



PARIS 2024 OLYMPIC OPENING CEREMONY: “GAMES WIDE OPEN”

PARIS, France, July 26, 2024 – The Paris 2024 33rd Summer Olympic Games Opening Ceremony took place on July 26, 2024 with the theme of “Games Wide Open”. The introduction of the Olympic athletes took place in 85 boats on a six-kilometre journey on the Seine River from the Pont d’Austerlitz to the Pont d’Iéna, in front of the Eiffel Tower.

IOC President and Olympic fencing gold medallist Thomas Bach gave a welcome speech, stating “The Olympic flame will make Paris and all of France shine even brighter. What better place than Paris, to share this magic of the Olympic Games with the whole world. Paris, the birthplace of our founder, Pierre de Coubertin, to whom we owe everything. Paris, City of Light, where he created the modern Olympic Games.”

Mr. Bach then invited the President of the French Republic, Mr. Emmanuel Macron, to declare open the Games of the 33rd Olympiad, Paris 2024.

Fencing was one of the original events at the first modern Olympic Games in 1896.

Paris 2024 Organising Committee President Tony Estanguet also gave a speech to the 320,000 Opening Ceremony attendees in 124 grandstands lining the Seine River as well as the hundreds of millions of spectators watching worldwide on television and social media. “This love story was born nearly 130 years ago, just a few kilometres from here, in the main amphitheatre of the Sorbonne University, when Pierre de Coubertin proposed the rebirth of the ancient Olympic Games”, he said.

Two French Olympic champion fencers participated in the final torch relay, Laura Flessel and Jean-Francois Lamour, before the lighting of the Olympic flame for Paris 2024.



PARIS, France, August 7, 2024 –

Nine days of fencing competition have completed at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games in the Grand Palais between July 27 and August 4, with 12 gold medals awarded in individual and team events for women and men in epee, foil and sabre.

"We have seen fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games in the Grand Palais in the most spectacular venue in our lifetime", said Emmanuel Katsiadakis, FIE Interim President.


"Fencing events at these Games will surely stand as the most memorable of all time, presenting our sport to the world as never before. I congratulate our new Olympic champions, all participating athletes, as well as all the people who made these Games possible. Fencing has absolutely entered a new era of excitement and interest, having reached millions of spectators and fans worldwide."



IOC President and Men's Team Foil Olympic gold medallist Thomas Bach presented the medals with FIE Interim President Emmanuel Katsiadakis for men's team foil.

A total of 53 NOCs participated in the Paris 2024 Olympic fencing programme, with 212 athletes, evenly divided between 106 women and 106 men.

The medals were distributed among four continents and 13 countries. Japan topped the fencing medals table with a total of five (2 gold, 1 silver, 2 bronze), followed by USA with four (2 gold, 1 silver, 1 bronze) and Korea with three (2 gold, 1 silver).

HONG KONG-CHINA'S MAN WAI VIVIAN KONG,
AND KOREA'S SANGUK OH WIN GOLD MEDALS IN
INDIVIDUAL WOMEN'S EPEE AND MEN'S SABRE



PARIS, France, July 27, 2024 – Hong Kong, China’s Man Wai Vivian Kong and Korea’s world champion Sanguk Oh won gold medals in individual women’s epee and men’s sabre fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.

Women’s Individual Epee (36 Fencers)

Kong faced France’s Auriane Mallo-Breton in the final bout of women’s epee, winning with a score of 13-12. This is the first-ever women’s Olympic medal in fencing for Hong Kong, China. In the semifinal round, Mallo-Breton won against Hungary’s Eszter Muhari, 15-9, while Kong defeated Estonia’s Nelli Differt, 15-11. The bronze medal went to Muhari over Differt, 15-14. Of note, in the round of 16, Muhari beat Korea’s world champion Sera Song, 15-6, and China’s Sihan Yu won against France’s world champion Marie-Florence Candassamy, 15-10. In the round of 32, Canada’s Ruien Xiao defeated Brazil’s world champion Nathalie Moellhausen, 15-11, Japan’s Miho Yoshimura beat China’s Olympic champion Yiwen Sun, 14-13, and USA’s Anne Cebula won against Italy’s two-time world champion Rossella Fiamingo, 15-14.



