raises concerns, as it fails to account for the wide

range of potential injuries and their varying degrees of severity. Implementing a blanket three-minute timeframe may not provide sufficient flexibility to effectively address all potential medical situations.

4. **Proposed Amendments to Rule t.45:** The modifications suggested in the written rule t.45 are logically consistent with the motivations outlined in the proposal. However, they also carry the inherent weaknesses present in the proposal, predominantly the lack of empirical support and potential contradiction with athlete health prioritization.
5. **Reactions from the Medical Commission:** The proposal was unanimously rejected by the Medical Commission members, citing a variety of concerns such as the absence of data substantiating the request, complexities in juxtaposing fencing with other sports, and potential interruptions to the medical evaluation and treatment process.

In conclusion, while the Rules Commission's proposal to reduce the medical timeout from five minutes to three is founded on well-intended concerns, it is critically important that any modifications to such rules be thoroughly grounded in comprehensive, empirical evidence. Given that over 2.5% of the FIE events have assigned Medical Commission delegates deeply familiar with rule t.45 and its implementation, we are presented with an exceptional opportunity to collect and analyze pertinent data across all FIE events. Currently, all medical timeouts must be documented on pool sheets or bout sheets, but the utilization of this data remains unclear. By developing systems to capture injury data, diagnosis times, and treatment durations, we can gather substantial evidence that could aid in justifying a rule change, if needed. Furthermore, this data could equip the Medical Commission with valuable insights into sport-specific injury epidemiology, aligning with the IOC Consensus Statement of 2020. The Medical Commission would likely endorse a proposal with such ambition, as it fundamentally serves the interest of athlete health and safety while ensuring the rules are applied fairly and effectively across all competitions.

A reference could also come up on screen to show the FIE website and FIE sponsors.

For major events (World Championships and GP) there should always be a Master of Ceremonies (MC), as well as announcers, to inform and entertain the live audience. Particularly important during short breaks and delays. Well explained event is critical – the impressive Orleans Women’s World Cup given as an example.

The commission would like to increase dramatically the attendance, and after the final at the Medal Ceremony. Many different ideas have been tried in the past. Lottery system to be trialed. Include LOC engagement with the community.

### ***Team championships***

**1— Participation**

Each country may enter one team per gender and per weapon, thus giving a total of 6 competitions.

The teams shall be composed of fencers who participated in the individual competition of the corresponding weapon, but c.f. o.103.2 b below.

~~2—The rules for team competitions are applicable with the following exceptions:~~

- ~~a) For each weapon, the teams are composed of three fencers of the same nationality, one from category "A", one from "B" and one from "C", with or without a reserve for each category. A team cannot begin the match if it is not complete.~~
- ~~b) In the case of a team being short of a fencer in any of the weapons, the team may use a fencer who has competed in the individual championships at another weapon or who is registered but has yet to compete, but his/her ranking will be deemed to be last in the individual competition at the weapon of the team in which he is going to fence plus 1.~~
- ~~c) The teams are placed in the pools according to the ranking of the three fencers in the individual championship, the team having the lowest total being ranked highest. All the fencers registered for the team event must be present at the piste before the start of the match.~~
- ~~d) Each team may request, before a given bout, the substitution of a fencer. However, in case of injury or other medical reason duly recognized by the Medical delegate, the substitution can be immediate, even during the relay.~~

~~There can only be one substitution per team per match.~~

~~3—A fencer who has been replaced because of an injury may not fence again during that match. If both a fencer and the reserve, if any, are forced to retire, or if a fencer is excluded, their team is deemed to have lost the match.~~

~~4—The relay system is always applied. The three fencers of a team fence against their opponent of the same category. Each fencer fences his/her opponent twice giving a total of 6 bouts. The bouts are for 5 hits (5-10-15-20 etc.). Exceptionally, a relay may end at more than 5,10,15 etc. if a fencer scores a valid last hit of the relay and is at the same time awarded an additional penalty hit: in this case both hits will be counted; the maximum time for each bout is 3 minutes.~~

~~5—The team that first reaches the maximum score of 30 hits, or that which has scored the greatest number of hits after the expiry of regulation time, is the winner.~~

~~6—The order of categories for each match is established by the referee with the captains on the piste prior to the start of the match: The referee will draw lots and the winning captain will choose the first category in the order. The losing captain will choose the second category.~~

~~7—The competition consists of a round of pools of 3 or 4 teams, in which all the teams participate, and a direct elimination phase for the highest placed 16 teams; the other teams will be classified according to their ranking after the round of pools.~~

~~a) The order of fights in a pool of 4 is as follows:~~

~~b) Match 1 : The team ranked 1 vs the team ranked 4~~

~~— Match 2 : The team ranked 2 vs the team ranked 3 Match 3 : The winner of Match 1 vs the loser of Match 2~~

~~The initial ranking on which the drawing of the pools is based is established from the results of the fencers in the individual events. (cf. o.103.2.c)~~

~~Using the results of the pools, an overall ranking is established, from which the top 16 (or 8 if there are fewer than 16 teams taking part) are promoted to a direct elimination tableau, in which the teams are placed according to this ranking. Should there be absolute equality in results between teams ranked 16 and 17 (or 8 and 9), the team ranked higher before the round of pools will be qualified.~~

~~However, teams which have already fenced each other in the pools should not meet again immediately in the direct elimination. To avoid this, the lower ranked of the two teams in question may be moved:~~

- ~~– in the case of a tableau of 16, the team ranked 9 may change places only with the team ranked 10, the team ranked 11 may change places only with the team ranked 12, the team ranked 13 may change places only with the team ranked 14 and the team ranked 15 may change places only with the team ranked 16.~~

Until the Wednesday preceding the competition (midnight, Lausanne time), a fencer may be replaced by another. To do this, the national federation must send to the FIE, by fax or e-mail, a written request to substitute the fencer.
- 4 **Addition of a fencer or a team after the dead-line.**

From the Wednesday preceding the competition until 12 noon (local time) on the day preceding the competition, one or more fencers and/or a team may be added by national federations after payment to the FIE of a penalty according to the scale in force (cf o.31, table of financial penalties and fines).
- 5 Should a fencer or team who have been entered not present themselves to fence, a fine (cf o.31, table of financial penalties and fines), payable to the FIE, will be imposed to the federation of the faulty fencer or team, except in cases of properly authenticated 'force majeure'.

- 6 The organisers of all official competitions must, at risk of a penalty of a fine payable to the FIE (cf o.31, table of financial penalties and fines), refuse any entry of either fencer or referee not in possession of an FIE license valid for the current season.

  - b) In the case of a team being short of a fencer in any of the weapons, the team may use a fencer who has competed in the individual championships at another weapon or who is registered but has yet to compete, but his/her ranking will be deemed to be last in the individual competition at the weapon of the team in which he is going to fence plus 1.
  - c) The teams are placed in the pools according to the ranking of the three fencers in the individual championship. The team ranked 1 is the one having the lowest total. All the fencers registered for the team event must be present at the piste before the start of each match.
  - d) Each team may request, before a given relay, the substitution of a fencer. However, in case of injury or other medical reason duly recognized by the Medical delegate, the substitution can be immediate, even during the relay.

There can only be one substitution per team per match.

- 3 A fencer who has been replaced because of an injury may not fence again during that match. If both a fencer and the reserve are forced to retire, or if a fencer is excluded, their team is deemed to have lost the match.

- 4 The relay system is always applied. The three fencers of a team fence against their opponent of the same category. Each fencer fences his/her opponent twice giving a total of 6 relays. The relays are for 5 hits (5-10-15-20- etc.). Exceptionally, a relay may end at more than 5,10,15 etc. if a fencer scores a valid last hit of the relay and is at the same time awarded an additional penalty hit: in this case both hits will be counted; the maximum time for each relays is 3 minutes.
- 5 The team that first reaches the maximum score of 30 hits, or that which has scored the greatest number of hits after the expiry of regulation time, is the winner.