“I love the fencing family, I love the FIE”, said Kong. “I’m so lucky to be a part of it. I think [this medal] is a gift I can give everyone who has shown so much love. I’m so grateful to be in a position to give back and thank everyone.”

Men's Individual Sabre (34 fencers)

Oh faced Tunisia's Fares Ferjani in the final bout of men's sabre, winning the Olympic gold medal with a score of 15-11. In the semifinal round, Ferjani won against Egypt's Ziad Elsisy, 15-11, while Oh defeated Italy's Luigi Samele, 15-5. The bronze medal went to Samele over Elsisy, 15-12. Of note, in the round of 32, Hungary's Csanad Gemesi beat USA's world champion Eli Dershwitz, 15-10, France's Bolade Apithy won against Hungary's world champion Andras Szatmari, 15-13, and Canada's Fares Arfa defeated Hungary's world and three-time Olympic champion Aron Szilagy, 15-8.

"I listened to my coach, who told me to work hard", said Oh. "I tried that and ended up coming in first place, and it's an honour. I think that if it wasn't this time, the next time would be difficult, because I would be older."

MAN WAI VIVIAN KONG LOOKS BACK ON HER HISTORIC OLYMPIC GOLD MEDAL FOR HONG KONG AND DISCUSSES HER RETIREMENT ANNOUNCEMENT

How does it feel to be an Olympic champion?

It feels amazing, unreal, and I feel incredibly lucky and grateful for the whole team. All the hard work we've put in paid off, and I'm thankful I could properly honour them with a medal.

What does winning this medal mean to you and to your country?

I hope this medal has brought more happiness, joy, and love for sports, encouraging people to try fencing. I know many people in Hong Kong stayed up really late to watch us, and I'm so grateful for that. I want to thank them, as well as the Hong Kong fans who came all the way to Paris to support us.

After your medal, you announced your retirement. How did you decide to retire from fencing after such a great success?

It was really hard, but I believe that "once a fencer, always a fencer". I'll be fencing for the rest of my life because I love it so much. I've been fencing for almost 20 years, and for the longest time, especially when I was a full-time athlete, I measured success by whether or not I would win a gold medal. But leading up to Paris, I wasn't confident. I wasn't sure if I had it in me, so I channelled all my stress and doubt into training. I worked really hard and kept reminding myself that even if I didn't win, the journey was worth it because of how much I love the sport. I made the decision at the beginning of the year to enjoy every moment leading up to the Olympics, and I'm so happy it ended well. But this isn't the end—I will fence for the rest of my life.

What was the hardest part of making this decision?

The hardest part was telling my coach. I love him very much, and I know he loves fencing more than anyone I've ever met. So, telling him I wanted to take a break or step back felt like I was saying I didn't love fencing anymore. But I need him to know that I'll still be around, still be a training partner for the Hong Kong team, and I'll still see him. This isn't goodbye.

What do you believe will miss you most from your professional athlete career?


I didn't get the chance to say goodbye to all the women's epee fencers that I love and admire so much. So, I plan to travel and attend as many competitions as I can, just as a supporter, to properly say goodbye or visit all the countries again. I want to see all the fencers I love to thank them for making fencing so much more enjoyable. They've given me so many role models to look up to and the privilege of fencing alongside them.


I feel incredibly lucky to have had the chance to be a part of this amazing community of women.

Ka Long Cheung also from Hong Kong also won a gold medal in Paris 2024. What does it mean for the growth of fencing in Hong Kong?

Ka Long Cheung won our first gold medal, which was also Hong Kong's second-ever gold, at the Tokyo Olympics. After that, many kids became interested in fencing, and more clubs have opened up as interest in the sport has grown. It's been incredible to witness because I truly believe fencing is the best sport in the world. Now, with his latest victory and my own success, it's clear that fencing is for everyone—not just boys, but girls too. We hope more people can enjoy fencing, or at least watch the Olympics and appreciate all the sports.







**ANOTHER OLYMPIC HISTORY MAKER AS SANGUK OH WINS MEN'S SABRE
IN BOTH INDIVIDUAL AND TEAM EVENTS****How do you feel about winning the men's individual sabre gold medal in Paris?**

I was incredibly happy and excited, as if I were living in a dream for a month and a half, receiving calls and messages from a sea of people, even from people I don't know. After winning the individual gold, I didn't have much time to celebrate, given the team match coming up, but we eventually secured another gold in the team event, making it two gold medals. The sense of relief and accomplishment was overwhelming, knowing that I had achieved the best possible results. Now, I'm headed back into domestic tournaments and returning to normal life.

What was the experience of becoming an olympic champion in the men's individual and team sabre events like for you?

This was the first gold medal for Korea in all sports in Paris, in both individual and team events, and also the first 'grand slam.' I received the most heartfelt celebrations and congratulations from people. I was delighted because a lot of people told me it inspired, encouraged, and motivated young kids. That means the world to me.

What was your biggest challenge on the day you won?

On that day, it was all about mind control. I wasn't too nervous or 'all over the place.' Fencing is not the most popular sport in Korea, so it was one of the few times it could receive attention from many people. I felt a burden on my shoulders to impress others, and I wasn't really used to this kind of circumstance, especially since the Olympics only happen every four years. I kept telling myself I needed to stay focused only on the game and pull myself together. I'm not usually nervous, but I found myself feeling nervous in this situation, which was the biggest challenge in winning the medal.


What stands out as your biggest memory of Paris 2024?


After everything was over, my biggest memory was having that 'legit' meal with my teammates. I finally felt relieved and free, knowing that I had achieved everything and that I had made it – that was the best feeling.

What was your impression of Paris overall at this time?

I could sense the vibrant fashion and culture in Paris. I noticed many fashionable people and could see just how much Parisians embrace it, which left a strong impression on me. The city's love for fashion, luxury goods, and similar things truly stood out.







DAY TWO

USA'S LEE KIEFER, JAPAN'S KOKI KANO WIN GOLD MEDALS IN INDIVIDUAL WOMEN'S FOIL AND MEN'S EPEE



PARIS, France, July 28, 2024 – USA’s Olympic champion Lee Kiefer and Japan’s Koki Kano won gold medals in individual women’s foil and men’s epee fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games.

Women’s Individual Foil (34 Fencers)

Kiefer faced teammate Lauren Scruggs in the final bout of women’s foil, winning the Olympic gold medal with a score of 15-6. She is the third woman in history to win multiple Olympic gold medals in women’s individual foil, after Valentina Vezzali (ITA, 3) and Ilona Elek (HUN, 2). In the semifinal round, Scruggs won against Canada’s Eleanor Harvey, 15-9, while Kiefer defeated Italy’s two-time world champion Alice Volpi, 15-10. Harvey won the bronze medal bout against Volpi, 15-12. Of note, in the quarterfinals Scruggs beat Italy’s two-time world champion Arianna Errigo, 15-14, and in the round of 32, Poland’s Julia Walczyk-Klimaszuk won against France’s world champion Ysaora Thibus, 15-12.

“I feel good, I feel relaxed, my face hurts from smiling so much”, said Kiefer. “No matter how much I prepare, I put pressure on myself and work to fence well and stay present. As a woman, we’ve seen so much growth in our women’s programs in the past decade for me and for Lauren to be on the podium, it really makes a statement.”