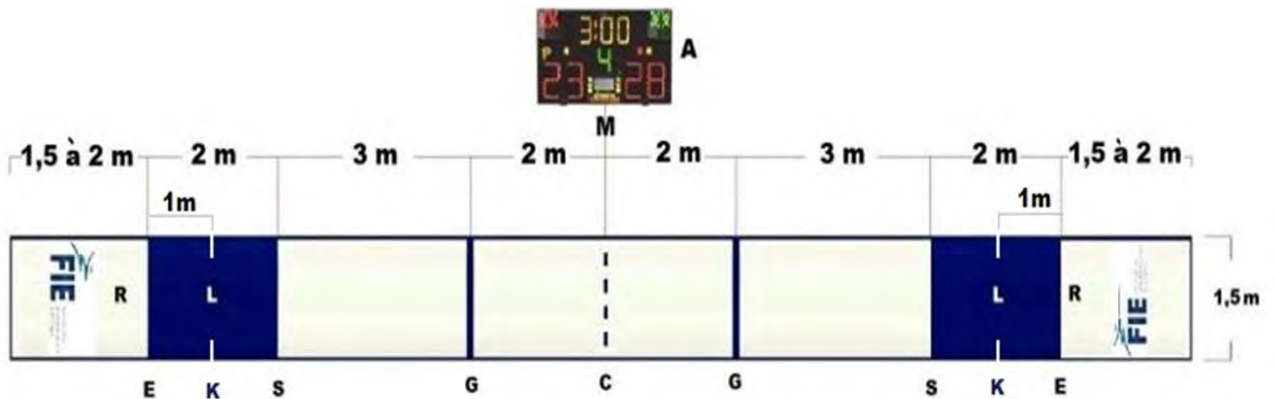
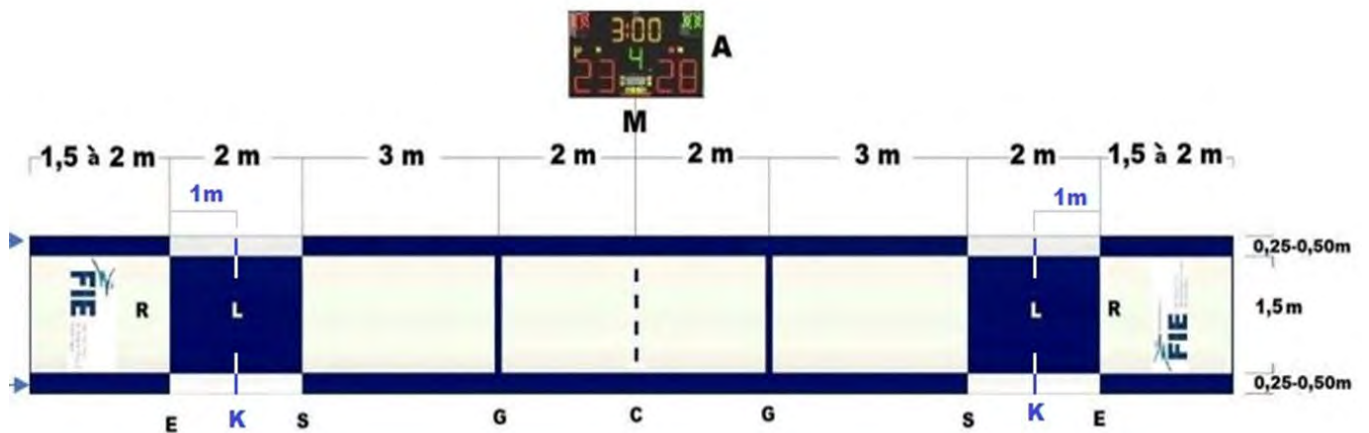

#### t.29

- 1 The use of the **non-sword hand** and **arm** to carry out an offensive or defensive action is forbidden (cf t.158-162, ~~t.165~~, **t.166**, t.170). Should such an offence occur, the hit scored by the fencer at fault is annulled and the latter will be penalized as specified for offences of the 2nd group (red card).
- 2 If a fencer **substitutes a non-valid part of his target for a valid part**, either by covering it or by any abnormal movement, the **Referee must penalise him by** applying the penalties specified in Articles t.158-162, t.165, t.170-, [for the offences of the 1st group](#) and any hit scored by the fencer at fault is annulled.
- 3 During the fight, the fencer must not, under any circumstances, **take hold of any part of the electrical equipment** with his non-sword hand; [the referee imposes him/her the penalties for the offences of the first group](#) (cf. t.158-162, t.165, t.170); any hit scored by the fencer at fault is annulled.

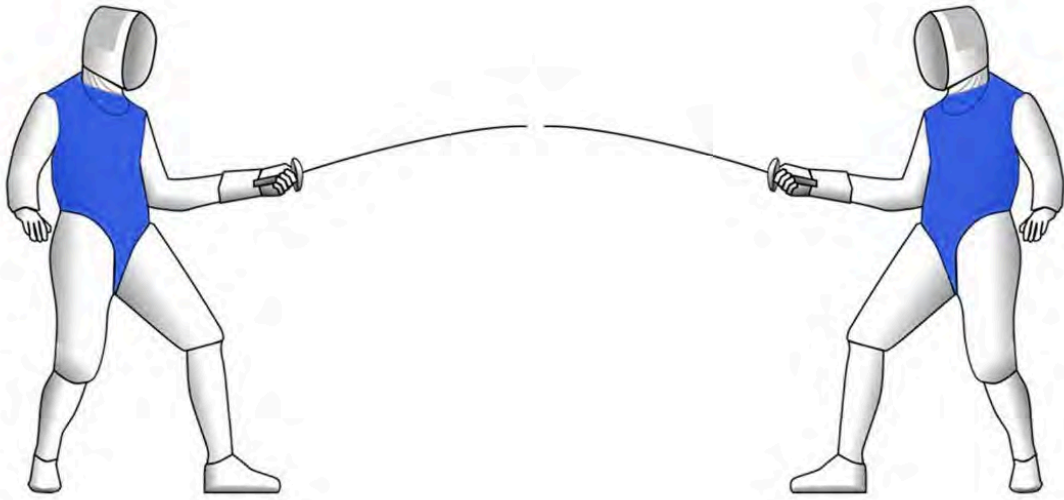


Figure 4 Valid target at foil

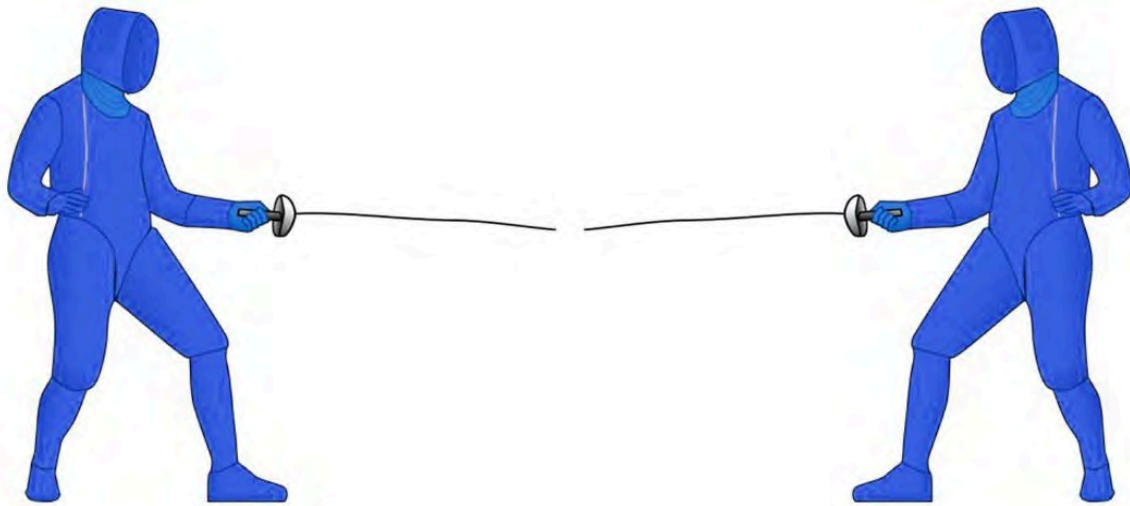


Figure 5 Valid target at épée

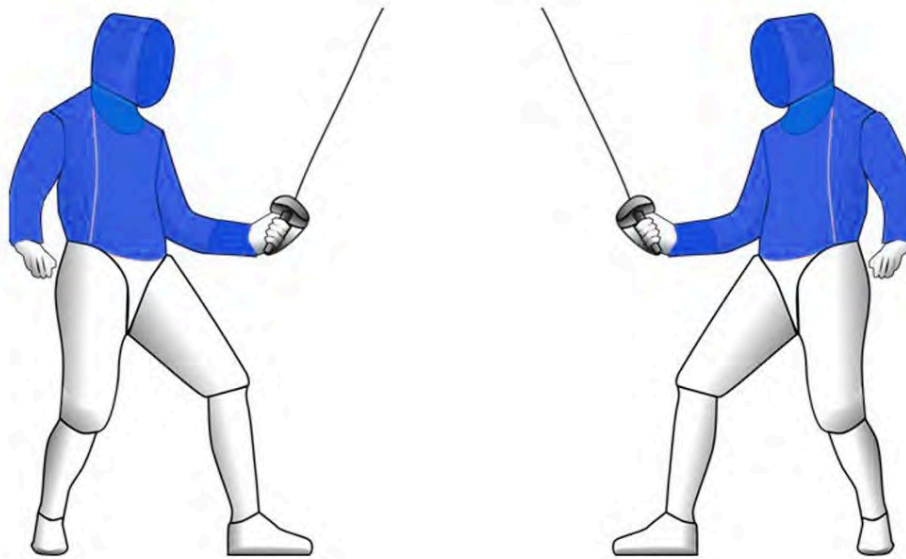


Figure 6 Valid target at sabre

Giandomenico Varallo asked if anyone had any proposals for congress 2024. None were forthcoming. Proposals should be made by mid- March 2024 another meeting can be arranged in February 2024 to discuss any proposals.

#### **Point 5 / Item 5 / Punto 5:**

Report of the Junior and Cadet World Championships in Plovdiv.

Report given by Gudjon Gestsson

1. No bags were available to transport fencers equipment from the call room to the piste
2. Use of volunteers in weapon control room and call room. The volunteers were rotated frequently so every new group of volunteers had to be trained each time.
3. Due to inexperience of volunteers in weapon control some items that did not comply were passed in error.

NOTES and suggestions

1. It would be helpful if further training of Weapon Control and Call Room Staff was made available. This would considerably reduce waiting times for the fencers and improve the running of the event.
2. At major events at least 4 lines of controls should be set up
3. Not all countries have the necessary sets of test equipment. Each test line would require (Gabarit for dimensions and flexibility/Electrical resistance testers for controlling lame material and blades)
4. Would it be possible for the FIE to budget for the provision of 2 complete sets for use by countries running competitions.