Men's Individual Epee (35 Fencers)

Kano faced France's world champion Yannick Borel in the final bout of men's epee, winning the gold medal with a score of 15-9. This is the first-ever Olympic gold medal in an individual fencing event for Japan. In the semifinal round, Borel won against Egypt's Mohamed Elsayed, 15-9, while Kano defeated Hungary's Tibor Andrasfi, 14-13. Elsayed won the bronze medal against Andrasfi, 8-7, the first Olympic individual epee medal for Egypt. Of note, in the round of 16, Kazakhstan's Ruslan Kurbanov defeated France's world and Olympic champion Romain Cannone, 15-10 and Belgium's Neisser Loyola beat Hungary's world champion Gergely Siklosi, 14-13. In the round of 32, Venezuela's Grabiell Lugo won against Hungary's world champion Mate Tamas Koch, 15-10, and Andrasfi beat Venezuela's Olympic champion Ruben Limardo Gascon, 15-10.

"I am so very happy, but I am tired", said Kano. "It's a very good feeling. I had to focus very much today. This is so important, because it's the first individual gold medal in fencing in Japan, and this is history."

USA'S LEE KIEFER CAPTURES TWO GOLDS IN MEMORABLE OLYMPIC FINALS AND REFLECTS ON INDIVIDUAL AND TEAM SUCCESS

How did you feel about being in the final with somebody from your team?

It was amazing being in the final with Lauren [Scruggs]. I was really proud of both of us, and I don't think we expected to walk away with both gold and silver, so it was a really special moment — surprising in the best way possible.

How does it feel to be a champion in the individual and team events?

Winning individual and team each has its own flavors, but both were incredible. The team victory, in particular, was something special — having everyone come together and put in the effort made it a truly satisfying and beautiful experience.

What was your biggest challenge on the day you won your Paris 2024 medal?

No matter what tournament I'm in, I always feel incredibly nervous, especially for the first bout. It's like my feet are glued to the strip and my body feels all out-of-sorts. So, stepping out there for that first bout is definitely the toughest part for me.


What does winning this individual medal mean for the USA?



How does it feel to be an Olympic champion?

It's the best feeling! This achievement has given me even more confidence going into upcoming competitions. I was able to manage my nerves and overcome them, which prevented me from losing focus before I could find my rhythm. This success proves that Japanese athletes can succeed on the world stage in epee.

How proud does it make you to represent the Japanese people?

As a Japanese athlete, I felt it was essential to compete in a way that wouldn't bring shame to my country. I was very happy to win gold, especially with that mindset.

How did you celebrate your victory?

We celebrated by enjoying delicious food with many of the people who supported us.


What stands out as your best memory of Paris 2024?

The most memorable moment was participating in the Olympic Games and fencing on the stage of the Grand Palais. I also had the opportunity to meet many fans, which was fantastic.

How does it feel to have also won a silver medal in the team event?

FRANCE'S MANON APITHY-BRUNET, AND
HONG KONG-CHINA'S KA LONG CHEUNG
WIN GOLD MEDALS IN INDIVIDUAL
WOMEN'S SABRE AND MEN'S FOIL



PARIS, France, July 29, 2024 – France’s Manon Apithy-Brunet and Ka Long Cheung won gold medals in individual women’s sabre and men’s foil fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. International Olympic Committee President and Olympic men’s foil gold medallist Thomas Bach attended the evening’s finals.

Women’s Individual Sabre (36 Fencers)

Apithy-Brunet faced teammate Sara Balzer in the final bout of women’s sabre, winning the Olympic gold medal with a score of 15-12. This was France’s first-ever Olympic gold medal in women’s sabre. In the semifinal round, Balzer won against Ukraine’s four-time world champion Olga Kharlan, 15-7, while Apithy-Brunet defeated Korea’s Sebin Choi, 15-12. The bronze medal went to Kharlan over Choi, 15-14. Of note, in the round of 16, Choi beat Japan’s two-time world champion Misaki Emura, 15-7.