#### **Point 6 / Item 6 / Punto 6:**

##### **Flexibility of the blades**

It has been observed that some foil blades have been produced are failing as being too stiff.

At the recent European Games, a large proportion of foil blades tested failed for this reason (26%) these were almost all manufactured by Blaise Frères (BF). A further 15 brand new BF unsold blades (the stock of a local retailer) were tested and 7 failed. A report by the European SEMI was sent to FIE SEMI for information.

Giandomenico Varallo has spoken to the owner of BF on many occasions and has been told that they are being manufactured at the request of fencers who like the stiffer blades. However, these blades fall outside the parameters set in the FIE Rules.

A further check on the stiffness of foil blades will be made at the forthcoming World Championships in Milan and details of failures will be noted.

To ensure that blades are produced within the permitted limits Giandomenico Varallo may need to take further action which could result in withdrawing homologation.

It is essential that blades that are too stiff should not be used for safety reasons.

#### **Point 7 / Item 7 / Punto 7:**

##### **Advertising and checks by the SEMI Commission**

A great amount of time is taken up in weapon control explaining to fencers with equipment failures due to infringement against the publicity code. It would be useful if a member of the Promotion Communication and Marketing Commission could be available in the weapon control at major events to deal with these cases

A request was made for a joint meeting with SEMI – PCM – ATHLETS to discuss how this could work and to help educate fencers in what is permitted (suggested a diagram of the athlete showing permitted positions and size.)

A. Maraging sabre blades

Solution not yet reached but 2 manufacturers have sabre blades at the development stage

B. Revision of FIE Material Rules

The text has been translated from English to French and 20 points need clarification for the translation. As Janet Huggins and Giandomenico Varallo are both scheduled to be at the World Championships in Milan in July they will meet to confirm any required alterations. When finished the completed PDF and the XL sheet will be sent out to the members of the SEMI.

C. WIRELESS SYSTEM and its use at the Paris Olympics.

The present wireless system from StM does not meet the European (and USA) Regulations  
The requirement to cancel out the signal from the metallic piste cannot be obtained within permitted levels. StM must provide a successful test of their system if it is to be used at the Olympics

An alternative system is being investigated whilst using conventional spools and wires but incorporating lights in the fencer's masks.

This system has the following properties

Reduction in the sound made by the spool and wires for TV

Signal from score machine to light in mask 5mili seconds via encrypted radio transmitter signal  
cCompatible with Swiss Timing protocol with a battery life 48hrs about.

A test of this system is expected at the World Championships in Milan

D. New manufacturers from China

Zhigang Hou was asked to assist with education of these companies regarding the specification of equipment specifications. A suggestion was made that he could attempt as translation of the material rules into Chinese.

A similar idea was raised by Samer Hashem and Zeyad Saleem regarding the possible translation of the rules into Arabic.

*FIE Directoire Technique and delegates for official events*

**o.15**

- 5 The day before an individual or team competition, the DT must download the entry file, the day before the competition, from 12:00 noon local time from the FIE website.
  - In individual competitions, the DT must publish and send to the FIE the pools and the relevant schedules, as well as the list of exempt fencers for senior competitions, no later than 4:00 p.m. (local time). No addition may be made to pools already published unless they come from pools starting at the same time (cf o.67.1).
  - In team competitions, the DT must publish and send to the FIE the table and the relevant schedules no later than one hour after the end of the quarter finals of the individual event. No addition may be made to the published list.

**o.85**

- 1 The competition consists of **two phases**, a preliminary phase and a main phase, each of which are run on one day.
- ~~2 The day before the competition, the organizers must publish and send to the FIE the pools and relevant schedules, as well as the list of exempt fencers, at the latest by 4:00 pm (local~~

The officials a) to e) should preferably be selected from the Zone in which the Championships are being held.

## **ENTRIES**

- 1 The **entry of the names** of the fencers and all possible replacements, and the entry of teams, must be made via the FIE website 7 days before the competition at the latest (midnight Lausanne time).

However, a replacement can be made after this stage, and at the latest at the end of the individual event, in the case of injury or other medical reason duly certified by the competition

Until the Wednesday preceding the competition (midnight, Lausanne time), a fencer may be replaced by another. To do this, the national federation must send to the FIE, by fax or e-mail, a written request to substitute the fencer.

## **4 Addition of a fencer or a team after the dead-line.**

From the Wednesday preceding the competition until 12 noon (local time) on the day preceding the competition, one or more fencers and/or a team may be added by national federations after payment to the FIE of a penalty according to the scale in force (cf o.31, table of financial penalties and fines).

**5** Should a fencer or team who have been entered not present themselves to fence, a fine (cf o.31, table of financial penalties and fines), payable to the FIE, will be imposed to the federation of the faulty fencer or team, except in cases of properly authenticated 'force majeure'.

**6** The organisers of all official competitions must, at risk of a penalty of a fine payable to the FIE (cf o.31, table of financial penalties and fines), refuse any entry of either fencer or referee not in possession of an FIE license valid for the current season.

- 2** All other fencers in order of age, starting from the youngest.
- 3** The allocation of fencers in the pools must be made in such a way as to place fencers of the same nationality in different pools, as far as possible (staggering).
- 4** If in any category there are fewer than ten competitors, the competition is held as a poule unique followed by direct elimination.
- 5** If in any category there are fewer than 6 competitors, they will fence with the next lower age category. A separate ranking for that category will be extrapolated from the combined categories' final rankings at the end of the competition.
- 6** If in any category there is only one competitor, the event in that category is cancelled.
- 7** No fencer is eliminated after the pools. All the fencers participate in the direct elimination phase.

## **VETERANS TEAM EVENTS**

### **o.119**

#### **1 Participation**

Each country may enter one team per gender and per weapon, thus giving a total of 6 competitions.

The teams shall be composed of fencers who participated in the individual competition of the corresponding weapon, but c.f. o.103.2 b below.

- 2** The rules for team competitions are applicable with the following exceptions:
  - a)** For each weapon, the teams are composed of three fencers of the same nationality, one from category "A", one from "B" and one from "C", with or without a reserve for each category. A team cannot begin the match if it is not complete.
  - b)** In the case of a team being short of a fencer in any of the weapons, the team may use a fencer who has competed in the individual championships at another weapon or who is registered but has yet to compete, but his/her ranking will be deemed to be last in the individual competition at the weapon of the team in which he is going to fence plus 1.
  - c)** The teams are placed in the pools according to the ranking of the three fencers in the individual championship. The team ranked 1 is the one having the lowest total. All the fencers registered for the team event must be present at the piste before the start of each match.
  - d)** Each team may request, before a given relay, the substitution of a fencer. However, in case of injury or other medical reason duly recognized by the Medical delegate, the substitution can be immediate, even during the relay.

There can only be one substitution per team per match.

- 3** A fencer who has been replaced because of an injury may not fence again during that match. If both a fencer and the reserve are forced to retire, or if a fencer is excluded, their team is deemed to have lost the match.
- 4** The relay system is always applied. The three fencers of a team fence against their opponent of the same category. Each fencer fences his/her opponent twice giving a total of 6 relays. The relays are for 5 hits (5-10-15-20- etc.). Exceptionally, a relay may end at more than 5,10,15 etc. if a fencer scores a valid last hit of the relay and is at the same time awarded an additional penalty hit: in this case both hits will be counted; the maximum time for each relays is 3 minutes.
- 5** The team that first reaches the maximum score of 30 hits, or that which has scored the greatest number of hits after the expiry of regulation time, is the winner.
- 6** The order of categories for each match is established by the referee with the captains on the piste prior to the start of the match: The referee will draw lots and the winning captain will choose the first category in the order. The losing captain will choose the second category.
- 7** The competition consists of a round of pools of 3 or 4 teams, in which all the teams participate, and a direct elimination phase for the highest placed 16 teams; the other teams will be classified according to their ranking after the round of pools.

The initial ranking on which the drawing of the pools is based is established from the results of the fencers in the individual events. (cf. o.103.2.c)

The composition of the direct elimination table of 16 teams (or 8 if there are less than 16 teams) is established according to the general ranking established by the results of all the teams in the pool round. In the event of an absolute tie between the teams ranked 16 and 17 (or 8 and 9), the highest ranked team in the initial pool ranking shall qualify.

However, in no case, teams which have already fenced each other in the pools should meet again immediately in the direct elimination. To avoid this, the lower ranked of the two teams in question may be moved:

- in the case of a tableau of 16, the team ranked 9 may change places only with the team ranked 10, the team ranked 11 may change places only with the team ranked 12, the team ranked 13 may change places only with the team ranked 14 and the team ranked 15 may change places only with the team ranked 16.
  - in the case of a tableau of 8, the team ranked 5 may change places only with the team ranked 6 and the team ranked 7 may change places only with the team ranked 8.
- 8** If fewer than 6 teams participate in the competition, they all fence in a poule unique; a match for the 3rd and 4th places is then held, followed by a match for the first place between the teams who came 1st and 2nd in the pool.
- 9** Ranking matches from 5th place onwards will not be fenced and teams will be ranked, in each round of the table, according to their ranking after the pools.