“This morning when I woke up I was thinking I was scared, I’m alive, and I’ll just do my best and just enjoy all the people here and we’ll see”, said Apithy-Brunet. “Tonight, I’ll take my medal and sleep with it. Today I felt many emotions – every match was difficult. I was scared, I’m happy, I’m stressed, and I just accepted them, I said to myself if you want to cry, cry; if you want to smile, smile; and go all the day with this.”

“I got the first women’s sabre medal for France in Tokyo, and now I am happy and proud for my country that I have the first gold, in Paris.”

Men's Individual Foil (37 Fencers)

Cheung faced Italy's Filippo Macchi in the final bout of men's foil, winning his second Olympic gold medal with a score of 15-14. In the semifinal round, Macchi won against USA's Nick Itkin, 15-11, while Cheung defeated Japan's Kazuki Iimura, 15-11. Itkin won the bronze medal bout against Iimura, 15-12. Of note, in the quarterfinals, Cheung beat France's two-time world champion Enzo Lefort, 15-14, and in the table of 16, France's Maxime Pauty won against Italy's world champion Tommaso Marini, 15-14.

"This is wonderful, one of the best days of my life," said Cheung. "I got back-to-back golds, and with my French coach, in Paris—that means so much. In the final tonight, I was down 14-12, and in my mind I said I have to try my best, and I made a comeback."

"When I got my last gold Olympic gold medal, everyone in Hong Kong went crazy and everyone was psyched to fence and be a fencer. I hope like last time this will create even more fencers in Hong Kong. This is a very beautiful competition, one of the best in my life."

FROM FOURTH IN RIO 2016 TO GOLD IN PARIS 2024:

MANON APITHY-BRUNET WINS FRANCE'S FIRST-EVER OLYMPIC GOLD MEDAL IN WOMEN'S SABRE.

After being fourth in Rio and third in Tokyo, can you tell us your path to becoming an Olympic Champion in Paris?

In Tokyo, I won a bronze medal [ed. in individual] and silver in team, and I thought, "Alright, I need one more colour." So I came back to Paris, made a big change in my life, and decided, "I'm going to stop training at INSEP [ed. the French National Institute of Sport, Expertise, and Performance] and join the Christian Bauer Academy in Orléans." My husband [ed. French Olympic fencer Boladé Apithy] and I moved there together.

For the past three years, I've been training with a new team under Christian Bauer and adopting his fencing style. It felt like starting fencing from scratch again. There were so many new things to learn, and I got to train not only with French fencers but with athletes from all over the world, which was really great.

How does it feel to be an Olympic champion?

It's difficult to realise. I asked some Olympic champions, "Do you ever fully realise it?" and they told me, "It will take a few months to sink in, but for now, just enjoy the moment."

What does winning this medal mean for your country?

Winning a gold medal for France is a significant achievement. Many people were watching, and the Grand Palais was packed. A lot of kids saw the fencing event and are now inspired to start themselves, which makes me very proud. As the first French female sabre fencer to win a gold medal, this is a great milestone for French fencing.


What was your biggest challenge on the day you won your Paris 2024 medal?

On the day of the competition, I remember my semifinal match against the Greek fencer Theodora Gkountoura. Every point was hard-fought, and it was impossible to tell who would land the final touch and win until the very end.

What stands out as the biggest memory of Paris 2024?

My favourite memory was when my husband embraced me after the win. I wanted to win the gold medal and celebrate with him, and that's exactly what we did.







TWO-TIME OLYMPIC CHAMPION KA LONG CHEUNG

REFLECTS ON MAKING HISTORY FOR HIS COUNTRY

How does it feel to be a two-time Olympic champion?

Winning my first Olympic title in Tokyo was incredible—it was everything I had been working for. I started fencing when I was about nine or ten, and at each stage of my journey, I set new goals. Once I became a professional athlete, my ultimate dream was to become an Olympic champion. I could hardly believe it in Tokyo, and now, having won again in Paris, the feeling is still amazing. I never imagined as a kid, watching the World Cup and seeing all the great fencers, that one day I would be one of them.

Looking back at how hard I've worked over the past three years to stay in top form for Paris, it was tough, but I enjoyed the journey—and it was absolutely worth it.

Vivian Kong, also from Hong Kong, also won a gold in the women's individual epee event. What it means for the growth of fencing in Hong Kong?


Honestly, it feels surreal—absolutely crazy. Typically, the French and Italians dominate fencing; they're always ranked at the top and usually fighting for gold. But now, with both Vivian Kong and I winning gold medals, it's like we've shaken up the rankings. We're so excited because this is something that's never happened before in our history. For Hong Kong, it means so much. In the past, we've always just aimed for a single Olympic medal, but now we have two in fencing—it's incredible.

This has given us a huge boost in confidence, showing everyone from Hong Kong who fences that it's possible—we did it! For my country, it's monumental. Hong Kong's first Olympic gold medal was in 1996, and now I'm the second to win a medal, and it's been such a long time. I wasn't even born yet—I was born in 1997! So this achievement is amazing, and the support from the people of Hong Kong has been overwhelming. It means the world to them, and it means the world to me that we've been able to accomplish this.

What was your greatest challenge during that competition day before winning gold?

I think almost every match was tough because anyone who makes it to the Olympics is a strong fencer. They're all highly skilled, and at that level, it's more about mental strength and who is best prepared at the moment. So for me, every match felt challenging because you're up against the best fencers in the world.

ITALY WINS GOLD MEDAL IN WOMEN'S TEAM EPEE







PARIS, France, July 30, 2024 – Italy won its first-ever gold medal in women’s team epee fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. In all, 12 gold-medal events in epee, foil and sabre individual and team competitions are being held from July 27 to August 4 at the Grand Palais.

Women’s Team Epee (8 Teams)

Italy faced France in the final match of women’s team epee, winning the Olympic gold medal with a score of 30-29. In the semifinal round, Italy won against China, 45-24, while France defeated Poland, 45-39. Poland won the bronze medal match over China, 32-31. “We are friends, we put our hearts in what we do, we work hard for one touch, one touch, one touch”, said Italy’s Mara Navarria. “For Italy, this is so important for the young, the girls and for dreamers. If they work hard, they can do it. And the Grand Palais is spectacular!”

How does it feel to be an Olympic champion in team?

It was a wonderful emotion, and it was also the first time for Italian women's epee. I am honoured to be the first epee fencer to have won the first individual medal ('16) and the first team gold ('24). We knew we were very strong, but the level of competition is very high right now, so turning our dreams into reality was incredible.

Winning the first Olympic medal in women's team epee for Italy—how special was that victory?

It was wonderful because we are a very close team, and we have won a lot over the years; the Olympic gold was the icing on the cake! The Italian epee fencers are very strong, and it's also thanks to the entire training group that we were able to train in the best possible way.


Team Italy won the final by just one point. How does the team handle the pressure of making that crucial last touch?

Teamwork was crucial. We started at a disadvantage, but we never let the match slip away. We didn't get discouraged, and in the end, we channelled all our energy to Alberta, who then delivered that beautiful final touch.

How did your work together throughout the day to reach the gold medal?

We trained together a lot, and during the training camps team events were a priority. We knew that if we played all our cards right, we could make it. All four of us tried different roles and practiced every situation to make sure we were never caught off guard by our opponents. We even watched and analysed some videos, and our coach prepared audio recordings with French crowd noise to help us get used to the loud home support!

KOREA WINS GOLD MEDAL IN MEN'S TEAM SABRE



PARIS, France, July 31, 2024 – Korea won men’s team sabre fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, the third time winning the Olympic gold medal in this event. In all, 12 gold-medal events in epee, foil and sabre individual and team competitions are being held from July 27 to August 4 at the Grand Palais.