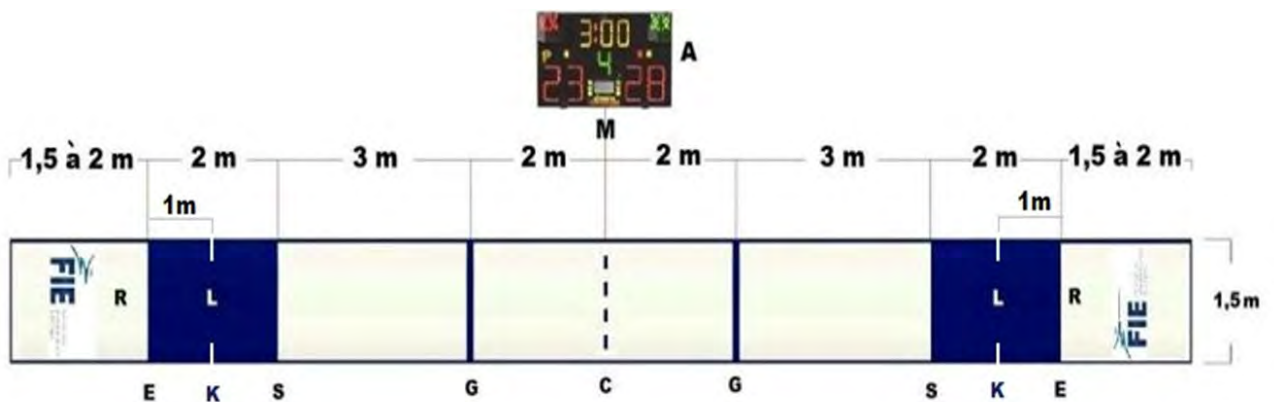
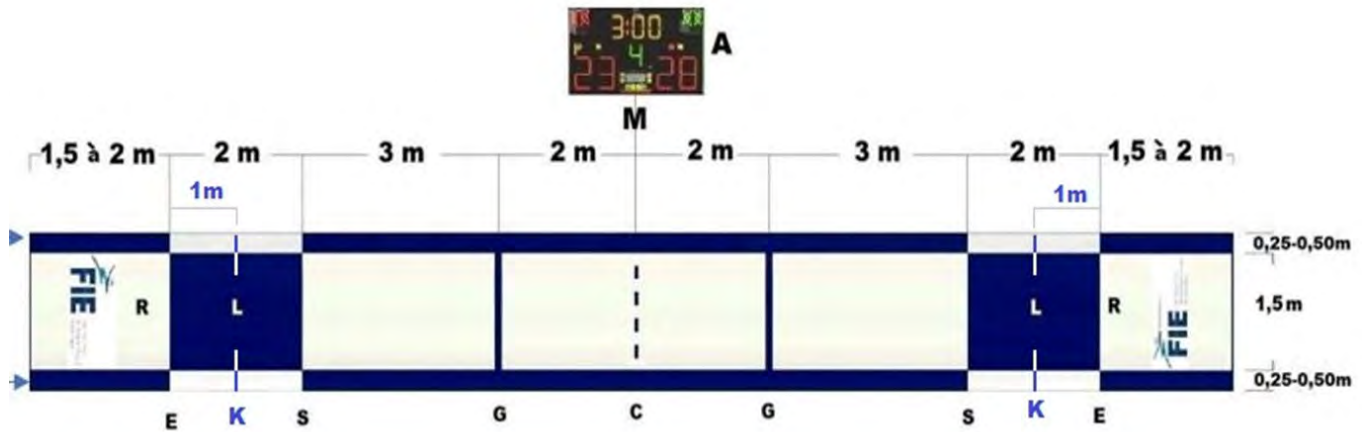

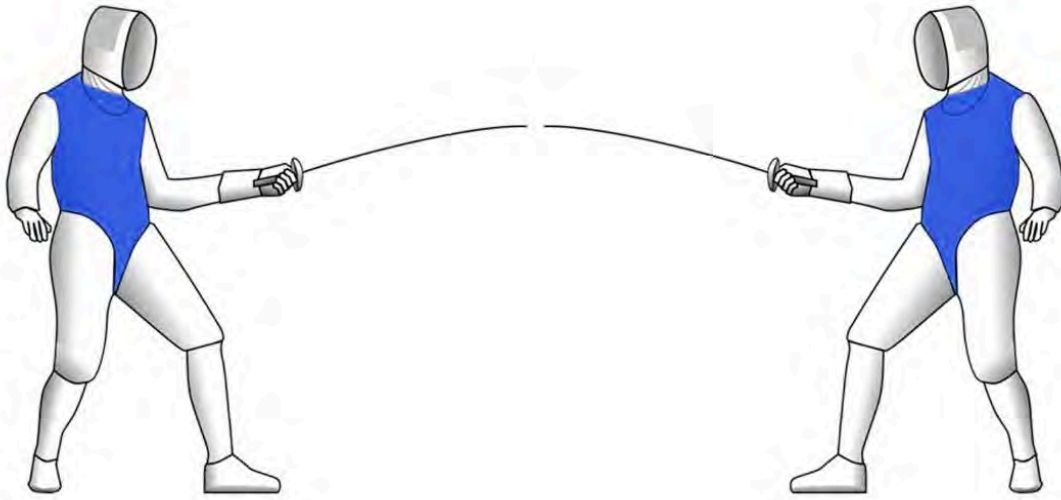


Figure 4 Valid target at foil

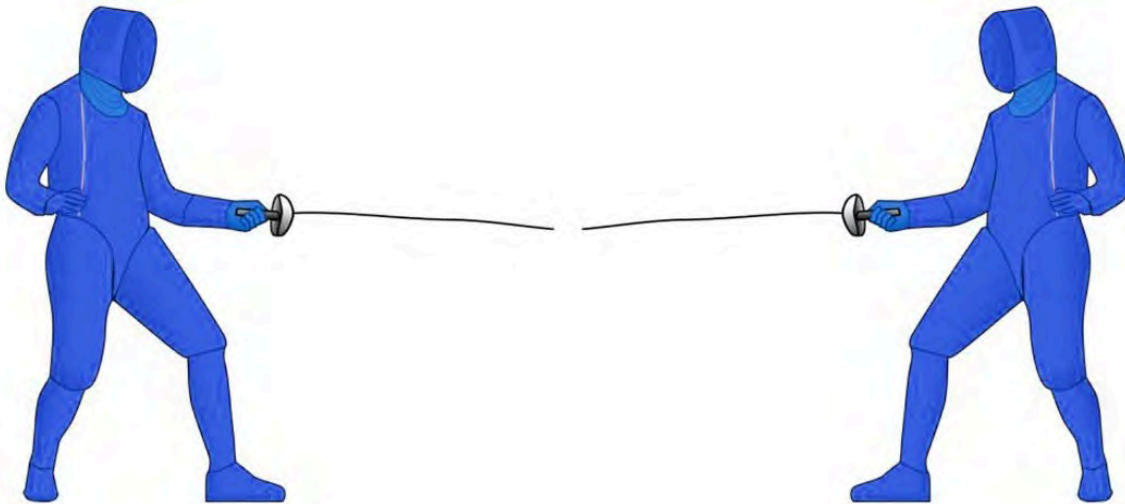


Figure 5 Valid target at épée

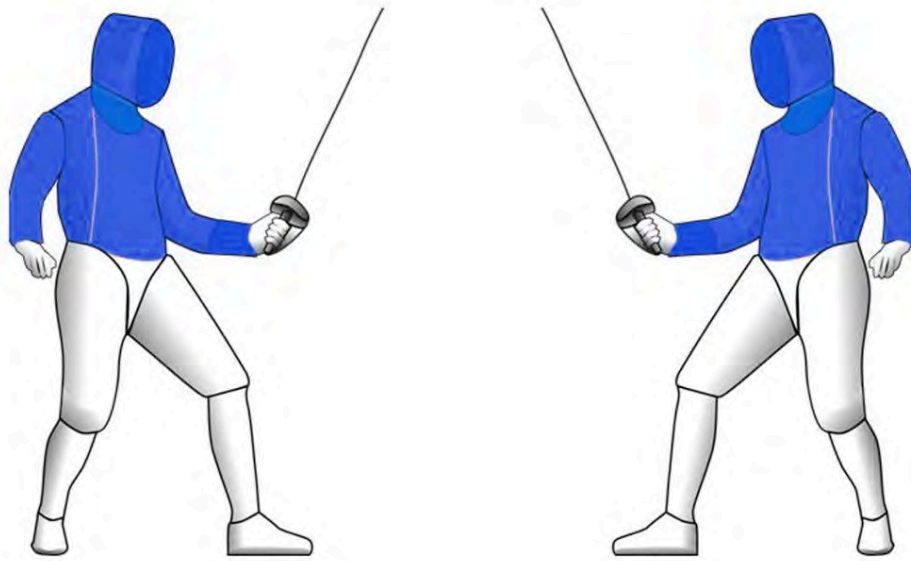


Figure 6 Valid target at sabre

- 1) To clarify the expectation on all participants in a competition to respect the FIE statutes and rules, including the Ethical Code and Safeguarding Policy.
- 2) To clarify the minimum reporting expectations if people witness a breach of the Ethical Code and Safeguarding Policy.

**t.109**

Everybody taking part in or present at a fencing competition **must respect the FIE statutes and rules, including but not limited to the FIE Ethical Code and Safeguarding Policy. They must remain orderly and must not disturb the smooth running of the competition.** During bouts no one is allowed to **go near the pistes, to give advice to the fencers, to criticise the Referee** or the

judges, to insult them or to attempt to influence them in any way. Even the **team captain** must remain in the space assigned to him and he may only intervene in the situations and in the manner provided for in Article t.130 of the Rules. The Referee must stop immediately any activity which disturbs the smooth running of the bout which he is refereeing (cf. t.137.1–3). Any person who, for any reason, threatens or insults an official commits an offence of the 4th group and is penalised according to article t.169.

Any person present who witnesses a breach of the FIE Ethical Code and the Safeguarding Policy must report this to the [Safeguarding Officer if present, or to the Directoire Technique](#).

**Point 1 / Item1 / Punto 1:**

G. Tyshler gave a short report on the year of work of the coaching council. Mr. Guillermo Sausedo sent his apologies that he is not able to attend the meeting today because of family issues. We do not have many points to discuss in our session today. We have sent the request to FIE for a joint meeting with the Athletes and Refereeing commissions. The refereeing commission did not respond to our request. As we do not have many points to discuss, finishing the meeting in one day instead of two days was proposed. The minutes of the previous council meeting were circulated and approved via email.

The Coaching Council President reports on the Council's work in 2022 – 2023.

Unfortunately, many projects were put on hold or canceled because of the COVID and current political issues in FIE. FIE did not approach the Council with any questions or requests for expertise on any matters during

the period from the last meeting. Dr. G. Tyshler proposed to follow up on all previous work done in the earlier years and the Council's prior proposals.

**Point 2 / Item 2 / Punto 2:**

Report of the COMEX representative, Mr. HAIBIN WANG - Executive Committee Member on COMEX meetings in 2022 – 2023.

Mr. H. Wang proposed that FIE allow two people to be in the “coaches box” during the individual and team competitions. It is essential, as many countries use foreign coaches and need a translator with the coach at the box.

There is a lot of politics in the FIE concerning the Russian and Belorussian athletes. It was many discussions involving the lawyers, etc. The proposal is to concentrate on our job as coaches and members of the coaching council to keep our sport alive. After the Paris Olympics COMEX, the newly elected will deal with all political problems.

One of the important matters is the Calendar for seniors and Junior fencers, especially for the period after the Paris Olympic Games. Our Council must actively create a new Calendar, including the Olympic qualification system for the next Olympic Games.

The Council needs to keep working and concentrating on our projects and decisions.

We have another year to go.

Unfortunately, the FIE refereeing committee does not want to meet with us.

**Point 3 / Item 3 / Punto 3:**

Proposals for FIE Congress

Proposals were discussed. Coaches opinions on the proposals are attached in a separate document.

**Point 4 / Item 4 / Punto 4:**

General discussion on fencing development and coaching council goals and targets.

Proposals – Decisions

1. Two people should be allowed to be in the “coach box” during the individual and team competitions.
2. Coaching Council requests that meetings in person for Council members be organized at least once a year. Zoom meetings cannot substitute in-person meetings and can be only additional follow-up meetings.
3. Representatives from the Coaching Council must be included in the working group for creating the Fencing Calendar after the Paris Olympic Games and discussing the Olympic qualification system.
4. During the competition, the scoring machines must operate only in “competition mode,” not in “training mode”; when the scoring apparatus automatically adds points to the score, it is unacceptable.
5. The coaching council and FIE must follow up on proposals and decisions sent to COMEX considerations.

**Point 5 / Item 5 / Punto 5:**

Follow up on the previous proposals

- 1. THE AGE OF PARTICIPANTS AT CADETS AND JUNIOR EVENTS**

The age of participants at Junior and Cadet competitions during the Junior and Cadet season was discussed. All coaches have the same vision on the cadets and junior participation. The rule o.30 should be strictly applied. The Council decided to approach the rules commission and legal commission to clarify the definition of the Junior and Cadets season.

“It is unfortunate, but every few years we have a problem with the age of participants at the junior and cadet local competitions in different countries.

Age of participants: o.29, o.30

We discussed the matter at the coaching council meeting and all coaches agree with the rule o.30 However, we have parents and fencing officials who have never fenced and interpret the rules differently.

Please help with correcting the interpretation of the rules or help us to find the place in the rules that clarifies the situation.

Maybe we need to add a definition for Junior fencing season to the rules. From Junior WC to the next Junior WC, or from April to April, or that the junior fencing season starts from the first Junior competition after the World championship.

Your help will be greatly appreciated.”

“First of all I want to thank everybody who is taking part in this discussion. Special thanks to Bruno Gares for the time he spent on putting together all pieces of the “Age of participants” matter from different parts of the rules into one document.

The FIE is not a closed corporation or business. The FIE is a Sports Federation and the main aim of the FIE is “to promote the development of fencing in the world” and “to improve the practice of our sport in every way”. The Federation should look not only after fencers who have paid the license, but for all fencers in the world including those, who are between 13 and 15 years old, with parents as their representatives.

Dear Nathalie, you are absolutely right in what you’ve written, taking extracts from the FIE rules. But this is the problem that we are talking about.

- Request to look at this matter is not coming from the amateurs or volunteers, but from the FIE Coaching Council, the FIE experts committee, that represents the fencing community from professionals at the international level and coaches working with the fencers on the ground. We have discussed the matter with other coaches from different countries and discussed it during the FIE Coaching Council meeting in June 2022. All members of the Council have the same opinion on the matter.
- Sport season. I am not going to talk about other sports, but in fencing, season is the period from one main FIE competition of the year, World Championships (Olympic Games) to the next one the following year. From July of one year to July of the next year, for example. A

Sport season is divided into periods. The transitional period (in our case it is August), the preparation period, the pre competition period and the competition period. Periods are divided in to macro cycles and then micro cycles. The Senior fencing season is from July to July. The Junior and Cadet fencing season is from April to April. Please do not mix the competitions Calendar with the fencing season.

- Calendar. Junior FIE competitions calendar is from November to April. This does not mean that juniors do nothing for the rest of the year. Fencers are training, having training camps, different kinds of competitions and other events. Cadets FIE competitions calendar has only one competition. But it does not mean that fencers, cadets, do not fence during the year or do not have a fencing season. Cadets and Juniors can take part in Senior competitions as well.
- The most serious cheating in the sport is doping and manipulating with age. This is absolutely clear to anybody who fenced as a cadet and a junior, or fencers and their representatives (coaches, parents of fencers) who took part in “ranking” and “selection” competitions. It is especially important in fencing, where we have direct elimination system, seeding before competitions and after the pools.
- Dear Nathalie, you are absolutely right o.30 rule is correct. o.30. Only fencers who are of an age to qualify for the next Junior World Championships may fence in the official FIE Junior competitions, individual or team, of the current season. This is exactly what we’re all talking about, but we need to clarify this rule clause for the WORLD FENCING community, especially for people who learned fencing “from the book” and have never fenced cadet or junior competitions themselves, that we have a Senior season AND a Junior and Cadets season, And that the fencer, who moved to the senior category after his last Junior World Championship in April, should not take part in any Junior ranking and selection competitions any more. New cadets and junior age groups should start training and competing together, preparing for the next major event.
- The Current situation is unfair for the younger kids and does not meet safeguarding requirements. The situation is opening possibilities for “manipulation of results” and “corrupt conduct”. As participants who are “over age” (not eligible for selection for the next world championship) can manipulate the ranking, results and selection. To make it straight forward, they can sell their bout to fencers who need the ranking and selection.

We need to and can help Confederations, Federations, THE WORLD of fencing by putting a few words in the FIE rules to make this absolutely clear. This will not have any impact on the current FIE procedures and will not harm anybody. I think that the FIE rules and legal committees can find the right way to address the problem.

Example:

o.30. Only fencers who are of an age to qualify for the next Junior World Championships may fence in the official FIE Junior competitions, individual or team, of the current JUNIOR season (1st May to 31st of April next year).

## **2. JUNIOR AND CADETS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION PROGRAM**

Coaches discussed the program for the Cadets and Junior World Championships. All agreed that the Cadets event should be organized before the Junior event.

## **3. HALL SET UP AT MAJOR FIE EVENT**

The most important person in sports is the athlete. During competitions everything should be done to help the fencers compete comfortably and achieve the best possible results. It has come to our attention that at the last few competitions, organizers, during the preliminary stage of the competition, blocked all competition areas with a fence, not allowing fencers access to their coaches between the bouts during preliminary pools stages. This situation is unacceptable. Fencers should have easy access to their coaches advice between their bouts during pools. Additionally, the blocked area was very big and the lights on the scoring apparatus were not visible from all directions. We want to mention that pools are the preliminary stage of the event and the official competition will start only after the opening ceremony with direct elimination and spectators.

A coach usually has 4 fencers competing in the pools. Easy passage should be organized from one side of the arena to another.

We think that the matter is clear, competitions should be organized according to the rules, handbook of regulations and traditions of our sport.

Another solution may be to allow the coach at the piste during the bout of his fencer as is during direct elimination.

### **Point 6 / Item 6 / Punto 6:**

Joint meeting with FIE Athletes commission.

The coaching council had a joint meeting with the Athletes Commission. The meeting went well. Everybody agreed that athletes and coaches must cooperate more and create joint proposals for the FIE.