“At the moment I won the gold medal, I had tears in my eyes”, said Korea’s Sanguk Oh, who also won the Paris 2024 gold medal in men’s individual sabre. “We had a great deal of burden on us, and this was a very important moment for us as a team. But even though our team members are changing, we are getting stronger and our team is performing well.”

How does it feel to be a three-time Olympic champion in team?

I'm thrilled to have become a three-time Olympic champion in the team event, and I'm incredibly grateful to my teammates who have stood by me through the 2012, 2020 and 2024 Olympics.

What it like preparing as a team for Paris 2024?

For this Paris Olympics, we took on the challenge with a team that had been together for less than a year. I believe that the journey we undertook to win the gold medal was our greatest challenge.


You've been part of this team for many years, how has it been to see the members change while always winning gold at the Olympic Games?

Being Olympic champion in team again, what does it say about fencing in Korea? How are you hoping to see fencing grow in Korea?



FENCING INITIATION AT THE GRAND PALAIS



The FIE hosted programmes at the Olympic Games to introduce the public and guests to fencing, including giving visitors to the Grand Palais the opportunity to learn the basics of the sport. Under the umbrella of the French Fencing Federation and direction of French fencing masters, spectators were able to try fencing each day of competition.

The official International Olympic Committee “UAP” programme gave “elite” IOC sponsors and partners such as Bridgestone and Allianz a full, private Grand Palais fencing tour and fencing initiation. The “behind the scenes” look gave sponsors a unique look into how athletes “progress” from their arrival at the Grand Palais to when they begin fencing on the piste. USA WINS GOLD MEDAL IN WOMEN'S TEAM FOIL



PARIS, France, August 1, 2024 – USA won the gold medal in women’s team foil fencing at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, the first time the country has won an Olympic gold medal in any team fencing event. In all, 12 gold-medal events in epee, foil and sabre individual and team competitions are being held from July 27 to August 4 at the Grand Palais.

Women’s Team Foil (8 Teams)


USA faced Italy in the final match of women’s team foil, winning the Olympic gold medal with a score of 45-39. In the semifinal round, Italy defeated Japan, 45-39, while USA won against Canada, 45-31. Japan won the bronze medal match over Canada, 33-32.

“I’m very shocked, I have no words to describe it”, said USA’s Lauren Scruggs. “I think it’s super-cool and unbelievable to make history. The last bout was a tough one, I was dealing with some injuries, and Errigo is super-good and it’s so stressful to be the anchor. I locked-in, kept fighting, had a good lead, and I managed to close it out.

Our strategy was just to be better fighters, we doubled-down and we fought better. I’m proud of my teammates, happy to make my country proud, and hopefully this is the start of a long continuation of great women’s foil and American fencing. This is a whole family effort, and thank you to everyone for your support.”


What was your greatest challenge as a team before winning gold?








DAY SEVEN

This was Hungary’s fourth time winning the men’s team epee event at the Olympics, last taking the title in 1972. In all, 12 gold-medal events in epee, foil and sabre individual and team competitions are being held from July 27 to August 4 at the Grand Palais.

Men’s Team Epee (8 Teams)


Hungary faced Japan in the final match of men’s team epee, winning the Olympic gold medal with a score of 26-25. In the semifinal round, Japan won against Czechia, 45-37, while Hungary defeated France, 45-30. Czechia won the bronze medal over France, 43-41.

“I knew there was something special about the team event”, said Hungary’s Gergely Siklosi. “We worked a lot these past months and were absolutely ready for this challenge. We had different strategies for each team, and against Japan we knew they want to use defensive tactics and we had to attack them and it was crucial that we had the lead. Still, they managed to equalize it. This event and venue have been on our minds since being announced, and the Grand Palais is the most beautiful place I have ever fenced in my life.”

How does it feel to be an Olympic champion in team?

Being an Olympic champion in a team event is different from winning individually. You get to share that exact moment with your teammates, go through it together and help each other process what happened. When you win with the team, you're definitely not alone.