## **CONCLUSION**

Dr. G. Tyshler thanked everybody for the work done. A draft of the minutes will be circulated by the president to all members for comments. The date for the next meeting will be announced.

#### Meeting minutes

1. Opening by the President. Bert Van der Flier opens the meeting with greetings.
2. Ms. Hilary Philbin was unable to attend the meeting due to health reasons.
3. Mr. Van der Flier asked if anyone had objections or comments from the last meeting. – No objections or comments from the members.
4. As of now, Mr. Van der Flier still needs to discuss the candidates for the fair play award for the 2022-2023 season with the FIE interim President. He suggested waiting until after the Milan senior WCH to see if additional candidates emerge. Furthermore, he proposed recognizing individuals for reasons beyond just self-reporting after a self-hitting in epee.
5. Jennifer Yamin recently shared the name of a Fair Play nominee, Mostafa Tahoun (CMF, Egypt), who participated in the Plovdiv junior cadet world championships. A Japanese referee filled out the nomination form and sent it back to Jennifer Yamin, who was working as a DT at the junior & cadet world championships. To date, Mostafa Tahoun is the only candidate for the award this season. During the CMF individual T-64 fencing match in Plovdiv, Mostafa, a fencer, showed sportsmanship by sharing his weapons with his opponent, Park from Korea. Unfortunately, Mostafa lost the bout in the end.
6. The Women's Council suggested more precise wording for T109, but most members have yet to reply. Jennifer Yamin shared Elena Murdaca's email with all council members, and Mr. Van der Flier gave everyone until the end of the day to respond. All members have favorably received the proposal put forward by the women's council.

7. Alexandra Benitez Romero proposes creating a video compilation highlighting unfair play instances. She has shared unverified YouTube videos featuring athletes exhibiting poor behavior after losing matches.
  - Jennifer Yamin disagrees with this approach and believes that our focus should be on promoting positive images and fostering good sportsmanship by educating families involved in fencing. Uplifting spirits by sharing videos of good sportsmanship is the direction our council should be focusing on. Jennifer Yamin believes that pointing out someone's mistake may negatively affect the relationships between our council and federations.
8. Alexandra Benitez Romero proposes having the Fair Play Council review the black card cases.
  - Jennifer Yamin advised that It's important to note that altering the FIE status or regulations would require a proposal submitted within the time frame for approval. Additionally, Jennifer Yamin is unclear whether the Fair Play Council has the authority to penalize athletes or individuals who receive a black card, as there is already a disciplinary panel to handle such matters.
9. Budgetary constraints have hindered the project of creating a promotional video for fair play. However, Marcel, Alejandra, and Jennifer have suggested using social media as an alternative way to promote Fair Play without putting a strain on the budget. Mr. Bert Van der Flier has asked Mr. Peskov to inquire whether it would be possible to use the FIE logo on social media. Mr. Peskov will request the FIE office to add this request to the agenda for the upcoming COMEX meeting on July 22.
  - As a follow-up, the council has received approval to use the FIE logo on the Fair Play Council's social media account. We still need to address the specifics of creating the social media account.
10. Jennifer Yamin proposed that the FIE communication department assist our council in interviewing previous award winners who will be attending the Milan world championships. Mr. Bert Van der Flier requested that Jennifer Yamin contact Serge Timacheff, who is currently in Phoenix for the US summer national tournaments, where Jennifer was also attending.
  - After speaking with Serge Timacheff, Jennifer Yamin contacted Zhen Ma at the FIE communication department to request assistance with interviews and social media coverage for our council's initiative. Zhen Ma and Serge Timacheff were eager to help and agreed to cover the council's efforts.
11. The next meeting is proposed on 8/3 at 15:00 CET to discuss additional candidates for the fair play award.

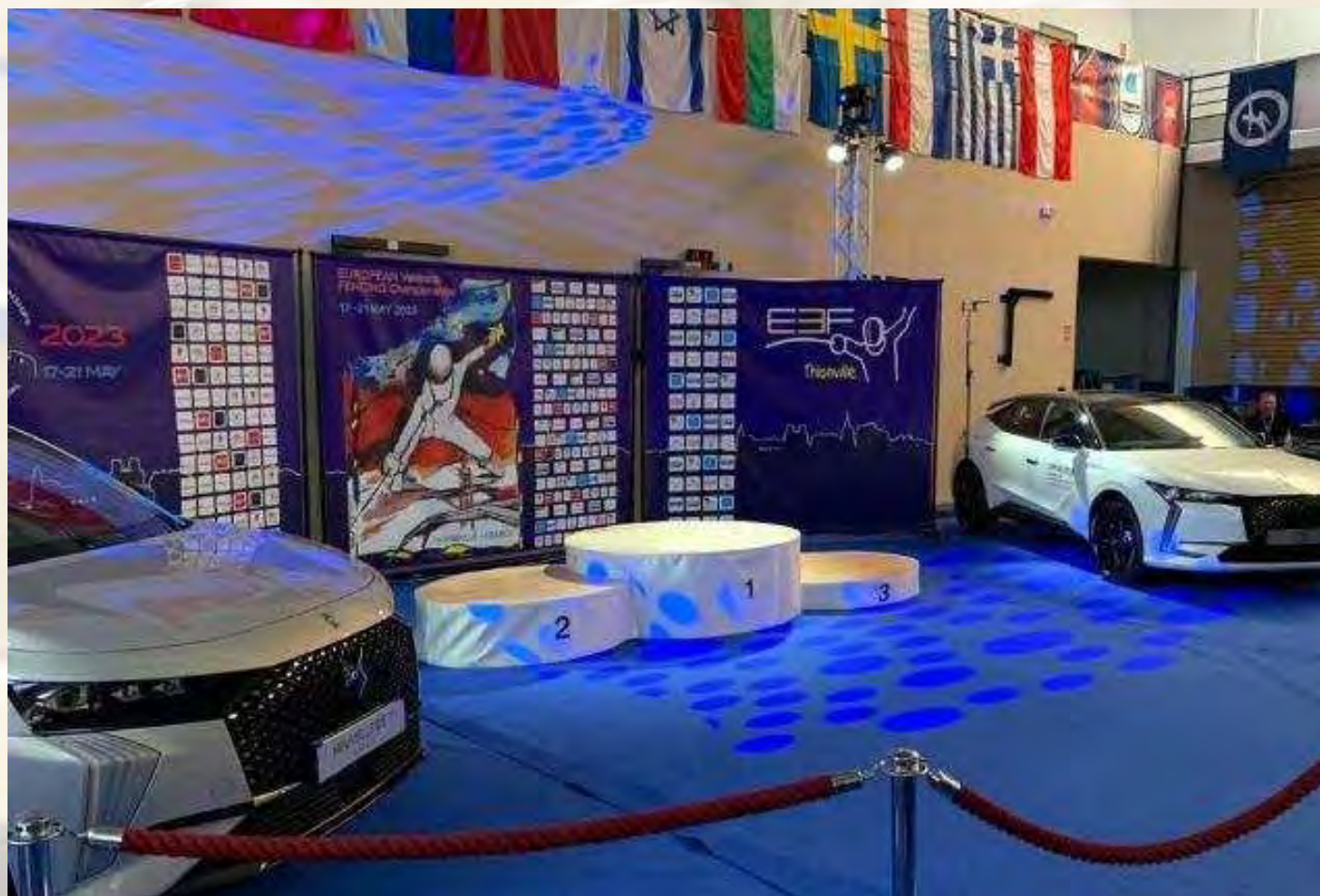

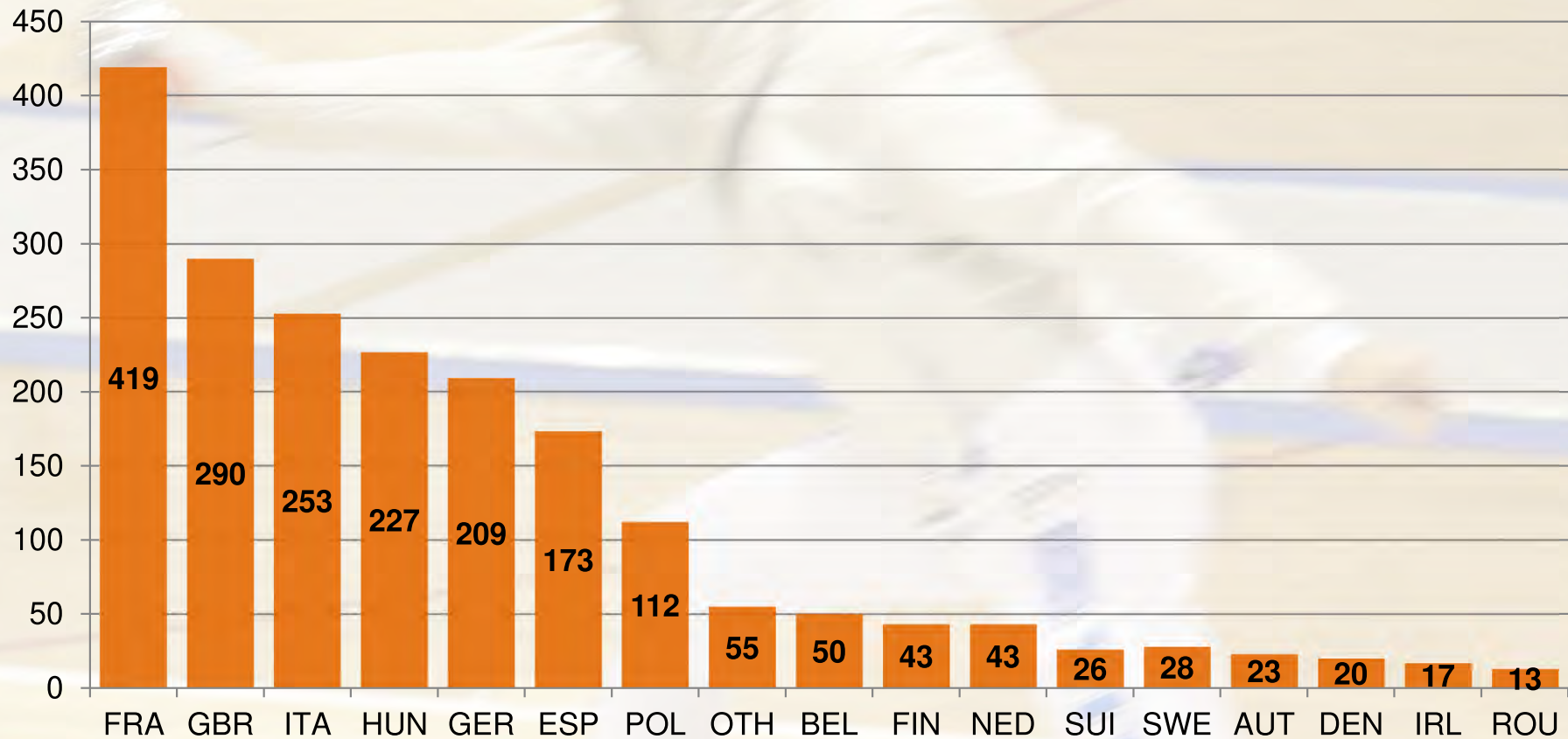
# EVF European circuit 2022-23 - Geographical distribution





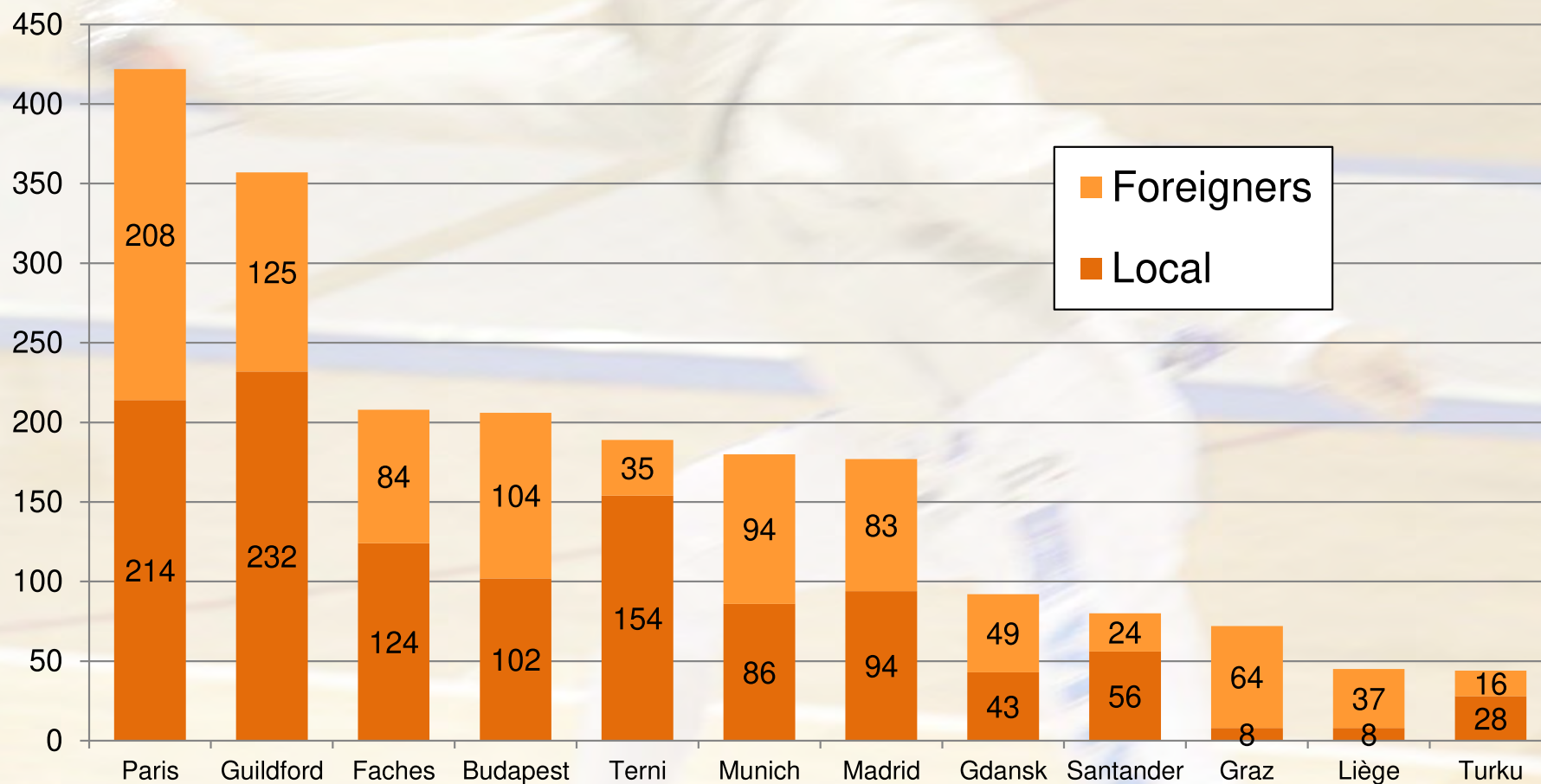

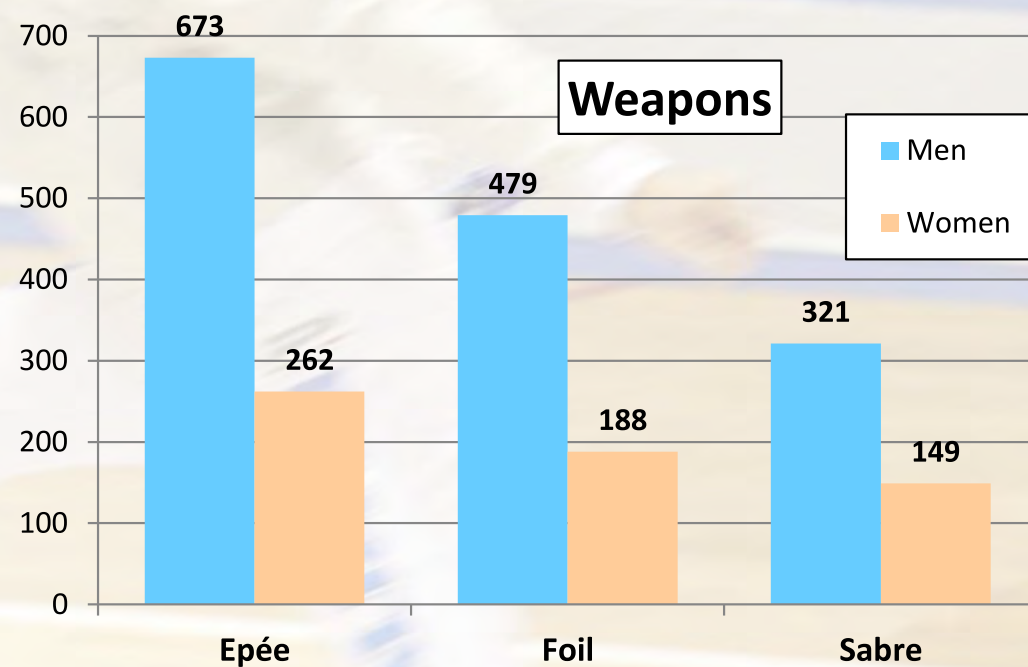

## **2023- USA – Prepared by Rita Comes – Member of the FIE Veteran Council**

The number of Veteran Fencers in the United States has continued to increase. Veteran National Events and Regional Events are well attended by the Veteran Fencing Community. United States Fencing Association Members include Senior, Youth, Veteran and Para Fencers as one united organization.

It was unfortunate that the 2021 FIE Veteran World Championships had to be postponed due to the world Covid crises. We recognize the hardship and loss that so many suffered during this crisis. We are extremely excited to host the 2023 FIE Veteran World Championships in Daytona Beach, Florida during October 2023. All information – the website and invitation letters for the 2023 FIE Veteran World Championships have been published and forwarded to all Federations.

The United States Fencing Association (USFA) currently has about 39,000 (38,289) members. 3,936 are identified as Veteran Fencers. Veteran Fencers represent more than 10% of all USFA members. There are 626 individual Veteran Fencers that are competing in a variety of events during the 2023 USA National Championships in July – 19 of those Veteran Fencers are over the age of 80. The 2023 National Championships and July Challenge in Phoenix, Arizona had over 5,300 participants and is considered the largest fencing tournament in the world.

### **Team Participation**

Veteran Team Events have increased over the years. Many competitions are adding Veteran Team Events to Local and Regional Events. This has been proved a successful addition for marketing and profitability at competitions. The US will demo the FIE Veteran's Team format at a future event.