1972 was the last time that team Hungary won gold, how does it make it even more special?

In 1972, the Hungarian epee team won gold, and the last Hungarian team to win at all was our men's sabre team in 1988. That was a long time ago as well. We have now joined a special club, and with that comes the responsibility to behave and live up to the standards that this group requires.

Team Hungary won the final by just one point. How does the team handle the pressure of making that crucial last touch?

By now, I think they're used to it. This season, I've had many matches that came down to a single touch, and I can proudly say I've won them all. I had prepared for that moment when it came at the Olympics, and my mind didn't let me down. I can't speak for what went through their minds when I lost the two-point lead, but I'm sure they're happy with the final touch.


What was your greatest challenge as a team before winning gold? (during that day)

We are moderate in our celebrations. We were happy, couldn't sleep for days and were smiling all the time. We still are.




Women’s Team Sabre (8 teams)

After winning bronze in individual, how does it feel to be an Olympic champion in team, for a second time?

It feels amazing, of course. I was also really happy with my bronze medal, which was unexpected since my bout against the Korean fencer [ed. Choi Sebin] was incredibly tough. Competing for bronze at the Olympics for the third time isn't easy, but I was proud to bring home Ukraine's first medal at Paris 2024. After the individual event, though, I set my bronze medal aside and didn't look at it again until the competition was over, because I knew I had to focus on the team event. Winning gold after 16 years since our victory in Beijing is just unbelievable, and I'm beyond happy with what we accomplished in Paris.

In the final, Korea was leading throughout. How did your team work together under this pressure to win gold?

I think we didn't feel too much pressure because we knew we already had a medal secured. Of course, we were focused on winning the final, but we weren't fixated on the colour of the medal. We were simply thinking about how to win the match, knowing that if we succeeded, everything would fall into place.

It was ironic to feel that calm in the Olympic final, with so much pressure, but I'm so happy I managed to deliver exactly what I'd been working toward throughout the season and the entire Olympic cycle. My team and I believed in each other, we trusted our coaches, and in that moment, we went for it and made it happen.



How did your team support each other throughout the day to reach the gold medal?

We've always been incredibly supportive of each other. We've fenced together for many years, through countless seasons, and we've faced some very difficult moments as a team. It's during those hard times that you truly test the strength of your team and your friendships. To us, we're more than just a team—we're like family, best friends who have shared the same life and the same dream throughout this whole Olympic cycle.


What was your greatest challenge during that competition day as a team before winning gold?

All of the matches that day were extremely tough because we were fighting for a medal, for our dream. The first one, against Italy, was especially challenging because it was the crucial first step we had to overcome. We succeeded because we had put in so much work and preparation for that match. Afterwards, we just waited to see who our next opponent would be, and it turned out to be Japan.

They were a team we hadn't faced often in competition, which made it interesting. We stayed positive, knowing we had to be stronger and that no matter what, we couldn't give up.

PARIS, France, August 4, 2024 – Japan won the gold medal in men’s team foil on the final day of fencing competition at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, the first time the country has ever won this event. International Olympic Committee President Thomas Bach, who is an Olympic gold medallist in men’s team foil, presented the medals with FIE Interim President Emmanuel Katsiadakis.

In all, 12 gold-medal events in epee, foil and sabre individual and team competitions have been held from July 27 to August 4 at the Grand Palais.


Men’s Team Foil (8 teams)

“I can’t believe what we’ve achieved here today”, said Japan’s Kyosuke Matsuyama. “This is for the future, for the kids in Japan, and I hope in the future there will be many Japanese medals in fencing. France was our very hardest match today, this is their home country, and everyone was cheering for them but we stayed focused on each touch and we beat them. This is a really amazing venue—at the last Olympics in Tokyo there were no crowds, but here everyone was cheering, even for us.”

We always respected each other and weren't afraid to show our emotions and we spoke positive words to one another.


What does this Olympic gold mean for the future of fencing in Japan?