### **Veteran Camps and Competitions**

There has been a significant increase in Veteran workshops, Camps and Veteran Competitions across the United States with members traveling long distances to participate. Many Veteran Fencers are able to attend camps and competitions around the world and have appreciated the openness and help of the world fencing community. An increase of Regional (ROC) events in the US allowed for reduction of travel expenses and more participation of the fencers to compete and qualify for the US National Championships without having to travel to National Events during the year. There is an increasing number of Veteran Fencers that continue to participate in tournaments around the world and use these opportunities as a destination travel event.

### **Strategies for promotion of “older fencers”**

Regarding the strategies for promotion to “older fencers” our largest initiative has been starting the V80 category at our North American Cup (NAC) events since December 2018. As predicted, the Vet80+ women's participation has continued to increase in the US. The participants of the 80+ Events are very grateful for the experience, but more information will have to be gathered from other Countries before proposing to seriously consider suggesting that it be included as an event at the FIE Veteran World

Championships.

USFA has also increase the Social Media presence for Veteran Fencing - interviews, photos, memorabilia, and historical stories have really helped promote the image of Veteran Fencing.

A private USA Fencing Veterans Face Book (FB) page (1,900 Members) that was started in 2018 has grown by an additional 400 members in the past year. This page is used so that official and fun information could be shared amongst the Veteran Fencers around the world, there is also a private US Women's Veteran FB page (617 members). During the pandemic, a Veteran Women's Fencing Support Group was formed and had weekly then bi-monthly and now monthly Zoom meetings to support each other during this difficult time.

In leading up to the 2023 FIE Veteran's World Championships, we have an eager team of competitive fencers that fought their way for the spots on the USA Veteran Team. The Team has high hopes of receiving another recognition medal from the FIE for the 2023 Event as it did for the 2022 FIE World Championships. Promotion for the Daytona Beach, Florida Event and Veteran Fencing overall has brought a lot of attention to Veteran Fencing in the US and beyond.

We look forward to welcoming the World to Daytona Beach in October.

- The Veteran Council raised concern in some of the younger (40-49) veteran age cohorts participation seems to be dropping (potentially due to family or work obligations)
- Similar issue with some of the older age cohorts (70+) competing among the same cohort
- Discussion on how the Councils could work together to address this.

- Veterans council members to meet with Mirani to discuss using world championships to highlight what is to come in the future with increased category 40+

Everybody taking part in or present at a fencing competition **must respect the FIE statutes and rules, including but not limited to the FIE Ethical Code and Safeguarding Policy. They must remain orderly and must not disturb the smooth running of the competition.** During bouts no one is allowed to **go near the pistes, to give advice to the fencers, to criticise the Referee** or the judges, to insult them or to attempt to influence them in any way. Even the **team captain** must remain in the space assigned to him and he may only intervene in the situations and in the manner provided for in Article t.130 of the Rules. The Referee must stop immediately any activity which disturbs the smooth running of the bout which he is refereeing (cf. t.137.1–3). Any person who, for any reason, threatens or insults an official commits an offence of the 4th group and is penalised according to article t.169.

**Any person present who witnesses a breach of the FIE Ethical Code and the Safeguarding Policy must report this to the Directoire Technique.**

During the Junior/Cadet and Senior and Veterans World Championships, incidents of harassment/abuse/neglect can be reported to the FIE Safeguarding Officer on site.

During Open World Cups and Junior World Cups, incidents of harassment/abuse/neglect can be reported to the FIE Supervisor, acting as the FIE Safeguarding officer. This responsibility shall be added to the list of responsibilities of Supervisors.

The FIE shall designate Safeguarding Officers to other official FIE events, for example, training camps.

The FIE shall ensure that the FIE Safeguarding Officers receive appropriate training and support for carrying out their responsibilities under this policy.

Zonal Confederations shall appoint at least one person to serve as a Safeguarding Officer at each Zonal Championship. All safeguarding reports which are not resolved through mediation must be reported to the FIE.

## URGENT DECISION

### PROPOSAL FROM SEMI COMMISSION

#### FIE Publicity Code, article p.12.2 a

##### Motivation:

The current formulation of the article forces sabre's fencers to make a sublimation print of the advertising logos on the sleeve of the conductive jacket. This kind of print is expensive and could be an issue for a fencer to reprint the logos each time he needs to change a jacket, for example after a malfunction/breakage or change of sponsorship. Furthermore, shortly after the jacket has been printed, the colours tend to fade and give a grey-on-grey effect which is not nice in TV shooting. The proposal therefore aims to return to the old system and allow the logos to be displayed on the upper part of the fencer's leg, as we still often see during weapons controls.

##### NEW TEXT

If a federation and/or a fencer have signed a **sponsorship contract** with a commercial or other company, the logo of that sponsorship partner may be fixed **at a rate of maximum of 3 logos, with a maximum area of 85 cm<sup>2</sup> each;**

**In foil and epee:** at the top of the sleeve of the non-sword arm of the fencing jacket; **in sabre:** at the top of the thigh of the non-sword side of the fencing breeches and clearly separated from the national logo.

#### General rules and rules common to the three weapons

##### t.1 Definition of the fencer's salute

In competition, the fencer's salute is a gesture of civility towards the opponent, the referee and the spectators.

To perform the fencer's salute, the two fencers:

- face each other
- stand still on their on-guard line
- place the mask under the non-sword arm
- lift the guard to the chin
- then lower the blade to the ground

##### t.122, Rule until the end of the 2023-2024 season

Before the beginning and at the end of a bout, the two fencers must perform the **fencer's salute** to their opponent, to the referee and to the spectators, as defined in article t.1.

When the final hit of the bout has been scored, the two fencers stand still on their on-guard line while the referee is making his/her decision.

The two fencers then perform the **fencer's salute** (cf. t.1) to their opponent, to the referee and to the spectators.

The bout has then ended.

~~Before the beginning of each bout, the two fencers must perform a **fencer's salute** to their opponent, to the Referee and to the spectators. Equally, when the final hit has been scored, the bout has not ended until the two fencers have saluted each other, the Referee and the spectators: to this end, they must remain still while the referee is making his decision; when he has given his decision, they must **return to their on-guard line**, perform a fencer's salute and shake **hands** with their opponent.~~

If either or both of the two fencers refuse to comply with these rules, the Referee will penalise him/**her**/them as specified for offences of the 4th group (cf. t.158-162, t.169, t.170).

Athletes ambassadors may be mainly employed in awareness raising programs and activities on social media. Overall, the social media feedback for the Fencing for the planet day consisted of 83k viewership and 2.2 k engagement.

However, Baiba Brandule observed that the SEMI delegate allocated for the competition would not necessarily have enough time for extra work.

## 2023 STATUS REPORT

### OLYMPIC GAMES QUALIFICATION SYSTEM WORKING GROUP

---

During last year the group had submitted a proposition to the FIE Executive Committee of having a system with two-members teams plus the alternate, bearing in mind that it constituted an absolute reform of the team format and competitions.

The Executive Committee considered that the idea proposed by the working group (two fencers per team instead of three) transforms the team concept into a “double” concept, like in tennis. This would imply a total revolution of the team format and team competitions and that the possible future consequences could be counterproductive.

The Executive Committee therefore concluded that the existing qualification system was currently the only viable one, taking into account the existing rules and limitations.

In addition, the transfer of accreditations has been examined as a possible alternative. This would mean that an accreditation is withdrawn/cancelled just after the athlete has finished his or her competition, and his or her accreditation is provided to another athlete. The transfer of accreditations was discussed in the past with the IOC and was not accepted for the main following reasons: a) As per the Olympic Charter, accreditations are withdrawn for specific reasons (such as sanctions). Otherwise, they are valid for the period of the Games. b) each NOC has a fixed quota of accreditations for the whole period of the Games. c) Fencers don't arrive on the date of their competitions but a few days earlier to train. And because of this flow there would always be more than 212 athletes. d) The organisers would have a lot of trouble managing all the athletes and officials entering and leaving the Olympic Village and the accreditation system.

The FIE had discussed the issue of transferable accreditations with the IOC in the past. The IOC did not accept this request for the above reasons adding that an athlete has the right to stay for the whole period of the OG should he/she would like to.

The main difference between Tokyo 2020 and Paris 2024 qualification systems is that for Paris there will be 6 additional host country quota places, instead of 8 that existed for Tokyo, leaving two (2) universality places (one per gender) available to eligible NOCs and allocated by the IOC. The NOCs will submit their requests

until January 2024, they will then be evaluated by the IOC. Following that the IOC will propose to the IFs the universality places.

Based on these facts, the working group was asked to continue its efforts and to put forward new alternative proposals that would allow to increase places for individual qualification.

The Olympic Games Qualification System Working Group resumed its works on a meeting on Monday, 4 September 2023 at 23.00 CET.

Following that meeting the chair of the group addressed letter to all the working group members asking them to submit in writing their proposals or ideas until Friday, September 15<sup>th</sup>.

On expiry of the deadline set for the 15<sup>th</sup> of September no proposal had been submitted.

Although no progress was made, however it is important that an Olympic Qualification System Working Group should continue to exist and determine whether there are areas for potential improvement and to develop proposal(s) which comply with all the principles of the Olympic Charter and IOC Guidelines for consideration by the Executive Committee of the FIE on such a complex and serious issue.

Based on the above facts, the Chair of the working group proposes that the group continues with a new composition.
